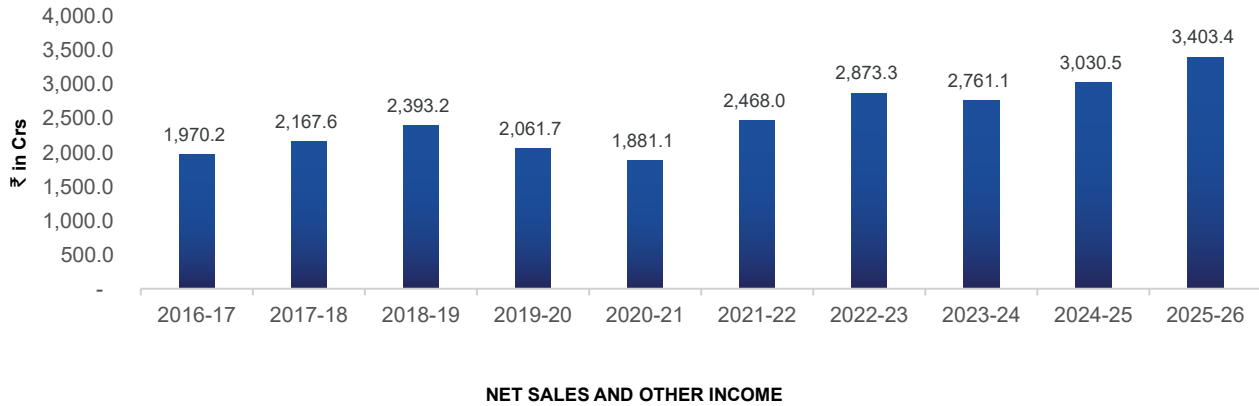




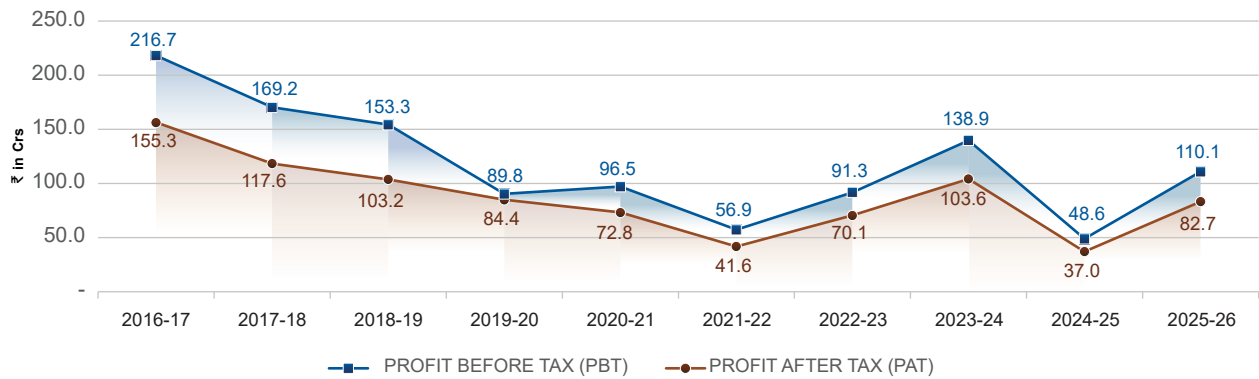

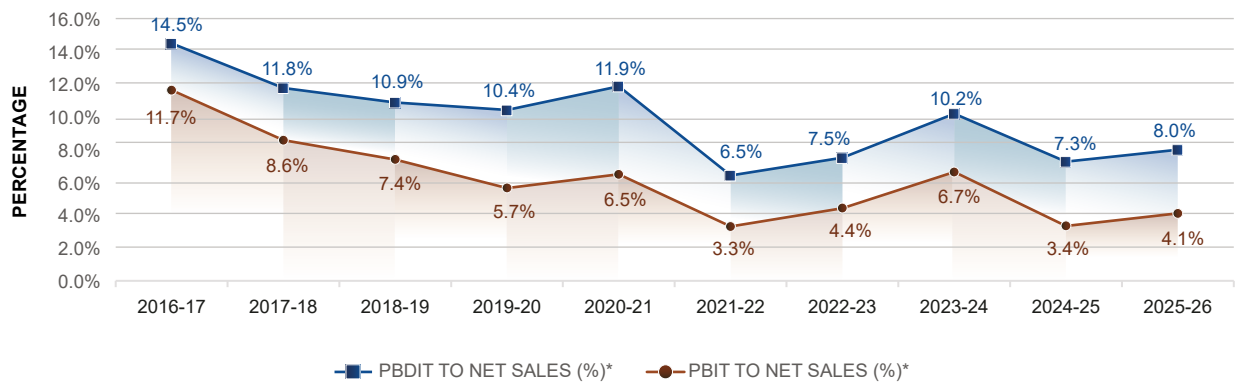

PROFITABILITY

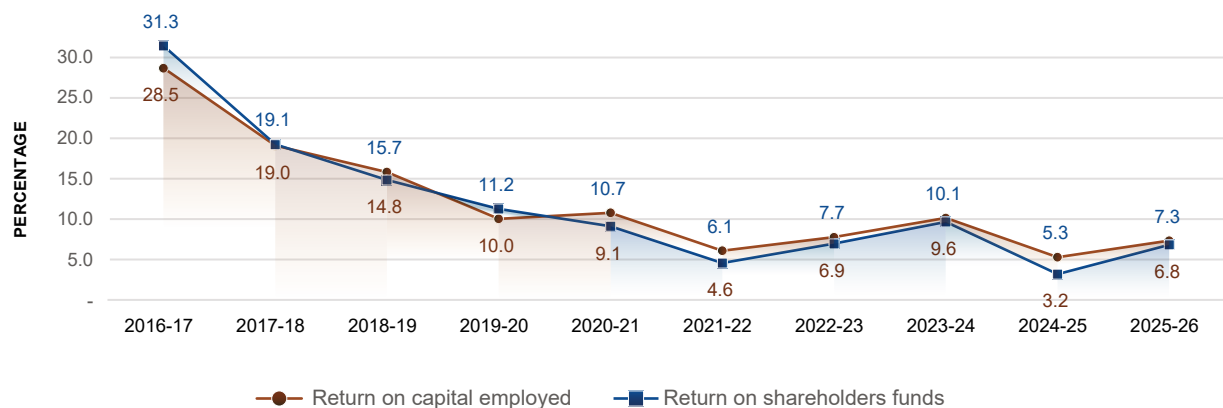


OPERATING MARGINS

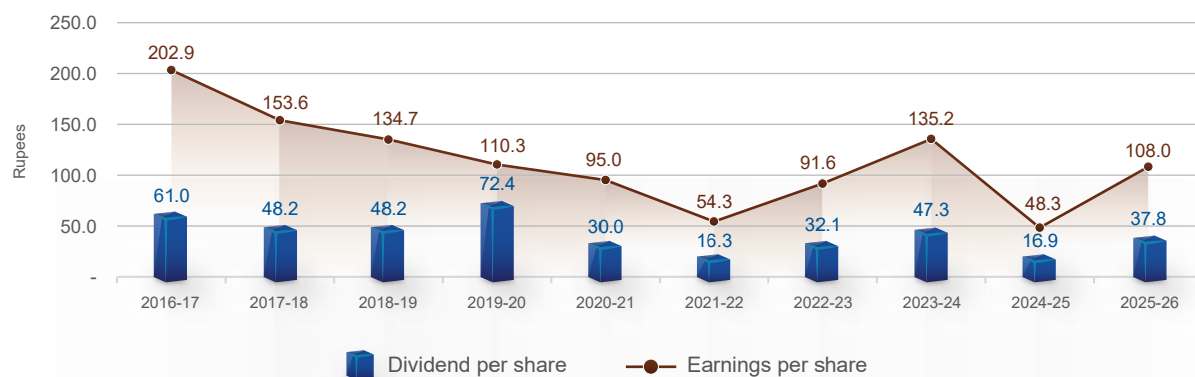

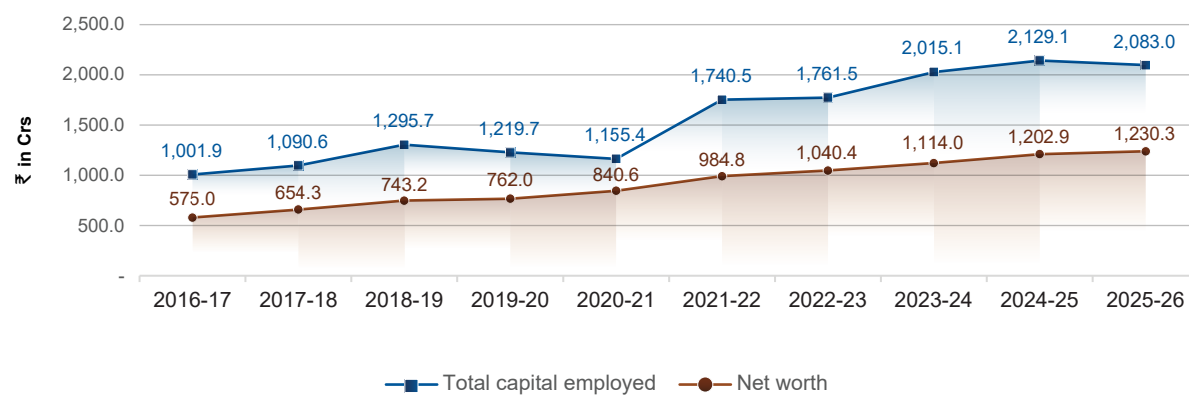
RETURN ON FUNDS EMPLOYED

Operational Performance

During the financial year ended 31st March 2026, your Company reported steady growth in revenue despite facing market headwinds and volatility. Revenue from operations increased to ₹3,389.66 crores, as compared to ₹3,022.90 crores in the previous year, reflecting a growth of 12.13% year-on-year.

The Profit Before Tax (PBT) increased significantly to ₹110.13 crores in Financial Year ("FY") 2025-26, from ₹48.61 crores in FY 2024-25, registering a growth of 126.57%. Profit After Tax (PAT) also improved to ₹82.71 crores, as against ₹36.96 crores in the previous year.

EBITDA (Earnings Before Finance Costs and Depreciation) increased to ₹285.69 crores in FY 2025-26 from ₹228.09 crores in the prior year. This growth was driven by strong topline performance, relatively stable raw material prices for a major part of the year, improved cost absorption on higher volumes and other operational efficiencies.

Depreciation expenses increased to ₹132.03 crores, compared to ₹118.91 crores in FY 2024-25, primarily due to the capitalization of new assets. Finance costs reduced to ₹46.45 crores from ₹49.17 crores, mainly on account of loan repayments during the year. Deferred tax expense also declined significantly to ₹0.13 crores, as against ₹7.45 crores in the previous year.

Earnings Per Share (EPS) increased sharply to ₹108.02 in FY 2025-26 from ₹48.28 in the previous year a 123.74% increase. As a result of the increase in net profits, the Company continued to maintain a robust net worth position, carrying forward a surplus of ₹978.76 crores to the balance sheet.

Dividend

Considering the performance of your Company, a final dividend of ₹37.80/- (378%) per Equity Share of a face value of ₹10/- per Equity Share is recommended by the Board for approval at the 43rd Annual General Meeting.

The dividend will result in a total pay-out of ₹28.94 crores.

Transfer to Reserves

Your Company does not propose to transfer any amount to general reserve for the financial year 2025-26.

Share Capital

There is no change in the Share Capital of your Company and the Equity Share Capital is ₹7,65,70,500/- comprising of 76,57,050 Equity Shares of ₹10/- each fully paid up.

Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF)

During the year, your Company transferred unclaimed and un-encashed dividend amounting to ₹40,08,800/- for the FY 2017-18. Further 10,225 shares for the FY 2017-18, on which dividends had remained unclaimed for seven consecutive years, were transferred in accordance with the requirements of the IEPF Rules. The consolidated financial statements of your Company for the year ended 31st March 2026 are prepared in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("Act"), Indian Accounting Standards and the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI (LODR) Regulations"). The audited consolidated financial statements along with all relevant documents and the Auditor's Report thereon form part of Annual Report and may be accessed on the Company's website <https://tvseurogrip.com/>.

Pursuant to Section 129(3) of the Act, a statement containing salient features of the financial statement of the subsidiaries in the prescribed **Form AOC-1** is attached as **Annexure 1**.

The financial statements of the subsidiary companies are available for inspection by the members at the Registered Office of the Company pursuant to the provisions of Section 136 of the Act. The Company shall provide free of cost, copies of the financial statements of the Company and its subsidiary companies to the members upon request. The financial statements of the subsidiary companies are also available on the website of the Company at <https://tvseurogrip.com/>.

Highlights of performance of subsidiary companies

TVS Srichakra Investments Limited, wholly owned subsidiary Company, recorded a profit of ₹1.55 crores (previous year net profit of ₹2.22 crores).

TVS Sensing Solution Private Limited (**TVSSSPL**), recorded a net operational turnover of ₹178.39 crores during the year, showing an increase of 14.18% compared to the previous year. TVSSSPL recorded a Profit After Tax of ₹12.08 crores showing an increase of 3.80% compared to the previous year. During the year, TVSSSPL undertook a Right Issue and allotted 2,14,285 Equity Shares of ₹10 per share at a premium of ₹270 per share. TVSSSPL acquired 1,000 Equity shares of ₹10 per share in Fiber Optic Sensing Solutions Private Limited (**FOSSPL**) as a result of which FOSSPL became wholly owned subsidiary effective from 8th January 2026.

FOSSPL recorded a net operational turnover of ₹30.04 crores showing an increase of 317.50% compared to the previous year. FOSSPL made a Profit After Tax of ₹1.23 crores compared to a loss of ₹0.89 crores in the previous year.

Super Grip Corporation, the US based wholly owned subsidiary of your Company, recorded a net operational turnover of ₹91.82 crores and recorded loss after tax of ₹18.03 crores during the year.

Consolidated Performance

On a consolidated basis, your Company registered a turnover of ₹3,643.35 crores, an increase of 11.97%. The Company's consolidated net profit stood at ₹71.06 crores as against the previous year's net profit of ₹20.52 crores, an increase of 246.30%.

Capital Expenditure and Expansion Project

During the year under review, capital expenditure amounted to ₹106.09 Crores. Your Company has a working capital management process that facilitates continuous monitoring and control over receivables, payables and other key financial metrics.

Further, during the year, the Board approved an additional capital expenditure to a tune of ₹210.00 crores (Rupees Two Hundred and Ten Crores only) for the Uttarakhand Expansion Project at UKD-II, aimed at expanding the Company's manufacturing capacity. The Board of Directors, at its meeting held on 27th May 2026, approved further capital expenditure of ₹220.00 crores, comprising ₹110.00 crores for the Two-Wheeler (2W) plant and ₹110.00 crores for the Off-Highway Tyre (OHT) plant, towards capacity expansion at the manufacturing facilities located at Vellaripatti, Madurai.

Cash and cash equivalent as of 31st March 2026 was ₹11.78 Crores.

Particulars of Loans, Guarantees or Investments

Loans, guarantees and investments covered under Section 186 of the Act form part of the Notes to the financial statements provided in the Annual Report.

