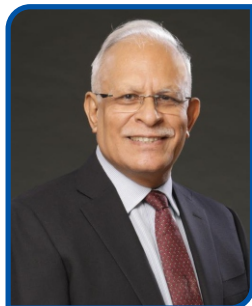

1. The General Circular Nos. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020 and various subsequent Circulars latest being No. 09/2024 dated September 19, 2024 issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (collectively referred to as “MCA Circulars”) permitted the holding of the Meeting through Video Conferencing/Other Audio Visual Means (VC/OAVM), without the physical presence of the Shareholders at a common venue. In compliance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (the “Act”), SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (“Listing Regulations”) and the MCA Circulars, the Annual General Meeting (“AGM”) of the Company is being held through VC/OAVM. The venue of AGM shall be deemed to be the Registered Office of the Company.
2. As the AGM shall be conducted through VC / OAVM, physical attendance of members is not required and the facility for appointment of Proxy by the Members is not available for this AGM and hence the Proxy Form and Attendance Slip including Route Map are not annexed to this Notice.
3. The Explanatory Statement pursuant to Section 102 of the Act setting out material facts concerning the business under Item Nos. 4 to 6 of the Notice is annexed hereto. The relevant details pursuant to Regulation 36(3) of the Listing Regulations and Secretarial Standards on General Meetings (SS-2) issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI), in respect of Directors seeking appointment/re- appointment at this AGM are also annexed. Mr. Arun Raghuvirraj Bhandari and Ms. Rohini Bhandari are relatives of each other as defined under Section 2(77) of the Companies Act, 2013.
4. The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before & after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available to at least 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis. 5. Institutional / Corporate shareholders (i.e. other than individuals, HUF, NRI, etc.) are required to send a scanned copy (PDF / JPG Format) of their respective Board or governing body Resolution / Authorisation etc., authorising their representative to attend the AGM through VC / OAVM on their behalf and to vote through remote e-Voting. 6. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.
7. In line with aforementioned MCA and SEBI Circulars, the Notice of the AGM along with the Annual Report 2024-25 is being sent only through e-mail, to those Members whose e-mail addresses are registered with the Company/ Registrar & Share Transfer Agent (RTA)/ Depository Participant/ Depositories. The Notice convening the 52nd AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.mmpil.com and may also be accessed from the relevant section of the websites of the Stock Exchange i.e. National Stock Exchange of India Limited at www.nseindia.com.
8. Record Date, Book Closure and Dividend:
 - a) The Company has fixed **Monday, 1st September, 2025** as the ‘**Record Date**’ for determining entitlement of members to dividend for the financial year ended 31st March, 2024, if approved at the AGM.
 - b) The Register of Members and the Share Transfer Books of the Company will be closed from Monday, 1st September, 2025 to 8th September, 2025 (both days inclusive).
 - c) If the dividend, as recommended by the Board of Directors, is approved at the AGM, payment of such dividend subject to deduction of tax at source will be made within 30 days from the date of AGM as under:
 - i. To all Beneficial Owners in respect of shares held in dematerialised form as per the data as may be made available by the National Securities Depository Limited (“NSDL”) and the Central Depository Services (India) Limited (“CDSL”), collectively “Depositories”, as of end of day on **Monday, 1st September, 2025**;
9. Pursuant to Finance Act 2020, dividend income is taxable in the hands of shareholders w.e.f. 1st April, 2020 and the Company is required to deduct tax at source from dividend paid to shareholders at the prescribed rates. For the prescribed rates for various categories, please refer to the Finance Act, 2020 and the amendments thereof. The shareholders are requested to update their PAN with the Depository Participant (if shares held in electronic form) and Company / RTA (if shares held in physical form). A Resident individual shareholder with PAN and who is not liable to pay income tax can submit a yearly declaration in Form No. 15G / 15H, to avail the benefit of non-deduction of tax at source by e-mail to companysecretary@mmpil.com / tds@bigshareonline.com by 11:59 p.m. IST on 1st September, 2025. Shareholders are requested to note that in case their PAN is not registered, the tax will be deducted at a higher rate of 20%. Non-resident shareholders [including Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) / Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs)] can avail beneficial rates under tax treaty between India and their country of tax residence, subject to providing necessary documents i.e. No Permanent Establishment and Beneficial Ownership Declaration, Tax Residency Certificate, Form 10F, any other document which may be required to avail the tax treaty benefits. For this purpose the shareholder may submit the above documents (PDF / JPG Format) by e-mail to companysecretary@mmpil.com / tds@bigshareonline.com. The aforesaid declarations and documents need to be submitted by the shareholders by 11:59 p.m. IST on 1st September, 2025.

 - a. **Shares held in electronic form:** Members may please note that their bank details as furnished by the respective Depositories to the Company will be considered for remittance of dividend as per the applicable regulations of the Depositories and the Company will not entertain any direct request from such Members for change/addition/deletion in such bank details. Accordingly, the Members holding shares in demat form are requested to update their Electronic Bank Mandate with their respective Depository Participants (DP).
12. Members seeking any information with regard to the financial statements or any matter to be placed at the AGM, are requested to write to the Company on or before 1st September, 2025 through e-mail on companysecretary@mmpil.com. The same will be replied by the Company suitably.
13. To prevent fraudulent transactions, Members are advised to exercise due diligence and notify the Company of any change in address or demise of any Member as soon as possible. Members are also advised not to leave their demat account(s) dormant for long. Periodic statement of holdings should be obtained from the concerned DPs and holdings should be verified from time to time.

THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR REMOTE E-VOTING ARE AS UNDER:

- i. The voting period begins on Thursday, 4th September, 2025 at 9.00 a.m, and ends on Sunday, 7th September, 2025 at 5.00 p.m. During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date- 1st September, 2025 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by Bigshare for voting thereafter.
- ii. Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- iii. Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. **SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020**, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to **all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants**. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

- iv. In terms of **SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020** on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

1.3 DIVIDEND

ALUMINIUM POWDERS

The revenue for the segment in the FY 2024-25 was Rs. 43,835.43 Lakhs the revenue of Rs. 39,039.81 Lakhs in FY 2023-24.

ALUMINIUM FOILS

The revenue for the segment in the FY 2024-25 was Rs. 15,441.20 Lakhs over the revenue of Rs 10,703.89 Lakhs in FY 2023-24.

ALUMINIUM CONDUCTORS & CABLES

The revenue for the segment in the FY 2024-25 was Rs. 9666.99 Lakhs up over the revenue of Rs. 7865.91 Lakhs of FY 2023-24.

FUTURE PLANS / PROSPECTS:-**Aluminium Powders**

The Aluminium Powders division delivered strong revenue growth of 25% year-on-year in Q4FY25 and 12% for the full year FY25, outperforming industry benchmarks and reflecting healthy demand.

However, demand has been subdued in Q1FY26, particularly from the explosives segment. Export volumes have also declined due to the economic slowdown in Europe. Considering the current market conditions and the impact of the recent fire incident (note below), we anticipate single-digit growth for the Powder division in FY26.

The Phase III capacity expansion of 2,500 MTPA (Pyro and Flake) has been partially commissioned and is expected to be fully operational by the end of Q2FY26.

Aluminium Foils

The Foil segment delivered exceptional revenue growth of 89% year-on-year in Q4FY25 and 44% for the full year FY25, driven by strong demand across all product categories and consistent supply of foil stock from Hindalco, our key supplier.

Our brand, MMP, continues to gain strong traction among foil customers, reinforcing our position as a preferred vendor across diverse customer segments.

Margins have improved, supported by robust demand and the recent withdrawal of export incentives by the Chinese Government, which has increased the cost of imports and benefited domestic producers.

Aluminium Conductors and Cables

The Aluminium Conductor and Cables division recorded strong revenue growth of 39% year-on-year in Q4FY25 and 23% for the full year FY25, driven by sustained demand in the segment.

We expect this positive momentum to continue in FY26 with further improved margins.

MMP Electricals Private Limited [MEPL] – WOS

During the period under review, the Company has incorporated its new WOS- Wholly Owned Subsidiary namely MMP Electricals Private Limited on 24th September, 2025, to the manufacturing of composite insulators for the power distribution and transmission sectors. This strategic decision marks the company's diversification from aluminium products to electrical infrastructure products and exploit the market synergy with its conductor & cable division. This diversification is aimed to take advantage of the golden era of electrical infrastructural development in India.

Commercial production is expected to commence in Q2FY26 of Phase I, we anticipate to reach full capacity by end of FY 25-26.

Encouraged by strong market feedback and the promising growth potential, the company has already initiated Phase II expansion and will be completed by Q2 FY26-27.

Note on Fire Incident

An explosion and fire incident occurred at the Aluminium Powder Plant in Umred on 11th April, 2025. The incident took place in the post-production area, not in the main production zone. It caused significant damage to the building and parts of the post-production machinery. Additionally, Aluminium Powder stock was destroyed in the finished goods (FG) godown and partially damaged in the work-in-progress (WIP) section.

Tragically, the incident resulted in 7 fatalities and 4 injuries. The company promptly announced and disbursed monetary compensation to the families of the deceased and the injured.

Powder Plant operations (at Umred only) were suspended for over a month. However, all customer demands were fulfilled from the Bhandara and Hingna locations of the powder division. The company also had buffer inventory which has helped overcome this challenge.

The estimated loss of ₹ 150 – 200 Mn, covering damage to plant and machinery, the building, and burnt stock, is fully insured. The company is actively working toward the early settlement of the insurance claim.

The Company has been giving utmost priority to conservation of various forms of energy used in the manufacturing process. The major conservation measures implemented so far are optimization of utility output to match process requirement thereby reducing wasteful running of equipment and timely replacement or servicing wherever required. Progressively, we are replacing normal Star Delta Starters with VFD’S for various machines.

The major Energy conservation projects implemented in FY 2024-2025 are as follows:

- 1) Load Factor improvement above 85 % and its monitoring and control to ensure the incentives and government subsidy from MSEDCL implemented. Benefits accrued are sizable amounts.
- 2) During the FY 2024-25 the company has taken steps for replacing normal Star Delta Starters with VFD’S for various machines.
- 3) The Company is replacing progressively with IE3 Motors. This leads to conserve the energy to large extent.
- 4) The Company has replaced the old fluorescent lights with the new energy efficient LED lights.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

ECONOMIC OVERVIEW AND OUTLOOK

Global Economy

As we progressed through FY 2024–25, the global economy continued its journey toward recovery, marked by resilience amidst persisting structural and geopolitical challenges. The post-pandemic landscape has settled into a phase of moderate and uneven growth, with inflation gradually converging toward central bank targets. Global headline inflation is estimated to have declined to around 5.9% in 2024, supported by easing commodity prices, improved labour market dynamics, and declining energy-related shocks.

The aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic, compounded by disruptions caused by the Russia-Ukraine conflict and escalating tensions in the Middle East, has had a lasting impact on global supply chains, food and energy markets, and capital flows. These disruptions initially triggered inflationary pressures and forced central banks across the globe to implement synchronized monetary tightening.

Following a sharp slowdown in 2022 and a mild contraction in 2023, global output growth remained subdued during 2024, registering the third consecutive year of below-trend performance. This persistent deceleration reflects structural inefficiencies such as the misallocation of resources, declining private sector investment, a shrinking working-age population in key economies, and a general slowdown in total factor productivity. These trends have been further complicated by heightened geopolitical instability, especially in energy-sensitive regions.

According to the latest World Economic Outlook by the International Monetary Fund (IMF), advanced economies are showing signs of modest recovery, with GDP growth expected to inch up from 1.6% in 2023 to 1.7% in 2024 and 1.8% in 2025. For emerging markets and developing economies, growth is expected to remain steady at 4.2% in both 2024 and 2025. Low-income developing countries are projected to see stronger momentum, with GDP growth rising from 4.0% in 2023 to 4.7% in 2024 and 5.2% in 2025, as near-term challenges begin to fade.

Inflation expectations in advanced economies have declined meaningfully, and long-term inflation remains well-anchored. It is anticipated that many central banks will begin reducing policy interest rates in the second half of 2024, depending on the pace of disinflation and financial sector stability.

The moderation in inflation is underpinned by waning energy price shocks and an easing of supply-side constraints. Labour markets have also begun to rebalance, with job vacancies declining, a marginal uptick in unemployment, and enhanced labour supply driven in part by immigration.

Despite the steady macro indicators, the global economic outlook is tempered by several downside risks. These include possible commodity price spikes due to unresolved geopolitical conflicts, diverging disinflation paths leading to currency volatility, and financial sector vulnerabilities emerging from delayed impacts of high interest rates. Household debt burdens, particularly in economies with variable-rate mortgage exposures, are expected to weigh on consumption as refinancing pressures mount.

Public debt levels remain elevated, particularly in advanced and low-income economies where pandemic-related fiscal support led to a significant increase in debt-to-GDP ratios. Interest payments have consumed a growing share of fiscal revenues—estimated at 14.3% for low-income countries in 2024—constraining fiscal space for growth-enhancing investments. Consequently, tighter fiscal consolidation strategies, including tax hikes and expenditure rationalization, are expected in many economies going forward.

On the trade front, while global merchandise trade growth has been sluggish, the outlook shows signs of improvement. According to the OECD's February 2024 Interim Economic Outlook, a resurgence in semiconductor production and automobile sales, especially in Asia, is aiding recovery. The rebound in global air travel is also boosting services trade. However, logistical disruptions—particularly in the Red Sea region—have led to a rise in shipping costs and transit delays, affecting Asia-Europe trade routes.

As the global economy enters FY 2025–26, balancing inflation control with growth revival, mitigating geopolitical risks, and sustaining investor confidence will remain at the heart of economic policymaking worldwide.

Indian Economy

Amidst a challenging global backdrop, India continues to demonstrate robust economic momentum, solidifying its position as the world's fastest-growing major economy. The country's economic resilience in FY 2024–25 has been powered by strong domestic consumption, resilient rural demand, steady private investments, and sustained growth across core sectors such as manufacturing, construction, and services. India ends the fiscal year on a positive note—characterized by healthy GDP growth, moderating inflation, a stable external sector, and encouraging employment trends.

With a real GDP growth of 8.2% in FY 2023–24 and a projected growth of 7.2% for FY 2024–25, India remains on track to become the third-largest global economy by 2027, surpassing Japan and Germany. Additionally, it is expected to host the third-largest stock market by 2030, driven by its expanding technological ecosystem, green energy transition, and demographic advantages.

Despite facing global headwinds such as rising crude oil prices, commodity market volatility, and persistent supply chain constraints, India's macroeconomic fundamentals remain robust. The country's digital transformation, progressive policy reforms, and targeted sectoral incentives have created a conducive environment for long-term economic expansion.

Indian capital markets outperformed most emerging market peers during FY 2024, buoyed by strong foreign portfolio inflows—marking the highest cumulative FPI levels in the past five years. Equities remained the preferred investment class, with continued interest in government and corporate debt. This strong investor confidence reflects India's large consumer base, young and skilled labour force, and the government's reforms across education, digital infrastructure, logistics, and manufacturing.

Infrastructure development remained a central pillar of growth in FY 2024–25. Projects under the Bharatmala, Sagarmala, and Smart Cities Mission witnessed significant execution progress. These initiatives are enhancing regional connectivity, modernizing logistics, and reshaping the urban and industrial landscape. The government's push for domestic semiconductor manufacturing and advanced technologies also aims to reduce import dependence and accelerate investment in AI and electronics manufacturing.

The industrial sector experienced a slower pace of growth in FY2024–25, with the Index of Industrial Production (IIP) expanding by 4.0%, marking a four-year low and the weakest post-Covid performance. In March 2025, IIP growth inched up to 3.0% year-on-year, slightly below expectations, but reflecting some recovery from February's 2.7% rise. The uptick was driven by improved performance in manufacturing (+3.0%) and electricity generation (+6.3%), although this was partially offset by subdued mining activity, which grew by just 0.4%. Among use-based segments, infrastructure and construction goods, consumer durables, and basic metals supported growth, while capital goods output moderated. On the downside, consumer non-durables witnessed a sharp contraction of 4.7%, continuing a two-month declining trend. The overall deceleration was influenced by weaker momentum in core sectors, base effects, and sectoral disparities, suggesting a cautious outlook for industrial recovery in the near term.

Provisional estimates for FY 2024–25 peg Real GDP growth at 6.5%, down from 9.2% in FY 2023–24, while Real GVA is expected to rise by 6.4% versus 8.6% earlier. Nominal GDP and GVA are projected to grow by 9.8% and 9.5%, respectively. Sectoral drivers in Q4 FY2024–25 included construction (+10.8%), public administration (+8.7%), and financial services (+7.8%). Inflation remained contained, with CPI inflation for FY2024–25 projected at 4.5%, continuing the disinflationary trend seen in late FY2023–24. India remains the world's fastest-growing major economy, with real GDP growth estimated at 6.5% in 2024–25 and expected to continue at the same pace in 2025–26. This steady performance stands out amid global uncertainty.

Driven by strong domestic demand, easing inflation, robust capital markets, and rising exports, the economy shows resilience and balance. Indicators like record forex reserves, a manageable current account deficit, and rising foreign investment highlight growing global confidence in India's long-term potential.

While the global environment poses risks—such as geopolitical instability, energy price shocks, and trade fragmentation—India's diversified economic structure and prudent policy framework position it well to manage volatility. Overall, real GDP growth for FY 2024–25 is forecasted at 7.2%, with quarterly projections ranging between 7.2% and 7.3%.

Industry Overview and Outlook

Aluminium Industry

Aluminium continues to be a cornerstone of modern industrial applications, valued for its unique combination of lightness, durability, corrosion resistance, and high conductivity. Its usage has become increasingly critical across multiple sectors—ranging from aerospace and automotive to packaging, infrastructure, and electrical transmission. The growing demand for lighter, energy-efficient, and recyclable materials has further elevated aluminium's strategic importance in the global transition towards sustainable industrial practices.

In the automotive sector, aluminium usage is steadily increasing as manufacturers aim to enhance fuel efficiency and meet stricter emission norms. Electric vehicle (EV) manufacturers, in particular, are adopting aluminium extensively to reduce vehicle weight and improve battery range, making it a vital enabler of green mobility. Simultaneously, aluminium's presence in consumer electronics, construction materials, and packaging solutions underscores its indispensable role in both industrial and everyday applications.

The global aluminium market, valued at USD 243.89 billion in 2024, is projected to reach approximately USD 393.70 billion by 2032, growing at a CAGR of 6.2% (Fortune Business Insights, 2024). This expansion is driven by several structural factors, including the surge in demand for sustainable and lightweight materials in automotive, aerospace, and construction sectors (GlobeNewswire, 2025). Additionally, there is increasing adoption of recycled aluminium and advancements in manufacturing technologies such as precision alloying, automated smelting, and closed-loop recycling systems (GM Insights, 2025).

The automotive and beverage sectors continue to be major contributors to aluminium recycling, significantly promoting circular economy practices and reducing the industry's carbon footprint. With recycled aluminium consuming just 5% of the energy required for primary production, it is rapidly gaining regulatory and commercial preference (GM Insights, 2025). Moreover, rising consumer awareness and stringent environmental regulations are expected to further accelerate the transition toward low-emission, recyclable materials in the coming years (Reuters, 2025). The sector benefits from India's ample bauxite reserves, with Odisha alone contributing more than half of the country's production.

Key demand drivers include the transportation, construction, packaging, energy, aerospace, and defense sectors, increasingly propelled by government initiatives like Make in India, Production-Linked Incentive (PLI) schemes, and import substitution policies. For instance, aluminium's use in lightweight freight rail wagons and electric vehicle components supports national efforts toward fuel efficiency and advanced manufacturing. The packaging industry—especially cans and foils—also continues to boost demand, driven by sustainability trends.

Environmental compliance and sustainability initiatives are significant considerations, with producers like Vedanta committing to renewable power and green aluminium production rather than expanding coal-based capacity. Further, major capacity expansions, such as Vedanta's planned multiple-million-tonne smelters in Odisha, reinforce both domestic production and downstream value creation.

Moreover, India's packaging industry—especially in the food and beverage segment—is experiencing a marked rise in aluminium consumption, driven by evolving consumer preferences for convenience, hygiene, and sustainability. Aluminium foil and rigid containers are preferred choices due to their superior barrier properties, reusability, and compliance with safety norms.