During the year your Company extended a loan of USD 13,50,000 (equivalent to ₹11.92 crores) to its wholly owned subsidiary, M/s. Super Grip Corporation, USA. The total outstanding loan on M/s. Super Grip Corporation on 31st March 2026 stood at USD 55,87,425/- (equivalent to ₹52.96 crores).

Investment for sourcing renewable energy

Your Company has invested ₹59,150/- for acquiring 5,915 equity shares of ₹10 each, representing 5.92% of the Equity Share Capital of Navia Two Power Private Limited ("**Navia**"). Subsequently, the Company invested ₹3,78,79,138/- for acquiring 19,863 Equity Shares of Navia by subscribing to the rights issue at a face value of ₹10 each and at a premium of ₹1,897.02 per share, for the purchase of solar power under the Group Captive mode. As on 31st March 2026, the Company holds a total of 25,778 Equity Shares in Navia, representing 5.92% of its Equity Share Capital.

Further, pursuant to a buyback offer received from Clean Max Genesis Private Limited ("**Clean Max**"), the Company's investment in Clean Max was adjusted through the buyback of 4,084 equity shares at ₹1,876 per share, aggregating to ₹76,61,584. The adjustment in investment is pursuant to a Settlement Agreement executed with Clean Max to facilitate the recovery of the Company's funds invested for sourcing wind power from Clean Max. Clean Max was unable to supply wind power due to its project implementation issues.

Subsidies and Incentives

During the year under review, your Company has been granted financial assistance under the Structured Package of Assistance from State Industries Promotion Corporation of Tamil Nadu Limited, Egmore, Chennai, comprising:

- Capital Subsidy aggregating to ₹75.00 crores, receivable in 12 equal instalments;
- Green Industry Incentive amounting to ₹1.00 crore; and
- Training Subsidy of ₹68.40 lakhs.

Corporate Governance

The Board remains committed to the highest standards of corporate governance, accountability, transparency and ethical business conduct. The Company's corporate governance practices are reflective of the values and culture nurtured over the years to deliver sustainable value to its stakeholders in a fair, transparent and ethical manner. Your Company continues to comply with the corporate governance requirements prescribed by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI), in letter and spirit. The Corporate Governance Report for the financial year 2025-26 forms part of this Annual Report.

Board of Directors and Key Managerial Personnel

• Appointment & Cessation of Directors

During the year, Ms. Shobhana Ramachandhran was re-appointed as the Managing Director of the Company for a further term of 5 (five) years with effect from 25th August 2025. Further, Mr. R. Naresh was re-appointed as the Managing Director (designated as Executive Vice Chairman) of the Company for a further term of 3 (three) years with effect from 16th June 2026.

Except for the above, there were no other changes in the composition of the Board of Directors.

• Director Liable to Retire by Rotation

Mr. S Ravichandran (DIN: 01485845), Non-Executive Director, is liable to retire by rotation at the forthcoming AGM and seeks reappointment. Based on performance evaluation, the Board has recommended his reappointment. Further details are available in the notice convening the AGM.

• Directors' Responsibility Statement

In terms of Section 134(5) of the Act, your directors, to the best of their knowledge and belief, state that:

- a) In the preparation of the annual accounts the applicable Accounting Standards had been followed along with proper explanation relating to material departures, if any;
- b) They had selected such accounting policies and applied them consistently and made judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent so as to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company at the end of the financial year and of the profit of the Company for that period;
- c) They had taken proper and sufficient care for the maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of this Act for safeguarding the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting fraud and other irregularities;
- d) They had prepared the annual accounts on a going concern basis;
- e) They had laid down internal financial controls to be followed by the Company and that such internal financial controls are adequate and were operating effectively; and

- f) They had devised proper systems to ensure compliance with the provisions of all applicable laws and that such systems were adequate and operating effectively.

• Declaration by Independent Directors

The Independent Directors have declared that they meet the criteria specified under Section 149(6) of the Act, Regulation 25(8) of SEBI (LODR) Regulations and the relevant provisions of Rule 6 of the Companies (Appointments and Qualifications of Directors) Rules, 2014. The Board is of the opinion that the Independent Directors of your Company possess the requisite qualifications, experience and expertise and they uphold the highest standards of integrity.

• Meetings of the Board of Directors

An annual calendar of the Board and committees' meetings for the fiscal 2026 was circulated in advance to the directors. The Board of Directors met 7 (Seven) times during the year ended 31st March 2026. The details of the board meetings and the attendance of the directors are provided in the Corporate Governance Report.

• Board Evaluation

In accordance with the provisions of the Act and SEBI (LODR) Regulations, an internal evaluation of the Board, its committees and individual directors was conducted. The evaluation process included parameters such as directors' attendance at Board and committee meetings, participation in the Annual General Meeting, effective engagement and domain knowledge. The performance evaluation of the Chairman and Non-Independent Directors was also conducted by the Independent Directors. Details of the evaluation parameters and process are outlined in the Corporate Governance Report.

• Board diversity

Your Company embraces the importance of a diverse Board in its success. The details on Board diversity are available in the Corporate Governance Report that forms part of this Report.

• Board Committees

The Company has constituted certain committees of directors as per the mandatory requirements of the Act and SEBI (LODR) Regulations. The details of such committees are provided in the Corporate Governance Report, which forms a part of the Annual Report.

During the year, all recommendations made by committees were approved by the Board.

• Familiarization Programme for Independent Directors

The Company regularly conducts familiarization programs for Independent Directors, including periodic presentations on business strategy and updates on Company performance. Additionally, programs are organized to familiarize Independent Directors with the Company, their responsibilities, the nature of the industry, the Company's business model and related matters. Details of the familiarization program are provided in the Corporate Governance Report.

• Key Managerial Personnel

A. CONSERVATION OF ENERGY:

1. Electric power

Following energy conservation projects were successfully implemented to conserve electrical energy. With these initiatives, we have saved electrical energy of 2660 units/day.

- a) Cooling towers return water sump optimization & Sand filter pump eliminated for Hot feed Extruder.
- b) Reduction in compressed air consumption through setting pressure optimization.
- c) 1111 HFE cooling tower no. of running pump optimization through interconnection of cooling tower pumps.
- d) IL TCU & cooling can cooling water pump integrated and reduced no. of pump operation in D3 plant.
- e) Euro plant - AHU room temperature optimized from 25+/-1 to 27+/-1.
- f) Plant shop floor Lighting automation.

2. Thermal

Following Energy conservation projects were successfully implemented to conserve thermal energy in our plants. With these initiatives, we reduced specific steam consumption by 3.4% compared to previous year.

- a) Steam consumption reduction projects activities through distribution steam lines optimisation, Steam traps replacement with higher efficient traps with external audit.
- b) Steam trap monitoring system implemented to reduce the distribution losses with internal and external audit.
- c) Steam distribution line insulation done with upgraded materials.
- d) Effective condensate recovery system.
- e) Dedicated team allotted daily basis, for steam leaks monitoring and corrections.
- f) Boiler efficiency improved by improving the SFR (Steam Fuel Ratio) increased by 6%. Through Flash steam recovery projects, Boiler feed water temperature improved.
- g) Fuel quality monitoring and improvement to improve the SFR.

b) Steps taken by the Company for utilizing alternate sources of energy

Your Company maximises the use of renewable energy sources. The renewable power consumption in Madurai plant increased from 80% to 90%. The renewable power consumption in Uttarakhand plant increased to 16%.

c) Capital investments on energy conservation equipment

- a) To increase the renewable energy usage further your Company has done an Equity investment of ₹3.79 Crore for Renewable Hybrid Power (Both Solar & Wind).
- b) To reduce specific steam consumption and to improve Boiler efficiency by installing Flash steam recovery system, Invested ₹0.96 crore.

COMPANY PROFILE

TVS Srichakra Limited (hereinafter referred as "the Company" or "your Company") is one of India's largest manufacturers and exporters of two-wheeler, three-wheeler and Off Highway Tyres ("OHT"). Domestically, the company is a leading supplier of tyres to two and three-wheeler manufacturers (OEMs) as well as the replacement market. Supplies are made through a network of depots, distributors and retailers. The company's growing OHT business is focused on global markets. The company accesses international markets through sales to about 100 countries across the globe.

The company manufactures tyres at its facilities located in Madurai in Tamil Nadu and Rudrapur in Uttarakhand. Products are precision engineered to provide superior performance in different conditions. The company's product range includes two & three-wheeler tyres and a range of pneumatic tyres addressing the off highway segment for agricultural, commercial, industrial and materials handling applications. The company's tyres are designed to global standards with high-quality and advanced technology at our design facilities in India and Italy in Europe. The company's tyres are sold under the brand names of "TVS Eurogrip", "TVS Tyres", "Eurogrip" and "Super Grip".

GLOBAL ECONOMY

The world economy entered 2026 stronger than many had expected. Having said that, the conflict in the Middle East is now the dominant force shaping global economic outlook. Disruptions to shipments through the Strait of Hormuz, together with damage to energy infrastructure, have triggered a sharp rise in energy prices and increased the cost of fertilisers and other critical industrial inputs. Higher costs are feeding into inflation pressures, weakening confidence and weighing on household demand and business activity.

The evolution of the Middle East conflict remains uncertain, but its economic consequences are likely to be felt for some time even after its resolution. The range of possible outcomes is wide.

The OECD Economic Outlook report published in June 2026 (the most recent of reports published by a globally recognised institution of repute) contemplates two possible trajectories:

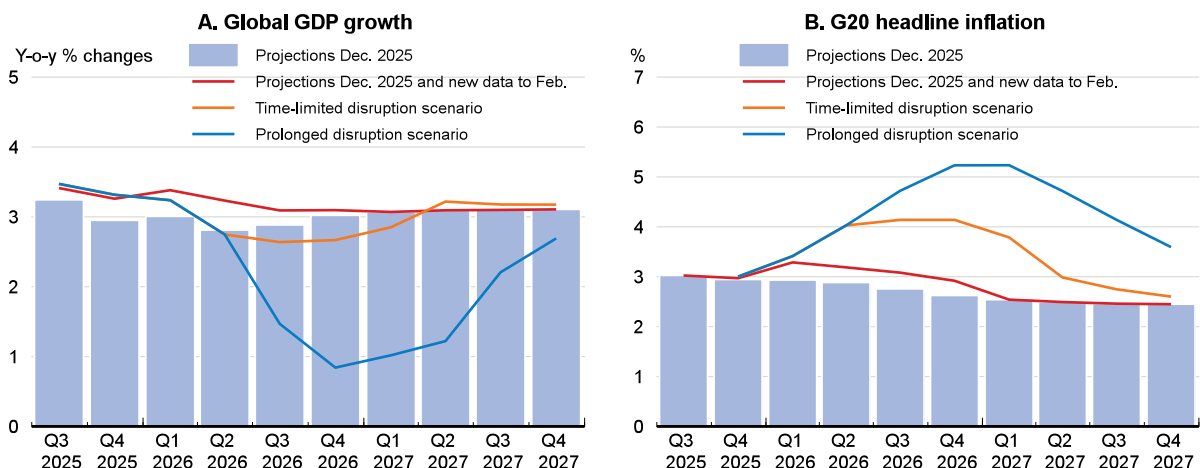
- Time-limited disruption scenario in which disruptions remain relatively short-lived,
- Prolonged disruption scenario, with broader, much more long-lasting negative consequences.

At the time of writing, the prospects of a peace deal seemed to have gained some momentum.

A durable settlement to the current conflict would lay the groundwork for a resolution to the disruptions caused to the global economy. Assuming energy prices ease from mid-2026 onward, OECD projects global economic growth to slow from 3.4% in 2025 to 2.8% in 2026 before recovering to 3.1% in 2027.

However, the longer these disruptions persist, the greater their economic and social impact is likely to be. If they continue well into 2027, the OECD projects that global economic growth could slow significantly to 2.1% in 2026 and further to 1.8% in 2027, potentially pushing some economies into or close to recession. Unemployment is expected to rise, while investment - including in energy-intensive Artificial Intelligence ("AI") - could weaken considerably, increasing the risk of financial market repricing. Global inflation is projected to increase by 0.4 percentage points in 2026 and 1.3 percentage points in 2027, as upward pressure from elevated commodity prices is only partially offset by weaker overall demand.

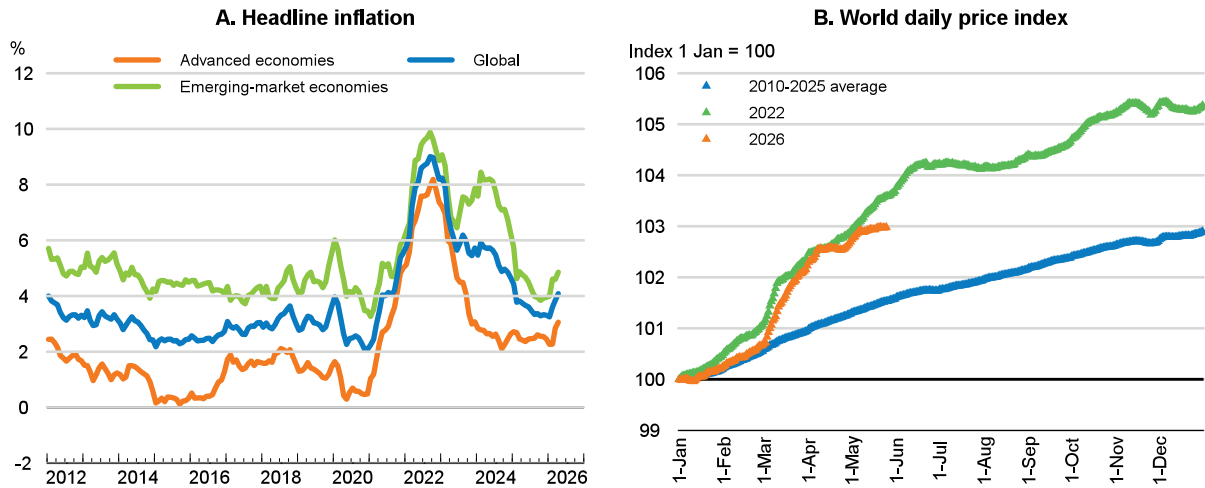
Global growth prospects depend heavily on the duration of the conflict, as the charts below indicate.

While the consequences would be global, they could prove especially severe for developing economies with limited energy reserves, higher shares of energy and food in household consumption, constrained fiscal capacity and weak social safety nets, low private savings buffers and more fragile currencies.

The charts below, taken from the OECD Economic Outlook Report of June 2026, show how the energy price shock is feeding into consumer prices.



INDIAN ECONOMY - OUTLOOK

Despite heightened global trade tensions in Financial Year ("FY") 26, India remained the fastest-growing major economy, with growth accelerating to 7.6 % up from 7.1 % in FY25. The current account deficit stood at 1 % of GDP and fiscal consolidation continued, bringing the general government deficit to 7.4 % of GDP. Employment rates remained stable and formal job creation strengthened. In FY27, growth is projected at 6.6 %, reflecting headwinds from the Middle East conflict. While India's strong macroeconomic buffers offer some protection against downside risks, the conflict underscores the importance of energy diversification, prudent fiscal management and trade diversification.