Despite these positive developments, the industry faces operational and regulatory challenges. Evolving environmental norms, energy efficiency mandates, and emission control requirements have increased compliance costs. Aluminium manufacturing is energy-intensive, and aligning with green production standards demands significant capital investment in technology upgradation, waste management systems, and clean energy sourcing. While these regulations are essential for long-term environmental sustainability, they pose short-term pressures on profitability and require industry players to recalibrate their operations.

Looking ahead, the aluminium industry in FY 2026 is expected to benefit from structural shifts in global supply chains, increasing integration of green technologies, and policy incentives for sustainable manufacturing. Companies with strong backward integration, efficient recycling systems, and technological capabilities are well-positioned to capitalize on the emerging opportunities while navigating the evolving regulatory landscape.

INDUSTRY OR SECTOR WISE PERFORMANCE

Aluminium Powder

Aluminium powder, a fine, silvery-white, lightweight material produced through the milling of aluminium metal, plays a critical role across a wide array of industrial applications. Owing to its high reactivity, thermal conductivity, and corrosion resistance, it is widely used in industries such as aerospace, automotive, construction, defence, and energy. Its flammable nature and high surface area make it especially suitable for applications requiring combustion or energy release, such as pyrotechnics and explosives.

In recent years, aluminium powder has become increasingly vital in modern manufacturing technologies, particularly additive manufacturing and 3D printing, where its strength-to-weight ratio and ability to withstand high temperatures enhance the quality of complex components. The automotive industry continues to drive demand, leveraging aluminium powder to develop lightweight, fuel-efficient, and low-emission vehicles. Simultaneously, the aerospace sector, fuelled by advancements in aviation and defence, is integrating aluminium powder in the development of precision-engineered, lightweight components.

Another significant area of growth is renewable energy, where aluminium powder is used in the fabrication of solar panels, wind turbine components, and energy-efficient conductors. Its recyclability further aligns with global efforts toward sustainable development and circular economy practices.

The moderate but steady growth is fueled by increasing urbanization, rapid development in the construction and automotive sectors, technological innovation, and rising consumption in paints, coatings, and pigments. The Asia-Pacific region, particularly India and China, remains the largest contributor to demand, driven by aggressive industrialization and infrastructure expansion.

In the Indian context, the aluminium powder market reached 43,977 tons in 2023 and is expected to grow to 71,142 tons by 2032, reflecting a strong CAGR of 5.49%. This significant growth is underpinned by rising applications across sectors such as explosives, chemical manufacturing, paint production, and metallurgy. Additionally, the increasing utilization of aluminium powder in automotive coatings, thermal spray technologies, and additive manufacturing is contributing to sustained market momentum within the country.

Construction and Housing

India's construction sector continues to be a cornerstone of the country's economic development, with infrastructure and housing forming the foundation of national growth. Recognized as a high-priority area by the Government of India, the sector has seen unprecedented levels of investment, policy support, and execution momentum in FY 2024–25.

The Union Budget 2024-25 builds upon the transformative step taken in 2023, maintaining robust fiscal support for infrastructure development. This year's capital expenditure allocation stands at ₹11.11 lakh crore (approximately 3.4% of GDP), aimed at fostering modern, connected, and sustainable urban ecosystems. Alongside fiscal support, regulatory reforms like GST rationalization and RERA implementation have increased transparency, strengthened investor confidence, and revived momentum in the real estate segment.

India has emerged as the third-largest recipient of Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) in the construction and real estate space, reflecting strong investor confidence. This trend is further reinforced by rising private equity and sovereign fund participation, transforming the sector into a technology-driven, globally competitive landscape.

The construction sector's contribution to GDP is at historic highs, with Gross Value Added (GVA) from construction growing by 9% in FY 2023–24. Growth continues to be propelled by ambitious public infrastructure investments across transportation, urban housing, water resource management, and renewable energy sectors.

Several flagship government initiatives are driving this momentum:

- Bharatmala Pariyojana: Development of 34,800 km of national highways
- Sagarmala Programme: Over 800 port and logistics infrastructure projects
- PM Gati Shakti: Integrated infrastructure planning and execution
- Greenfield Airports: 21 new sites under development, including Navi Mumbai and Jewar International Airport

These strategic initiatives have not only enhanced India's infrastructure backbone but have also unlocked long-term opportunities for contractors, material suppliers, and allied industries.

This infrastructure surge directly benefits aluminium-intensive applications, boosting demand for foils, cables, structural components, and aluminium powder used in concrete and coating formulations. Additionally, the expansion of tunneling and foundation work has increased the requirement for industrial explosives, further linking the construction boom with upstream material industries.

Explosives for Mining and Infrastructure

Aluminium powder plays a pivotal role in the explosives industry, where it enhances the energy output and thermal performance of explosives used in mining, construction, defence, and infrastructure. Its rapid oxidation reaction makes it essential in producing thermite mixtures, slurry explosives, and ANFO (Ammonium Nitrate Fuel Oil). It also finds application in rocket propellants and pyrotechnics, where it provides brilliance and combustion strength.

The global explosives market, valued at USD 53.2 billion in 2024, is expected to reach USD 67.87 billion by 2028, growing at a CAGR of 6.3%. The rising demand is fueled by:

- Intensified construction and mining activity,
- Government investments in infrastructure and defence,
- Rapid urbanization and increased tunnel development.

Countries such as India, China, UAE, and Saudi Arabia have led large-scale tunnel and highway construction using industrial explosives. India's infrastructure growth, combined with its strategic mining and mineral exploration agenda, has made it a significant consumer of industrial explosives.

India is also undergoing regulatory transformation in this space. The Explosives Bill, 2024—intended to replace the colonial-era Explosives Act of 1884—proposes a modern framework for licensing, usage limits, compliance, and penalties. Once enacted, it is expected to create a safer, more accountable environment for handling high-energy materials.

While growth prospects are strong, the industry must navigate operational risks related to environmental safety, logistics, and regulatory oversight. Manufacturers are increasingly required to adopt international best practices, including real-time inventory tracking, GPS-based transport monitoring, and controlled storage systems.

With aluminium powder at the core of energy-intensive formulations, MMP Industries Limited remains well-positioned to serve this growing market with quality-assured, application-specific powder grades.

Aluminium Foil

The aluminium foil industry continues to experience robust growth in FY 2024–25, driven by evolving consumer preferences, rapid urbanisation, and increased demand for convenience-based packaging. The shift towards on-the-go consumption, rising penetration of quick-service restaurants, and the proliferation of e-commerce in food delivery have significantly accelerated the adoption of flexible, lightweight, and hygienic packaging materials. In this context, aluminium foil has emerged as a key packaging solution due to its superior barrier properties, thermal stability, and recyclability.

Widely used across food, beverage, and pharmaceutical industries, aluminium foil provides effective protection against moisture, light, oxygen, and microbial contamination, thereby extending product shelf life and preserving quality. In retail environments such as supermarkets, bakeries, and food stalls, aluminium-based pouches and wraps ensure hygiene, convenience, and compliance with safety standards.

The demand surge in ready-to-eat meals and packaged foods, especially among India's growing working population, has significantly expanded the market for aluminium foil in the FMCG segment. At the same time, the proliferation of electric vehicles (EVs) and mobile technologies has increased the requirement for lithium-ion batteries, where aluminium foil serves as a critical component for cell sealing and current collection.

The sustainability profile of aluminium continues to give it a competitive edge. According to industry estimates, approximately 75% of all aluminium ever produced remains in circulation—a testament to its recyclability and environmental efficiency. Recycling aluminium requires significantly less energy than primary production, thereby reducing greenhouse gas emissions and aligning with ESG goals of both manufacturers and consumers. This sustainability advantage is prompting brands to replace plastic and multi-layered composites with recyclable aluminium alternatives.

Beyond the food and pharmaceutical sectors, aluminium foil is also gaining traction in electronics, insulation, and construction applications. Its light weight, corrosion resistance, and insulating capabilities make it suitable for thermal shielding, power transmission equipment, and precision electronic components. The pharmaceutical industry continues to rely on aluminium foil for strip packing, blister packs, and sachets, given its non-toxic and tamper-evident characteristics.

The growth is being driven by robust demand from packaging innovations, energy storage technologies, and the healthcare sector. However, the market's upward trajectory may face headwinds due to geopolitical trade interventions, such as anti-dumping duties imposed by the U.S. and other jurisdictions on aluminium products originating from countries like China and Oman. These trade measures may disrupt global pricing structures and sourcing strategies, especially for foil manufacturers that depend heavily on export markets. In the Indian context, the aluminium foil segment is well-positioned for sustained expansion, supported by:

- the government's focus on sustainable and recyclable packaging,
- growing urban consumption,
- deeper penetration of organized retail, and
- rapid improvements in cold-chain infrastructure.

Enterprises with backward integration, recycling capabilities, and diversified product portfolios are expected to benefit most from these evolving market dynamics.

A notable development in FY 2024–25 is the implementation of anti-dumping duties on aluminium foil (up to 80 microns thickness) imported from China, effective March 2025 for a five-year period. This trade safeguard, aimed at curbing the adverse effects of underpriced imports, is expected to:

- stabilize domestic prices,
- improve capacity utilization for Indian manufacturers, and
- stimulate long-term investments in quality enhancement and technological innovation.

Overall, this move aligns with broader efforts to fortify the domestic aluminium value chain and build a more resilient and globally competitive manufacturing ecosystem.

Aluminium Conductors and Cables

In FY 2024–25, aluminium conductors continue to serve as a cornerstone in the global power transmission and distribution infrastructure. Known for their high tensile strength, corrosion resistance, and cost-effectiveness, aluminium conductors are extensively used in the construction of overhead power lines and grid networks, particularly across emerging and developing economies. With the ongoing transition to sustainable energy and expanding electrification initiatives, the demand for reliable and efficient transmission infrastructure has surged, placing aluminium at the forefront of energy sector materials.

While copper offers higher conductivity, aluminium's lower density allows for greater conductivity per unit weight, making it a lighter and more economical alternative. Modern conductor designs often involve aluminium strands wound around composite or reinforced cores to optimize strength, reduce sag, and extend transmission range. Over time, older steel-reinforced conductors have shown susceptibility to corrosion, prompting a wave of replacement activity across ageing grids—further stimulating demand for advanced aluminium-based solutions.

The steady growth is driven by the continued rollout of electrification initiatives, expansion of renewable energy infrastructure, modernization of smart grids, and increased investment in high-voltage transmission systems. Aluminium conductors are increasingly preferred for long-distance power transmission owing to their light weight, lower sag, and cost efficiency—qualities that make them particularly suitable for improving electricity access across remote and challenging geographies.

In India, the momentum remains strong as the country retains its position as the third-largest producer and consumer of electricity globally. As of April 2024, India's installed power capacity stood at 441.97 GW, with an ambitious goal of achieving 500 GW of renewable energy capacity by 2030. This is being supported by a range of strategic infrastructure projects, including:

- The Raipur–Visakhapatnam Expressway (₹20,000 crore),
- The Kala Amb smart grid initiative (₹19.44 crore),
- And ₹19,518 crore allocated for metro rail development under the Union Budget 2023–24.

These investments reflect India's broader shift toward infrastructure-led economic growth, clean energy integration, and technologically advanced grid systems.

The domestic cables and conductors industry is evolving to meet these demands through innovations in thermal performance, corrosion resistance, and eco-friendly design. While the sector is benefitting from long-term infrastructure trends, it continues to face challenges such as global economic uncertainty, supply chain disruptions, and volatile raw material prices. In response, industry players are increasingly adopting strategies such as localized sourcing, recycling infrastructure, and green manufacturing practices to align with ESG commitments and reduce reliance on imports.

Pesticides and Aluminium in Agriculture

The global agriculture sector faces rising pressure to increase productivity while managing the risks posed by pests, climate variability, and shrinking arable land. In this context, pesticides play a vital role in safeguarding crops against insects, weeds, and diseases, thereby ensuring food security and yield optimization. Their significance has grown in recent years as governments aim to enhance agricultural output and reduce post-harvest losses.

As of FY 2025–26, Asia remains the dominant consumer of pesticides, accounting for over half of global usage. India continues to rank 12th globally and 3rd in Asia, following China and Turkey. According to Allied Market Research, the global pesticide market, valued at USD 45.7 billion in 2022, is projected to reach USD 92.6 billion by 2032, registering a CAGR of 7.5%. The Indian pesticide market, estimated at USD 321.5 million in 2024, is forecast to grow at a CAGR of 8.01% through 2030, driven by India's expansive agricultural footprint, proactive government subsidies, and a growing shift toward scientific and precision farming practices.

While pesticides remain indispensable for crop protection, their overuse or misapplication continues to raise serious environmental and public health concerns, underscoring the need for integrated pest management (IPM) and precision agriculture.

Amid this agricultural evolution, aluminium is emerging as a key enabler of sustainable farming. Traditionally associated with industries like construction and aerospace, aluminium is now finding innovative applications in agriculture due to its light weight, durability, non-toxicity, and resistance to corrosion. Its agricultural contributions span a range of use cases:

- Aluminium compounds, such as aluminium sulphate, are used as adjuvants to boost pesticide performance, adjust pH levels in formulations, and act as flocculants in irrigation water treatment.
- Aluminium salts are incorporated in fungicides for their effective antifungal action.
- Aluminium foils and barrier packaging are critical for safe storage and transportation of agrochemicals, minimizing degradation and extending shelf life.
- In precision farming, aluminium is increasingly used in lightweight spraying devices, sensor casings, and agricultural drones, improving the accuracy of pesticide application and reducing environmental impact.
- For greenhouses and polyhouses, aluminium frameworks offer structural stability, weather resistance, and long-term sustainability in chemically active environments.

As India advances toward mechanized, resource-efficient, and climate-resilient agriculture, aluminium's role is set to expand. Its integration across crop protection, irrigation, and equipment manufacturing reflects a broader trend of technological convergence aimed at meeting the twin goals of agricultural productivity and environmental stewardship.

COMPANY OVERVIEW

MMP Industries Limited ("MMP" or "the Company") is engaged in the production of a diverse range of aluminium-based products, operating from its manufacturing facilities located in and around Nagpur, Maharashtra. The Company's product portfolio includes pyro and flake aluminium powders, atomised aluminium powders, aluminium foils, aluminium pastes, and aluminium conductors and cables.

The Company's aluminium powders—comprising pyro, flake, and atomised variants—cater to multiple industrial segments, including:

- Construction, for the manufacture of AAC (Autoclaved Aerated Concrete) blocks;
- Mining and infrastructure, in the form of aluminised slurry explosives;
- Agriculture, for use in pesticide formulations;
- Defence, for applications in ammunition;
- Railways, in thermite welding processes;
- Fireworks, for pyrotechnic products.

In addition, aluminium foils produced by MMP are widely used in the pharmaceutical and food packaging sectors due to their excellent barrier properties and hygienic characteristics. The Company's aluminium conductors and cables serve the power transmission sector, playing a critical role in the installation of overhead transmission lines across the country.

Upcoming Projects

To augment its product portfolio and support the growing demand in power infrastructure and grid modernization, the Company is actively expanding its operations through strategic investments in its wholly owned subsidiaries:

- MMP Electricals Private Limited is in the process of setting up a new manufacturing facility for composite insulators, which are widely used in high-voltage transmission and distribution networks. These insulators offer high mechanical strength, improved resistance to environmental degradation, and longer service life compared to conventional ceramic or glass insulators. The addition of composite insulators will enable the Company to offer a comprehensive range of power transmission products to utilities and infrastructure developers.
- MMP Cables Private Limited is developing a manufacturing facility for Low Voltage Power Cables (LVPC), marking the Company's entry into the fast-growing segment of energy-efficient and safety-compliant cable solutions. LVPCs are essential for domestic, commercial, and industrial electrical systems, and the new facility will cater to increasing demand driven by urban electrification, smart buildings, and renewable energy installations.

These initiatives align with the Company's long-term strategy of strengthening backward and forward integration across the aluminium value chain while diversifying into high-growth, high-demand segments within the electrical and infrastructure sectors.

The company plans to establish a wire rod manufacturing facility as part of a backward integration initiative, with an investment of ₹ 130 - 150 Mn,. This project will be undertaken under a separate wholly owned subsidiary—MMP Alutech Private Limited. The initiative is aimed at improving margins for the Cable/Conductor and LVPC segments while reducing reliance on external wire rod procurement and ensuring a stable supply chain.

ASSOCIATE COMPANIES / JOINT VENTURE COMPANIES

The Company has a joint venture with Toyo Aluminium K.K. of Japan, Toyol MMP India Private Limited (TMI), for the manufacturing of special grades of aluminium paste. The Company holds 26% equity in the new joint venture.

Star Circlips & Engineering Limited is an associate Company engaged in the manufacture of circlips, retaining rings, washers, shims and formed components mainly used in auto and auto component industries in which the Company holds 26.06% equity.

EXPORT

MMP primarily exports its products to three main regions in the world that include Europe, Africa, and the Middle East. The Company's products have started being sold in Japan through our JV company TMI.

OPPORTUNITIES

Demand for aluminium is expected to pick up as the scenario improves for user industries like power, infrastructure, coal, mining, and transportation.

The Company will also have access to various global Toyo marketing channels, which will help both the Aluminium powder and paste business. Since the Company produces certain powders not in the range of our JV partner Toyo Aluminium KK, this is an opportunity to open business potential in Japan through TMI.

The company has entered into a long term sale arrangement for special grades of concrete powders for AAC Industry with its long term partner in Europe. This will be a volume business and as the economic situation stabilises in Europe, we expect improved margins in the coming years from this new long term opportunity.

With the installation of special machinery and process development assistance from our JV partner, the Company will produce special fractions of powders for bulk usage in space applications and specialized defence applications.

In parallel, the imposition of anti-dumping duties on aluminium foil (up to 80 microns) imported from China, effective March 2025 for a period of five years, marks a key policy shift aimed at addressing trade imbalances. This decision is expected to ensure pricing stability, improve domestic capacity utilization, and encourage sustained investment in technology and quality, thereby enhancing the competitiveness of the broader aluminium ecosystem.

THREATS

Economic and industrial growth is going to be adversely impacted for the foreseeable future due to external challenges. The uncertainty of how long this will persist cannot be predicted.

The volatility in the prices of important raw material namely Aluminium is another challenge with the rapidly changing global economic scenario. This impacts business of all aluminium user segments.

The manufacturing and handling of Aluminium Powder is inherently hazardous and there is always a risk of accidents in the plant. MMP is OHSAS and EMS certified and gives prime importance to the safety of its people. The Company conducts regular safety audits and trainings to mitigate risks of an accident.

As stipulated by Schedule IV - Code of Independent Directors to the Companies Act, 2013 and the Regulations 25 of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, a separate meeting of the Independent Directors of the Company was held on Friday, 24th May 2024 to review inter-alia, the performance of all the Director/s including Executive Directors & Chairman and Key Managerial Personnel of the Company, and the Board including its Committees. The Independent Directors also reviewed the quality, content and timeliness of the flow of information between the Management, the Board and its Committees, which is necessary to effectively and reasonably perform and discharge their duties.

e. Induction, Training and Familiarization Program for Board Members

An effective induction program for newly appointed Directors, along with continuous training for existing Directors, plays a vital role in upholding the Company's high standards of Corporate Governance. Every new Director undergoes a structured induction process, which includes a presentation by the Managing Director covering key aspects of the Company such as manufacturing, marketing, finance, and other critical functions. The Chief Financial Officer and the Company Secretary are jointly responsible for facilitating these induction and training programs.

Independent Directors may, as needed, request detailed insights into specific projects, operations, or processes. The management addresses such requests by providing the necessary information and training either during Board meetings or through separate sessions.

The induction program typically includes interactive meetings with members of the executive committee, business and functional heads, site visits to manufacturing facilities, and visits to locations where the Company's CSR initiatives are implemented. For subjects requiring specialized knowledge, the Company engages external experts and consultants to conduct presentations and discussions with the Board.

To familiarize Directors with the Company's operations and business model, the management team regularly delivers presentations. Directors are also kept informed about industry trends, new initiatives, and strategic plans of the Company. Board members receive relevant reports, internal policies, and periodic updates during Board and Committee meetings.

Additionally, Directors are briefed on their roles, powers, rights, and responsibilities under applicable laws and regulations, including the Companies Act, 2013 and the Listing Regulations, among others.

f. Evaluation of the Board's Performance

During the financial year 2024-25 ended 31st March 2025, the Board continued with a formal mechanism for evaluating its performance as well as that of its Committees and individual Director/s, including the Chairman of the Board. The exercise was carried out through a structured evaluation process covering various aspects of the Board functioning such as composition of the Board and its Committee/s, experience and competencies, performance of specific duties and obligations, governance issues, etc. Separate exercise was carried out to evaluate the performance of individual Director/s including the Chairman of the Board, who were evaluated on parameters such as attendance, contribution at the meetings, independent judgment, safeguarding of minority shareholders interest, etc. by framing suitable questionnaire.

The evaluation of the Independent Directors was carried out by the entire Board and that of the Chairman and the Non-Independent Directors were carried out by the Independent Director/s. The Director/s were satisfied with the evaluation results, which reflected the overall engagement of the Board and its Committee/s with the Company.

g. Key Board qualifications, expertise and attributes

The Board comprises of qualified members who possess required skills, expertise and competencies that allow them to make effective contributions to the Board and its Committees. h. Agenda

All the meeting/s are conducted as per well designed and structured agenda. All the agenda item/s are backed by necessary supporting information, notes and documents (except for critical or unpublished price sensitive information, which is circulated at the meeting itself) to enable the Board and its Committee to take informed decisions. The agenda also includes item related to ratification, confirmation and approval, if any, of minutes of the previous Board and its Committee meeting/s. Additional agenda item/s, if any, in the form of "Other Business" are included with the permission of the Chairman and with the requisite consent of majority of the Director/s of the Company. The agenda including notes thereof are generally circulated together with Notice, Seven (7) clear days prior to date of the Board and its Committee Meeting/s. In addition, the resolution/s passed by circulation, if any, for any business exigencies, were later placed in the ensuing Board Meeting for ratification and approval, if any.

The Companies Act, 2013 read with the relevant rules made there under, now facilitates the participation of Director/s in the Board and its Committee Meeting/s through video conferencing or other audio visual mode. Accordingly, the option to participate in the meeting through video conferencing (subject to technical aspects) was made available for the Director/s.

The Board periodically reviews the item/s required to be placed before it and in particular, reviews and approves the quarterly and yearly financial statements (Audited or Un-audited), statement of Deviation or Variation (Utilization of IPO proceeds), corporate strategies, business plans, annual budgets, projects and capital expenditure. The Board monitors overall operating performance, progress of major projects and review such other items which require Board's attention. It directs and guides the activities of the management towards the set goals and seeks accountability. It also sets standards of corporate behavior, ensures transparency in corporate dealings and compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. The agenda for the Board meeting covers item/s set out as per the various laws and regulations applicable to the Company, including but not limited to, the Companies Act, 2013 read with the rules made there under and the Listing Regulations to the extent these are relevant and applicable to the Company.

i. Invitees and Proceedings

Apart from the Board members, the Company Secretary is a Secretary to the Board and all its Committee/s, while the Chief Financial Officer (CFO) is invited to attend the Board Meeting/s as well as its Committee Meeting/s. Capital Work-in-Progress / Property, Plants and Equipment	
The Company had embarked on a project on enhancement of Property, Plants and Equipment in “UMRED” and “BHANDARA” location. The Value of such Property, Plant and Equipment capitalized during the reporting period is ₹ 2,478.43 Lakhs and ₹ 1,609.39 Lakhs respectively. The project needs to be capitalized and depreciated once the assets are ready to use as intended by the Company’s management. Inappropriate timing of capitalization of the project and / or inappropriate classification of categories of item of Property, Plant and Equipment could results in material misstatement of Capital Work-in-Progress / Property, Plant and Equipment with a consequent impact on charge of depreciation and results for the period.	Our audit procedures included testing the design, implementations and operating effectiveness of controls in respect of review of capital work-in-progress, particularly in respect of timing of the capitalization and recording of additions to items of various categories of Property, Plant and Equipment with source documentation, substantive testing of appropriateness of the cut-off date considered for project capitalization. We tested the source documentation to determine whether the expenditure is of capital nature and has been appropriately approved and segregated into appropriate categories. We reviewed operating expenses to determine the appropriateness of accounting. Further, through sites visit, we physically verified the existence of capital work-in-progress / Property, Plant and Equipment.
Existence and Valuation of Inventories	
The Company’s inventories as at the end of the reporting period are ₹ 13,472.16 Lakhs representing 26.65% of the Company’s total assets. (Refer “Note No. 10” of the Standalone Financial Statements) The existence of inventories is a key audit matters due to involvement of high risk, basis the nature and size of the products where in value per unit is relatively insignificant but high volumes are involved which are distributed across different plants of the Company.	In response to these key matters, our audit included, among others, the following principal audit procedures: * Understood the management’s control over physical inventory counts and their valuation. * Evaluation of design and testing of the operating effectiveness of internal controls relating to physical inventory counts at the plants. In testing these controls, we observed the inventory cycle count process on a sample basis, inspected the results of the inventory cycle count and confirmed that the variances were approved and appropriately accounted for. * Evaluation of design and testing of the operating effectiveness of internal controls relating to purchases, sales and inventories including the automated controls. * We have performed the physical verification of inventories on a sample basis for establishing the existence of inventory as at the end of the reporting period. * For a representative sample, verification that the finished goods inventories were correctly measured, using a recalculation of the measurement of those inventories based on the cost of acquiring them from suppliers and considering the costs of directly attributable to such goods. * Assessed the key estimates used by the Company’s management to determine the net realizable value and the consistency thereof with the Company’s policy on provision for non-moving inventory and performed a sensitivity analysis on the estimated selling price and compared with the cost per item.

Carrying Value of Trade Receivables	
As at March 31, 2025, trade receivables constitute approximately 17.71% of total assets of the Company (Refer "Note No. 11" of the Standalone Financial Statements). The Company is required to regularly assess the recoverability of its trade receivables. The Company applied, expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on trade receivables. The Company uses a provision matrix to determine impairment loss allowances. The provision matrix is based on its historically observed default rates over the expected life of trade receivables and is adjusted for forward-looking estimates. This is a key audit matters as significant judgment is involved to establish the provision matrix.	Our audit procedures included, among other the followings: * Evaluated the Company's accounting policies pertaining to impairment of financial assets and assessed compliance with those policies in term of Ind AS - 109, "Financial Instruments". * Assessed and tested the design and operating effectiveness of the Company's internal financial controls over provision for expected credit loss (ECL). * Evaluated the management's assumption and judgment relating to various parameters which included the historical default rates and business environment in which the entity operates for estimating the amount of such provision. * Evaluated the management's assessment of recoverability of the outstanding receivables and recoverability of the overdue / aged receivables through inquiry with the management, and analysis of the collection trends in respect of receivables. * Assessed and read the disclosures made by the Company in the Standalone Financial Statements.

Emphasis on Matters

We draw attention to the "Note No. 52" of the Standalone Financial Statements, which describes events subsequent to the year end, the effects of a fire in the Company's production facilities. Since, this is the non-adjusting subsequent event, no adjustment has been made in the Standalone Financial Statements for the period ended March 31, 2025. Our opinion is not modified in respect of these matters.

Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditor's Report thereon

The Company's Management and the Board of Directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Management's Discussion and Analysis, Board's Report including Annexure to the Board's Report, Report on Corporate Governance, Business Responsibility and Sustainability Report and Shareholder's information, but does not include the consolidated financial statements, standalone financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Notes to the Standalone Financial Statements for the year then ended on March 31, 2025**Corporate Information**

MMP INDUSTRIES LIMITED (“the Company”) (CIN No. L32300MH1973PLC30813) is a Public Limited Company, domiciled and incorporated in India, under the provisions of Companies Act, 1956. The Registered office of the Company is situated at 211, *Shrimohini Complex, 345, Kingsway, Nagpur, (M.H.) - 440001*. The books of accounts and other related documents and information are maintained at *B - 24, MIDC Area, Hingna Industrial Estate, Hingna Road, Nagpur (M.H.) - 440016*. The Company’s shares are listed on “*National Stock Exchange*” (NSE).

The Company is primarily engaged in the business of manufacturing, selling, distribution and trading of Aluminium Powder, Aluminium Pyro and Flake Powder, Aluminium Paste, Aluminium Conductor and Aluminium Foils. The Company is also engaged in trading and manufacturing of MnO and MnO₂ Powder.

The Board of Directors approved the Standalone Financial Statements for the year ended March 31, 2025, and authorized for issue on May 23, 2025.

1. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND KEY ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS**MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES****1.1 BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

These Standalone Financial Statements are the separate financial statements of the Company (also called as “Standalone Financial Statements”) prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standard (“Ind AS”) as notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (“the Act”) read together with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standard) Rule, 2016, as amended, time to time. The preparation and presentation of the Standalone Financial Statements is based on the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS), Division - II of the Schedule - III of the Companies Act, 2013.

Entity specific disclosure of material accounting policies, where the Indian Accounting Standards permits options are disclosed hereunder:

The Company’s management and the Board of Directors has assessed the materiality of the accounting policy information, which involves exercising judgements and considering both qualitative and quantitative factors, taking into account not only the size and nature of the items or conditions but also the characteristics of the transactions, events or conditions that could make the information more likely to impact the decisions of the users of the Standalone Financial Statements.

Entity’s conclusion that an accounting policy is immaterial does not affect the disclosures requirements set out in the Indian Accounting Standards.

The Company adopted Ind AS from April 01, 2018. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policies hitherto adopted. These Standalone Financial Statements have been prepared and presented under the historical cost convention, on the accrual basis of accounting except for certain financial assets and financial liabilities that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between the market participants at the measurement date.

The Standalone Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared under indirect method, whereby the profit and loss are adjusted for the effect of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals and accruals or future operating cash receipts or payments and items of income and expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated. The Company considers all highly liquid instruments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value to be cash equivalents.

The Company’s Standalone Financial Statements are prepared and presented in Indian Rupee (₹) in Lakhs, which is also the functional currency for the Company. All amounts have been rounded off to the nearest (₹) in Lakhs up to two decimals, except when otherwise specified.

1.2 APPLICATION OF NEW ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

Ministry of Corporate Affairs (the “MCA”) notifies the new standards or amendments to the existing standards under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standard) Rule, as issued from time to time. For the period ended March 31, 2025, MCA has notified amendments to Ind AS - 116, “*Lease*”, relating to the sale and leaseback transactions, which is applicable to the Company w.e.f. April 01, 2024. The Company has reviewed the new pronouncements and based on its evaluation has determined that it is not likely to have any significant impact in its Standalone Financial Statements.

1.3 CURRENT AND NON - CURRENT CLASSIFICATION

The Company presents the assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current / non-current classification. An asset or liabilities are classified as current when it satisfies any of the following criteria:

- i) The assets / liabilities are expected to be realized / settled in the Company's normal operating cycle.
- ii) The assets are intended for sales or consumption.
- iii) The assets / liabilities are held primarily for the purpose of trading.
- iv) The assets / liabilities are expected to be realized / settled within twelve months after the end of reporting date.
- v) The assets are cash or cash equivalents unless they are restricted from being exchanged or used to settle liabilities for at least twelve months after the reporting period.
- vi) In the case of liabilities, the Company does not have an unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liabilities for at least twelve months after the reporting date.

All other assets and liabilities are classified as non-current.

For the purpose of current / non-current classification of assets and liabilities, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as twelve months (12 months). This is based on the nature of services and the time between the acquisition of the assets or inventories for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents.

1.4 SUMMARY OF MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Property, Plant and Equipment

Measurement at Recognition

An item of property, plant and equipment that qualifies as an asset is measured on the initial recognition at cost. Following the initial recognition, item of property, plant and equipment are carried at its cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, *if any*. The Company identifies and determines cost of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment separately, if the part has a cost which is significant to the total cost of that item of property, plant and equipment and has useful life that is materially different from that of the remaining items.

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment comprises of its purchase price net of discounts, if any, including import duties and other non-refundable purchase taxes or levies, directly attributable to cost of bringing the assets to its present location and working condition for its intended use and the initial estimate of decommissioning, restoration, and similar liabilities, *if any*. Cost includes the cost of replacing a part of the plants and equipment, if the recognition criteria are met. Expenses directly attributable to new manufacturing facilities during its construction period are capitalized, if the recognition criteria are met. Expenditure related to plans, designs and drawings of buildings or plants and machinery are capitalized under the relevant heads of property, plant and equipment, if the recognition criteria are met. When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at periodical intervals, the Company recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any components accounted for as a separate asset is de-recognized when replaced.

All the costs, including administrative, financing and general overhead expenses, as are specifically attributable to construction of a specific projects or to the acquisition of a property, plant and equipment or bringing it to its present location and working condition, is includes, as a part of the cost of construction of the project or as a part of the cost of property, plant and equipment, till the commencement of its commercial production. Any adjustments arising from exchange rate variations attributable to the property, plant and equipment are capitalized as aforementioned.

Borrowing costs relating to the acquisition / construction of property, plant and equipment which takes the substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use are also included in the cost of property, plant and equipment / cost of constructions, to the extent they relate to the period till such property, plant and equipment are ready to be put to use.

Any subsequent expenditure related to an item of property, plant and equipment is added to its book value only and only if it increases the future economic benefits from the existing assets beyond its previously assessed standard of performance.

Any items such as spare parts, stand-by equipment and servicing equipment that meet the definitions criteria of the property, plant and equipment are capitalized at cost and depreciated over the useful life of the respective property, plant and equipment. Cost is in the nature of repairs and maintenances are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss as and when incurred.

Capital Work-in-Progress and Capital Advances

Cost of property, plant and equipment not ready for intended use, as at the balance sheet date, is shown as a “*Capital Work-in-Progress*”. The capital work-in-progress is stated at cost. Any expenditure in relation to survey and investigation of the properties is carried out as capital work-in-progress, such expenditure is either capitalized as cost of the projects on completion of construction project or the same is expensed in the period in which it is decided to abandon such projects. Any advances given towards acquisition of property, plant and equipment outstanding at each balance sheet date is disclosed as “*Other Non - Current Assets*”.

The Company has elected to consider the carrying value of all its property, plants and equipment appearing in its Standalone Financial Statements and used the same as deemed cost in the opening Ind AS Balance Sheet prepared at April 01, 2018.

Depreciation

Depreciation on each part of property, plant and equipment are provided to the extent of the depreciable amount of the assets on the basis of “*Straight Line Method (SLM)*” on the useful lives of the tangible property, plant and equipment as estimated by the Company’s management and is charged to the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss, as per the requirement of *Schedule - II to the Companies Act, 2013*. The estimated useful lives of the property, plant and equipment has been assessed based on the technical advice, which is considered in the nature of the property, plant and equipment, the usage of the property, plant and equipment, expected physical wear and tear of such property, plant and equipment, the operating conditions, anticipated technological changes, manufacturer warranties and maintenance support of the property, plant and equipment etc.

When the parts of an item of the property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) and are depreciated over their useful lives or over the remaining useful lives of the principal property, plant and equipment, whichever is less.

The useful lives of the items of property, plants and equipment as estimated by the Company’s management is mentioned below:

The Company based on technical assessment made by the technical experts and the Company’s management estimate, depreciate certain items of property, plant and equipment over the estimated useful lives which are different from the useful lives as prescribed under *Schedule - II of the Companies Act, 2013*. The Company’s management believes that the useful lives given above are best to represent the period over which Company’s management expects to use this property, plant and equipment.

Freehold land is not depreciated. Leasehold land and their improvement cost are amortized over the period of the lease.

The useful lives, residual value of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment and method of depreciation is reviewed at the end of each reporting period, *if any*, of these expectations differ from the previous estimates, such change is accounted for as a change in accounting estimate and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Derecognition

The carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment and other intangible assets are recognized on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from derecognition of the property, plant and equipment is measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the assets and is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss, as and when the assets are de-recognized.

b) Intangible Assets**Measurement at Recognition**

Intangible assets acquired separately measured on the initial recognition at cost. Intangible assets arising on the acquisition of businesses are measured at fair value as at the date of acquisition. Internally generated intangible assets including research costs are not capitalized and the related expenditure is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss in the period, in which the expenditure is incurred. Following the initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment loss, *if any*.

The Company has elected to consider the carrying value of all intangible assets appearing in its Standalone Financial Statements and used the same as deemed cost in the opening Ind AS Balance Sheet prepared at April 01, 2018.

Amortization

Intangible assets with the finite lives are amortized on a “*Straight Line Basis*” over the estimated useful economics lives of such intangible assets. The amortization expenses on intangible assets with finite lives are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss. The estimated useful lives of intangible assets are mentioned below:

The amortization period and the amortization method for an intangible asset with the finite useful lives are reviewed at the end of each financial year. If any of these expectations differ from the previous estimates, such changes are accounted for as a change in an accounting estimate and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Derecognition

The carrying amount of an intangible asset is de-recognized at disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from the de-recognition of an intangible assets is measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the intangible assets and is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss, as and when such assets are de-recognized.

c) Impairment

Assessment for impairment is done at each Balance Sheet date as to whether there is any indication that a non-financial asset may be impaired. Assets that have an indefinite useful life are not subject to amortization and are tested for impairment annually and whenever there is an indication that the assets may be impaired.

Assets that are subject to depreciation and amortization and assets representing investment in subsidiary and associate companies are reviewed for impairment, whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that carrying amount may not be recoverable. Such circumstances include, though are not limited to, significant or sustained decline in revenues or earnings and material adverse changes in the economic environments.

The Company assesses at each reporting date, whether there is an indication that assets may be impaired, if any indication exists based on internal or external factors, or when Annual impairment testing for assets is required, the Company estimates the asset's recoverable amount. Where the carrying amount of the assets or its cash generating unit (CGU) exceeds its recoverable amount, the assets are considered impaired and written down to its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is greater of the fair value less cost to sell and value-in-use. In assessing value-in-use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax rate that reflects current market rates and the risk specific to the assets. For an asset that does not generate largely independent cash inflows, the recoverable amount is determined for the CGU to which the assets belong. Fair value less cost to sell is the best estimate of the amount obtainable from the sale of an assets in an arm's length transactions between knowledgeable, willing parties, less cost of disposal. After the impairment, depreciation is provided on the revised carrying amount of the assets over its remaining useful lives.

Reversal of impairment losses recognized in prior years is recorded when there is an indication that the impairment losses recognized for the assets no longer exists or has decreased. However, the increase in the carrying amount of assets due to the reversal of an impairment loss is recognized to the extent it does exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of depreciation) had no impairment loss been recognized for the assets in the prior years.

Impairment losses, if any, are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss and included in depreciation and amortization expense. Impairment losses are reversed in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined if no impairment loss had previously been recognized.

d) Revenue Recognition

Revenue from Contracts with Customers

Revenue from contracts with customers is recognized on transfer of control of promised goods or services to a customer at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Company is expected to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue towards satisfaction of a performance obligation is measured in the amount of transaction price (net of variable consideration on accounts of various discounts and schemes offered by the Company as a part of the Contracts) allocated to that performance obligation. These variable considerations are estimated based on the expected value of outflow. Revenue (net of variable consideration) is recognized only to the extent that it is highly probable that the amount will not be subject to significant reversal when uncertainty relating to its recognition is resolved.

Sale of Products

Revenue from sales of goods is recognized when control on the goods has been transferred to the customers. The performance obligation in the case of sale of goods is satisfied at a point in time i.e. when the material is shipped to the customers or delivery to the customers as may be specified in the contracts with them.

Sales (Gross) excludes Goods and Service Tax (GST) and is a net of discounts and incentives to the customers.

Sale of Services

Revenue from sales of service is recognized over the period of time by measuring the progress towards satisfaction of performance obligation for the service rendered. The revenue is recognized based on the agreements / arrangements with the customers as the service is performed and based on the satisfaction of performance obligation.

Advances from customers are recognized under “*Other Current Liabilities*” and released to revenue on satisfaction of performance obligation.

Interest

Revenue from interest income is recognized using the effective interest method. Effective interest rate (EIR) is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments or receipts over the expected life of the financial instruments or a shorter period, where appropriate, to the gross carrying amount of the financial assets or to the amortized cost of financial liabilities.