GDP growth was projected at 7.2 %, reflecting a better than expected FY26 result. Growth is now projected at 6.6 % in FY27, reflecting headwinds from the Middle East conflict. Private consumption is expected to slow modestly as higher global oil prices will raise inflationary pressures and reduce household disposable income. The reduction in GST rates introduced in September 2025 is softening the impact of inflationary pressures to an extent. Government consumption is expected to slow, as efforts to preserve fiscal consolidation constrain nonessential current spending to offset higher subsidy outlays for cooking gas and fertilizers, as well as excise duty cuts. Investment growth is expected to be impacted by elevated global financial market volatility, which will affect market sentiment and delay investment decisions by firms. Merchandise exports may remain relatively resilient as US tariffs ease and new FTAs—particularly with the EU come into effect, softening the impact of lower demand from Gulf countries. However, stronger import demand for capital goods will limit the overall contribution of net exports to growth.

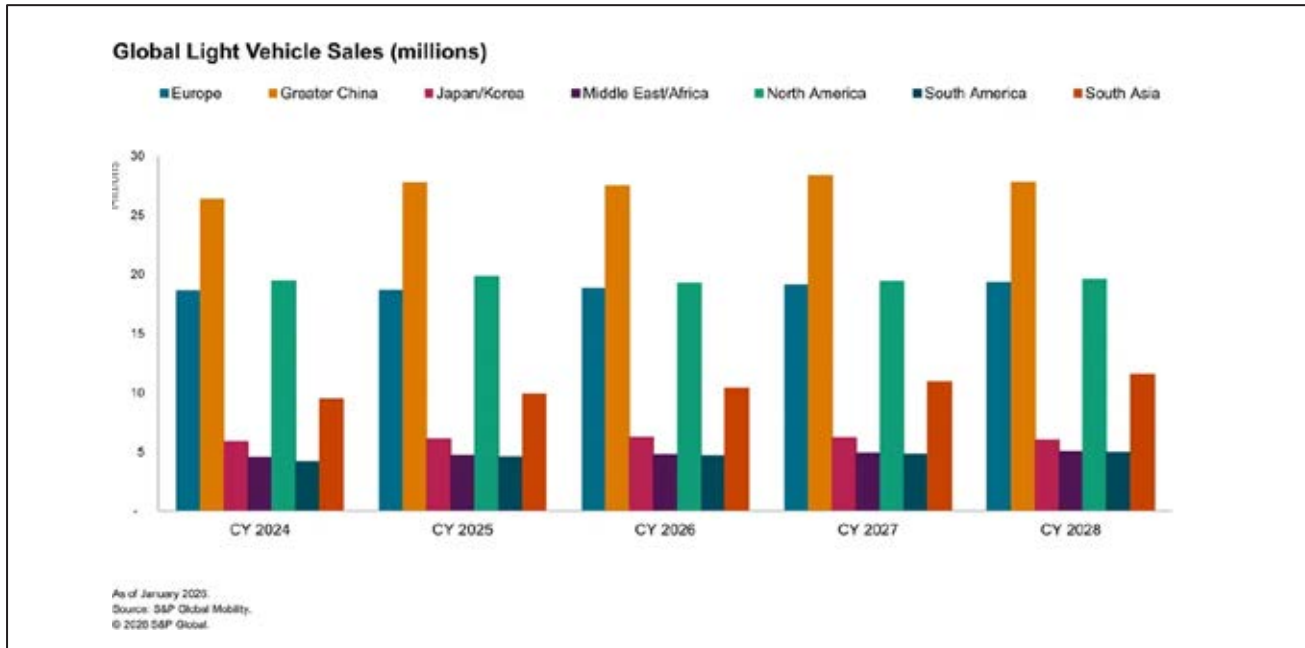

GLOBAL AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY

Global light vehicle sales rose 3.4% in 2025 to 91.7 million units, but S&P sees momentum easing. S&P forecasts 2026 sales to be nearly flat (as compared to 2025) with a downwards bias in the second half - driven by cost and price pressures. The chart below reflects S&P's region wise forecast.



Looking specifically at the two-wheeler segment - the global market size was valued at about US\$ 120 billion in 2025 and is expected to grow at a CAGR of over 6% over the next five years. The Asia Pacific region dominates the segment - accounting for about 70% of global sales in 2025. India has surpassed China to become the world's largest market and top exporter, while the South East Asian markets of Indonesia, Thailand and Vietnam show massive per person density.

While the Internal Combustion Engine ("ICE") segment still leads, Electric Vehicles ("EVs") are showing rapid growth. EVs already constitute about 20% of global two-wheeler sales and are expected to grow at a 30% CAGR over the next few years. Charging infrastructure and battery safety concerns (especially in low cost models) have slowed consumer confidence - but these are being addressed.

INDIA'S AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY

India is the world's third-largest automobile market. The Indian automotive industry in its entirety contributes 6-7% of India's GDP. It employs about 4.2 million people directly and 26.5 million people indirectly.

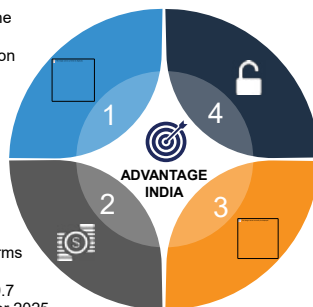
The chart below, taken from IBEF's Automobiles Report of February 2026 encapsulates the strength and potential of India's automotive industry.

1. Growing demand

- ▶ Rising middle-class income and young population will result in strong demand growth.
- ▶ The Indian automotive industry is targeting to increase the export of vehicles by five times between 2016-26.
- ▶ Automobile exports from India rose 19% to over 5.3 million units in FY25, led by strong demand for passenger vehicles, two-wheelers and commercial vehicles abroad.
- ▶ The total production of Passenger Vehicles*, Three-Wheelers, Two-Wheelers and Quadri cycle in January 2026 was ~ 2.9 million.

2. Rising Investments

- ▶ India offers 10 - 25% operational cost savings for auto firms compared to Europe and Latin America.
- ▶ The automobile sector attracted ₹2,64,456 crore (US\$39.7 billion) in equity FDI Inflow between April 2000-December 2025.
- ▶ India is set to become the largest EV market by 2030, with an investment potential exceeding US\$200 billion over the next five years.
- ▶ The Government of India allocated ₹5,940 crore (US\$672million) for the auto PLI scheme in the Union Budget 2026-27.



4. Opportunities

- ▶ Focus shifting on electric cars to reduce emissions.
- ▶ Government aims to transform India into an R&D hub.
- ▶ India could be a leader in shared mobility by 2030, providing opportunities for electric and autonomous vehicles.
- ▶ The electric vehicles industry is likely to touch ₹20,00,000 crore (US\$234billion) and will create around five crore jobs by 2030.

3. Policy support

- ▶ Automotive Mission Plan 2016-26 is a mutual initiative by the Government of India and the Indian automotive industry to lay down the roadmap for the development of the industry.
- ▶ The Centre has launched the PME-DRIVE scheme with a budget of ₹10,900 crore (US\$1.30billion), effective from October 1, 2024, to March 31, 2028 (Earlier March 31, 2026). The initiative aims to accelerate the adoption of Electric Vehicles (EVs), establish charging infrastructure and develop an EV manufacturing ecosystem in India. The target for 3W(L5)(2,88,809 Nos.) was achieved in December 2025.

For the Indian auto industry, FY26 saw a slow first half followed by resurgence in the second half, on the back of GST cuts. The two-wheeler segment showed a strong recovery returning close to Pre-COVID levels (shown in the chart below).



As we write this, demand in FY27 continues to show strength. The concern as common for all sectors of the economy remains the uncertain effect of the conflict in the Middle East. With the added concern of the forecast for a poorer than normal monsoon, which is likely to suppress rural demand.

INDIAN TYRE INDUSTRY

Tyre demand in India grew about 6 - 8% in FY26, coming off relatively low levels of growth in FY25 of about 4.4%. Tyre exports from India led the way, registering a 9% increase in FY26 over FY25 even in the face of tariff restrictions that the industry faced.

PwC, in collaboration with ATMA, presented a vision roadmap for the Indian tyre industry, extending to 2047. The key insights drawn from this roadmap are shown in the chart below

COMPANY INITIATIVES DURING FY 2025-26

A. Overall

Your Company remains a leading supplier to domestic OEMs including to manufacturers of both ICE vehicles as well as the growing EV segment. Your Company sustained market share in the replacement market in the face of intense competition. Your Company has also achieved significant share in the growing E-rickshaw segment.

Your Company sees opportunities in global markets as being of great significance and an area of focus. FY26 saw healthy growth of your Company's global business in both the two & three wheeler space as well as the OHT space, with annual growth of global sales well in excess of growth in domestic sales.

B. Technology, Research and Product Development

A continued area of strength for your Company is its focus on Technology and Research & Development (R&D). This focus covers not just new product development to meet market requirements but also fundamental research on material science.

FY26 saw a mix of new product development initiatives alongside a period of establishing commercial production of a range of products developed and introduced at a hectic pace over the last two years especially in the OHT tyre segment. The Company's products continue to receive excellent reviews in global markets. This provides a major growth pathway in the period ahead.

C. Market and Channel Development

FY26 saw a series of initiatives to enhance the Company's presence in the markets it operates

- In the domestic market OEM, your Company has well established infrastructure in place to supply its OEM customers on Just in Time basis across the length and breadth of the country.
- The domestic aftermarket is addressed through a network of depots and distributors throughout the country. FY26 saw significant efforts through structured programs to increase the Company's width and depth in this segment.
- Globally, as the Company's sales grow, the network of channel partners is being enhanced, in an effort to be present closer to customers. In addition, Company personnel are being placed in global markets, to make the Company's market approach more nimble and aligned to needs of the various sub segments we service in these markets.
- Your Company's acquisition of Super Grip in USA was a step in this direction. FY26 saw integration of Super Grip into the larger global outreach by your Company. While a large part of the year was challenging because of the tariff situation in the US, the Company saw better performance towards the end of FY26.

D. Raw Material Trends

The year gone by (FY26) saw a moderation in raw material costs, which had seen a sharp increase from the second quarter of FY25. While market prices saw moderation, the Company's own efforts at strategic procurement initiatives along with focused efforts on reducing in plant wastages, saw some success - translating into improved profitability margins.

However, the start to FY27 has seen an unprecedented increase in raw material prices - largely driven by the Middle East conflict. Your Company continues to make its best efforts to address and mitigate this increase.

E. Capacity Expansion

While FY26 focused on productivity improvements to maximise utilization of plant capacities already installed, FY27 will see an enhancement in capacity - both in the two-wheeler segment and the OHT segment through ongoing investments approved by the Board in manufacturing capacity, productivity improvement and technology upgradation.

F. Opportunities

The tyre industry offers immense opportunity - domestically as well as globally.

The two & three wheeler as well as OHT segment in which your Company operates are at the forefront of tyre exports from India. Your Company is a leader in the export of two & three wheeler tyres from India. We are similarly focusing on global opportunities in the OHT segment which presents an overall market size of over US\$ 20 billion.

The domestic market also presents opportunities for your Company - especially in the domestic aftermarket. This remains an area of focus, including through actions to enhance its brand position.

G. Challenges

At the start of FY26, demand itself was recovering only slowly. By the end of FY26, market demand had recovered strongly. In addition, your Company's efforts in expanding its presence were paying off. As a result, revenue itself does not present a challenge - at least in the short term.

On the other hand, the steep increase in raw material costs that has been seen from the beginning of FY27 causes a challenge. The Company is mitigating against this challenge to its fullest ability - through strategic procurement actions, through reduction of wastages and through finished goods price increases.

H. Risk Management

In compliance with Regulation 21 of the SEBI (LODR) Regulations, the Board of Directors of your Company has established a Risk Management Committee. This Committee is tasked with addressing the evolving and dynamic risks present in today's business environment.

The risk management framework put in place by your Company aids in the identification, prioritization and mitigation of risks.

By establishing the Risk Management Committee and implementing a risk management policy that combines strategic and operational risks, your Company demonstrates its commitment to proactive risk management and ensuring the resilience of its operations in the face of evolving threats.

The company continues to review emerging risks arising from digitalisation and evolving technologies, including Artificial Intelligence and has integrated these considerations into its enterprise risk management framework. Details of the potential risks the company faces are in the BRSR section of this report. A summary is shown in the table below.

I. Energy

Sustainability continues to remain integral to the Company's long-term business strategy. The Company continues to focus on decarbonisation, energy efficiency, responsible sourcing, circular economy initiatives and environmental stewardship while strengthening governance and social responsibility practices.

Your Company's use of renewable energy sources has continued to grow over the years, reaching levels of approximately 90% at Madurai Plants in FY26.

The Company is working towards a scenario where close to 100% of its electricity will be supplied by "green" sources.

The Company has also put in place and is pursuing a Sustainable Roadmap, covering greenhouse gas emissions, overall carbon footprint, decarbonization and finally extending to the company's Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiatives.

The Company also makes efforts at environment conservation, including through actions such as tree plantation drives, as well as reduction of its use of scarce resources such as water.

J. Quality Assurance

Your Company continues to be a preferred supplier for OEMs manufacturing traditional ICE driven by two and three-wheelers. In addition to this, your company has been assessed and cleared for supplies by a vast majority of the new clutch of OEMs manufacturing electric (EV) two-wheelers.

Quality is assured at every stage of the process by enforcing a documented quality standard through the entire chain of receiving materials, manufacturing and logistics.

The Total Employment Involvement (TEI) initiative started at the company a few years back continues to be used as a tool to motivate employees towards a culture of quality consciousness and continuous improvement.

K. Occupational Health & Safety

Your Company views employee health and safe working conditions to be an integral part of its day-to-day operations. Safety metrics take priority over all others when the Company measures its performance. The company has built strong internal processes and a governance mechanism to ensure:

- Constant review of failure modes that may result in accidents.
- Action plans to mitigate against possible unsafe conditions.
- Reviews to ensure action plans are being implemented.

The Company's revenue from operations increased to ₹3388.66 Crores in the year 2025-26 in comparison to ₹3022.90 Crores in the previous year, an increase of 12.1% over the previous year. Your company has also increased its Profit Before Tax to ₹110.13 Crores from ₹48.61 Crores, an increase of 126.6% year on year. EPS increased to ₹108.02 in March 2026 from ₹48.28 in March 2025, a 123.7% increase year on year. There has been a decrease in the borrowings of the company from ₹812.20 Crores in the previous year end to ₹701.73 Crores during the current year. Finance costs have decreased from ₹49.17 Crores to ₹46.45 Crores primarily on account of improved Profitability from operations during the year as compared to previous year.

O. Human Resources Management

The Company continues to invest in capability building through focused learning and development initiatives aimed at enhancing technical, functional and leadership competencies. Emphasis is also placed on leadership development, succession planning and employee engagement to build a high-performance culture, strengthen organisational capability and support the Company's long-term growth strategy. Yes, manufacturing units of the company have an occupational health and safety management system ISO45001:2018 in place. It covers 100% of our employees, workers, visitors, contractual service providers, suppliers. Coverage is 100%.
The company's Occupational Health Safety & Environment policy works as a guiding document to implement, monitor and assess the occupational health and safety management system. OHSE risk is monitored during regular safety committee meetings, monthly review meeting with senior team, safety audits, various OHSE training/ awareness (Induction/ PEP Talk/ On the Job Training (OJT)/ Fire Safety etc.), work permit system, EHS Zone members meetings, etc.

b. What are the processes used to identify work-related hazards and assess risks on a routine and non-routine basis by the entity?