Dividend

Revenue is recognized when the Company's right to receive the payment is established, which is generally when the shareholders approved the dividend, at their respective Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Other Income

Other items of income are recognized as and when the right to receive such income arises and it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of income can be measured reliably.

e) Government Grants and Subsidies

Recognition and Measurements

The Company recognizes grant as income when there is reasonable assurance that the Company will comply with all the necessary conditions attached to them and the grant will be received, in accordance with Ind AS - 20, “*Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance*”. The Company is entitled to receive, certain non-refundable subsidies from the Government in respect of manufacturing units located in the State of Maharashtra, which are measured, when the right to receive the amounts from the Government is established.

Government grants are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which related costs, which the grants are intended to compensate, are recognized as expenses. Government grants related to property, plants and equipment are presented at fair value, and grants are recognized as deferred income.

Presentation

Income from the above grants and subsidies are presented under Revenue from Operations. Government grants related to property, plants and equipment are presented at fair value, and grants are recognized as deferred income.

f) Inventories

Raw material, work-in-progress, finished goods, packing material, stores and spares, components, consumables and trading stock are carried at lower of cost and net realizable value. However, materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written-down below cost, if the finished goods in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above costs. The comparison of costs and net realizable value is made on an item-by-item basis. In determining the cost of raw materials, work-in-progress, finished goods, packing materials, stores and spares, components and trading stock, “*Weighted Average*” method is used. Cost of inventories comprises all costs of purchase, non-refundable duties and taxes, cost of conversion including an appropriate share of fixed and variable production overheads and all other costs incurred in bringing the inventory to its present location and conditions.

“*Net Realizable Value*” is the estimated selling price of inventories in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and estimated cost necessary to make the sales of the products.

The Company considers factors like estimated shelf life, product discontinuances and aging of inventory in determining the provision for slow moving, obsolete and other non-saleable inventory and adjusts the inventory provision to reflect the recoverable value of the inventory.

g) Financial Instruments

A financial instrument is in any contract that gives rise to the financial assets of one entity and financial liabilities or equity instruments of another entity.

Financial Assets**Initial Recognition and Measurements**

The Company recognizes a financial asset in its Standalone Balance Sheet as and when it becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. All the financial assets are recognized initially at fair value, plus in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial assets. However, trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price.

Where the fair value of a financial assets at initial recognition is different from its transaction price, the difference between the fair value and the transaction price is recognized as a gain or loss in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss at initial recognition, if the fair value is determined through a quoted market price in an active market for an identical asset (i.e. level 1 input) or through a valuation technique that uses data from observable markets (i.e. level 2 input).

In case the fair value is not determined using a level 1 or level 2 input as mentioned above, the difference between the fair value and transaction price is deferred appropriately and recognized as a gain or loss in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss only to the extent that such gain or loss arises due to a change in factor that market participants taken into account, when pricing the financial assets.

Subsequent Measurements

For subsequent measurements, the Company classifies a financial asset in accordance with the below criteria:

- i) The Company’s business model for managing the financial assets and
- ii) The contractual cash flows characteristics of the financial assets.

Based on the above criteria, the Company classifies, its financial assets into the following categories:

- i) Financial assets measured at amortized costs
- ii) Financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)
- iii) Financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

Financial Assets measured at Amortized Costs

A financial asset is measured at the amortized costs if both the following conditions are met:

- a) The Company’s business model objective for managing the financial assets is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows, and
- b) The contractual terms of the financial assets give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

This category applies to cash and bank balances, trade receivables, loans and other financial assets of the Company. Such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method. Under the effective interest method, the future cash receipts are discounted to the initial recognition value using the effective interest rate. The cumulative amortization using the effective interest method of the difference between the initial recognition amounts and the maturity amount is added to the initial recognition value (net of principal repayments, if any) of the financial assets over the relevant period of the financial assets to arrive at the amortized costs at each reporting date. The corresponding effect of the amortization, under effective interest method is recognized as interest income over the relevant period of the financial assets. The same is included under “Other Income” in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss. The amortized costs of financial assets are also adjusted for loss allowance, if any.

Financial Assets measured at FVTOCI

A financial asset is measured at FVTOCI, if both of the following conditions are met:

- a) The Company’s business model objective for managing the financial assets is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets, and
- b) The contractual terms of the financial assets give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

This category applies to certain investments in debt instruments. Such financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value at each reporting date. Fair value changes are recognized in the Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). However, the Company recognizes interest income and impairment losses and its reversals in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

On de-recognition of such financial assets, cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in OCI, is reclassified from equity to Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

Further, the Company, through an irrevocable election at initial recognition, has measured certain investments in equity instruments at FVTOCI. The Company has made such selection on an instrument-by-instrument basis. These equity instruments are neither held for trading nor are contingent consideration recognized, under a business combination. Pursuant to such irrevocable election, subsequent changes in the fair value of such equity instruments are recognized in other comprehensive income. However, the Company recognizes dividend income from such instruments in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss, when the right to receive such payment is established, it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount can be measured reliably.

On de-recognition of such financial assets, cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in OCI is not reclassified from equity to Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss. However, the Company may transfer such cumulative gain or loss into retained earnings within equity.

Financial Assets measured at FVTPL

A financial asset is measured at FVTPL unless it is measured at amortized costs or at FVTOCI as explained above. This is a residual category applied to all other investments of the Company excluding investments in subsidiary and associate companies. Such financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value at each reporting date. Fair value changes are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial assets or part of a group of similar financial assets) is de-recognized (i.e. removed from the Company’s Standalone Balance Sheet) when any of the following occurs:

- i) The contractual rights to cash flows from the financial assets expire.
- ii) The Company transfers its contractual rights to receive cash flows of the financial assets and has substantially transferred all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset.
- iii) The Company retains the contractual rights to receive cash flows but assumes a contractual obligation to pay the cash flows without material delay to one or more recipients under a “pass-through” arrangement (thereby substantially transferring all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial assets).
- iv) The Company neither transfers nor retains substantially all risk and rewards of ownership and does not retain control over the financial assets.

In cases, where the Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the financial assets, but retains control of the financial assets, the Company continues to recognize such financial assets to the extent of its continuing involvement in the financial assets. In that case, the Company also recognizes an associated liability. The financial assets and the associated liabilities are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Company has retained.

On de-recognition of financial assets, (except as mentioned in above for financial assets measured at FVTOCI), the difference between the carrying amount and the consideration received is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

Impairment of Financial Assets

The Company applies expected credit losses (ECL) model for measurements and recognition of loss allowance on the following:

- i) Trade receivables
- ii) Financial assets measured at amortized costs (other than trade receivables)
- iii) Financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)

In the case of trade receivables, the Company follows a simplified approach wherein an amount equal to lifetime ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance. In the case of other assets (listed as ii and iii above), the Company determines if there has been a significant increase in credit risk of the financial assets since the initial recognition. If the credit risk of such assets has not increased significantly, an amount equal to twelve months ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance. However, if credit risk has increased significantly, an amount equal to lifetime ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance.

Subsequently, if the credit quality of the financial assets improves such that there is no longer a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the Company reverts to recognizing impairment loss allowance based on twelve months ECL.

ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Company in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the entity expected to receive (i.e., all cash shortfalls), discounted at the original effective interest rate. Lifetime ECL are the expected credit losses resulting from all possible default events over the expected life of financial assets. Twelve months ECL is a portion of the lifetime ECL which results from default events that are possible within twelve months from the reporting date.

ECL are measured in a manner that they reflect unbiased, and probability weighted amounts determined by a range of outcomes, taking into account the time value of money and other reasonable information available as a result of past events, current conditions and forecasts of future economic conditions.

As a practical expedient, the Company uses a provision matrix to measure lifetime ECL on its portfolio of trade receivables. The provision matrix is prepared based on historically observed default rates over the expected life of trade receivables and is adjusted for forward-looking estimates. At each reporting date, the historically observed default rates and changes in the forward-looking estimates are updated.

ECL impairment loss allowance (or reversal) recognized during the reporting period are recognized as income/expense in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss under the head “Other Expenses”.

Financial Liabilities

Initial Recognition and Measurements

The Company recognizes financial liabilities in its balance sheet when it becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value, in the case of financial liabilities not recorded at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial liabilities.

Where the fair value of a financial liabilities at initial recognition is different from its transaction price, the difference between the fair value and the transaction price is recognized as a gain or loss in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss at initial recognition, if the fair value is determined through a quoted market price in an active market for an identical asset (i.e. level 1 input) or through a valuation technique that uses data from observable markets (i.e. level 2 input).

In case the fair value is not determined using a level 1 or level 2 input as mentioned above, the difference between the fair value and transaction price is deferred appropriately and recognized as a gain or loss in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss, only to the extent that such gain or loss arises, due to a change in factor that market participants taken into account when pricing the financial liabilities.

Subsequent Measurements

All the financial liabilities of the Company are subsequently measured at amortized costs using the effective interest method.

Under the effective interest method, the future cash payments are exactly discounted to the initial recognition value using the effective interest rate. The cumulative amortization using the effective interest method of the difference between the initial recognition amount and the maturity amount is added to the initial recognition value (net of principal repayments, if any) of the financial liabilities over the relevant period of the financial liabilities to arrive at the amortized costs at each reporting date. The corresponding effect of the amortization, under effective interest method are recognized as interest expense over the relevant period of the financial liabilities. The same is included under finance costs in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition

A financial liability is de-recognized when the obligation under the liabilities is discharged or cancelled or expires. When existing financial liabilities are replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liabilities are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification are treated as the de-recognition of the original liabilities and the recognition of a new liabilities. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liabilities de-recognized and the consideration paid is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

Offsetting of Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset, and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet, if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

h) Derivative Financial Instruments and Hedge Accounting

The Company enters into derivative financial contracts in the nature of forward currency contracts with external parties to hedge its foreign currency risks relating to foreign currency denominated financial liabilities measured at amortized cost. The Company formally establishes a hedge relationship between such forward currency contracts ("*Hedging Instruments*") and recognized financial liabilities ("*Hedged Items*") through a formal documentation at the inception of the hedge relationship in line with the Company's Risk Management objective and strategy.

The hedge relationship so designated is accounted for in accordance with the accounting principles prescribed for a fair value hedge under Ind AS - 109, "*Financial Instruments*".

Recognition and Measurement of Fair Value Hedge

Hedging instruments are initially recognized at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently measured at fair value at each reporting date. Gain or loss arising from such changes in the fair value of hedging instruments is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss. Hedging instruments is recognized as financial assets in the Standalone Balance Sheet, if it's fair value as at reporting date is positive as compared to carrying value and as financial liabilities, if it's fair value as at reporting date is negative as compared to carrying value.

Hedged items (recognized financial liabilities) are initially recognized at fair value on the date of entering into the contractual obligation and are subsequently measured at amortized costs. The hedging gain or loss on the hedged items is adjusted to the carrying value of the hedged item as per the effective interest method and the corresponding effects are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition

On de-recognition of the hedged items, the unamortized fair value of the hedging instrument adjusted to the hedged items, is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

i) Fair Value

The Company measures financial instruments at fair value in accordance with the accounting policies mentioned above. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the assets or transfer the liabilities takes place either:

* In the principal market for the assets or liabilities, or

* In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the assets or liabilities.

All the assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the Standalone Financial Statements are categorized within fair value hierarchy that categorizes into three levels, described as follows, the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure value. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 inputs) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 inputs).

Level 1 - Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the assets or liabilities, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 - Inputs that are unobservable for the assets or liabilities.

For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the Standalone Financial Statements at fair value on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorization at the end of each reporting period and discloses the same.

j) Investments in Subsidiary Companies and Associate Companies

The Company has elected to recognize its investments in subsidiary companies and associate companies at cost in accordance with the option available in Ind AS - 27, "*Separate Financial Statements*". Investments in subsidiary and associates are carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses, *if any*. Cost includes cash consideration paid on initial recognition adjusted for embedded derivatives and estimated contingent considerations (earn out), if any. Contingent consideration (earn out) is re-measured at fair value at each reporting date and changes in the fair value of the contingent consideration are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

Where an indication of impairment exists, the carrying amount of the investment is assessed and written down immediately to its recoverable amount. On disposal of investments in subsidiary and associates, the difference between net disposal proceeds and the carrying amounts are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

k) Foreign Currency Transactions

a) Initial Recognition

Transactions in the foreign currencies entered into by the Company are accounted in the functional currency (i.e. Indian Rupee `), by applying the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction i.e. spot exchange rate. Any exchange difference arising on foreign exchange transactions settled during the reporting period are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss except to the extent that they are regarded as an adjustment to the finance costs on foreign currency borrowings that are directly attributable to the acquisition or constructions of the qualifying assets, are capitalized to the qualifying assets.

b) Measurement of Foreign Currency Items at Reporting Date

Foreign currency monetary items of the Company are restated as at the end of the reporting date by using the closing exchange rate as prescribed by the Reserve Bank of India. Non-monetary items are recorded at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of the transactions i.e. measured at historical costs. Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value is measured i.e. using the exchange rate at the date of transactions. Exchange differences arising out of foreign exchange translations and settlements during the period are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

l) Taxes on Income

Tax expense comprises current tax and deferred income tax. Tax expenses are the aggregate amount included in the determination of profit or loss for the reporting period current tax and deferred income tax. Tax expenses are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to the items recognized in the other comprehensive income or in the equity. In that case, tax is also recognized in other comprehensive income or equity.

Current income tax is the amount of income tax payable in respect of taxable profit for the reporting period. Taxable profit differs from "*Profit Before Tax*" as reported under Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss because of item of expenses or income that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible under Income Tax Act, 1961.

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured by using the tax rates that have been enacted by the end of the reporting period for the amounts expected to be recovered from or paid to the income tax authorities. Current tax also includes any adjustment amount to tax payable / receivable in respect of previous reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognized on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the Standalone Financial Statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit under Income Tax Act, 1961 and their carrying amounts. Deferred tax is measured based on the tax rates and the tax laws enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are generally recognized for all deductible and taxable temporary differences. However, in the case of temporary differences that arise from initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction (other than business combination) that affect neither the taxable profits nor the accounting profits or does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary difference, deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognized. Also, for temporary differences, if any, that may arise from initial recognition of goodwill, deferred tax liabilities are not recognized.

Deferred tax assets are generally recognized for all deductible temporary differences, and any unused tax losses and unused tax credits, to the extent, it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary difference can be utilized. In the case of temporary differences that arise from initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction that affect neither the taxable profits nor the accounting profits, deferred tax assets are not recognized.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets / liabilities are reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow the benefits of part or all such deferred tax assets to be utilized.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the Balance Sheet date and are expected to apply to taxable income in the years in which those temporary differences are expected to be recovered or settled.

Uncertain Tax Positions

The Company's management periodically evaluates the positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and consider whether it is probable that a taxation authority will accept uncertain tax treatments. The Company reflects the effect of uncertainty for each uncertain tax treatment by using one of two methods, the expected value method (the sum of the possibility-weighted amounts in range of possible outcomes) or the most likely amount (single most likely amount method in a range of possible outcomes), depending on which is expected to better predict the resolution of the uncertainty. The Company applies consistent judgments and estimates, if an uncertain tax treatment affects both the current and deferred income tax.

Presentation

Current tax and deferred tax are recognized as income or an expense in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss, except when they relate to items that are recognized in other comprehensive income, in which case, the current tax and deferred tax income / expense are recognized in other comprehensive income.

The Company offsets current tax assets and current tax liabilities, where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously. In case of deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities, the same are offset, if the Company has a legally enforceable right to set off corresponding current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the Company.

m) Lease

A lease is classified at the inception date, as finance lease or an operating lease. A lease that transfers substantially all the risk and rewards incidental to the ownership of the Company is classified as a finance lease. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

The Company as a Lessee

a) Operating Lease: Rental payable under the operating lease is charged to the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss on a "Straight - line" basis over the term of the relevant lease except where another systematic basis is more representative of time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased assets are consumed.

b) Finance Lease: Finance leases are capitalized at the commencement of the lease, at the lower of the fair value of the property or the present value of the minimum lease payments. The corresponding liabilities for the lessor are included in the Standalone Balance Sheet as a finance lease obligation. Lease payments are appropriated between finance expenses and the reduction of the lease obligation so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liabilities. Finance expenses are charged directly against the income over the period of the lease unless they are directly attributable to the qualifying assets, in which case they are capitalized. Contingent rental is recognized as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

A leased assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets, however, if there is no reasonable certainty that the Company will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term, the assets are depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful lives of the assets and the lease terms.

The Company as a Lessor:

Lease payments under operating leases are recognized as an income on a straight-line basis in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss over the lease term except where the lease payments are structured to increase in line with expected general inflation. The respective leased assets are included in the Standalone Balance Sheet based on their nature.

n) Borrowing Costs

Borrowing cost include the interest, commitments charges on bank borrowings, amortization of ancillary costs incurred in connection with the arrangement of borrowings and exchange differences arising from foreign currency borrowings to the extent they are regarded as an adjustment to the finance cost.

Borrowing costs, if any, that are directly attributable to the acquisition or constructions or production of qualifying property, plant and equipment are capitalized as a part of cost of that property, plant and equipment until such time that the assets are substantially ready for their intended use. Qualifying assets are assets which take a substantial period of time to get ready for the intended use or sale.

When the Company borrows the funds specially for the purpose of obtaining the qualifying assets, the borrowing costs incurred are capitalized with the qualifying assets. When the Company borrows fund generally and use them for obtaining a qualifying asset, the capitalization of borrowing costs is computed on weighted average cost of general costs that are outstanding during the reporting period and used for acquisition of the qualifying assets. Capitalization of the borrowing costs ceases when substantially all the activities necessary to prepare the qualifying assets for intended use are complete.

Other borrowing costs are recognized as expenses in the period in which they are incurred. Any interest income earned on temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalization.

o) Employee Benefits**Short-Term Employee Benefits**

All the employee benefits payable wholly within twelve months of rendering the services are classified as short-term employee benefits and they are recognized in the period in which the employee renders the related services. The Company recognizes the undiscounted amount of short-term employee benefits expected to be paid in exchange for services are rendered as a liability (accrued expense) after deducting any amount already paid.

Post - Employment Benefits**a) Defined Contribution Plans**

Defined contribution plans are employee state insurance scheme and Government administrated pension fund scheme for all the applicable employees and superannuation scheme for all the eligible employees, who met eligible criteria. The Company's contribution to defined contribution plans is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss in the reporting period to which they relate.

i) Recognition and Measurement of Defined Contribution Plans

The Company recognizes contribution payable to a defined contribution plan as an expense in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss, when the employees render services to the Company during the reporting period. If the contributions payable for services received from employees before the reporting date exceed the contributions already paid, the deficit payable is recognized as a liability after deducting the contribution already paid. If the contribution already paid exceeds the contribution due for services received before the reporting date, the excess is recognized as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to, for example, a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

b) Defined Benefits Plans**i) Gratuity**

The Company operates a defined benefits plan for its employees. The Company pays the gratuity to employee whoever has completed its five years of service with the Company at the time of retirement or resignation or superannuation. The gratuity is paid @ 15 Days salary for every completed year of service as per the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972.

The liabilities in respect of gratuity are calculated using "Project Unit Credit Method" and spread over the period during which the benefits are expected to be derived from employee services. The remeasurements of defined benefits plan in respect of post-employments are charged to the other comprehensive income (OCI).

ii) **Provident Fund Scheme**

Provident fund is defined contribution plan covering certain eligible employees. The Company and the eligible employees make a monthly contribution to the provident fund maintained by the regional provident fund commissioners equal to the specified percentage of the basic salary of the eligible employees as per the scheme. The contributions to the provident fund are charged to the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss for the period when the contributions are due. The Company has no obligation, other than the contributions payable to the provident fund.

iii) **Pension Scheme**

The Company operates a defined benefit pension plan for certain specified employees and is payable upon the employee satisfying certain conditions, as approved by the Board of Directors.

iv) **Post - Retirement Medical Benefit Plan**

The Company operates a defined post-retirement medical benefits plan for certain specified employees and is payable upon the employee satisfying certain conditions.

v) **Leave Encashment**

Accumulated leave, which is expected to be utilized within the next twelve months, is treated as short-term employee benefits for measurement purposes. The Company measures the expected cost of such absence as the additional amount that are expected to pay as a result of unused entitlement that has accumulated at the reporting date.

The Company treats accumulated leave expected to be carried forward beyond twelve months, as long-term employee benefits for measurement purpose. Such long-term compensated absences are provided based on the actuarial valuation using the “*Project Unit Credit Method*” at the reporting date. Actuarial gain / losses are immediately taken to the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss and are not deferred.