Routine risks are assessed through conducting regular Hazard Identification & Risk Assessments (HIRA) and controlled through standard operating procedures, operational control procedures, visual display signages, safety audits, inspections, etc.,
Non-routine activities which may have hazards and related risks are assessed through conducting Job Safety Analysis (JSA) by expert teams (safety officer, engineering head, area head, contractor, safety committee member). Safety procedure has been developed for execution on all non routine activity.

All critical activities are monitored through 8 types of work permits to ensure the health and safety of man, machines and materials. These are:

- Hot work permit
- Confined space entry permit
- Height work permit
- Night work permit
- Excavation work permit
- Lock Out Tag Out (LOTO) work permit
- Lifting work permit
- Heavy vehicle entry permit

We have various forums to record work related risks by consultation and participation of employees/workers in safety committee meetings, daily review meetings, PEP talks and shift start up meetings. Based on the nature of the recorded observations, actions are taken by supervisors and reviewed by the safety officer. This is horizontally deployed in all respective areas as corrective actions and are regularly reviewed.

Yes, The company has a well-defined system to encourage employees/workers to record, monitor and mitigate work related hazards through various means including EHS zone wise classifications- 92 nos, safety suggestions, near miss incident reporting, safety committee meetings, etc.,

We conduct various awareness sessions inside the manufacturing facilities on reporting unsafe conditions, near miss incidents, etc., to all our employees through internal and external resources.

Daily PEP talk is conducted inside shop floor on job related standard operating procedures through discussion with employees.

Conducting Behaviour Based Safety Assessment study for operators to ensure the safety working culture and scope of improvement points will also share to the employees as feedback in shopfloor.

Safety signages are provided inside the manufacturing facility on potential hazards, Do's & Dont's, One point lesson.

Report on the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying standalone financial statements of TVS Srichakra Limited ("the Company"), which comprise the standalone balance sheet as at 31st March 2026, the standalone statement of Profit and Loss (including other comprehensive income), standalone statement of changes in equity and standalone statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the standalone financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "standalone financial statements").

1. Corporate Information

TVS Srichakra Limited ('TSL' or 'the Company') is a public limited company domiciled and incorporated in India having its registered office at TVS Building, 7-B West Veli Street, Madurai 625001. The Company is engaged in the business of two-wheeler, three-wheeler and other industrial tyre manufacturing.

The Company's shares are listed and traded on Bombay Stock Exchange and National Stock Exchange in India.

The standalone financial statements for the year ended March 31st, 2026 were approved by the Board of Directors and authorized for issue on 27th May 2026.

2. Material Accounting Policies

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared and presented in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules 2015, as amended from time to time and other relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on accrual basis of accounting, except for certain items of Assets and Liabilities that have been measured on fair value basis. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or revision to existing accounting standards requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use. Management evaluates all recently issued or revised accounting standards on a periodic basis.

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in Note 2(r). Based on the nature of products and services and the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalent, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current and non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

b) Statement of Compliance with Ind AS

The Financial Statements comprising Balance Sheet, Statement of Profit and Loss, Statement of Changes in Equity, Statement of Cash Flow together with notes for the year ended March 31st, 2026, have been prepared in accordance with Ind AS as notified above.

c) Changes in Accounting policies effective from 1st April 2025

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time.

The Company has applied the following amendments to Indian Accounting Standards for the year ended 31st March 2026:

i. Ind AS 1 - Implementation of Amendments to Ind AS 1 - Classification of Liabilities

The Company has adopted amendments to Ind AS 1 relating to classification of liabilities as current or non-current. Classification is based on the existence of a substantive right to defer settlement for at least twelve months as at the reporting date.

Only covenants required to be complied with on or before the reporting date affect classification; covenants applicable after the reporting date require disclosure only. A liability may continue to be classified as non-current where a waiver for breach of covenant is obtained after the reporting date but before approval of the financial statements, subject to the conditions of the amendment.

Conversion options are considered only where they are not classified as equity in accordance with Ind AS 32.

ii. Ind AS 12 - Income Taxes (International Tax Reform - Pillar Two)

The Company has applied the mandatory temporary exception from recognition and disclosure of deferred tax assets and liabilities arising from the Pillar Two model rules introduced through amendments to Ind AS 12. The Company has assessed its exposure to Pillar Two income taxes and does not expect a material impact on its financial statements.

iii. Ind AS 7 - Supplier Finance Arrangements

The amendments require disclosures to enhance transparency of supplier finance arrangements and their effects on an entity's liabilities, cash flows and exposure to liquidity risk. The company has complied with the disclosure requirements, to the extent applicable.

iv. Ind AS 21 - Lack of Exchangeability

The amendments provide guidance on assessing when a currency is exchangeable into another currency and on determining the exchange rate when exchangeability is lacking. The Company has evaluated the impact of these amendments and concluded that they

do not have a material impact on its financial statements.

Overall impact:

The adoption of the above amendments did not have a material impact on the Company's financial statements for the current or prior periods.

d) Changes in Accounting Standards that may affect the Company after 31st March 2026

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA), vide notification dated 13th August 2025, has issued amendments to Ind AS 1 - Presentation of Financial Statements, relating to the classification of liabilities as current or non-current. The amendments clarify that classification is based on rights that exist at the end of the reporting period, and that only covenants required to be complied with on or before the reporting date affect such classification.

These amendments are applicable for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1st April 2026.

The Company has performed a preliminary assessment of its loan arrangements and does not expect these amendments to have a material impact on the classification of its financial liabilities.

e) Functional and Presentation Currency

Items included in financial statements of the Company are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates ("the functional currency"). Indian rupee is the functional currency of the Company.

The Financial Statements are presented in Indian Rupees which is the Company's presentation currency. All financial information presented in Indian Rupees has been rounded to the nearest Crore (Cr) with two decimals except where otherwise indicated.

f) Critical Accounting Judgments, Assumptions and Key Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, the disclosures of contingent assets and contingent liabilities at the date of financial statements, income and expenses during the period. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in future periods which are affected.

Critical Judgments in applying accounting policies

i. Classification of investments in TVS Automobile Solutions Private Limited & TASL Automobile Solutions Private Limited

The Company holds investments in equity shares of TVS Automobile Solutions Private Limited ("TVS ASPL") & TASL Automobile Solutions Private Limited ("TASL"). In the opinion of the management, TVS ASPL & TASL are not considered to be associates of the Company. Accordingly, the investments in their shares have been designated as investment at FVTOCI.

ii. Lease

The Company evaluates if an arrangement qualifies to be a lease as per the requirements of Ind AS 116. Identification of a lease requires significant judgment. The Company uses significant judgement in assessing the lease term (including anticipated renewals) and the applicable discount rate.

Ind AS 116 requires lessees to determine the lease term as the non-cancellable period of a lease adjusted with any option to extend or terminate the lease, if the use of such option is reasonably certain. The Company makes an assessment on the expected lease term on a lease-by-lease basis and thereby assesses whether it is reasonably certain that any options to extend or terminate the contract will be exercised. In evaluating the lease term, the Company considers factors such as any significant leasehold improvements undertaken over the lease term, costs relating to the termination of the lease and the importance of the underlying asset to Company's operations taking into account the location of the underlying asset and the availability of suitable alternatives. The Company revises the lease term if there is a change in the non-cancellable period of a lease.

The Company has elected not to apply the requirements of Ind AS 116 Leases to short-term leases of all assets that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases for which the underlying asset is of low value.

The discount rate is generally based on the incremental borrowing rate specific to the lease being evaluated or for a portfolio of leases with similar characteristics.

Assumptions and Key Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

i. Fair value measurements and valuation processes

Some of the Company's assets and liabilities are measured at fair value for financial reporting purposes. In estimating the fair value of

an asset or a liability, the Company uses market-observable data to the extent it is available. Where Level 1 inputs are not available, the Company engages third party qualified valuers to perform the valuation. Management works closely with the qualified external valuers to establish the appropriate valuation techniques and inputs to the model.

Information about the valuation techniques and inputs used in determining the fair value of various assets and liabilities are disclosed in Note 2(q).

ii. Provisions for liabilities and charges

The value of provisions recognized in the Financial Statements represent the best estimate to date made by management for a range of issues. This estimate entails the adoption of assumptions which depend on factors that may change over time and which could therefore have a significant impact on the current estimates made by management in preparing the Financial Statements.

iii. Useful life of Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE)

The Company reviews the estimated useful lives of PPE at the end of each reporting period.

g) Financial Instruments

1) Financial Assets -

a) Investment in subsidiaries and associates

The Company records the investments in subsidiaries and associates at cost less impairment loss, if any.

b) Other than investment in subsidiaries and associates

Financial assets comprise investments in equity securities, trade receivables, cash and cash equivalents, loans and other financial assets.

Initial recognition:

All financial assets are recognized initially at Fair value plus transaction costs that are attributable to the Acquisition of the financial asset (In case of financial assets recorded at FVTPL, transaction costs are recognized immediately in statement of profit and loss). Purchase or sales of financial assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognized on the trade date. However, trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price.

Subsequent measurement:

i) Financial assets measured at amortized cost:

Financial assets held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding are measured at amortized cost using Effective Interest Rate (EIR) method. The EIR amortization is recognized as finance income in the statement of profit and loss.

The Company while applying above criteria has classified the following at amortized cost

- a) Trade receivable
- b) Loans
- c) Other financial assets

ii) Financial asset at FVTOCI

Financial assets that are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flow and selling financial asset and the contractual terms of financial assets give rise on specified dates to cash flow that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding are subsequently measured at FVTOCI. Fair value movements in financial assets at FVTOCI are recognized in other comprehensive income

Equity instruments held for trading are classified as FVTPL. For other equity instruments the Company classifies the same as FVTOCI. The classification is made on initial recognition and is irrevocable. Fair value changes on equity instruments at FVTOCI excluding dividends, are recognized in other comprehensive income (OCI).

iii) Financial asset at FVTPL

All fair value changes are recognized in the Statement of Profit and loss.

Derecognition of financial asset

Financial assets are derecognized when the contractual right to cash flows from the financial asset expires or the financial asset is transferred, and the transfer qualifies for Derecognition. On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the carrying amount (measured at the date of Derecognition) and the consideration received (including any new asset obtained less any new liability Assumed) shall be recognized in the statement of profit and loss (except for equity instruments designated as FVTOCI).

Impairment of financial asset

Trade receivables, investments in subsidiaries and associates, loans and other financial assets are tested for impairment based on the expected credit losses for their respective financial asset.

i) Trade receivable -

An impairment analysis is performed at each reporting date. The expected credit losses over lifetime of the asset are estimated by adopting the simplified approach using a provision matrix which is based on historical loss rate reflecting future economic conditions. In this approach, assets are grouped on the basis of similar credit characteristics such as industry, customer segment, past due status and other factors which are relevant to estimate the expected cash loss from these assets.

ii) Investments in subsidiaries and associates -

Where an indication of impairment exists, the carrying amount of investment is assessed and written down immediately to its recoverable amount

iii) Loans and other financial assets

Other financial assets are tested for impairment and expected credit losses are measured at an amount equal to 12 month expected credit loss. If the credit risk on the financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition, then the expected credit losses are measured at an amount equal to life-time expected credit loss.

2) Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are initially recognized at fair value net of any transaction cost that are attributable to the acquisition of financial liability except financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss which are initially measured at fair value.

Subsequent measurement

The financial liabilities are classified for subsequent measurement into following categories

- at amortized cost
- at fair value through the statement of profit and loss

Financial liabilities at amortized cost

The Company is classifying the following under amortized cost;

- a) Borrowings from banks
- b) Borrowings from others
- c) Trade payables
- d) Other Financial Liabilities

Amortized cost for financial liabilities represents amount at which financial liability is measured at initial recognition minus the principal repayments, plus or minus the cumulative amortization using the effective interest method of any difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount.

Financial liability at Fair Value through statement of profit and loss

Financial liabilities held for trading are measured at FVTPL.

Financial guarantee contracts (FGC)

A financial guarantee contract is a contract that requires the issuer to make specified payments to reimburse the holder for a loss it incurs because a specified debtor fails to make payments when due in accordance with the terms of a debt instrument.

Financial guarantee contracts issued by the Company are initially measured at their fair values and are subsequently measured (if not designated as at Fair value through profit or loss) at the higher of:

- the amount of impairment loss allowance determined in accordance with requirements of Ind AS 109; and

- the amount initially recognised less, when appropriate, the cumulative amount of income recognised.

De-recognition of financial liabilities

A financial liability is de-recognized when and only when, it is extinguished i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

3) Derivative financial instruments

The Company holds derivative financial instruments such as foreign exchange forward and currency swap contracts to mitigate the risk of changes in exchange rates on foreign currency exposures. The counterparty for these contracts is generally a bank. This category includes derivative financial assets or liabilities which are not designated as hedges.

Any derivative that is either not designated as a hedge or is so designated but is ineffective as per Ind AS 109, is categorised as a financial asset or financial liability, at fair value through profit or loss.

Derivatives not designated as hedges are recognised initially at fair value and attributable transaction costs are recognised in the net profit in the Statement of Profit and Loss when incurred. Subsequent to initial recognition, these derivatives re-measured at fair value through profit or loss and the resulting exchange gains or losses are included in other income / other expenses. Assets / liabilities in this category are presented as current assets / current liabilities if they are either held for trading or are expected to be realised within 12 months after the Balance Sheet Date.

Cash flow hedges

The Company designates certain foreign exchange forward contracts / other derivative instruments as cash flow hedges to mitigate the risks of foreign exchanges exposure on highly probable forecast cash transactions.

When a derivative is designated as a cash flow hedge instrument, the effective portion of changes in the fair value of the derivative is recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the cash flow hedge reserve. Any ineffective portion of changes in the fair value of the derivative is recognized immediately in the net profit in the Statement of Profit and Loss. If the hedging instrument no longer meets the criteria for hedge accounting, then hedge accounting is discontinued prospectively. If the hedging instrument expires or is sold, terminated or exercised, the cumulative gain or loss on the hedging instrument recognized in cash flow hedge reserve till the period the hedge was effective remains in cash flow hedge reserve until the forecasted transaction occurs. The cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in the cash flow hedge reserve is transferred to the net profit in the Statement of Profit and Loss upon the occurrence of the related forecasted transaction. If the forecasted transaction is no longer expected to occur, then the amount accumulated in cash flow hedge reserve is reclassified to net profit in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

4) Offsetting of financial assets and liabilities

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, and the net amount is presented in Balance Sheet when, and only when, the Company has a legal right to offset the recognized amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realize the assets and settle the liability simultaneously.

5) Reclassification of financial assets

The Company does not restate any previously recognized gains, losses (including impairment gains or losses) or interest.

h) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation (except in case of freehold land which is not depreciated) and where applicable, accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to acquisition of the asset. The cost of self-constructed assets includes the cost of materials, direct labour and any other costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to a working condition for its intended use, and the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located. For qualifying assets, borrowing costs are capitalised in accordance with Ind AS 23 - Borrowing costs.

When parts of an item of Property, Plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Property, plant and equipment which are not ready for intended use as on the date of Balance Sheet are disclosed as "Capital work-in-progress". Gains and losses on disposal of an item of property plant and equipment are determined by comparing the proceeds from disposal with the carrying amount of Property, Plant and equipment and are recognized net within "other income/other expenses" in the statement of profit and loss.

Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognized in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefit embodied within the part will flow to the Company and its cost can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is de-recognized. The cost of day to day servicing of property, plant and equipment are recognized in statement of profit or loss.

Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of profit and loss under straight line basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment. Leased asset are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives unless it is reasonably certain that the company will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term. Assets costing ₹5000 or below acquired during the year considered not material are depreciated in full retaining Re.1 per asset. The Useful life has been considered in line with schedule II except where based on technical estimates.

The depreciation method, useful lives and residual value are reviewed at each of the reporting date.

i) Intangible assets

Intangible assets that are acquired by the Company, which have finite useful lives are measured at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the intangible asset.

Research costs are expensed as incurred. Development expenditures on an individual project / New Product Development are recognised as an intangible asset when the Company can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale
- Its intention to complete and its ability and intention to use or sell the asset
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits
- The availability of resources to complete the asset
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development

Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific asset to which it relates. All other expenditure, including expenditure on internally generated goodwill and brands, are recognized in the statement of profit and loss.

Amortization of intangible asset with finite useful lives

Amortization is recognized in the statement of profit and loss on a straight line basis over the estimated useful lives of intangible assets from the date that they are available to use based on the estimates made by the management w.r.t the useful life and residual value. Estimated useful life:

- Software License is amortised over 5 years
- New Product Development is amortised over 6 years

Amortization methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

j) Leases

At the inception of a contract, the Company assesses whether the contract is a lease or not. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the

contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a time in exchange for a consideration.

The Company determines the lease term as the non-cancellable period of a lease, together with both periods covered by an option to extend the lease if the Company is reasonably certain to exercise that option; and periods covered by an option to terminate the lease if the Company is reasonably certain not to exercise that option.

The Company recognizes a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received. The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of remaining lease payments at the commencement date, discounted using the Company's incremental borrowing rate.

Right of use assets are evaluated for recoverability whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that their carrying amounts may not be recoverable. For the purpose of impairment testing, the recoverable amount (i.e., the higher of the fair value less cost to sell and the value-in-use) is determined on an individual asset basis unless the asset does not generate cash flows that are largely independent of those from other assets. In such cases, the recoverable amount is determined for the Cash Generating Unit (CGU) to which the asset belongs.

The Company has elected not to recognize right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. The Company recognizes the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense over the lease term.

k) Inventories

Inventories consisting of stores and spares, raw materials, work in progress, and finished goods are valued at the lower of cost (determined using Weighted average method) and net realizable value. Cost comprises the fair value of consideration for the purchase and all directly attributable costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and estimated cost necessary to make the sale.

Cost includes direct material cost, direct labour cost, taxes, and duties (other than duties and taxes for which input credit is available), freight, other direct expenses, and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overhead expenditure.

Cost of the purchased inventory is determined after deducting rebates and discounts. Provision is made for obsolete, non-moving & defective stocks, wherever necessary.

l) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognized on their accrual and when no significant uncertainty on measurability or collectability exists.

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the performance obligations towards customers have been met at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Company believes it is entitled to in exchange for the transfer of goods to customers i.e., Transaction price, net of any sales returns and GST. Variable consideration in the form of trade discounts and volume rebates are netted off from revenue. Performance obligations are deemed to have been met when the control of goods has been transferred to the customer, depending on the individual terms of the contract with customers.

Considering the general terms of sales, there is no significant financing element included in the sales consideration.

Subsidies on export and other incentives

Government Subsidies and incentives, in the nature of Business Support Subsidy and RODTEP (Remission of Duties or Taxes on Export Products) are recognized when there is a reasonable assurance that the condition attaching to the incentive would be complied with and incentives will be recognized. Government grant received relating to assets are treated as Deferred Revenue and are recognized over the period in which the economic benefit is expected from such assets.

m) Employee benefits

Employee benefits are accrued in the period in which the associated services are rendered by employees of the Company, as detailed below:

i. Defined contribution plan (including Provident fund)

In accordance with Indian law, eligible employees receive benefit from various defined contribution plans. The employee and / or employer make periodic contributions to these plans. The Company has no further obligations under the plan beyond its contributions.

Obligations for contributions to these plans are recognized as employee benefit expenses in the statement of profit and loss when incurred.

ii. Defined benefit plan (gratuity)

In accordance with applicable Indian laws, the Company provides for gratuity, which is a defined benefit retirement plan covering eligible employees. The Gratuity Plan provides a lump sum payment to vested employees, at retirement or termination of employment, an amount based on the respective employee's last drawn salary and the years of employment with the Company. The Company's net obligation in respect of the gratuity plan is calculated by estimating the amount of future benefits that the employees have earned in return for their service in the current and prior periods; that benefit is discounted to determine its present value. Any unrecognized past service cost and the fair value of plan assets are deducted. The discount rate is the yield at the reporting date on risk free government bonds that have maturity dates approximating the terms of the Company's obligations. The calculation is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method. When the calculation results in a benefit to the Company, the recognized asset is limited to the total of any unrecognized past service costs and the present value of economic benefit available in the form of any future refunds from the plan or reductions in the future contributions to the plan.

The Company recognizes all re-measurements of net defined benefit liability / asset directly in other comprehensive income and presented within retained earning under equity. The Company has an employees' gratuity fund managed by the ICICI Prudential Life Insurance Company Limited.

iii. Short term benefits

Short term employee benefit obligations are measured on an undiscounted basis and are expensed as the related service is provided. A liability is recognized for the amount expected to be paid under short term cash bonus or profit sharing plans if the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

iv. Compensated absences

The employees of the Company are entitled to compensated absence. The employees can carry forward a portion of the unutilized accrued absence and utilize it in future periods or receive cash compensation at retirement or termination of employment for the unutilized accrued compensated absence. The Company recognizes an obligation for compensated absences in the period in which the employee renders the services. The Company provides for the expected cost of compensated absence in statement of profit or loss as additional amount that the Company expects to pay as a result of the unused entitlement that has accumulated based on actuarial valuations carried out by an independent actuary at the balance sheet date.

v. Termination benefits

Termination benefits, in the nature of voluntary retirement benefits or termination benefits are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. The Company recognises termination benefits at the earlier of the following dates:

- i) When the Company can no longer withdraw the offer of those benefits; or
- ii) When the Company recognises costs for a restructuring that is within the scope of Ind AS 37: Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets and involves the payment of termination benefits.

n) Finance Income and expense

Finance income comprises interest income on funds invested, dividend income, fair value gains on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Interest income is recognized using effective interest method. Dividend income is recognized in statement of profit and loss on the date when the Company's right to receive payment is established, which in the case of quoted securities is the ex-dividend date. Finance expense comprises interest expense on loans and borrowings, bank charges, unwinding of discount on provision, fair value losses on financial asset through FVTPL (if any) that are recognized in the statement of profit and loss.

o) Income taxes

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax expense is recognized in the statement of profit and loss except to the extent it relates to items recognized directly in equity or in other comprehensive income. Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax is recognized using the balance sheet method, providing for temporary differences between the carrying amount of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the amounts used for taxation purposes. Deferred tax is not recognized for the following temporary differences:

- (i) The initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction that is not a business combination and that affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss

- (ii) Differences relating to investments in subsidiaries and associates to the extent that it is probable that they will not reverse in the foreseeable future.
- (iii) Arising due to taxable temporary differences arising on the initial recognition of goodwill, as the same is not deductible for tax purposes.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to be applied to temporary differences when they reverse, based on the laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax liabilities and assets, and they relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the same taxable entity.

A deferred tax asset is recognized to the extent it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the temporary difference can be utilized. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date and are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realized.

Deferred taxation arising on investments in subsidiaries and associates is recognized except where the Company is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred taxation on temporary differences arising out of undistributed earnings of the equity-method accounted investee is recorded based on the management's intention. If the intention is to realize the undistributed earnings through sale, deferred tax is measured at the capital gains tax rates that are expected to be applied to temporary differences when they reverse. However, when the intention is to realize the undistributed earnings through dividend, the Company's share of the income and expenses of the equity-method accounted investee is recorded in the statement of profit and loss after considering any taxes on dividend payable by equity-method accounted investee or deferred tax is set up in the books if the tax liability is with the Company.

p) Foreign Currency Transactions and balances

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recognized in the financial statements using exchange rate prevailing on the date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated to the relevant functional currency at the exchange rates prevailing at the reporting date. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies that are measured at fair value are re-translated to the functional currency at the exchange rate prevailing on the date that the fair value was determined. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in a foreign currency and measured at historical cost are translated at the exchange rate prevalent at the date of transaction. Foreign currency differences arising on translation are recognized in statement of profit and loss for determination of net profit or loss during the period.

q) Fair value measurements

Ind AS requires the determination of fair value for both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. A fair value measurement assumes that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either in the principal market for the asset or liability or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The principal market or the most advantageous market must be accessible to the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data is available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole. The fair value hierarchy is described as below:

Level 1 - Unadjusted quoted prices in active market for identical assets and liabilities

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 - Unobservable outputs for the assets and liabilities

For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the financial statement at fair value on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by reassessing categorization at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of fair value hierarchy.

Fair values have been determined for measurement and/or disclosures purposes based on the following methods. When applicable, further information about the assumptions made in determining fair values is disclosed in the notes specific to that asset or liability.

(i) Investments in equity securities

The fair value is determined by reference to their quoted price at the reporting period. In the absence of quoted price, the fair value of the financial asset is measured using valuation techniques.

(ii) Trade and other receivables

The fair value of trade and other receivables is estimated as the present value of future cash flows, discounted at the market rate of interest at the reporting date except trade receivables which do not contain a significant financing component (determined in accordance with Ind AS 115 Revenue from Contracts with Customers) are measured at undiscounted invoice price (i.e., transaction price) and not at fair value. However, in respect of such financial instruments, fair value generally approximates the carrying amount due to the short-term nature of such assets.

(iii) Security Deposits

Any Security deposits paid by the Company are discounted to their fair value and thereafter accounted on amortised cost method over the tenure of the deposits.

(iv) Derivatives

The fair value of forward exchange contracts is based on quoted price. Fair value reflects the credit risk of the instrument and includes adjustments to take account of the credit risk of the Company and the counter party when appropriate.

(v) Non-derivative financial liabilities

Fair value, which is determined for disclosure purposes, is calculated based on the present value of future principal and interest cash flow discounted at the market rate of interest at the reporting date.

r) Current and non-current classification

An asset is classified as current if:

- (a) it is expected to be realized or sold or consumed in the Company's normal operating cycle;
- (b) it is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- (c) it is expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting period; or
- (d) it is cash or cash equivalent unless it is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current if:

- (a) it is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle;
- (b) it is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- (c) it is expected to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period;
- (d) it has no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

s) Segment Reporting

Operating segments are identified and reported considering the different risks and returns, the organization structure and the internal reporting system to the chief operating decision maker. The Company's business activity falls within a single reportable business segment, viz, Automotive Tyres, Tubes and Flaps. Geographical segments are considered as India and rest of the world.

t) Warranty

Provision is made for estimated warranty claims in respect of products sold which are still under warranty at the end of the reporting period. Management estimates the provision based on historical warranty claim information and any recent trends that may suggest future claims could differ from historical amounts.

40. Financial risk management

The Company has exposure to the following risks from its use of financial instruments:

40.1 Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Company. The Company has adopted a policy of dealing only with creditworthy counterparties and obtaining sufficient collateral, where appropriate, as a means of mitigating the risk of financial loss from defaults.

Trade receivables consist of a large number of customers, spread across diverse industries and geographical areas. Ongoing credit evaluation is performed on the financial condition of accounts receivable.

The management believes that the probability of any outflow on account of financial guarantees issued by the Company being called on is remote and hence the same is not considered in the above assessment. Refer Note 38(b) for details of the financial guarantee issued as at March 31, 2026.

Credit risk is managed by the entity. Considering the credit risk assessment made by the management and based on past history, provision for receivables amounting to ₹2.75 crores (PY - ₹1.55 crores) has been made under the simplified approach.

40.2 Liquidity risk

The Company manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate reserves, banking facilities and reserve borrowing facilities, by continuously monitoring forecast and actual cash flows, and by matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities.

40.3 Market risk

40.3.1 Commodity Price Risk - The primary commodity price risks that the Company is exposed to include rubber prices that could adversely affect the value of the Company's financial assets or expected future cash flows.

40.3.2 Foreign currency risk management - The Company imports raw materials from outside India as well as make export sales to countries outside India. The Company is, therefore, exposed to foreign currency risk principally arising out of foreign currency movement against the Indian Currency. Foreign currency exchange risks are managed by entering into forward contracts against firm purchase commitment and receivables.

47. Exceptional Item -

- (i) The Company had a Voluntary Retirement Scheme for its employees. Under this scheme, the Company has received and approved applications for a sum of ₹5.36 crores in the current year (PY ₹5.30 crores).
- (ii) The Government of India had notified four Labour Codes which became effective from 21st November 2025. Final central rules were notified on 8th May 2026, while notification of state rules including those for Tamil Nadu is awaited.

To comply with the above, the Company had taken an actuarial valuation in accordance with Ind AS 19 - Employee Benefits, read with relevant guidance issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India, and had recognized an incremental obligation of ₹10.61 crores as past-service cost during the year. Considering the non-recurring nature of the impact arising on first-time application of the Labour Codes, the same has been disclosed as an exceptional item.

The Company is in the process of evaluating and implementing the necessary changes in the employee benefit policies and will continue to monitor further regulatory developments including notifications of state rules and additional clarifications to assess the consequential financial impact, if any.

- (iii) The Company has received interim eligibility certificate from State Industries Promotion Corporation of Tamil Nadu Limited (SIPCOT) for a structured package of assistance in the form of an Investment Promotion Capital Subsidy (the "Grant"), which was sanctioned by the State Government of Tamil Nadu in November 2021. The Grant will be received over 12 years, in equal annual instalments, subject to fulfilment of Grant related conditions as laid down by the Government.

The Company has adopted Income Approach as laid down in Ind AS 20 "Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance" for accounting the aforementioned Grant. Accordingly grant income of ₹18.81 crores attributable towards completed useful life of eligible assets upto March 31, 2025 recognised under exceptional item.

- (iv) The Company has received eligibility certificate from State Industries Promotion Corporation of Tamil Nadu Limited (SIPCOT) for a structured package of assistance in the form of an Green Industry Incentive (the "Grant"), which was sanctioned by the State Government of Tamil Nadu in November 2021. This is a one-time Grant.

The Company has adopted Income Approach as laid down in Ind AS 20 "Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance" for accounting the aforementioned Grant. Accordingly grant income of ₹0.08 crores attributable to the financial year 2024-25 recognised under exceptional item.

- (v) During 2024-25, The Regional Provident Fund Commissioner, Madurai issued final orders under Section 7-A of the Employees' Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952, for provident fund applicability on certain salary/wages components for the period April 2012 to July 2017. Potential additional liability arising out of the aforesaid orders has been estimated and accounted for as exceptional item amounting to ₹6.10 crores during the year ended March 31, 2025.

48. Previous year figures: Previous year's figures have been regrouped/ reclassified wherever necessary, to conform to current year's classification.

49. Quarterly returns filed with Banks and Financial Institutions: The amounts as per the quarterly return of inventories and book debts submitted to the banks were lower than the amounts as per the books of account and accordingly did not affect the drawing power and the required security cover computed in accordance with the sanctioned terms.