Recognition and Measurement of Defined Contribution Plans

The cost of providing defined benefits is determined using the “*Projected Unit Cash Credit*” method with actuarial valuations being carried out at each Standalone Balance Sheet date. The defined benefit obligations recognized in the Standalone Balance Sheet represent the present value of the defined benefit obligations as reduced by the fair value of plan assets, *if any*. Any defined benefit assets (negative benefit defined obligations resulting from these calculations) are recognized representing the present value of available refunds and reductions in future contributions to the plan.

All expenses represented by current service cost, past service cost, if any, and net interest on defined benefit liabilities / (assets) are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss. Remeasurement of the net defined benefits liabilities/ (assets) comprising actuarial gains and losses and the return on the plan assets (excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liabilities /assets), are recognized in other comprehensive income. Such remeasurements are not reclassified to the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss in the subsequent periods.

Past service cost is recognized immediately to the extent that the benefits are already vested, else is amortized on a straight-line basis over the average period until the amended benefits become vested. Actuarial gain or losses in respect of the defined benefits plan are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss in the year in which they arise.

The Company presents the above liabilities as current and non-current in the balance sheet as per the actuarial valuation by the independent actuary.

p) **Segment Reporting**

Segments are identified having regard to the dominant source and nature of the risks and returns and the internal organization and management structures. The Company has considered business segments as primary segments. The Company does not have any geographical segments.

Identification of Segments

The Company's operating business are organized and managed separately according to the nature of the products and services provided, with each segment representing a strategic business unit that offers the different products and serves the different markets. Majorly, the Company's business segments are *Aluminium Powder and Paste, Aluminium Conductor, Aluminium Foils and Others*.

Segment Accounting Policies

The Company's Board of Directors is identified as the Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM). The CODM reviews the overall financial information of the Company together for performance evaluation and allocation of resources and does not review any discrete information to evaluate the performance of any individual products or geography. The Company prepares its segment information in conformity with the accounting policies adopted for preparing and presenting the Standalone Financial Statements of the Company as a whole.

Operating Segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM). The CODM is responsible for assessing the performance and allocating the resources of the operating segment of the Company. Refer "Note No. 43" for Segment information.

q) Earnings per Share

The Company reports the basic and diluted Earnings per Share (EPS) in accordance with Ind AS - 33, "Earnings per Share". Basic EPS is computed by dividing the net profit or loss attributable to the equity shareholders of the Company for the period by the weighted average number of Equity shares outstanding during the period.

Diluted EPS is computed by dividing the net profit or loss attributable to the equity shareholders for the period by the weighted average number of Equity shares outstanding during the period as adjusted for the effects of all potential equity shares, except where the results are anti-dilutive.

The weighted average number of Equity shares outstanding during the period is adjusted for events such as a bonus Issue, bonus elements in right issue, share splits, and reverse share split (consolidation of shares) that have changed the number of Equity shares outstanding, without a corresponding change in resources.

r) Provisions and Contingencies

The Company recognizes provisions when a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event exists, and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle such obligation and the amount of such obligation can be reliably estimated.

If the effect of time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, when appropriate, the risks specific to the liabilities. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as a finance cost.

A disclosure for contingent liabilities is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not require an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or the amount of such obligation cannot be measured reliably. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which likelihood of outflow of resources embodying economic benefits is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

A provision is recognized if, as a result of a past event, the Company has a present legal obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by the best estimate of the outflow of economic benefits required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. Where no reliable estimate can be made, a disclosure is made as Contingent Liabilities.

Contingent assets are a possible asset arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed, only by the occurrence and non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the controls of the Company. Contingent assets are not recognized till realization of the income is virtually certain and are not recognized in the Standalone Financial Statements. The nature of such assets and an estimate of its financial effects are disclosed in the notes to the Standalone Financial Statements.

s) Exceptional Items

Exceptional items are disclosed separately in the Standalone Financial Statements, where it is necessary to do so to provide further understanding of the financial performance of the Company. These are the material items of income or expenses that have shown separately due to their nature and incidence. An ordinary item of income or expense which by its size, nature, occurrence or incidence requires a disclosure in order to improve understanding of the performance of the Company is treated as an exceptional item in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

t) Event after Reporting Date

Adjusting events are those events that provides further evidence of conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period. The Standalone Financial Statements are adjusted for such events before authorization for issue. Non-adjusting events are those events that are indicative of conditions that arose after the end of the reporting period. Non-adjusting events after the end of the reporting period are not accounted, but disclosed if material.

All the events occurring after the balance sheet date up to the date of the approval of the Standalone Financial Statement of the Company by the board of directors on **May 23, 2025**, have been considered, disclosed and adjusted, wherever applicable, as per the requirement of Indian Accounting Standards. Refer “*Note No. 52*” of Standalone Financial Statements for further references.

u) Cash Flow Statements

Cash flows statements are reported using the method set out in the Ind AS - 7, “*Cash Flow Statements*” and is prepared by using indirect method adjusting the net profit / (losses) before tax excluding exceptional items for the effect of:

- i) Changes during the period in inventories and other operating receivables and payables;
- ii) Non-cash items such as depreciation, provisions, unrealized foreign currency gain / (losses); and
- iii) all other items for which the cash effects are investing and financing cash flows.

The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated. The cash and cash equivalents (including balances with banks), shown in the Standalone Statement of Cash Flows exclude items, which are not available for general use as at the date of Standalone Balance Sheet.

v) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and cheques-in-hand, balances with banks, and demand deposits with banks where the original maturity is three months or less and other short-term highly liquid investments net of bank of overdrafts, which are repayable on demand as these from an integral part of the Company’s cash management.

w) Commitments

Commitments are the future liabilities for contractual expenditure, classified and disclosed as follows:

- i) estimated amounts of contracts remaining to be executed on capital account and not provided for;
- ii) other non-cancellable commitment, if any, to the extent they are considered material and relevant in the opinion of the Company’s management.

Other commitments related to sales / procurements made in the normal course of business are not disclosed to avoid the excessive details.

1.5 RECENT ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENT

Ministry of Corporate Affairs (the “MCA”) notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standard) Rules as issued from time to time. For the period March 31, 2025, the MCA has not notified any new standards or amendments to the existing standards applicable to the Company.

1.6 KEY ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The preparation of the Company’s Standalone Financial Statements is in conformity with the Ind AS, which requires the Company’s managements to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of the accounting policies and the reported amounts of the assets, liabilities, incomes, and expenses (including the contingent liabilities) and the accompanying disclosures. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities effected in future periods. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on a periodic basis. Revision to accounting estimates is recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key resources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described as follow:

- a) Income Tax:** The Company’s tax jurisdiction is in India. Significant judgments are involved in estimating budgeted profits for the purpose of paying advance tax, determining the income tax provisions, including the amount expected to be paid / recovered for uncertain tax provisions (Refer “*Note No. 20*”).
- b) Property, Plant and Equipment:** Property, plant and equipment represent a significant proportion of assets base of the Company. The charge in respect of periodic depreciation is derived after determining an estimate of an asset’s expected useful life and expected residual value at the end of its life. The useful lives and residual values of assets are determined by the Company’s management at the time the assets are acquired and reviewed periodically, including at each financial year end. The useful lives of each of these assets are based on the life prescribed in Schedule - II to the Companies Act, 2013, or based on the technical estimates, taken into the account the nature of the assets, estimated usage, expected residual values and operating conditions of the assets. The useful lives are based on historical experience with the similar assets as well as anticipation of future events, which may impact

their life, such as changes in technical or commercial obsolescence arising from changes or improvements in production or from a change in market demand of the product or service output of the assets.

- c) **Defined Benefits Obligations:** The costs of providing gratuity and other post-employment benefits are charged to the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss in accordance with *Ind AS - 19, "Employee Benefits"* over the period during which benefit is derived from the employees' services. It is determined by using the actuarial valuation and assessed on the basis of assumptions selected by the Company's management. An actuarial valuation involves making various assumptions that may differ from actual developments in the future. These assumptions include salary escalation rate, discount rates, expected rate of return on assets and mortality rates. The same is disclosed in "Note No. 44", "Employee Benefits". Due to complexities involved in the valuation and its long-term in nature, a defined benefit obligation is highly sensitive to change in these assumptions. All assumptions are reviewed at each balance sheet date by the Company's Management.
- d) **Fair Value measurements of Financial Instruments:** When the fair values of financial assets and financial liabilities recorded in the Standalone Balance Sheet cannot be measured based on quoted prices in active markets, their fair value is measured using valuation techniques, including the discounted cashflow model, which involves various judgments and assumptions. The input to these models is taken from observable markets wherever possible, where this is not feasible, a degree of judgment is required in establishing fair value. Judgements include considerations of inputs such as liquidity risk, credit risk and volatility. Changes in assumptions about these factors could affect the reported fair value of the financial instruments.
- e) **Recoverability of Trade Receivables:** Judgment is required in assessing the recoverability of overdue trade receivables and determining whether a provision is against those receivables is required. Factors considered include the credit rating of the counterparty, the amount and timing of anticipated future payments and any possible actions that can be taken to mitigate the risk of non-payments.
- f) **Provisions and Contingent Liabilities:** The Company's management estimates the provision that have present obligation as a result of past events, and it is probable that outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. These provisions are reviewed at the end of each reporting period and are adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

The Company uses significant judgements to assess contingent liabilities. Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the controls of the Company or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made. Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the Standalone Financial Statements.

- g) **Impairment of Financial and Non-Financial Assets:** The impairment provision of financial assets is based on the assumptions about the risk of default and expected cash loss rates. The Company uses judgment in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation, based on the Company's history, existing market conditions as well as forward looking estimates at the end of the reporting period.

In case of non-financial assets, the Company estimates asset's recoverable amount, this is higher of an assets or cash generating units (CGU) fair value less the cost of disposal and the value-in-use. In assessing the value-in-use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted using the pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risk specific to the assets. In determining the fair value less cost of disposal, recent market transactions are taken into account, if no such transactions can be identified, an appropriate valuation model is being used.

- h) **Recognition of Deferred Tax Assets and Liabilities:** Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognized for deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses or unused tax credit for which there is probability of utilization against the future taxable profits. The Company uses judgments to determine the amount of deferred tax that can be recognized, based upon the likely timing and the level of future taxable profits and business developments.
- i) **Amortization of Leasehold Land:** The Company's lease assets primarily consist of lease for industrial land. The lease premium is the fair value of land paid by the Company to the respective authorities at the time of acquisition and there is no liability at the end of the lease term. The lease premium paid by the Company has been amortized over the lease period on systematic basis and the same has been classified under *Ind AS - 16, "Property, Plant and Equipment"* and therefore, the requirements of both the *Ind AS - 116* and *Ind AS - 17*, as to the period over which, and the manner in which, the right of use assets (under *Ind AS - 116*) or the assets arising from the finance lease (under *Ind AS - 17*) amortized as similar.

38B - Financial Risk Management - Objectives and Policies

The Company’s principal financial assets mainly comprise of investments, security deposits, cash and cash equivalents, other balances with banks, trade and other receivables that derive directly from its business operations. The Company’s financial liabilities mainly comprise the borrowings in foreign as well as Indian currency, retention money, trade payable and other payables. The main purpose of these financial liabilities is to finance the Company’s business operations and to provide guarantees to support its operations.

The Company is exposed to Market Risk, Credit Risk and Liquidity Risk from its financial instruments. The Board of Directors ("the Board") oversees the management of these financial risks. The risk management policy of the Company formulated by the Company's management and approved by the Board of Directors, which states the Company's approach to address uncertainties in its endeavor to achieve its stated and implicit objectives. It prescribes the roles and responsibilities of the Company's managements, the structure for managing the risk and the framework for risk management. The framework seeks to identify, assess and mitigate the financial risks in order to minimize potential adverse effects on the Company's financial performance. The Board has taken necessary actions to mitigate the risks identified on the basis of information and situations present.

The following disclosures summarize the Company's exposure to financial risks and the information regarding the use of derivatives employed to manage the exposure to such risks. Quantitative sensitivity analysis has been provided to reflect the impact of reasonably possible changes in market rate on financial results, cash flows and financial positions of the Company.

1) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in the market prices. Market risk comprises three types of Risk: "Interest rate risk, Currency risk and Other price risk". Financial instruments affected by the market risk include loans and borrowings in foreign as well as domestic currency, deposits, retention money, trade and other payables and trade receivables and derivatives financial instruments.

a) Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash outflows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in the market interest rates. An upward movement in the interest rate would adversely affect the borrowing costs of the Company. The Company is exposed to long-term and short-term borrowings. The Company manages interest rate risk by monitoring its mix of fixed and floating rate instruments and taking actions as necessary to maintain an appropriate balance. The Company has not used any interest rate derivatives.

The Company operates globally, and a portion of the business is transacted in several currencies and consequently the Company is exposed to foreign exchange risk through its sales in overseas and purchases from overseas suppliers in foreign currency. c) **Other Price Risk**

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value of a financial instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market traded price. Other price risk arises from financial assets such as investments in quoted equity instruments. The Company is exposed to price risk arising mainly from investments in quoted equity instruments recognized at FVTOCI, if any. 2) **Credit Risk**

Credit risk refers to the risk that the counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial losses to the Company. Credit risk arises primarily from financial assets such as trade receivables, other balances with banks and other financial assets such as other receivables with the Company.

The Company has adopted a policy of only dealing with counter parties that have sufficiently high credit ratings. The Company's exposure and credit ratings of its counterparties are continuously monitored, and the aggregate value of transactions is reasonably spread amongst the counterparties.

Credit risk arising from term deposits and other balances with banks is limited and there is no collateral held against these because the counterparties are banks and recognized financial institutions with high credit rating assigned by the international credit rating agencies.

The average credit period on sale of products ranges from 30 to 60 days. Credit risk arising from trade receivable is managed in accordance with the Company's established policy, procedures and control relating to customer credit risk management. The credit quality of a customer is assessed based on detailed study of creditworthiness and accordingly individual credit limits are defined / modified. The concentration on credit risk is limited due to the fact that, the customer base is large. There are very few of the customers, which represents more than 10% of its total balance of trade receivable. For trade receivables, as a practical expedient, the Company computes credit loss allowance based on provision matrix. The provision matrix is prepared on historically observed default rate over the expected life of trade receivable and is adjusted for forward-looking estimates. 3) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in raising the funds to meet the commitments associated with financial instruments that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. Liquidity risk may result from an inability to sell a financial asset quickly at close to its fair value.

The Company has an established liquidity risk managements framework for managing its short-term, medium-term and long-term funding and liquidity management requirements. The Company's exposure to liquidity risk arises primarily from mismatches of maturities of financial assets and liabilities. The Company manages the liquidity risk by maintaining adequate funds in the cash and cash equivalents. The Company also has adequate credit facilities agreed with banks to ensure that there is sufficient cash to meet all its normal operating commitments in a timely and cost-effective manner.

The Company believes that its liquidity positions {As At March 31, 2025, ₹ 1,276.79 Lakhs (Prev Year ₹ 104.84 Lakhs)}, anticipated future internally generated funds from operations, and its fully available revolving undrawn credit facilities will enable it to meet its future known obligations in the ordinary course of business. However, if liquidity needs were to arise, the Company believes it has access to financing arrangements, value of unencumbered assets, which should enable it to meet its ongoing capital, operating, and other liquidity requirements.

The liquidity position of the Company mentioned above, includes:

- Cash and Cash Equivalents as disclosed in the Cash Flows Statements
- Current / non - current term deposits as disclosed in the other financial assets

The Company's liquidity management process as monitored by the management, includes:

- Day-to-day funding, managed by monitoring future cash flows to ensure that requirements can be met.
- Maintaining rolling forecasts of the Company's liquidity position on the basis of expected cash flows.
- Maintaining diversified credit lines.

38C - Capital Management

The Company adheres to a robust Capital Management framework which is underpinned by the following guiding principles.

- Maintain the financial strength to ensure BBB+ stable ratings domestically and investment grade ratings internationally.
- Ensure financial flexibility and diversify the source of financing and their maturities to minimize liquidity risk while meeting its investment requirements.
- Ensure sufficient liquidity is available (either through cash and cash equivalents, investments or committed credit facilities) to meet the needs of the business.
- Minimize the finance costs while taking into consideration current and future industry, market and economic risks and conditions.
- Safeguard its ability to continue as going as a going concern.
- Leverage optimally in order to maximize shareholders' returns while maintaining strength and flexibility of the Balance Sheet.

This framework is adjusted based on underlying macro-economic factors affecting the business environment, financial market conditions and interest rates environment.

The Board of Directors of the Company has primary responsibilities to maintain a strong capital base and reduce the cost of capital through a prudent management of deployed fund and leveraging in domestic and international financial market, so as to maintain investors, creditors and market confidence and to sustain future development of the business.

For the purpose of the Company's capital management, capital includes issued equity capital and all other equity reserves attributable to the equity shareholders of the Company. The primary objective of the Company when managing capital is to safeguard its ability to continue as a going concern and to maintain an optimal capital structure so as to maximize shareholder value.

As at March 31, 2025, and March 31, 2024, the Company has only one class of equity shares and has low debts. Consequent to such capital structure, there are no externally imposed capital requirements. In order to maintain or achieve an optimal capital structure, the Company allocates its capital for distribution as dividends or reinvestments into business based on its long-term financial plans.

The Company manages its capital on the basis of the Net Debt to Equity Ratio which is Net Debt (Total Borrowings net of Cash and Cash Equivalents) divided by total equity.

52 Event occurring after the Balance Sheet Date (Fire Incident at Plants)

On April 11, 2025, at approximately 06.45 PM, a major explosion and fire break out in one section of Aluminium Powder divisions situated at Umred Plants. Swift and effective response by our emergency evacuation team, all the individuals present at the site were promptly evacuated. However, despite these efforts, we deeply regret to report the unfortunate loss of some of our valued workmen. Additionally, a few individually sustained minor injuries and are currently receiving appropriate medical attention. The Company's management is profoundly saddened by this tragic incident. We extend our heartfelt condolence to the families of the deceased and assure them of our unwavering support during this difficult time. We are also fully committed to ensuring the well-being and recovery of the injured. The Company stand united with their employees, their families, and the wider community during this moment of grief and are committed to providing every possible assistance.

Preliminary assessments indicate that certain part of the plants, building, equipment and inventories located at the site, sustained extensive damage and were destroyed in the incident. A detailed investigation is currently underway to determine the root cause of the explosion. The Company's management estimates the total losses to inventories, plants, building and equipment range between ₹ 15 Crore to ₹ 20 Crore. However, the Company has adequately covered its assets and inventories under a fire insurance policy and is in the process of filling an insurance claim for the losses incurred during the incident.

To minimize the impact on ongoing operations and customer commitments, the Company has partially shifted operations to its Bhandara Plant. The Company's management believes remain focused on gradually resuming normal business operation in the coming months to meet the customer demand to substantial extent. We are fully cooperating with the relevant authorities and will implement all the necessary steps to prevent such incidents in the near future.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying Consolidated Financial Statements of **MMP INDUSTRIES LIMITED** (hereinafter referred to as "the Parent") and its subsidiaries, (the Parent Company and its subsidiaries together referred to as "the Group"), which includes the Group's share of net profit / (loss) in its associates, which comprises the Consolidated Balance Sheet as at **March 31, 2025**, the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss (including the Other Comprehensive Income), the Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows and the Consolidated Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended on that date and notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the Consolidated Financial Statements").

Carrying Value of Trade Receivables	
As at March 31, 2025, trade receivables constitute approximately 16.30% of total assets of the Group (Refer “Note No. 11” of the Consolidated Financial Statements). The Parent is required to regularly assess the recoverability of its trade receivables. The Parent applied, expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on trade receivables. The Parent uses a provision matrix to determine impairment loss allowances. The provision matrix is based on its historically observed default rates over the expected life of trade receivables and is adjusted for forward-looking estimates. This is a key audit matters as significant judgment is involved to establish the provision matrix.	Our audit procedures included, among other the followings: * Evaluated the Parent’s accounting policies pertaining to impairment of financial assets and assessed compliance with those policies in term of Ind AS - 109, “Financial Instruments”. * Assessed and tested the design and operating effectiveness of the Parent’s internal financial controls over provision for expected credit loss (ECL). * Evaluated the Parent’s management’s assumption and judgment relating to various parameters, which included the historical default rates and business environment in which the entity operates for estimating the amount of such provision. * Evaluated the Parent’s management’s assessment of recoverability of the outstanding receivables and recoverability of the overdue / aged receivables through inquiry with the Parent’s management, and analysis of the collection trends in respect of receivables. * Assessed and read the disclosures made by the Parent in the Consolidated Financial Statements.

Emphasis on Matters

We draw attention to the “Note No. 54” of the Consolidated Financial Statements, which describes events subsequent to the year end, the effects of a fire in the Parent’s production facilities. Since, this is the non-adjusting subsequent event, no adjustment has been made in the Consolidated Financial Statements for the period ended March 31, 2025. Our opinion is not modified in respect of these matters.

Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditor’s Report thereon

The Parent’s Board of Directors are responsible for the other information. Our opinion on the Consolidated Financial Statements, in so as far, as it relates to the amounts and disclosures included in respect of these associates, and our report in term of section 143(3) of the Act, in so far, as it relates to the aforesaid associates, is based solely on the report of other auditors.

Our opinion on the Consolidated Financial Statements above, and our report on the Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements below, is not modified in respect of above matters with respect to our reliance on the work done and the report of the other auditors.

- e. On the basis of the written representation received from the directors of the Parent as on March 31, 2025, taken on the record by the Board of Directors of the Parent and based on the reports of the Statutory Auditors of the subsidiary and associate companies, incorporate in India, none of directors of the Group companies, its associate companies, incorporated in India, is disqualified as on March 31, 2025, from being appointed as a director in term of Section 164(2) of the Act.
- f. With respect to adequacy of the internal financial controls with reference to these Consolidated Financial Statements and the operating effectiveness of such control, refer to our separate report in **Annexure “A”**, which is based on the auditor reports of the Parent, subsidiary, associate companies, incorporated in India. Our report expresses an unmodified opinion on the adequacy and operating effectiveness of the internal financial controls with reference to the Consolidated Financial Statements of those companies.
- g.  - b) The respective Managements of the Parent, subsidiary and its associates, which are incorporated in India, whose financial statements, have been audited under the Act, have represented to us and to the other auditors of such subsidiary and associate respectively, that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, as disclosed in notes to the accounts of the Consolidated Financial Statements, no funds (which are material either individually or in the aggregate) have been received by the Parent and any of such subsidiary and associates included in the Group, from any person or entities, including foreign entities (“Funding Parties”), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Parent and any of such subsidiary and associate included in the Group shall, whether, directly or indirectly, lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Funding Party (“Ultimate Beneficiaries”) or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries;

- c) Based on such audit procedures that have been considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances performed by us and that performed by the other auditors of the associate companies include in the Group, which are incorporated in India, whose financial statements audited under the Act, nothing has come to our or other auditors notice that has caused us and other auditors to believe that the representations under sub-clause (i) and (ii) of Rule 11(e), as provided under (a) and (b) above, contain any material misstatement.

The amount of dividend proposed is in accordance with section 123 of the Act, as applicable.
- (vi) Based on our examination, which included test check, and based on the other auditors of its associate companies, which have been incorporated in India, whose financial statements have been audited under the Act, the Parent, its subsidiaries and its associate, which are incorporated in India, has used accounting software for maintaining their respective books of accounts for the financial period ended March 31, 2025, which has a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facilities and the same has operated throughout the period for all the relevant transactions recorded in the software. Further, during the course of audit, we and respective other auditors, whose report have been furnished to us by the Management of Parent, have not come across any instances of the audit trail feature being tampered with.

Additionally, where the audit trail (edit log) facility was enabled and operated in the previous year, the audit trail has been preserved by the Parent and above referred associate companies, which are incorporated in India, as per the statutory requirements for record retention.

2. Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements for the year then ended on March 31, 2025**Group's Information**

The Consolidated Financial Statements comprise financial statements of MMP Industries Limited (the "Parent") and its subsidiaries (collectively referred to as the "Group") and includes share of profit of the associates for the period ended March 31, 2025.

The Parent is a Public Limited Company, domiciled and incorporated in India, under the provisions of Companies Act, 1956. The Registered office of the Parent is situated at *211, Shrimohini Complex, 345, Kingsway, Nagpur, (M.H.) - 440001*. The books of accounts and other related documents and information are maintained at *"B - 24, MIDC Area, Hingna Industrial Estate, Hingna Road, Nagpur (M.H.) - 440016"*. The Parent's shares are listed on *"National Stock Exchange"* (NSE).

The Group is primarily engaged in the business of manufacturing, selling, distribution and trading of Aluminium Powder, Aluminium Pyro and Flake Powder, Aluminium Paste, Aluminium Conductor, Aluminium Foils and Insulators. The Group is also engaged in trading and manufacturing of MnO and MnO₂ Powder.

The Parent's Board of Directors approved the Consolidated Financial Statements for the year ended March 31, 2025, and authorized for issue on May 23, 2025.

1. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND KEY ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS**MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES****1.1 BASIS OF PREPARATION OF CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

These Consolidated Financial Statements are the separate financial statements of the Parent (also called as the "Consolidated Financial Statements") prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standard ("Ind AS") as notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") read together with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standard) Rule, 2016, as amended, time to time. The preparation and presentation of the Consolidated Financial Statements is based on the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS), Division - II of the Schedule - III of the Companies Act, 2013.

Entity specific disclosure of material accounting policies, where the Indian Accounting Standards permits options are disclosed hereunder:

The Parent's management and the respective Board of Directors included in the Group has assessed the materiality of the accounting policy information, which involves exercising judgements and considering both qualitative and quantitative factors, taking into account not only the size and nature of the items or conditions but also the characteristics of the transactions, events or conditions that could make the information more likely to impact the decisions of the users of the Consolidated Financial Statements.

Entity's conclusion that an accounting policy is immaterial does not affect the disclosures requirements set out in the Indian Accounting Standards.

The Parent has adopted Ind AS from April 01, 2018. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policies hitherto adopted. These Consolidated Financial Statements have been prepared and presented under the historical cost convention, on the accrual basis of accounting except for certain financial assets and financial liabilities that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between the market participants at the measurement date.

The Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared under indirect method, whereby the profit and loss are adjusted for the effect of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals and accruals or future operating cash receipts or payments and items of income and expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Parent are segregated. The Parent considers all highly liquid instruments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value to be cash equivalents.

The Parent's Consolidated Financial Statements are prepared and presented in Indian Rupee (₹) in Lakhs, which is also the functional currency for the Parent. All amounts have been rounded off to the nearest (₹) in Lakhs up to two decimals, except when otherwise specified.

1.2 PRINCIPLE OF CONSOLIDATION

The Consolidated Financial Statements of the **MMP INDUSTRIES LIMITED** comprise the Standalone Financial Statements of the MMP Industries Limited (“the Parent”), its subsidiary and associate companies (collectively referred to as “the Group”) as at March 31, 2025.

The Parent consolidates all the entities when it owns or controls it. Control exists when the Parent has power over an entity, is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the equity and has the ability to affect those returns by using its power over the entity. Power is demonstrated through existing rights, that give the ability to direct relevant activities which significantly affect the entity’s returns.

Subsidiary Companies

Subsidiaries are consolidated, when the Parent, directly or indirectly, obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Parent, directly or indirectly, loses controls of the subsidiary. Income and expenses of subsidiary acquired are included in the Consolidated Profit and Loss from the date the Parent, directly or indirectly, gains control until the date when the Parent, directly or indirectly, ceases to control the subsidiary.

The consolidation of accounts of the Company with its subsidiary has been prepared in accordance with Ind AS - 110, “*Consolidated Financial Statements*”. The financial statements of the Parent and its subsidiary are combined on line-by-line basis and intra group balances, intra group transactions and unrealized profits or losses are fully eliminated. Ind AS - 12, “*Income Tax*” applies to temporary differences that arise from elimination of profits and losses resulting from intragroup transactions.

Profit or loss and other comprehensive income / (losses) are attributed to the owners of the Parent and to the non-controlling interest, shown separately in the Consolidated Financial Statements. Non-controlling interest represents that part of the total comprehensive income / (losses) and net assets of subsidiary, attributable to the interest, which is not owned, directly or indirectly, by the Parent.

The gain / (losses) in respect of part divestment / dilution of stack in subsidiary companies not resulting ceding of the controls, are recognized directly in Other Equity attributable to the owners of the Parent, in the Consolidated Financial Statements of the Group. The gain / (losses) in respect of divestment of stack resulting in ceding of controls in subsidiary companies are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. The investments representing the interest retained in the former subsidiary, if any, is initially recognized at its fair value with the corresponding effect recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss, as at the date of control is ceded. Such retained interest is subsequently accounted as Investment in subsidiary and associate companies or as a financial asset.

Associate Companies

An associate is an entity over which the Parent has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decision of the investee but is not control and joint control over the policies.

The resulting assets and liabilities of the associate companies are incorporated in consolidated financial statements using the “*Equity Method of Accounting*”. Under the Equity method, an investment in associates is initially recognized at cost. The carrying amount of the investments is adjusted to recognize changes in the Group’s share of net assets of the associates since the acquisition date. The consolidated statement of profit and loss reflects the Group’s share of the result of the operations of the associates. Any changes in the other comprehensive income / (losses) of those investees is presented as a part of the Group’s Other Comprehensive Income. In addition, when there has been a change recognized directly in the equity of the associates, the Group recognizes its share of any changes, when applicable, in the consolidated statement of changes in equity.

If Group’s share of losses of an associate equal or exceeds its interest in the associate (which includes any long-term interest that, in substance, form part of the Group’s net investments in the associates), the Group discontinues recognizing its share of further losses. Additional losses are recognized only to the extent that the Group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of an associate. If the associates subsequently report profits, the Group resumes recognizing its share of those profits only after its share of the profits equals the share of losses not recognized.

The aggregate of the Group’s share of profit and loss of an associate is shown on the face of the consolidated statement of profit and loss.

After the application of equity method, the Group determines, whether it is necessary to recognize an impairment loss on its investment in its associates. At each reporting period, the Group’s determines, whether there is objective evidence that

the investment in the associate is impaired. If there exists such evidence, the Group calculates the amount of impairment as the difference between the recoverable amount of associate and its carrying value, and then recognizes the loss in the consolidated statement of profit and loss. Upon the loss of significant influence over the associate companies, the Group measures and recognizes any retained investments at fair value. Any difference between the carrying amount of the associates upon the loss of significant influence and fair value of the retained investments less cost to sell is recognized in the consolidated statements of profit and loss.

Consolidated Financial Statements are prepared using the uniform accounting policies for like transactions and other events in similar circumstances and are presented to the extent possible, in the same manner as the Parent's separate financial statements, unless stated otherwise. If a member of the Group uses accounting policies other than those adopted in the Consolidated Financial Statements for like transactions and other events in the similar circumstances, appropriate adjustments are made to that Group member's financial statements in preparing the Consolidated Financial Statements to ensure the conformity with the Group's accounting policies.

The Standalone Financial Statements of all entities included in the Group, which are used for the purpose of consolidation, are drawn up to the same reporting period as that of the Parent i.e. year ended March 31, 2025. When the reporting period of the Parent is different from that of its subsidiary and associate companies, for consolidation purpose, additional financial information as of the same date as the financial statements of the Parent to enable the Parent Company to consolidate the financial information of the said subsidiary and associate companies, unless it is impracticable to do so.

1.3 APPLICATION OF NEW ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

Ministry of Corporate Affairs (the "MCA") notifies the new standards or amendments to the existing standards under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standard) Rule, as issued from time to time. For the period ended March 31, 2025, MCA has notified amendments to Ind AS - 116, "Lease", relating to the sale and leaseback transactions, which is applicable to the Group w.e.f. April 01, 2024. The Group has reviewed the new pronouncements and based on its evaluation has determined that it is not likely to have any significant impact in its Consolidated Financial Statements.

1.4 CURRENT AND NON-CURRENT CLASSIFICATION

The Parent presents the assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current / non-current classification. An asset or liabilities are classified as current when it satisfies any of the following criteria:

- The assets / liabilities are expected to be realized / settled in the Parent's normal operating cycle.
- The assets are intended for sales or consumption.
- The assets / liabilities are held primarily for the purpose of trading.
- The assets / liabilities are expected to be realized /settled within twelve months after the end of reporting date.
- The assets are cash or cash equivalents unless they are restricted from being exchanged or used to settle liabilities for at least twelve months after the reporting period.
- In the case of liabilities, the Parent does not have an unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liabilities for at least twelve months after the reporting date.

All other assets and liabilities are classified as non-current.

For the purpose of current / non-current classification of assets and liabilities, the Parent has ascertained its operating cycle as twelve months (12 months). This is based on the nature of services and the time between the acquisition of the assets or inventories for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents.

1.5 SUMMARY OF MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Property, Plant and Equipment

Measurement at Recognition

An item of property, plant and equipment that qualifies as an asset is measured on the initial recognition at cost. Following the initial recognition, item of property, plant and equipment are carried at its cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, *if any*. The Parent identifies and determines cost of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment separately, if the part has a cost which is significant to the total cost of that item of property, plant and equipment and has useful life that is materially different from that of the remaining items.

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment comprises of its purchase price net of discounts, if any, including import duties and other non-refundable purchase taxes or levies, directly attributable to cost of bringing the assets to its present location and working condition for its intended use and the initial estimate of decommissioning, restoration, and similar liabilities, *if any*. Cost includes the cost of replacing a part of the plants and equipment if the recognition criteria are met. Expenses directly attributable to new manufacturing facilities during its construction period are capitalized if the recognition criteria are met. Expenditure related to plans, designs and drawings of buildings or plants and machinery are capitalized under the relevant heads of property, plant and equipment, if the recognition criteria are met. When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at periodical intervals, the Parent recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Parent and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any components accounted for as a separate asset is de-recognized when replaced.

All the costs, including administrative, financing and general overhead expenses, as are specifically attributable to construction of a specific projects or to the acquisition of a property, plant and equipment or bringing it to its present location and working condition, is include as a part of the cost of construction of the project or as a part of the cost of property, plant and equipment, till the commencement of its commercial production. Any adjustments arising from exchange rate variations attributable to the property, plant and equipment are capitalized as aforementioned.

Borrowing costs relating to the acquisition / construction of property, plant and equipment which takes the substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use are also included in the cost of property, plant and equipment / cost of constructions to the extent they relate to the period till such property, plant and equipment are ready to be put to use.

Any subsequent expenditure related to an item of property, plant and equipment is added to its book value only and only if it increases the future economic benefits from the existing assets beyond its previously assessed standard of performance.

Any items such as spare parts, stand-by equipment and servicing equipment that meet definitions criteria of the property, plant and equipment are capitalized at cost and depreciated over the useful life of the respective property, plant and equipment. Cost is in the nature of repairs and maintenances are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss as and when incurred.

Capital Work-in-Progress and Capital Advances

Cost of property, plant and equipment not ready for intended use, as at the Consolidated Balance Sheet date, is shown as a "*Capital Work-in-Progress*". The capital work-in-progress is stated at cost. Any expenditure in relation to survey and investigation of the properties is carried out as capital work-in-progress, such expenditure is either capitalized as cost of the projects on completion of construction project or the same is expensed in the period in which it is decided to abandon such projects. Any advances given towards acquisition of property, plant and equipment outstanding at each Consolidated Balance Sheet date is disclosed as "*Other Non - Current Assets*".

The Parent has elected to consider the carrying value of all its property, plants and equipment appearing in its Consolidated Financial Statements and used the same as deemed cost in the opening Ind AS Balance Sheet prepared at April 01, 2018.

Depreciation

Depreciation on each part of property, plant and equipment are provided to the extent of the depreciable amount of the assets on the basis of “*Straight Line Method (SLM)*” on the useful lives of the tangible property, plant and equipment as estimated by the Parent’s management and is charged to the consolidated statement of profit and loss, as per the requirement of *Schedule - II to the Companies Act, 2013*. The estimated useful lives of the property, plant and equipment have been assessed based on the technical advice, which is considered in the nature of the property, plant and equipment, the usage of the property, plant and equipment, expected physical wear and tear of such property, plant and equipment, the operating conditions, anticipated technological changes, manufacturer warranties and maintenance support of the property, plant and equipment etc.

When the parts of an item of the property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) and are depreciated over their useful lives or over the remaining useful lives of the principal property, plant and equipment, whichever is less.

The useful lives of the items of property, plants and equipment as estimated by the Parent’s management is mentioned below:

The Parent based on technical assessment made by the technical experts and the Parents’s management estimate, depreciate certain items of property, plant and equipment over the estimated useful lives which are different from the useful lives as prescribed under *Schedule - II of the Companies Act, 2013*. The Parent’s management believes that the useful lives given above are best to represent the period over which the Parent’s management expects to use this property, plant and equipment.

Freehold land is not depreciated. Leasehold land and their improvement cost are amortized over the period of the lease. The useful lives, residual value of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment and method of depreciation is reviewed at the end of each reporting period, *if any*, of these expectations differ from the previous estimates, such change is accounted for as a change in accounting estimate and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Derecognition

The carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment and other intangible assets are recognized on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from derecognition of the property, plant and equipment is measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the assets and is recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss, as and when the assets are de-recognized.

b) Intangible Assets**Measurement at Recognition**

Intangible assets acquired separately measured on the initial recognition at cost. Intangible assets arising on the acquisition of businesses are measured at fair value as at the date of acquisition. Internally generated intangible assets, including research costs, are not capitalized and the related expenditure is recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which the expenditure is incurred. Following the initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment loss, *if any*.

The Parent has elected to consider the carrying value of all intangible assets appearing in its Consolidated Financial Statements and used the same as deemed cost in the opening Ind AS Balance Sheet prepared at April 01, 2018.

Amortization

Intangible assets with the finite lives are amortized on a “*Straight Line Basis*” over the estimated useful economics lives of such intangible assets. The amortization expenses on intangible assets with finite lives are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss. The estimated useful lives of intangible assets are mentioned below:

The amortization period and the amortization method for an intangible asset with the finite useful lives are reviewed at the end of each financial year. If any of these expectations differ from the previous estimates, such changes are accounted for as a change in an accounting estimate and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Derecognition

The carrying amount of an intangible asset is derecognized at disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from the de-recognition of an intangible assets is measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the intangible assets and is recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss, as and when such assets are de-recognized.

c) Impairment

Assessment for impairment is done on each Balance Sheet date as to whether there is any indication that a non-financial asset may be impaired. Assets that have an indefinite useful life are not subject to amortization and are tested for impairment annually and whenever there is an indication that the assets may be impaired.

Assets that are subject to depreciation and amortization and assets representing investment in subsidiary and associate companies are reviewed for impairment, whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that carrying amount may not be recoverable. Such circumstances include, though are not limited to, significant or sustained decline in revenues or earnings and material adverse changes in the economic environments.

The Parent assesses at each reporting date, whether there is an indication that assets may be impaired, if any indication exists based on internal or external factors, or when Annual impairment testing for assets is required, the Parent Company estimates the asset’s recoverable amount. Where the carrying amount of the assets or its cash generating unit (CGU) exceeds its recoverable amount, the assets are considered impaired and written down to its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is greater of the fair value less cost to sell and value-in-use. In assessing value-in-use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax rate that reflects current market rates and the risk specific to the assets. For an asset that does not generate largely independent cash inflows, the recoverable amount is determined for the CGU to which the assets belong. Fair value less cost to sell is the best estimate of the amount obtainable from the sale of an assets in an arm’s length transactions between knowledgeable, willing parties, less cost of disposal. After the impairment, depreciation is provided on the revised carrying amount of the assets over its remaining useful lives.

Reversal of impairment losses recognized in prior years is recorded when there is an indication that the impairment losses recognized for the assets no longer exists or has decreased. However, the increase in the carrying amount of assets due to the reversal of an impairment loss is recognized to the extent it does exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of depreciation) had no impairment loss been recognized for the assets in the prior years.