51. The Government of Tamil Nadu (GoTN) has sanctioned a structured package of assistance to the Company under the Tamil Nadu Industrial Policy 2021. The Company is entitled to a Fixed Capital Subsidy (referred to as "Phase I") at the rate of 15% of Eligible Fixed Assets, subject to a maximum of ₹75.00 crores, payable over a period of 12 years in equal annual instalments upon fulfilment and continued compliance with the prescribed investment and employment conditions.

Based on the Interim Eligibility Certificate received during the year and fulfilment of the stipulated conditions for Phase I, the Company has recognised grant receivable at its fair value amounting to ₹44.53 crores under non-current financial assets and ₹6.25 crores under current financial assets. The grant receivable is measured at present value in accordance with Ind AS 109, and the difference between the gross entitlement and fair value is recognised and amortised over the tenure of the grant. Deferred grant income has been recognised, of which ₹42.55 crores is classified under other non-current liabilities and ₹7.02 crores under other current liabilities. The deferred grant income will be recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss on a systematic basis over the useful life of the related assets.

52. Utilisation of borrowings from Banks and Financial Institutions: During the year, the Company has not availed any new term loans.

53. The Board of Directors of the Company recommended a dividend of ₹37.80 (PY - ₹16.89) per equity share of ₹10/-each (i.e.) for the year ended March 31, 2026, subject to the approval of shareholders at the ensuing Annual General Meeting of the company.

54. No funds have been advanced or loaned or invested (either from borrowed funds or share premium or any other sources or kind of funds) by the Company to or in any other person(s) or entity(ies), including foreign entities ("Intermediaries") with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Intermediary shall lend or invest in party identified by or on behalf of the Company (Ultimate Beneficiaries). The Company has not received any fund from any party(s) (Funding Party) with the understanding that the Company shall whether, directly or indirectly lend or invest in other persons or entities identified by or on behalf of the Company ("Ultimate Beneficiaries") or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries

55. The Company does not have any transaction which is not recorded in the Books of accounts that has been surrendered, disclosed as income during the year in tax assessments under the income tax act, 1961 (such as search or survey or any relevant provisions of Income Tax Act, 1961).

56. The Company uses an ERP as books of accounts and the same was configured to maintain audit trail and audit logs at transaction level and database level with the application layer from 9th July 2023. Post publication of ICAI implementation guide in February 2024, direct database level changes was also included in the audit trial scope, except for the periods where audit trail was not enabled in the prior years. The Company shall evaluate the impact on performance by enabling the database level audit trail and incorporate the recommendation as suggested by the ERP vendor. However, access to direct database level changes is available only to the default System user provided by the ERP vendor.

For accounting software for which audit trail feature is enabled, the audit trail facility has been operating throughout the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the software and audit trail feature has not been tampered with during the year. Additionally, other than the periods where audit trail was not enabled in the prior year, the audit trail has been preserved as per the statutory requirements for record retention.

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of TVS Srichakra Limited (hereinafter referred to as the "Holding Company") and its subsidiaries (Holding Company and its subsidiaries together referred to as "the Group") which comprise the consolidated Balance Sheet as at 31 March 2026, and the consolidated statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), the consolidated statement of changes in equity and the consolidated cash flows Statement for the year then ended, and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the consolidated financial statements").

Further, for the periods where audit trail (edit log) facility was enabled and operated throughout the year for the respective accounting software, we did not come across any instance of the audit trail feature being tampered with.

Additionally, other than the periods where audit trail was not enabled in the prior years, the audit trail has been preserved by the Holding Company and its subsidiary companies incorporated in India as per the statutory requirements for record retention. Refer Note 55 to the Consolidated Financial Statements.

MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2026

1. Corporate Information

TVS Srichakra Limited ('TSL' or 'the Holding Company') is a public limited company domiciled and incorporated in India having its registered office at TVS Building, 7-B West Veli Street, Madurai 625001. The Holding Company's shares are listed and traded on Bombay Stock Exchange and National Stock Exchange in India. The Holding Company is engaged in the business of two-wheeler, three-wheeler and other industrial tyre manufacturing.

The Consolidated financial statements for the year ended March 31st, 2026 were approved by the Board of Directors and authorized for issue on 27th May 2026.

2. Material Accounting Policies

a) Basis of preparation and Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared and presented in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules 2015, as amended from time to time and other relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on accrual basis of accounting, except for certain items of Assets and Liabilities that have been measured on fair value basis. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or revision to existing accounting standards requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use. Management evaluates all recently issued or revised accounting standards on a periodic basis.

The Consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of TVS Srichakra Limited (the Holding Company), its subsidiaries TVS Srichakra Investments Limited (TSIL), Super Grip Corporation (SGC), TVS Sensing Solutions Private Limited (formerly known as ZF Electronics TVS (India) Private Limited) & Fiber Optic Sensing Solutions Private Limited (FOSS) (the Holding Company and its subsidiaries together is referred to as the "Group").

TVS Srichakra Limited has incorporated a company named SG Acquisition Corporation in USA. SG Acquisition Corporation has acquired 100% of equity shares of M/s. Super Grip Corporation. Later, SG Acquisition Corporation was renamed to Super Grip Corporation. Accordingly, the Company has become the subsidiary of TVS Srichakra Limited w.e.f 2nd November 2023. The Financial Statements of the Parent Company and its subsidiaries have been consolidated on a line by line basis by adding together the book value of like items of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, after eliminating Intra-group balances, Intra-group transactions and unrealised profits or losses in accordance with Ind AS 110 - "Consolidated Financial Statements". The deferred tax to be recognised for temporary differences arises from elimination of profits and losses resulting from intra group transactions.

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Group's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in Note 2(u). Based on the nature of products and services and the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalent, the Group has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current and non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

b) Statement of Compliance with Ind AS

The Consolidated Financial Statements comprising Balance Sheet, Statement of Profit and Loss, Statement of Changes in Equity, Statement of Cash Flow together with notes for the year ended March 31st, 2026 have been prepared in accordance with Ind AS as notified above.

c) Changes in Accounting Standards effective from 1st April 2025

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time.

The Group has applied the following amendments to Indian Accounting Standards for the year ended 31st March 2026:

i. Ind AS 1 - Implementation of Amendments to Ind AS 1 - Classification of Liabilities

The Group has adopted amendments to Ind AS 1 relating to classification of liabilities as current or non-current. Classification is based on the existence of a substantive right to defer settlement for at least twelve months as at the reporting date.

Only covenants required to be complied with on or before the reporting date affect classification; covenants applicable after the reporting date require disclosure only. A liability may continue to be classified as non-current where a waiver for breach of covenant is obtained after the reporting date but before approval of the financial statements, subject to the conditions of the amendment.

Conversion options are considered only where they are not classified as equity in accordance with Ind AS 32.

ii. Ind AS 12 - Income Taxes (International Tax Reform - Pillar Two)

The Group has applied the mandatory temporary exception from recognition and disclosure of deferred tax assets and liabilities arising from the Pillar Two model rules introduced through amendments to Ind AS 12. The Group has assessed its exposure to Pillar Two income taxes and does not expect a material impact on its financial statements.

iii. Ind AS 7 - Supplier Finance Arrangements

The amendments require disclosures to enhance transparency of supplier finance arrangements and their effects on an entity's liabilities, cash flows and exposure to liquidity risk. The Group has complied with the disclosure requirements, to the extent applicable.

iv. Ind AS 21 - Lack of Exchangeability

The amendments provide guidance on assessing when a currency is exchangeable into another currency and on determining the exchange rate when exchangeability is lacking. The Group has evaluated the impact of these amendments and concluded that they do not have a material impact on its financial statements.

Overall impact:

The adoption of the above amendments did not have a material impact on the Company's Consolidated financial statements for the current or prior periods.

d) Changes in Accounting Standards that may affect the Group after 31st March 2026

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA), vide notification dated 13th August 2025, has issued amendments to Ind AS 1 - Presentation of Financial Statements, relating to the classification of liabilities as current or non-current. The amendments clarify that classification is based on rights that exist at the end of the reporting period, and that only covenants required to be complied with on or before the reporting date affect such classification.

These amendments are applicable for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1st April 2026.

The Group has performed a preliminary assessment of its loan arrangements and does not expect these amendments to have a material impact on the classification of its financial liabilities.

e) Functional and Presentation Currency

Items included in financial statements of the Group are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Group operates ("the functional currency"). Indian Rupee is the functional currency of the Group.

The Financial Statements are presented in Indian Rupees which is Group's presentation currency. All financial information presented in Indian Rupees has been rounded to the nearest Crore (Cr) with two decimals except where otherwise indicated.

f) Critical Accounting Judgments, Assumptions and Key Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, the disclosures of contingent assets and contingent liabilities at the date of financial statements, income and expenses during the period. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in future periods which are affected.

Critical Judgments in applying accounting policies

i. Classification of investment in TVS Automobile Solutions Private Limited & TASL Automobile Solutions Private Limited

The Holding Company holds investments in equity shares of TVS Automobile Solutions Private Limited ("TVS ASPL") & TASL Automobile Solutions Private Limited ("TASL"). In the opinion of the management, TVS ASPL & TASL are not considered to be associates of the Holding Company. Accordingly, the investments in their shares have been designated as investment at FVTOCI.

ii. Lease

The Group evaluates if an arrangement qualifies to be a lease as per the requirements of Ind AS 116. Identification of a lease requires significant judgment. The Group uses significant judgement in assessing the lease term (including anticipated renewals) and the applicable discount rate.

Ind AS 116 requires lessees to determine the lease term as the non-cancellable period of a lease adjusted with any option to extend or terminate the lease, if the use of such option is reasonably certain. The Group makes an assessment on the expected lease term on a lease-by-lease basis and thereby assesses whether it is reasonably certain that any options to extend or terminate the contract will be exercised. In evaluating the lease term, the Group considers factors such as any significant leasehold improvements undertaken over the lease term, costs relating to the termination of the lease and the importance of the underlying asset to Group's

operations taking into account the location of the underlying asset and the availability of suitable alternatives. The Group revises the lease term if there is a change in the non-cancellable period of a lease.

The Group has elected not to apply the requirements of Ind AS 116 Leases to short-term leases of all assets that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases for which the underlying asset is of low value.

The discount rate is generally based on the incremental borrowing rate specific to the lease being evaluated or for a portfolio of leases with similar characteristics.

Assumptions and Key Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

i. Fair value measurements and valuation processes

Some of the Group's assets and liabilities are measured at fair value for financial reporting purposes. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Group uses market-observable data to the extent it is available. Where Level 1 inputs are not available, the group engages third party qualified external valuers to establish the appropriate valuation techniques and inputs to the model. Management works closely with the qualified external valuers to establish the appropriate valuation techniques and inputs to the model.

Information about the valuation techniques and inputs used in determining the fair value of various assets and liabilities are disclosed in Note 2(t).

ii. Provisions for liabilities and charges

The value of provisions recognized in the Financial Statements represent the best estimate to date made by management for a range of issues. This estimate entails the adoption of assumptions which depend on factors that may change over time and which could therefore have a significant impact on the current estimates made by management in preparing the Financial Statements.

iii. Useful life of Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE) and Intangible Assets

The Group reviews the estimated useful lives of PPE at the end of each reporting period.

iv. Impairment testing of Goodwill:

Goodwill arising on the acquisition of a business is carried at cost as established at the date of acquisition of the business less accumulated impairment losses, if any. For the purposes of impairment testing, goodwill is allocated to each of the Group's cash - generating units (or groups of cash-generating units). A cash-generating unit to which goodwill has been allocated is tested for impairment annually, or more frequently when there is an indication that the unit may be impaired. If the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit is less than its carrying amount, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the unit and then to the other assets of the unit pro rata based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit. Any impairment loss for goodwill is recognised directly in consolidated statement of profit and loss. An impairment loss recognised for goodwill is not reversed in subsequent periods. On disposal of the relevant cash-generating unit, the attributable amount of goodwill is included in the determination of the profit or loss on disposal.

g) Business Combinations

The Group uses the acquisition method of accounting to account for business combinations other than those under common control. The acquisition date is the date on which control is transferred to the acquirer. Judgement is applied in determining the acquisition date and determining whether control is transferred from one party to another. Control exists when the Group is exposed to, or has rights to variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through power over the entity. In assessing control, potential voting rights are considered only if the rights are substantive. Goodwill is initially measured at cost, being the excess of the aggregate of the consideration transferred and the amount recognised for non-controlling interests, and any previous interest held, over the net identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed. Consideration transferred includes the fair values of the assets transferred, liabilities incurred by the Group to the previous owners of the acquiree, and equity interests issued by the Group. Consideration transferred also includes the fair value of any contingent consideration. Any goodwill that arises on account of such business combination is tested annually for impairment. Any contingent consideration is measured at fair value at the date of acquisition. A contingent liability of the acquiree is assumed in a business combination only if such a liability represents a present obligation and arises from a past event, and its fair value can be measured reliably. On an acquisition-by-acquisition basis, the Group recognises any non-controlling interest in the acquiree either at fair value or at the non-controlling interest's proportionate share of the acquiree's identifiable net assets. Transaction costs that the Company incurs in connection with a business combination, such as Stamp Duty for title transfer in the name of the Group, finder's fees, legal fees, due diligence fees and other professional and consulting fees, are expensed as incurred.

In case of a bargain purchase, before recognising a gain in respect thereof, the Group determines whether there exists clear evidence of the underlying reasons for classifying the business combination as a bargain purchase. Thereafter, the Group reassesses whether it has correctly identified all of the assets acquired and all of the liabilities assumed and recognises any additional assets or liabilities that are identified in that reassessment. The Group then reviews the procedures used to measure the amounts that Ind AS requires for the purposes of calculating the bargain purchase. If the gain remains after this reassessment and review, the Group recognises it in other

comprehensive income and accumulates the same in equity as capital reserve. This gain is attributed to the acquirer. If there does not exist clear evidence of the underlying reasons for classifying the business combination as a bargain purchase, the Group recognises the gain, after reassessing and reviewing (as described above), directly in equity as capital reserve.

When a business combination is achieved in stages, the Group's previously held equity interest in the acquiree is remeasured to its acquisition-date fair value and the resulting gain or loss, if any, is recognised in profit or loss. Amounts arising from interests in the acquiree prior to the acquisition date that have previously been recognised in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss where such treatment would be appropriate if that interest were disposed of.

h) Financial Instruments

i. Financial Assets - Investments

Financial assets comprise of investments in equity, trade receivables, cash and cash equivalents and other financial assets.

Initial recognition:

All financial assets are recognized initially at Fair value plus transaction costs that are attributable to the Acquisition of the financial asset (In case of financial assets recorded at FVTPL, transaction costs are recognized immediately in statement of profit and loss). Purchase or sales of financial assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognized on the trade date. However, trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price.

Subsequent measurement:

i. Financial assets measured at amortized cost:

Financial assets held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding are measured at amortized cost using Effective Interest Rate (EIR) method. The EIR amortization is recognized as finance income in the statement of profit and loss.

The Group while applying above criteria has classified the following at amortized cost

- a) Trade receivable
- b) Other financial assets

ii. Financial asset at FVTOCI

Financial assets that are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flow and selling financial asset and the contractual terms of financial assets give rise on specified dates to cash flow that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding are subsequently measured at FVTOCI. Fair value movements in financial assets at FVTOCI are recognized in other comprehensive income.

Equity instruments held for trading are classified as FVTPL. For other equity instruments the Group classifies the same as FVTOCI. The classification is made on initial recognition and is irrevocable. Fair value changes on equity instruments at FVTOCI excluding dividends, are recognized in other comprehensive income (OCI).

iii. Financial asset at FVTPL

All fair value changes are recognized in the Statement of Profit and loss.

Derecognition of financial asset

Financial assets are derecognized when the contractual right to cash flows from the financial asset expires or the financial asset is transferred, and the transfer qualifies for Derecognition. On Derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the carrying amount (measured at the date of Derecognition) and the consideration received (including any new asset obtained less any new liability assumed) shall be recognized in the statement of profit and loss (except for equity instruments designated as FVTOCI).

Impairment of financial asset

Trade receivables, investments in debt instruments that are carried at amortized cost, investments in debt instruments that are carried at FVTOCI are tested for impairment based on the expected credit losses for their respective financial asset.

a) Trade receivable

An impairment analysis is performed at each reporting date. The expected credit losses over lifetime of the asset are estimated by adopting the simplified approach using a provision matrix which is based on historical loss rate reflecting future economic conditions.

In this approach, assets are grouped on the basis of similar credit characteristics such as industry, customer segment, past due status and other factors which are relevant to estimate the expected cash loss from these assets.

b) Other financial assets

Other financial assets are tested for impairment and expected credit losses are measured at an amount equal to 12 month expected credit loss. If the credit risk on the financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition, then the expected credit losses are measured at an amount equal to life-time expected credit loss.

ii. Financial Liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are initially recognized at fair value net of any transaction cost that are attributable to the acquisition of financial liability except financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss which are initially measured at fair value.

Subsequent measurement

The financial liabilities are classified for subsequent measurement into following categories

- at amortized cost
- at fair value through the statement of profit and loss

Financial Liabilities at amortized cost

The Group is classifying the following under amortized cost;

- a) Borrowings from banks
- b) Borrowings from others
- c) Trade payables
- d) Other Financial Liabilities

Amortized cost for financial liabilities represents amount at which financial liability is measured at initial recognition minus the principal repayments, plus or minus the cumulative amortization using the effective interest method of any difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount.

Financial Liability at Fair Value through Statement of Profit and Loss

Financial liabilities held for trading are measured at FVTPL.

De-recognition of Financial Liabilities

A Financial liability is de-recognized when and only when, it is extinguished i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

iii. Derivative financial instruments

The Group holds derivative financial instruments such as foreign exchange forward contracts and Currency Swap contracts to mitigate the risk of changes in exchange rates on foreign currency exposures. The counterparty for these contracts is generally a bank. This category includes derivative financial assets or liabilities which are not designated as hedges.

Any derivative that is either not designated as a hedge, or is so designated but is ineffective as per Ind AS 109, is categorised as a financial asset or financial liability, at fair value through profit or loss.

Derivatives not designated as hedges are recognised initially at fair value and attributable transaction costs are recognised in the net profit in the Statement of Profit and Loss when incurred. Subsequent to initial recognition, these derivatives re-measured at fair value through profit or loss and the resulting exchange gains or losses are included in other income / other expenses. Assets / liabilities in this category are presented as current assets / current liabilities if they are either held for trading or are expected to be realised within 12 months after the Balance Sheet Date.

iv. Cash flow Hedges

The Group designates certain foreign exchange forward contracts / other derivative instruments as cash flow hedges to mitigate the risks of foreign exchanges exposure on highly probable forecast cash transactions.

When a derivative is designated as a cash flow hedge instrument, the effective portion of changes in the fair value of the derivative is recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the cash flow hedge reserve. Any ineffective portion of changes in the fair value of the derivative is recognized immediately in the net profit in the Statement of Profit and Loss. If the hedging instrument no longer meets the criteria for hedge accounting, then hedge accounting is discontinued prospectively. If the hedging instrument expires or sold, terminated or exercised, the cumulative gain or loss on the hedging instrument recognized in cash flow hedge reserve till the period the hedge was effective remains in cash flow hedge reserve until the forecasted transaction occurs. The cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in the cash flow hedge reserve is transferred to the net profit in the Statement of Profit and Loss upon the occurrence of the related forecasted transaction. If the forecasted transaction is no longer expected to occur, then the amount accumulated in cash flow hedge reserve is reclassified to net profit in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

v. Offsetting of financial assets and liabilities

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, and the net amount is presented in Balance Sheet when, and only when, the Group has a legal right to offset the recognized amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realize the assets and settle the liability simultaneously.

vi. Reclassification of financial assets

In case of any reclassification, the Group applies the reclassification prospectively and does not restate any previously recognized gains, losses (including impairment gains, or losses) or interest.

i) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, Plant and Equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation (except in case of freehold land which is not depreciated) and where applicable, accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that are directly attributable to acquisition of the asset. The cost of self-constructed assets includes the cost of materials, direct labour and any other costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to a working condition for its intended use, and the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located. For qualifying assets, borrowing costs are capitalised in accordance with Ind AS 23 - Borrowing costs.

When parts of an item of Property, Plant and Equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Property, Plant and Equipment which are not ready for intended use as on the date of Balance Sheet are disclosed as "Capital work-in-progress".

Gains and losses on disposal of an item of property plant and equipment are determined by comparing the proceeds from disposal with the carrying amount of Property, Plant and Equipment and are recognized net within "other income/other expenses" in the statement of profit and loss.

Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognized in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefit embodied within the part will flow to the Group and its cost can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is de-recognized. The cost of day to day servicing of property, plant and equipment are recognized in statement of profit or loss.

Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of profit and loss under straight line basis over the estimated Useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment. Leased assets are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives unless it is reasonably certain that the Group will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term. Assets costing ₹5000 or below acquired during the year considered not material are depreciated in full retaining Re.1 per asset. The Useful life has been considered in line with Schedule II except where based on technical estimates.

The depreciation method, useful lives and residual value are reviewed at each of the reporting date.

j) Goodwill

Goodwill on acquisitions is disclosed as a separate line item on the face of the balance sheet apart from 'Other Intangible Assets'. Goodwill is not amortised but it is tested for impairment annually, or more frequently if went or changes in circumstances indicate that it might be impaired, and is carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses. Gains and losses on the disposal of an entity include the carrying amount of goodwill relating to the entity sold.

Goodwill is initially recognised as an asset at cost and is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses.

For the purpose of impairment testing, goodwill is allocated to each of the Company's cash-generating units or groups of cash generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination. Cash-generating units to which goodwill has been allocated are tested for impairment annually, or more frequently when there is an indication that the unit's value may be impaired. If the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit is less than the carrying value of the unit, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying value of any goodwill allocated to the unit and then to the other assets of the unit in proportion to the carrying value of each asset in the unit.

k) Other Intangible assets

Intangible assets that are acquired by the Group, which have finite useful lives are measured at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the intangible asset.

Research costs are expensed as incurred. Development expenditures on an individual project / New Product Development are recognised as an intangible asset when the Group can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale
- Its intention to complete and its ability and intention to use or sell the asset
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits
- The availability of resources to complete the asset
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development

Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific asset to which it relates. All other expenditure, including expenditure on internally generated goodwill and brands, are recognized in the statement of profit and loss.

Amortization of intangible asset with finite useful lives

Amortization is recognized in the statement of profit and loss on a straight line basis over the estimated useful lives of intangible assets from the date that they are available to use based on the estimates made by the management w.r.t the useful life and residual value. Estimated useful life:

Amortization methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

l) Investment Properties

Investment properties are properties held to earn rentals and/or for capital appreciation (including property under construction for such purposes) and that is not meant for use by the Group. Investment properties are measured initially at cost, including transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment properties are measured in accordance with cost model.

An investment property is derecognized upon disposal or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefits are expected from the disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the property (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the period in which the property is derecognized.

Investment properties are depreciated using the straight-line method over their estimated useful life.

The useful life of Investment properties - Buildings have been estimated at 30 years. The useful life has been determined based on technical evaluation performed by management expert. Based on management's estimate, the residual value has been considered as NIL.

m) Leases

Where the Company is the lessee

At the inception of a contract, the Group assesses whether the contract is a lease or not. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a time in exchange for a consideration.

The Group determines the lease term as the non-cancellable period of a lease, together with both periods covered by an option to extend the lease if the Group is reasonably certain to exercise that option; and periods covered by an option to terminate the lease if the Group is reasonably certain not to exercise that option.

The Group recognizes a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received. The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments at the commencement date, discounted using the Group's incremental borrowing rate.

Right of use assets are evaluated for recoverability whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that their carrying amounts may not be recoverable. For the purpose of impairment testing, the recoverable amount (i.e. the higher of the fair value less cost to sell and the value-in-use) is determined on an individual asset basis unless the asset does not generate cash flows that are largely independent of those from other assets. In such cases, the recoverable amount is determined for the Cash Generating Unit (CGU) to which the asset belongs.

The Group has elected not to recognize right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases for which the underlying asset is of low value. The Group recognizes the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense over the lease term.

Where the Company is the lessor

Leases are classified as finance leases when substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership transfer from the Group to the lessee. Amounts due from lessees under finance leases are recorded as receivables at the Group's net investment in the leases. Finance lease income is allocated to accounting periods so as to reflect a constant periodic rate of return on the net investment outstanding in respect of the lease.

Leases in which the Group does not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset are classified as operating leases. Rental income from operating lease is recognised on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease. Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating and arranging an operating lease are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognised over the lease term on the same basis as rental income.

n) Inventories

Holding Company and Subsidiaries in India

Inventories consisting of stores and spares, raw materials, work in progress, and finished goods are valued at the lower of cost (determined using Weighted average method) and net realizable value.

Subsidiary outside India

Inventories consisting of traded finished goods are valued at the lower of cost (determined using FIFO method) and net realizable value.

Cost comprises the fair value of consideration for the purchase and all directly attributable costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and estimated cost necessary to make the sale.

Cost includes direct material cost, direct labour cost, taxes and duties (other than duties and taxes for which input credit is available), freight, other direct expenses and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overhead expenditure.

Cost of the purchased inventory is determined after deducting rebates and discounts. Provision is made for obsolete, non-moving & defective stocks, wherever necessary.

o) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognized on their accrual and when no significant uncertainty on measurability or collectability exists.

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the performance obligations towards customers have been met at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Group believes it is entitled to in exchange for the transfer of goods to customers i.e., Transaction price, net of any sales returns and GST. Variable consideration in the form of trade discounts and volume rebates are netted off from revenue. Performance obligations are deemed to have been met when the control of goods has been transferred to the customer, depending on the individual terms of the contract with customers.

Considering the general terms of sales, there is no significant financing element included in the sales consideration.

Subsidies on export and other incentives

Government Subsidies and incentives, in the nature of Business Support Subsidy and **RODTEP** (Remission of Duties or Taxes on Export Products) are recognized when there is a reasonable assurance that the condition attaching to the incentive would be complied with and incentives will be recognized. Government grant received relating to assets are treated as Deferred Revenue and are recognized over the period in which the economic benefit is expected from such assets.

p) Employee benefits

Employee benefits are accrued in the period in which the associated services are rendered by employees of the Group, as detailed below:

i. Defined contribution plan (including Provident fund)

In accordance with Indian law, eligible employees receive benefit from various defined contribution plans. The employee and / or employer make periodic contributions to these plans. The companies have no further obligations under the plan beyond its monthly contributions. Obligation for contributions to these plans are recognized as employee benefit expenses in the statement of profit and loss when incurred.

ii. Defined benefit plan (gratuity)

In accordance with applicable Indian laws, the Group provides for gratuity, which is a defined benefit retirement plan covering eligible employees. The Gratuity Plan provides a lump sum payment to vested employees, at retirement or termination of employment, an amount based on the respective employee's last drawn salary and the years of employment with the company. The Group's net obligation in respect of the gratuity plan is calculated by estimating the amount of future benefits that the employees have earned in return for their service in the current and prior periods; that benefit is discounted to determine its present value. Any unrecognized past service cost and the fair value of plan assets are deducted. The discount rate is the yield at the reporting date on risk free government bonds that have maturity dates approximating the terms of the Group's obligations. The calculation is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method. When the calculation results in a benefit to the Group, the recognized asset is limited to the total of any unrecognized past service costs and the present value of economic benefit available in the form of any future refunds from the plan or reductions in the future contributions to the plan.

The Group recognizes all re-measurements of net defined benefit liability / asset directly in other comprehensive income and presented within retained earning under equity.

iii. Short term benefits

Short term employee benefit obligations are measured on an undiscounted basis and are expensed as the related service is provided. A liability is recognized for the amount expected to be paid under short term cash bonus or profit sharing plans if the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

iv. Compensated absences

The employees of the Group are entitled to compensated absence. The employees can carry forward a portion of the unutilized accrued absence and utilize it in future periods or receive cash compensation at retirement or termination of employment for the unutilized accrued compensated absence. The Group recognizes an obligation for compensated absences in the period in which the employee renders the services. The Group provides for the expected cost of compensated absence in statement of profit or loss as additional amount that the Group expects to pay as a result of the unused entitlement that has accumulated based on actuarial valuations carried out by an independent actuary at the balance sheet date.

v. Termination benefits

Termination benefits, in the nature of voluntary retirement benefits or termination benefits are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. The Group recognises termination benefits at the earlier of the following dates:

- i) When the Group can no longer withdraw the offer of those benefits; or
- ii) When the Group recognises costs for a restructuring that is within the scope of Ind AS 37: Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets and involves the payment of termination benefits.

q) Finance Income and expense

Finance income comprises interest income on funds invested, dividend income, fair value gains on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Interest income is recognized using effective interest method. Dividend income is recognized in statement of profit and loss on the date when the Group's right to receive payment is established, which in the case of quoted securities is the ex-dividend date. Finance expense comprises interest expense on loans and borrowings, bank charges, unwinding of discount on provision, fair value losses on financial asset through FVTPL (if any) that are recognized in the statement of profit and loss.

r) Income taxes

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax expense is recognized in the statement of profit and loss except to the extent it relates to items recognized directly in equity or in other comprehensive income. Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax is recognized using the balance sheet method, providing for temporary differences between the carrying amount of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the amounts used for taxation purposes. Deferred tax is not recognized for the following temporary differences:

- (i) The initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction that is not a business combination and that affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss.
- (ii) Arising due to taxable temporary differences arising on the initial recognition of goodwill, as the same is not deductible for tax purposes.
- (iii) Arising due to taxable temporary differences arising on the initial recognition of goodwill, as the same is not deductible for tax purposes.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to be applied to temporary differences when they reverse, based on the laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax liabilities and assets, and they relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the same taxable entity.

A deferred tax asset is recognized to the extent it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the temporary difference can be utilized. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date and are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realized.

Deferred taxation arising on investments in subsidiaries and associates is recognized except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred taxation on temporary differences arising out of undistributed earnings of the equity-method accounted investee is recorded based on the management's intention. If the intention is to realize the undistributed earnings through sale, deferred tax is measured at the capital gains tax rates that are expected to be applied to temporary differences when they reverse. However, when the intention is to realize the undistributed earnings through dividend, the Investor company's share of the income and expenses of the equity-method accounted investee is recorded in the statement of profit and loss after considering any taxes on dividend payable by equity-method accounted investee or deferred tax is set up in the books if the tax liability is with the company.

s) Foreign Currency Transactions and balances

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recognized in the financial statements using exchange rate prevailing on the date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated to the relevant functional currency at the exchange rates prevailing at the reporting date. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies that are measured at fair value are re-translated to the functional currency at the exchange rate prevailing on the date that the fair value was determined. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in a foreign currency and measured at historical cost are translated at the exchange rate prevalent at the date of transaction. Foreign currency differences arising on translation are recognized in the statement of profit and loss for determination of net profit or loss during the period.