Impairment losses, if any, are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss and included in depreciation and amortization expense. Impairment losses are reversed in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss only to the extent that the asset’s carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined if no impairment loss had previously been recognized.

d) Revenue Recognition**Revenue from Contracts with Customers**

Revenue from contracts with customers is recognized on transfer of control of promised goods or services to a customer at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Parent is expected to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue towards satisfaction of a performance obligation is measured in the amount of

transaction price (net of variable consideration on accounts of various discounts and schemes offered by the Parent as a part of the Contracts) allocated to that performance obligation. These variable considerations are estimated based on the expected value of outflow. Revenue (net of variable consideration) is recognized only to the extent that it is highly probable that the amount will not be subject to significant reversal when uncertainty relating to its recognition is resolved.

Sale of Products

Revenue from sales of goods is recognized when control on the goods has been transferred to the customers. The performance obligation in the case of sale of goods is satisfied at a point in time i.e. when the material is shipped to the customers or delivery to the customers as may be specified in the contracts with them.

Sales (Gross) excludes Goods and Service Tax (GST) and is a net of discounts and incentives to the customers.

Sale of Services

Revenue from sales of service is recognized over the period of time by measuring the progress towards satisfaction of performance obligation for the service rendered. The revenue is recognized based on the agreements / arrangements with the customers as the service is performed and based on the satisfaction of performance obligation.

Advances from customers are recognized under “*Other Current Liabilities*” and released to revenue on satisfaction of performance obligation.

Interest

Revenue from interest income is recognized using the effective interest method. Effective interest rate (EIR) is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments or receipts over the expected life of the financial instruments or a shorter period, where appropriate, to the gross carrying amount of the financial assets or to the amortized cost of financial liabilities.

Dividend

Revenue is recognized when the Parent’s right to receive the payment is established, which is generally when the shareholders approved the dividend, at their respective Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Other Income

Other items of income are recognized as and when the right to receive such income arises and it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Parent and the amount of income can be measured reliably.

e) Government Grants and Subsidies

Recognition and Measurements

The Parent recognizes grant as income when there is reasonable assurance that the Parent will comply with all the necessary conditions attached to them and the grant will be received, in accordance with Ind AS - 20, “*Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance*”. The Parent is entitled to receive, certain non-refundable subsidies from the Government in respect of manufacturing units located in the State of Maharashtra, which are measured, when the right to receive the amounts from the Government is established.

Government grants are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which related costs, which the grants are intended to compensate, are recognized as expenses. Government grants related to property, plants and equipment are presented at fair value, and grants are recognized as deferred income.

Presentation

Income from the above grants and subsidies are presented under Revenue from Operations. Government grants related to property, plants and equipment are presented at fair value, and grants are recognized as deferred income.

f) Inventories

Raw material, work-in-progress, finished goods, packing material, stores and spares, components, consumables and stock-in-trade are carried at lower of cost and net realizable value. However, materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written - down below cost, if the finished goods in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above costs. The comparison of costs and net realizable value is made on an item-by-item basis. In determining the cost of raw materials, work-in-progress, finished goods, packing materials, stores and spares, components and trading stock, “*Weighted Average*” method is used. Cost

of inventories comprises all costs of purchase, non-refundable duties and taxes, cost of conversion including an appropriate share of fixed and variable production overheads and all other costs incurred in bringing the inventory to its present location and conditions.

“*Net Realizable Value*” is the estimated selling price of inventories in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and estimated cost necessary to make the sales of the products.

The Parent considers factors like estimated shelf life, product discontinuances and aging of inventory in determining the provision for slow moving, obsolete and other non - saleable inventory and adjusts the inventory provision to reflect the recoverable value of the inventory.

g) Financial Instruments

A financial instrument is in any contract that gives rise to the financial assets of one entity and financial liabilities or equity instruments of another entity.

Financial Assets

Initial Recognition and Measurements

The Parent recognizes a financial asset in its Consolidated Balance Sheet as and when it becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. All the financial assets are recognized initially at fair value, plus in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial assets. However, trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price.

Where the fair value of a financial assets at initial recognition is different from its transaction price, the difference between the fair value and the transaction price is recognized as a gain or loss in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss at initial recognition, if the fair value is determined through a quoted market price in an active market for an identical asset (i.e. level 1 input) or through a valuation technique that uses data from observable markets (i.e. level 2 input).

In case the fair value is not determined using a level 1 or level 2 input as mentioned above, the difference between the fair value and transaction price is deferred appropriately and recognized as a gain or loss in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss only to the extent that such gain or loss arises due to a change in factor that market participants taken into account, when pricing the financial assets.

Subsequent Measurements

For subsequent measurements, the Parent classifies a financial asset in accordance with the below criteria:

- i) The Parent’s business model for managing the financial assets and
- ii) The contractual cash flows characteristics of the financial assets.

Based on the above criteria, the Parent classifies its financial assets into the following categories:

- i) Financial assets measured at amortized costs
- ii) Financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)
- iii) Financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

Financial Assets measured at Amortized Costs

A financial asset is measured at the amortized costs if both the following conditions are met:

- a) The Parent’s business model objective for managing the financial assets is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows, and
- b) The contractual terms of the financial assets give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

This category applies to cash and bank balances, trade receivables, loans and other financial assets of the Parent. Such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method. Under the effective interest method, the future cash receipts are discounted to the initial recognition value using the effective interest rate. The cumulative amortization using the effective interest method of the difference between the initial recognition amounts and the maturity amount is added to the initial recognition value (net of principal repayments, if any) of the financial assets over the relevant period of the financial assets to arrive at the amortized costs at each reporting date. The corresponding effect of the amortization, under effective interest method is recognized as interest income over the relevant period of the financial assets. The same is included under “*Other Income*” in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss. The amortized costs of financial assets are also adjusted for loss allowance, if any.

Financial Assets measured at FVTOCI

A financial asset is measured at FVTOCI if both of the following conditions are met:

- a) The Parent's business model objective for managing the financial assets is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets, and
- b) The contractual terms of the financial assets give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

This category applies to certain investments in debt instruments. Such financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value at each reporting date. Fair value changes are recognized in the Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). However, the Parent recognizes interest income and impairment losses and its reversals in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

On de-recognition of such financial assets, cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in OCI is reclassified from equity to Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

Further, the Parent, through an irrevocable election at initial recognition, has measured certain investments in equity instruments at FVTOCI. The Parent has made such selection on an instrument-by-instrument basis. These equity instruments are neither held for trading nor are contingent consideration recognized under a business combination. Pursuant to such irrevocable election, subsequent changes in the fair value of such equity instruments are recognized in other comprehensive income. However, the Parent recognizes dividend income from such instruments in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss, when the right to receive such payment is established, it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Parent and the amount can be measured reliably.

On de-recognition of such financial assets, cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in OCI is not reclassified from equity to Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss. However, the Parent may transfer such cumulative gain or loss into retained earnings within equity.

Financial Assets measured at FVTPL

A financial asset is measured at FVTPL unless it is measured at amortized costs or at FVTOCI as explained above. This is a residual category applied to all other investments of the Parent excluding investments in subsidiary and associate companies. Such financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value at each reporting date. Fair value changes are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial assets or part of a group of similar financial assets) is derecognized (i.e. removed from the Parent's Consolidated Balance Sheet) when any of the following occurs:

- i) The contractual rights to cash flows from the financial assets expire.
- ii) The Parent transfers its contractual rights to receive cash flows of the financial assets and has substantially transferred all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset.
- iii) The Parent retains the contractual rights to receive cash flows but assumes a contractual obligation to pay the cash flows without material delay to one or more recipients under a "pass-through" arrangement (thereby substantially transferring all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial assets).
- iv) The Parent neither transfers nor retains substantially all risk and rewards of ownership and does not retain control over the financial assets.

In cases, where the Parent has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the financial assets, but retains control of the financial assets, the Parent continues to recognize such financial assets to the extent of its continuing involvement in the financial assets. In that case, the Parent also recognizes an associated liability. The financial assets and the associated liabilities are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Parent has retained.

On de-recognition of financial assets, (except as mentioned in above for financial assets measured at FVTOCI), the difference between the carrying amount and the consideration received is recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

Impairment of Financial Assets

The Parent applies expected credit losses (ECL) model for measurements and recognition of loss allowance on the following:

- i) Trade receivables
- ii) Financial assets measured at amortized costs (other than trade receivables)
- iii) Financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)

In the case of trade receivables, the Parent follows a simplified approach wherein an amount equal to lifetime ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance.

In the case of other assets (listed as ii and iii above), the Parent determines if there has been a significant increase in credit risk of the financial assets since the initial recognition. If the credit risk of such assets has not increased significantly, an amount equal to twelve months ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance. However, if credit risk has increased significantly, an amount equal to lifetime ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance.

Subsequently, if the credit quality of the financial assets improves such that there is no longer a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the Parent reverts to recognizing impairment loss allowance based on twelve months ECL.

ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Parent in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the entity expected to receive (i.e., all cash shortfalls), discounted at the original effective interest rate. Lifetime ECL are the expected credit losses resulting from all possible default events over the expected life of financial assets. Twelve months ECL is a portion of the lifetime ECL which results from default events that are possible within twelve months from the reporting date.

ECL are measured in a manner that they reflect unbiased, and probability weighted amounts determined by a range of outcomes, taking into account the time value of money and other reasonable information available as a result of past events, current conditions and forecasts of future economic conditions.

As a practical expedient, the Parent uses a provision matrix to measure lifetime ECL on its portfolio of trade receivables. The provision matrix is prepared based on historically observed default rates over the expected life of trade receivables and is adjusted for forward-looking estimates. At each reporting date, the historically observed default rates and changes in the forward-looking estimates are updated.

ECL impairment loss allowance (or reversal) recognized during the reporting period are recognized as income / expense in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss under the head “Other Expenses”.

Financial Liabilities**Initial Recognition and Measurements**

The Parent recognizes financial liabilities in its Consolidated Balance Sheet when it becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value, in the case of financial liabilities not recorded at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial liabilities.

Where the fair value of a financial liabilities at initial recognition is different from its transaction price, the difference between the fair value and the transaction price is recognized as a gain or loss in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss at initial recognition if the fair value is determined through a quoted market price in an active market for an identical asset (i.e. level 1 input) or through a valuation technique that uses data from observable markets (i.e. level 2 input).

In case the fair value is not determined using a level 1 or level 2 input as mentioned above, the difference between the fair value and transaction price is deferred appropriately and recognized as a gain or loss in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss, only to the extent that such gain or loss arises, due to a change in factor that market participants taken into account when pricing the financial liabilities.

Subsequent Measurements

All the financial liabilities of the Parent are subsequently measured at amortized costs using the effective interest method.

Under the effective interest method, the future cash payments are exactly discounted to the initial recognition value using the effective interest rate. The cumulative amortization using the effective interest method of the difference between the initial recognition amount and the maturity amount is added to the initial recognition value (net of principal repayments, if any) of the financial liabilities over the relevant period of the financial liabilities to arrive at the amortized costs at each reporting date. The corresponding effect of the amortization, under effective interest method are recognized as interest expense over the relevant period of the financial liabilities. The same is included under finance costs in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition

A financial liability is de-recognized when the obligation under the liabilities is discharged or cancelled or expire. When existing financial liabilities are replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liabilities are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification are treated as the de-recognition of the original liabilities and the recognition of a new liabilities. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liabilities de-recognized and the consideration paid is recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

Offsetting of Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset, and the net amount is reported in the Consolidated Balance Sheet, if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

h) Derivative Financial Instruments and Hedge Accounting

The Parent enters into derivative financial contracts in the nature of forward currency contracts with external parties to hedge its foreign currency risks relating to foreign currency denominated financial liabilities measured at amortized cost. The Parent formally establishes a hedge relationship between such forward currency contracts ("*Hedging Instruments*") and recognized financial liabilities ("*Hedged Items*") through a formal documentation at the inception of the hedge relationship in line with the Parent's Risk Management objective and strategy.

The hedge relationship so designated is accounted for in accordance with the accounting principles prescribed for a fair value hedge under Ind AS - 109, "*Financial Instruments*".

Recognition and Measurement of Fair Value Hedge

Hedging instruments are initially recognized at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently measured at fair value at each reporting date. Gain or loss arising from such changes in the fair value of hedging instruments is recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss. Hedging instruments is recognized as financial assets in the Consolidated Balance Sheet, if it's fair value as at reporting date is positive as compared to carrying value and as financial liabilities, if it's fair value as at reporting date is negative as compared to carrying value.

Hedged items (recognized financial liabilities) are initially recognized at fair value on the date of entering into the contractual obligation and are subsequently measured at amortized costs. The hedging gain or loss on the hedged items is adjusted to the carrying value of the hedged item as per the effective interest method and the corresponding effects are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition

On derecognition of the hedged items, the unamortized fair value of the hedging instrument adjusted to the hedged items, is recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

i) Fair Value

The Parent measures financial instruments at fair value in accordance with the accounting policies mentioned above. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the assets or transfer the liabilities takes place either:

* In the principal market for the assets or liabilities, or

* In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the assets or liabilities.

All the assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the Consolidated Financial Statements are categorized within fair value hierarchy that categorizes into three levels, described are as follows, the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure value. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 inputs) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 inputs).

Level 1 - Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the assets or liabilities, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 - Inputs that are unobservable for the assets or liabilities.

For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the Consolidated Financial Statements at fair value on a recurring basis, the Parent determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorization at the end of each reporting period and discloses the same.

j) Investments in Associate Companies

The Parent has elected to recognize its investments in associate companies at cost in accordance with the option available in Ind AS - 27, “*Separate Financial Statements*”. Investments in associates are carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses, *if any*. Cost includes cash consideration paid on initial recognition adjusted for embedded derivatives and estimated contingent considerations (earn out), if any. Contingent consideration (earn out) is re-measured at fair value at each reporting date and changes in the fair value of the contingent consideration are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

Where an indication of impairment exists, the carrying amount of the investment is assessed and written down immediately to its recoverable amount. On disposal of investments in subsidiary and associates, the difference between net disposal proceeds and the carrying amounts are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

k) Foreign Currency Transactions**a) Initial Recognition**

Transactions in the foreign currencies entered into by the Parent are accounted in the functional currency (i.e. Indian Rupee `), by applying the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction i.e. spot exchange rate. Any exchange difference arising on foreign exchange transactions settled during the reporting period are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss except to the extent that they are regarded as an adjustment to the finance costs on foreign currency borrowings that are directly attributable to the acquisition or constructions of the qualifying assets, are capitalized to the qualifying assets.

b) Measurement of Foreign Currency Items at Reporting Date

Foreign currency monetary items of the Parent are restated as at the end of the reporting date by using the closing exchange rate as prescribed by the Reserve Bank of India. Non-monetary items are recorded at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of the transactions i.e. measured at historical costs. Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value is measured i.e. using the exchange rate at the date of transactions. Exchange differences arising out of foreign exchange translations and settlements during the period are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

l) Taxes on Income

Tax expense comprises current tax and deferred income tax. Tax expenses are the aggregate amount included in the determination of profit or loss for the reporting period current tax and deferred income tax. Tax expenses are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to the items recognized in the other comprehensive income or in the equity. In that case, tax is also recognized in other comprehensive income or equity.

Current income tax is the amount of income tax payable in respect of taxable profit for the reporting period. Taxable profit differs from “*Profit Before Tax*” as reported under Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss because of item of expenses or income that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible under Income Tax Act, 1961.

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured by using the tax rates that have been enacted by the end of the reporting period for the amounts expected to be recovered from or paid to the income tax authorities. Current tax also includes any adjustment amount to tax payable / receivable in respect of previous reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognized on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the Consolidated Financial Statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit under Income Tax Act, 1961 and their carrying amounts. Deferred tax is measured based on the tax rates and the tax laws enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are generally recognized for all deductible and taxable temporary differences. However, in the case of temporary differences that arise from initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction (other than business combination) that affect neither the taxable profits nor the accounting profits or does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary difference, deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognized. Also, for temporary differences, if any, that may arise from initial recognition of goodwill, deferred tax liabilities are not recognized.

Deferred tax assets are generally recognized for all deductible temporary differences, and any unused tax losses and unused tax credits, to the extent, it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary difference can be utilized. In the case of temporary differences that arise from initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction that affect neither the taxable profits nor the accounting profits, deferred tax assets are not recognized.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets / liabilities are reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow the benefits of part or all such deferred tax assets to be utilized.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the Consolidated Balance Sheet date and are expected to apply to taxable income in the years in which those temporary differences are expected to be recovered or settled.

Uncertain Tax Positions

The Parent's management periodically evaluates the positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and consider whether it is probable that a taxation authority will accept uncertain tax treatments. The Parent reflects the effect of uncertainty for each uncertain tax treatment by using one of two methods, the expected value method (the sum of the possibility - weighted amounts in range of possible outcomes) or the most likely amount (single most likely amount method in a range of possible outcomes), depending on which is expected to better predict the resolution of the uncertainty. The Parent applies consistent judgments and estimates, if an uncertain tax treatment affects both the current and deferred income tax.

Presentation

Current tax and deferred tax are recognized as income or an expense in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss, except when they relate to items that are recognized in other comprehensive income, in which case, the current tax and deferred tax income / expense are recognized in other comprehensive income.

The Parent offsets current tax assets and current tax liabilities, where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously. In case of deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities, the same are offset, if the Parent has a legally enforceable right to set off corresponding current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the Parent.

m) Lease

A lease is classified at the inception date as finance lease or an operating lease. A lease that transfers substantially all the risk and rewards incidental to the ownership of the Parent is classified as a finance lease. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

The Parent as a Lessee:

- a) **Operating Lease:** Rental payable under the operating lease is charged to the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss on a "Straight - line" basis over the term of the relevant lease except where another systematic basis is more representative of time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased assets are consumed.
- b) **Finance Lease:** Finance leases are capitalized at the commencement of the lease, at the lower of the fair value of the property or the present value of the minimum lease payments. The corresponding liabilities for the lessor are included in the Consolidated Balance Sheet as a finance lease obligation. Lease payments are appropriated between finance expenses and the reduction of the lease obligation so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liabilities. Finance expenses are charged directly against the income over the period of the lease unless they are directly attributable to the qualifying assets, in which case they are capitalized. Contingent rental is recognized as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

A leased assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets, however, if there is no reasonable certainty that the Parent will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term, the assets are depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful lives of the assets and the lease terms.

The Parent as a Lessor:

Lease payments under operating leases are recognized as an income on a straight-line basis in the consolidated statement of profit and loss over the lease term except where the lease payments are structured to increase in line with expected general inflation. The respective leased assets are included in the Consolidated Balance Sheet based on their nature.

n) Borrowing Costs

Borrowing cost include the interest, commitments charges on bank borrowings, amortization of ancillary costs incurred in connection with the arrangement of borrowings and exchange differences arising from foreign currency borrowings to the extent they are regarded as an adjustment to the finance cost.

Borrowing costs, if any, that are directly attributable to the acquisition or constructions or production of qualifying property, plant and equipment are capitalized as a part of cost of that property, plant and equipment until such time that the assets are substantially ready for their intended use. Qualifying assets are assets which take a substantial period of time to get ready for the intended use or sale.

When the Parent borrows the funds specially for the purpose of obtaining the qualifying assets, the borrowing costs incurred are capitalized with the qualifying assets. When the Parent borrows fund generally and uses them for obtaining a qualifying asset, the capitalization of borrowing costs is computed on weighted average cost of general costs that are outstanding during the reporting period and used for acquisition of the qualifying assets. Capitalization of the borrowing costs ceases when substantially all the activities necessary to prepare the qualifying assets for intended use are complete.

Other borrowing costs are recognized as expenses in the period in which they are incurred. Any interest income earned on temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalization.

o) Employee Benefits**Short-Term Employee Benefits**

All the employee benefits payable wholly within twelve months of rendering the services are classified as short-term employee benefits and they are recognized in the period in which the employee renders the related services. The Parent recognizes the undiscounted amount of short-term employee benefits expected to be paid in exchange for services are rendered as a liability (accrued expense) after deducting any amount already paid.

Post - Employment Benefits**a) Defined Contribution Plans**

Defined contribution plans are employee state insurance scheme and Government administrated pension fund scheme for all the applicable employees and superannuation scheme for all the eligible employees, who met eligible criteria. The Parent's contribution to defined contribution plans is recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss in the reporting period to which they relate.

i) Recognition and Measurement of Defined Contribution Plans

The Parent recognizes contribution payable to a defined contribution plan as an expense in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss when the employees render services to the Parent during the reporting period. If the contributions payable for services received from employees before the reporting date exceed the contributions already paid, the deficit payable is recognized as a liability after deducting the contribution already paid. If the contribution already paid exceeds the contribution due for services received before the reporting date, the excess is recognized as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to, for example, a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

b) Defined Benefits Plans**i) Gratuity**

The Parent operates a defined benefits plan for its employees. The Parent pays the gratuity to employee whoever has completed its five years of service with the Parent at the time of retirement or resignation or superannuation. The gratuity is paid @ 15 Days salary for every completed year of service as per the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972.