The results and financial position of subsidiaries, with a different functional currency, are translated into the presentation currency using the following procedures:

- (a) assets and liabilities for each balance sheet presented (i.e. including comparatives) are translated at the closing rate at the date of that balance sheet.
- (b) income and expenses for each statement of profit and loss presented (i.e. including comparatives) are translated at the average exchange rate for the period; and
- (c) all resulting exchange differences are recognised in other comprehensive income as Foreign Currency Translation Reserve (FCTR).

t) Fair value measurements

Ind AS requires the determination of fair value for both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. A fair value measurement assumes that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either in the principal market for the asset or liability or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The principal market or the most advantageous market must be accessible to the Group.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use. The Group uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data is available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole. The fair value hierarchy is described as below:

Level 1 - Unadjusted quoted prices in active market for identical assets and liabilities

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 - Unobservable outputs for the assets and liabilities

For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the financial statement at fair value on a recurring basis, the Group determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by reassessing categorization at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Group has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of fair value hierarchy.

Fair values have been determined for measurement and/or disclosures purposes based on the following methods. When applicable, further information about the assumptions made in determining fair values is disclosed in the notes specific to that asset or liability.

(i) Investments in equity securities

The fair value is determined by reference to their quoted price at the reporting period. In the absence of quoted price, the fair value of the financial asset is measured using valuation techniques.

(ii) Trade and other receivable

The fair value of trade and other receivables is estimated as the present value of future cash flows, discounted at the market rate of interest at the reporting date except trade receivables which do not contain a significant financing component (determined in accordance with Ind AS 115 Revenue from Contracts with Customers) are measured at undiscounted invoice price (i.e., transaction price) and not at fair value. However, in respect of such financial statements, fair value generally approximates the carrying amount due to the short-term nature of such assets. This fair value is determined for disclosure purpose or when acquired in a business combination.

(iii) Security Deposits

Any Security deposits paid by the Group are discounted to their fair value and thereafter accounted on amortised cost method over the tenure of the deposits.

(iv) Derivatives

The fair value of forward exchange contracts is based on quoted price. Fair value reflects the credit risk of the instrument and includes adjustments to take account of the credit risk of the Group and the counter party when appropriate.

(v) Non-derivative financial liabilities

Fair value, which is determined for disclosure purposes, is calculated based on the present value of future principal and interest cash flow discounted at the market rate of interest at the reporting date. For leases, the applicable rate of interest is determined by reference to incremental borrowings rate.

u) Current and non-current classification

An asset is classified as current if:

- (a) it is expected to be realized or sold or consumed in the Group's normal operating cycle;
- (b) it is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- (c) it is expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting period; or
- (d) it is cash or cash equivalent unless it is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current if:

- (a) it is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle;
- (b) it is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- (c) it is expected to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period;
- (d) it has no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

v) Segment Reporting

Operating segments are identified and reported taking into account the different risks and returns, the organization structure and the internal reporting systems to the chief operating decision maker. The Holding Company's business activity falls within a single reportable business segment, viz, Automotive Tyres, Tubes and Flaps. Geographical segments are considered as India and rest of the world. Subsidiaries revenues and assets do not meet the criteria for reportable segment as prescribed in the standards. Non-Reportable segments have not been disclosed as unallocated reconciling item in view of materiality.

w) Warranty

Provision is made for estimated warranty claims in respect of products sold which are still under warranty at the end of the reporting period. Management estimates the provision based on historical warranty claim information and any recent trends that may suggest future claims could differ from historical amounts.

a. Details of Security for Secured Loans

Working Capital facilities availed from State Bank of India are secured by a first charge on the entire Current Assets of the Company viz Raw Materials, Semi-finished Goods, Finished Goods, Stores, Spares, Trade Receivables, and Other Current Assets. Interest rate charged is the half-yearly MCLR + 0.15%, with a half-yearly reset.

Working capital loans availed by subsidiary (TVS Sensing Solutions Private limited) represents cash credit, working capital demand loans, bills discounted and packing credit facilities from banks which are secured by a hypothecation of inventories and receivables both present and future and by way of equitable mortgage by deposit of title deeds of the Company's immovable properties situated at Madurai.

The Company has a revolving credit facility with State Bank of India, Chicago for USD 6 million, renewable annually. The facility carries an interest rate of 1.35% over the 90 day Secured Overnight Financing Rate (SOFR) and is secured by a guarantee issued by State Bank of India, Chennai for 110% of the value of the facility.

Interest Rates Risk:

The defined benefit obligation calculated uses a discount rate based on government bonds. If bond yields fall, the defined benefit obligation will tend to increase. Thus the plan exposes the Company to the risk of fall in interest rates. Some times, the fall can be permanent, due to a paradigm shift in interest rate scenarios because of economic or fiscal reasons. A fall in interest rates will result in an increase in the ultimate cost of providing the above benefit and will thus result in an increase in the value of the liability (as shown in financial statements). Even for funded schemes, a paradigm downward shift in bond yields may affect the reinvestment yields and may increase ultimate costs.

Investment Risk:

For funded plans that rely on insurers for managing the assets, the value of assets certified by the insurer may not be the fair value of instruments backing the liability. In such cases, the present value of the assets is independent of the future discount rate. This can result in wide fluctuations in the net liability or the funded status if there are significant changes in the discount rate during the inter-valuation period.

Salary Risk:

The present value of the defined benefit plan is calculated with the assumption of salary escalation rate(SER), which is applied to find the salary of plan participants in future, at the time of separation Higher than expected increases in salary will increase the defined benefit obligation and will have an exponential effect.

Demographic Risk:

Demographic assumptions are required to assess the timing and probability of a payment taking place. This is the risk of volatility of results due to unexpected nature of decrements that include mortality, attrition, disability and retirement. The effects of this decrement on the DBO depend upon the combination salary increase, discount rate, and vesting criteria and therefore not very straight forward. It is important not to overstate withdrawal rate because the cost of retirement benefit of a short serving employees will be less compared to long service employees.

(i) Forward and cross currency swap contract

Foreign exchange forward contracts and cross currency swap contracts are entered to mitigate the risk of changes in foreign exchange rates associated with certain payables, receivables and forecasted transactions denominated in certain foreign currencies. The Group's exposure to the risk of changes in foreign exchange rates relates primarily to the Group's operating activities (when revenue or expense

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is denominated in a foreign currency). The Group manages its foreign currency risk by using foreign currency forward contracts and currency swaps. When a derivative is entered into for the purpose of being a hedge, the Group negotiates the terms of those derivatives to match the terms of the hedged exposure. For hedges of forecast transactions, the derivatives cover the period of exposure from the point the cash flows of the transactions are forecasted up to the point of settlement of the resulting receivable or payable that is denominated in the foreign currency. 43. Financial risk management

The Group has exposure to the following risks from its use of financial instruments

43.1 Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Group. The Group has adopted a policy of dealing only with creditworthy counterparties and obtaining sufficient collateral, where appropriate, as a means of mitigating the risk of financial loss from defaults.

Trade receivables consist of a large number of customers, spread across diverse industries and geographical areas. Ongoing credit evaluation is performed on the financial condition of accounts receivable.

Credit risk is managed by the Management. Considering the credit risk assessment made by the management and based on past history, provision for receivables amounting to ₹4.65 crores (PY ₹2.39 crores) has been made under the simplified approach.

43.2 Liquidity risk

The Group manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate reserves, banking facilities and reserve borrowing facilities, by continuously monitoring forecast and actual cash flows, and by matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities.

43.3 Market risk

Market risk is the risk or uncertainty arising from possible market price movements and their impact on the future performance of a business. The major components of market risk are commodity price risk, foreign currency exchange risk and interest rate risk.

43.3.1 Commodity Price Risk - The primary commodity price risks that the Group is exposed to include rubber prices that could adversely affect the value of the Group's financial assets or expected future cash flows.

43.3.2 Foreign currency risk management - The Group imports raw materials from outside India as well as make export sales to countries outside India. The Group is, therefore, exposed to foreign currency risk principally arising out of foreign currency movement against the Indian Currency. Foreign currency exchange risks are managed by entering into forward contracts against firm purchase commitment and receivables.

43.3.3 Interest rate risk management

The Group is exposed to interest rate risk because of borrowal of short term funds at floating interest rates.

Interest rate sensitivity analysis

If interest rates had been 50 basis points higher/lower and all other variables were held constant, the Group's Profit for the year ended March 31st, 2026 would decrease/increase by ₹3.12 crores; as against ₹3.36 crores for the year ended March 31st, 2025.

44. Capital Management

For the purpose of the Group's capital management, capital includes issued equity capital, securities premium, general reserve and all other equity reserves attributable to the equity holders of the group. The primary objective of the Group's capital management is to maximise the shareholder value.

The Group manages its capital structure and makes adjustments in light of changes in economic conditions and the requirements of borrowings and related covenants. The Group monitors capital using a gearing ratio, which is net debt divided by fund attributable to Equity Shares Holders. 47. Exceptional Item -

- (i) The Holding Company had a Voluntary Retirement Scheme for its employees. Under this scheme, the holding company has received and approved applications for a sum of ₹5.36 crores in the current year (PY ₹5.30 crores)
- (ii) The Government of India had notified four Labour Codes which became effective from 21st November 2025. Final central rules were notified on 8th May 2026, while notification of state rules including those for Tamil Nadu is awaited.

To comply with the above, the Group had taken an actuarial valuation in accordance with Ind AS 19 - Employee Benefits, read with relevant guidance issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India, and had recognized an incremental obligation of ₹11.09 crores as past-service cost during the year. Considering the non-recurring nature of the impact arising on first-time application of the Labour Codes, the same has been disclosed as an exceptional item.

The Group is in the process of evaluating and implementing the necessary changes in the employee benefit policies and will continue to monitor further regulatory developments including notifications of state rules and additional clarifications to assess the consequential financial impact, if any.

- (iii) The holding company has received interim eligibility certificate from State Industries Promotion Corporation of Tamil Nadu Limited (SIPCOT) for a structured package of assistance in the form of an Investment Promotion Capital Subsidy (the "Grant"), which was sanctioned by the State Government of Tamil Nadu in November 2021. The Grant will be received over 12 years, in equal annual instalments, subject to fulfilment of Grant related conditions as laid down by the Government.

The Company has adopted Income Approach as laid down in Ind AS 20 "Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance" for accounting the aforementioned Grant. Accordingly grant income of ₹18.81 crores attributable towards completed useful life of eligible assets upto March 31, 2025 recognised under exceptional item.

- (iv) The holding company has received eligibility certificate from State Industries Promotion Corporation of Tamil Nadu Limited (SIPCOT) for a structured package of assistance in the form of an Green Industry Incentive (the "Grant"), which was sanctioned by the State Government of Tamil Nadu in November 2021. This is a one-time Grant.

The holding company has adopted Income Approach as laid down in Ind AS 20 "Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance" for accounting the aforementioned Grant. Accordingly grant income of ₹0.08 crores attributable to the financial year 2024-25 recognised under exceptional item.

- (v) During the year, the subsidiary, Super Grip Corporation, incurred severance expenses aggregating to ₹0.45 Crore on account of the separation of certain employees during the period.
- (vi) During the year 2024-25, The Regional Provident Fund Commissioner, Madurai issued final orders under Section 7-A of the Employees' Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 to holding company for provident fund applicability on certain salary/wages components for the period April 2012 to July 2017. Potential additional liability arising out of the aforesaid orders has been estimated and accounted for as exceptional item amounting to ₹6.10 crores during the year ended March 31, 2025.

48. Impairment testing of Intangibles with Indefinite life

Ind AS 36 mandates that Goodwill acquired in a business combination shall be tested for Impairment annually, irrespective of whether there are any indications of impairment. Goodwill shall be allocated to each of the Cash Generating Units (CGUs) that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, and all CGUs to which goodwill has been allocated are to be tested for impairment. Cash Generating Unit (CGU) is the smallest identifiable group of assets that generates cash inflows largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For the purpose of impairment testing, the entire subsidiary company (SGC) has been treated as a single CGU, given its operation in a single line of business with interdependent activities and no segment generating largely independent cash inflows. Management has conducted the annual impairment assessment as of March 31, 2026, using the value-in-use ("VIU") approach to estimate the recoverable amount of the entity. The assessment indicated that the recoverable amount exceeded the carrying value, and therefore, no impairment loss was recognized.

The impairment assessment was based on the approved business plan effective at the assessment date, which includes a five-year cash flow forecast. These forecasts incorporate growth rates driven primarily by the Company's Cycle Plan assumptions, historical performance data, and management's expectations of future market developments through 2029.

Key Assumptions:

The assessment of impairment is based on forecasts of future cashflows which are inherently uncertain and are developed using informed assumptions such as historical trends and market information. The key assumptions are:

Discount Rate:

The pre-tax discount rate is derived at 12.24% through an iterative process, ensuring that the value-in-use (VIU) based on pre-tax cash flows and a pre-tax discount rate equals the VIU based on post-tax cash flows and a post-tax discount rate.

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The post-tax discount rate represents the Weighted Average Cost of Capital (WACC), calculated using prevailing market weights of debt and equity for the rubber and tire industry, adjusted by a company-specific risk premium incorporated to account for risks unique to the company's operations.

The cost of debt is derived from Moody's corporate bond yield for a company rated BAA, which is subsequently adjusted for the tax shield available on interest expenses. This approach reflects a market-based cost of debt aligned with the company's credit risk profile.

The cost of equity is determined using the Capital Asset Pricing Model. The risk-free rate is represented by the yield on 10-year Treasury bills. The return required for market risk is captured by applying the market risk premium, which is scaled by the levered beta for the rubber and tyre industry to reflect industry-specific volatility. In addition, a size premium is incorporated to account for the illiquidity and additional return expectations associated with companies of comparable size.

Growth rate:

Revenue is projected to grow at a Compounded Annual Growth Rate (CAGR) of 28.14% over the five-year forecast period. This estimate is based on detailed forecasted financial statements, which incorporate the Company's planned sales initiatives and marketing strategies. For the terminal value calculation, a growth rate of 3% has been applied. This rate is conservative compared to the tyre industry's long-term growth trends, reflecting prudent assumptions about future market conditions.

Sensitivity to Key Assumptions:

The recoverable amount is not expected to fall below the carrying amount for a reasonably plausible change in any of the key assumptions.

53. The Government of Tamil Nadu (GoTN) has sanctioned a structured package of assistance to the Holding Company under the Tamil Nadu Industrial Policy 2021. The Holding Company is entitled to a Fixed Capital Subsidy (referred to as "Phase I") at the rate of 15% of Eligible Fixed Assets, subject to a maximum of ₹75.00 crores, payable over a period of 12 years in equal annual instalments upon fulfilment and continued compliance with the prescribed investment and employment conditions.

The deferred grant income will be recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss on a systematic basis over the useful life of the related assets.