The liabilities in respect of gratuity are calculated using "Project Unit Credit Method" and spread over the period during which the benefits are expected to be derived from employee services. The remeasurements of defined benefits plan in respect of post-employments are charged to the other comprehensive income (OCI).

ii) Provident Fund Scheme

Provident fund is defined contribution plan covering certain eligible employees. The Parent and the eligible employees make a monthly contribution to the provident fund maintained by the regional provident fund commissioners equal to the specified percentage of the basic salary of the eligible employees as per the scheme. The contributions to the provident fund are charged to the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss for the period when the contributions are due. The Parent has no obligation other than the contributions payable to the provident fund.

iii) Pension Scheme

The Parent operates a defined benefit pension plan for certain specified employees and is payable upon the employee satisfying certain conditions, as approved by the Parent's Board of Directors.

iv) Post - Retirement Medical Benefit Plan

The Parent operates a defined post-retirement medical benefits plan for certain specified employees and is payable upon the employee satisfying certain conditions.

v) Leave Encashment

Accumulated leave, which is expected to be utilized within the next twelve months, is treated as short-term employee benefits for measurement purposes. The Parent measures the expected cost of such absence as the additional amount that are expected to pay as a result of unused entitlement that has accumulated at the reporting date.

The Parent treats accumulated leave expected to be carried forward beyond twelve months, as long-term employee benefits for measurement purpose. Such long-term compensated absences are provided based on the actuarial valuation using the "Project Unit Credit Method" at the reporting date. Actuarial gain / losses are immediately taken to the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss and are not deferred.

Recognition and Measurement of Defined Contribution Plans

The cost of providing defined benefits is determined using the "Projected Unit Cash Credit" method with actuarial valuations being carried out at each Consolidated Balance Sheet date. The defined benefit obligations recognized in the Consolidated Balance Sheet represent the present value of the defined benefit obligations as reduced by the fair value of plan assets, *if applicable*. Any defined benefit assets (negative benefit defined obligations resulting from these calculations) are recognized representing the present value of available refunds and reductions in future contributions to the plan.

All expenses represented by current service cost, past service cost, if any, and net interest on defined benefit liabilities / (assets) are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss. Remeasurement of the net defined benefits liabilities/ (assets) comprising actuarial gains and losses and the return on the plan assets (excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liabilities /assets), are recognized in other comprehensive income. Such remeasurements are not reclassified to the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss in the subsequent periods.

Past service cost is recognized immediately to the extent that the benefits are already vested, else is amortized on a straight-line basis over the average period until the amended benefits become vested. Actuarial gain or losses in respect of the defined benefits plan are recognized in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss in the year in which they arise.

The Parent presents the above liabilities as current and non-current in the Consolidated Balance Sheet as per the actuarial valuation by the independent actuary.

p) Earnings per Share

The Parent reports the basic and diluted Earnings per Share (EPS) in accordance with Ind AS - 33, "Earnings per Share". Basic EPS is computed by dividing the net profit or loss attributable to the equity shareholders of the Parent for the period by the weighted average number of Equity shares outstanding during the period.

Diluted EPS is computed by dividing the net profit or loss attributable to the equity shareholders for the period by the weighted average number of Equity shares outstanding during the period as adjusted for the effects of all potential equity shares, except where the results are anti-dilutive.

The weighted average number of Equity shares outstanding during the period is adjusted for events such a bonus Issue, bonus elements in right issue, share splits, and reverse share split (consolidation of shares) that have changed the number of Equity shares outstanding, without a corresponding change in resources.

q) Provisions and Contingencies

The Parent recognizes provisions when a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event exists, and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle such obligation and the amount of such obligation can be reliably estimated.

If the effect of time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, when appropriate, the risks specific to the liabilities. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as a finance cost.

A disclosure for contingent liabilities is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not require an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or the amount of such obligation cannot be measured reliably. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which likelihood of outflow of resources embodying economic benefits is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

A provision is recognized if, as a result of a past event, the Parent has a present legal obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by the best estimate of the outflow of economic benefits required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. Where no reliable estimate can be made, a disclosure is made as Contingent Liabilities.

Contingent assets are a possible asset arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed, only by the occurrence and non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the controls of the Parent. Contingent assets are not recognized till realization of the income is virtually certain and are not recognized in the Consolidated Financial Statements. The nature of such assets and an estimate of its financial effects are disclosed in the notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements.

r) Exceptional Items

Exceptional items are disclosed separately in the Consolidated Financial Statements, where it is necessary to do so to provide further understanding of the financial performance of the Parent. These are the material items of income or expenses that have shown separately due to their nature and incidence. An ordinary item of income or expense which by its size, nature, occurrence or incidence requires a disclosure in order to improve understanding of the performance of the Parent is treated as an exceptional item in the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss.

s) Event after Reporting Date

Adjusting events are those events that provides further evidence of conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period. The Consolidated Financial Statements are adjusted for such events before authorization for issue. Non-adjusting events are those events that are indicative of conditions that arose after the end of the reporting period. Non-adjusting events after the end of the reporting period are not accounted, but disclosed if material.

All the events occurring after the Consolidated Balance Sheet date up to the date of the approval of the Consolidated Financial Statement of the Parent by the board of directors on **May 23, 2025**, have been considered, disclosed and adjusted, wherever applicable, as per the requirement of Indian Accounting Standards. Refer “*Note No. 54*” of Consolidated Financial Statements for further references.

t) Cash Flow Statements

Cash flows statements are reported using the method set out in the Ind AS - 7, “*Cash Flow Statements*” and is prepared by using indirect method adjusting the net profit / (losses) before tax excluding exceptional items for the effect of:

- i) Changes during the period in inventories and other operating receivables and payables;
- ii) Non-cash items such as depreciation, provisions, unrealized foreign currency gain / (losses); and
- iii) all other items for which the cash effects are investing and financing cash flows.

The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Parent are segregated. The cash and cash equivalents (including balances with banks), shown in the Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows exclude items, which are not available for general use as at the date of Consolidated Balance Sheet.

u) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and cheques-in-hand, balances with banks, and demand deposits with banks where the original maturity is three months or less and other short-term highly liquid investments net of bank of overdrafts which are repayable on demand as these from an integral part of the Parent's cash management.

v) Commitments

Commitments are the future liabilities for contractual expenditure, classified and disclosed as follows:

- i) estimated amounts of contracts remaining to be executed on capital account and not provided for;
- ii) other non-cancellable commitment, if any, to the extent they are considered material and relevant in the opinion of the Parent's management.

Other commitments related to sales / procurements made in the normal course of business are not disclosed to avoid the excessive details.

1.6 RECENT ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENT

Ministry of Corporate Affairs (the "MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standard) Rules as issued from time to time. For the period March 31, 2025, the MCA has not notified any new standards or amendments to the existing standards applicable to the Group.

1.7 KEY ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The preparation of the Group's Consolidated Financial Statements is in conformity with the Ind AS, which requires the Parent's managements to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of the accounting policies and the reported amounts of the assets, liabilities, incomes, and expenses (including the contingent liabilities) and the accompanying disclosures. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities effected in future periods. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on a periodic basis. Revision to accounting estimates is recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key resources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described as follow:

- a) **Income Tax:** The Parent's tax jurisdiction is in India. Significant judgments are involved in estimating budgeted profits for the purpose of paying advance tax, determining the income tax provisions, including the amount expected to be paid / recovered for uncertain tax provisions (Refer "Note No. 20").
- b) **Property, Plant and Equipment:** Property, plant and equipment represent a significant proportion of the assets base of the Parent. The charge in respect of periodic depreciation is derived after determining an estimate of an asset's expected useful life and the expected residual value at the end of its life. The useful lives and residual values of the Parent's assets are determined by the Parent's management at the time the assets are acquired and reviewed periodically, including at each financial period end. The useful lives of each of these assets are based on the life prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013 or based on the technical estimates, taken into the account the nature of the assets, estimated usage, expected residual values and operating conditions of the assets. The useful lives are based on historical experience with the similar assets as well as anticipation of future events, which may impact their life, such as changes in technical or commercial obsolescence arising from changes or improvements in production or from a change in market demand of the product or service output of the assets.
- c) **Defined Benefits Obligations:** The costs of providing gratuity and other post-employment benefits are charged to the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss in accordance with Ind AS - 19, "Employee Benefits" over the period during which benefit is derived from the employees' services. It is determined by using the actuarial valuation and assessed on the basis of assumptions selected by the Parent's management. An actuarial valuation involves making various assumptions that may differ from actual developments in the future. These assumptions include salary escalation rate, discount rates, expected rate of return on assets and mortality rates. The same is disclosed in "Note No. 46", "Employee Benefits". Due to complexities involved in the valuation and its long-term in nature, a defined benefit obligation is highly sensitive to change in these assumptions. All assumptions are reviewed at each balance sheet date by the Parent's Management.

- d) **Fair Value measurements of Financial Instruments:** When the fair values of financial assets and financial liabilities recorded in the Consolidated Balance Sheet cannot be measured based on quoted prices in active markets, their fair value is measured using valuation techniques, including the discounted cashflow model, which involves various judgments and assumptions. The input to these models is taken from observable markets wherever possible, where this is not feasible, a degree of judgment is required in establishing fair value. Judgements include considerations of inputs such as liquidity risk, credit risk and volatility. Changes in assumptions about these factors could affect the reported fair value of the financial instruments.
- e) **Recoverability of Trade Receivables:** Judgment is required in assessing the recoverability of overdue trade receivables and determining whether a provision is against those receivables is required. Factors considered include the credit rating of the counterparty, the amount and timing of anticipated future payments and any possible actions that can be taken to mitigate the risk of non-payments.
- f) **Provisions and Contingent Liabilities:** The Parent's management estimates the provision that has present obligation as a result of past events, and it is probable that outflows of resources will be required to settle the obligation. These provisions are reviewed at the end of each reporting period and are adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

The Parent uses significant judgements to assess contingent liabilities. Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the controls of the Parent or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made. Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the Consolidated Financial Statements.

- g) **Impairment of Financial and Non-Financial Assets:** The impairment provision of financial assets is based on the assumptions about the risk of default and expected cash loss rates. The Parent uses judgment in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation, based on the Parent's history, existing market conditions as well as forward looking estimates at the end of the reporting period.

In the case of non-financial assets, the Parent estimates asset's recoverable amount, this is higher of an assets or cash generating units (CGU) fair value less the cost of disposal and the value-in-use. In assessing the value-in-use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted using the pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risk specific to the assets. In determining the fair value less cost of disposal, recent market transactions are taken into account, if no such transactions can be identified, an appropriate valuation model is being used.

- h) **Recognition of Deferred Tax Assets and Liabilities:** Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognized for deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses or unused tax credit for which there is probability of utilization against the future taxable profits. The Parent uses judgments to determine the amount of deferred tax that can be recognized, based upon the likely timing and the level of future taxable profits and business developments.
- i) **Amortization of Leasehold Land:** The Parent's lease assets primarily consist of lease for industrial land. The lease premium is the fair value of land paid by the Parent to the respective authorities at the time of acquisition and there is no liability at the end of the lease term. The lease premium paid by the Parent has been amortized over the lease period on systematic basis and the same has been classified under Ind AS - 16, "*Property, Plant and Equipment*" and therefore, the requirements of both the Ind AS - 116 and Ind AS - 17, as to the period over which, and the manner in which, the right of use assets (under Ind AS - 116) or the assets arising from the finance lease (under Ind AS - 17) amortized as similar.

The Group is exposed to Market Risk, Credit Risk and Liquidity Risk from its financial instruments. The Parent’s Board of Directors (“the Board”) oversees the management of these financial risks. The risk management policy of the Group formulated by the Group’s management and approved by the Board of Director’s, which states the Group’s approached to address uncertainties in its endeavor to achieve its stated and implicit objectives. It prescribes the roles and responsibilities of the Group’s managements, the structure for managing the risk and the framework for risk management. The framework seeks to identify, assess and mitigate the financial risks in order to minimize potential adverse effects on the Group’s financial performance. The Board has taken necessary actions to mitigate the risks identified on the basis of information and situations present.

The following disclosures summarize the Group’s exposure to financial risks and the information regarding the use of derivatives employed to manage the exposure to such risks. Quantitative sensitivity analysis has been provided to reflect the impact of reasonably possible changes in market rate on financial results, cash flows and financial positions of the Group.

1) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in the market prices. Market risk comprises three types of Risk: “Interest rate risk, Currency risk and Other price risk”. Financial instruments affected by the market risk include loans and borrowings in foreign as well as domestic currency, deposits, retention money, trade and other payables and trade receivables and derivatives financial instruments.

a) Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash outflows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in the market interest rates. An upward movement in the interest rate would adversely affect the borrowing costs of the Group. The Group is exposed to long-term and short-term borrowings. The Group manages interest rate risk by monitoring its mix of fixed and floating rate instruments and taking actions as necessary to maintain an appropriate balance. The Group has not used any interest rate derivatives.

b) Foreign Currency Risk

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash outflows of an exposure will fluctuate due to changes in foreign exchange rates. The Group operates globally, and a portion of the business is transacted in several currencies and consequently the Group is exposed to foreign exchange risk through its sales in overseas and purchases from overseas suppliers in foreign currency. The foreign currency exchange rate exposure is partly balanced by purchasing of the goods in the respective currencies. The Group enters into forward exchange contracts with an average maturity of less than three months to hedge against its foreign currency exposures relating to the recognized underlying liabilities and firm commitments.

c) **Other Price Risk**

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value of a financial instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market traded price. Other price risk arises from financial assets such as investments in quoted equity instruments. The Group is exposed to price risk arising mainly from investments in quoted equity instruments recognized at FVTOCI, if any. As at March 31, 2025, the carrying value of such quoted equity instruments recognized at amounts FVTOCI amounts to ₹ NIL (March 31, 2024, ₹ NIL).

2) **Credit Risk**

Credit risk refers to the risk that the counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial losses to the Group. Credit risk arises primarily from financial assets such as trade receivables, other balances with banks and other financial assets such as other receivables with the Group.

The Group has adopted a policy of only dealing with counter parties that have sufficiently high credit ratings. The Group's exposure and credit ratings of its counterparties are continuously monitored, and the aggregate value of transactions is reasonably spread amongst the counterparties.

Credit risk arising from term deposits and other balances with banks is limited and there is no collateral held against these because the counterparties are banks and recognized financial institutions with high credit rating assigned by the international credit rating agencies.

The average credit period on sale of products ranges from 30 to 60 days. Credit risk arising from trade receivable is managed in accordance with the Group's established policy, procedures and control relating to customer credit risk management. The credit quality of a customer is assessed based on detailed study of creditworthiness and accordingly individual credit limits are defined / modified. The concentration on credit risk is limited due to the fact that, the customer base is large. There are very few of the customers, which represents more than 10% of its total balance of trade receivable. For trade receivables, as a practical expedient, the Group computes credit loss allowance based on provision matrix. The provision matrix is prepared on historically observed default rate over the expected life of trade receivable and is adjusted for forward-looking estimates. 3) **Liquidity Risk**

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Group will encounter difficulty in raising the funds to meet the commitments associated with financial instruments that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. Liquidity risk may result from an inability to sell a financial asset quickly at close to its fair value.

The Group has an established liquidity risk managements framework for managing its short-term, medium-term and long-term funding and liquidity management requirements. The Group's exposure to liquidity risk arises primarily from mismatches of maturities of financial assets and liabilities. The Group manages the liquidity risk by

maintaining adequate funds in the cash and cash equivalents. The Group also has adequate credit facilities agreed with banks to ensure that there is sufficient cash to meet all its normal operating commitments in a timely and cost-effective manner.

The Group believes that its liquidity positions {As At March 31, 2025, ₹ 1,295.60 Lakhs (Prev Year ₹ 104.84 Lakhs)}, anticipated future internally generated funds from operations, and its fully available revolving undrawn credit facilities will enable it to meet its future known obligations in the ordinary course of business. However, if liquidity needs were to arise, the Group believes it has access to financing arrangements, value of unencumbered assets, which should enable it to meet its ongoing capital, operating, and other liquidity requirements.

The liquidity position of the Group mentioned above, includes:

- i) Cash and Cash Equivalents as disclosed in the Cash Flows Statements
- ii) Current / non - current term deposits as disclosed in the other financial assets

The Group's liquidity management process as monitored by the management, includes:

- i) Day-to-day funding, managed by monitoring future cash flows to ensure that requirements can be met.
- ii) Maintaining rolling forecasts of the Group's liquidity position on the basis of expected cash flows.
- iii) Maintaining diversified credit lines.

38C -Capital Management

The Group adheres to a robust Capital Management framework which is underpinned by the following guiding principles.

- a) Maintain the financial strength to ensure BBB+ stable ratings domestically and investment grade ratings internationally.
- b) Ensure financial flexibility and diversify the source of financing and their maturities to minimize liquidity risk while meeting its investment requirements.
- c) Ensure sufficient liquidity is available (either through cash and cash equivalents, investments or committed credit facilities) to meet the needs of the business.
- d) Minimize the finance costs while taking into consideration current and future industry, market and economic risks and conditions.
- e) Safeguard its ability to continue as going as a going concern.
- f) Leverage optimally in order to maximize shareholders' returns while maintaining strength and flexibility of the Balance Sheet.

This framework is adjusted based on underlying macro-economic factors affecting the business environment, financial market conditions and interest rates environment.

The Board of Directors of the respective companies included in the Group has primary responsibilities to maintain a strong capital base and reduce the cost of capital through a prudent management of deployed fund and leveraging in domestic and international financial market, so as to maintain investors, creditors and market confidence and to sustain future development of the business.

For the purpose of the Group's capital management, capital includes issued equity capital and all other equity reserves attributable to the equity shareholders of the Parent. The primary objective of the Group, when managing capital is to safeguard its ability to continue as a going concern and to maintain an optimal capital structure so as to maximize shareholder value.

As at March 31, 2025, and March 31, 2024, the Parent has only one class of equity shares and has low debts. Consequent to such capital structure, there are no externally imposed capital requirements. In order to maintain or achieve an optimal capital structure, the Parent allocates its capital for distribution as dividends or reinvestments into business based on its long-term financial plans.

The Parent manages its capital on the basis of the Net Debt to Equity Ratio which is Net Debt (Total Borrowings net of Cash and Cash Equivalents) divided by total equity.

54 Event occurring after the Balance Sheet Date (Fire Incident at Plants)

On April 11, 2025, at approximately 06.45 PM, a major explosion and fire break out in one section of Aluminium Powder divisions situated at Umred Plants of the Parent. Swift and effective response by our emergency evacuation team, all the individuals present at the site were promptly evacuated. However, despite these efforts, we deeply regret to report the unfortunate loss of some of our valued workmen. Additionally, a few individually sustained minor injuries and are currently receiving appropriate medical attention. The Parent's management is profoundly saddened by this tragic incident. We extend our heartfelt condolence to the families of the deceased and assure them of our unwavering support during this difficult time. We are also fully committed to ensuring the well-being and recovery of the injured. The Group stand united with their employees, their families, and the wider community during this moment of grief and are committed to providing every possible assistance.

Preliminary assessments indicate that certain part of the plants, building, equipment and inventories located at the site of the Parent, sustained extensive damage and were destroyed in the incident. A detailed investigation is currently underway to determine the root cause of the explosion. The Parent's management estimates the total losses to inventories, plants, building and equipment range between ₹ 15 Crore to ₹ 20 Crore. However, the Parent has adequately covered its assets and inventories under a fire insurance policy and is in the process of filling an insurance claim for the losses incurred during the incident.

To minimize the impact on ongoing operations and customer commitments, the Parent has partially shifted operations to its Bhandara Plant. The Parent's management believes remain focused on gradually resuming normal business operation in the coming months to meet the customer demand to substantial extent. We are fully cooperating with the relevant authorities and will implement all the necessary steps to prevent such incidents in the near future.
