The directors have pleasure in presenting 12th Annual Report together with the Audited Financial Statement of the Company for the Financial Year (FY) ended March 31, 2026.

2. RESULT OF OPERATIONS AND STATE OF THE COMPANY'S AFFAIRS

The Company is mainly engaged in the business of processing and trading of cashew kernels and other dry fruit products and ice cream products through its subsidiary.

STANDALONE:

On a Standalone basis, the Company's total income for the year under review was Rs. **21,195.28** Lakhs as compared to Rs. **17,546.01** Lakhs in the previous year thereby registering growth of 20.79% over the previous year. Further, during the year under review the net profits of the Company was Rs. **2,078.76** Lakhs as compared to Rs. **1,353.56** Lakhs in the previous year.

CONSOLIDATED:

On a Consolidated basis, the Company's total income for the year under review is Rs. **30,440.69** Lakh as compared to Rs. **20,630.51** Lakh in the previous year thereby registering growth of 47.55% over the previous year.

The Consolidated Audited Financial Statement of the Company and its Subsidiaries for FY 2025-26 are prepared in compliance with the provisions of Section 129(3) of The Companies Act, 2013 ("Act") and Regulation 33 of the Securities Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("Listing Regulations") and form part of the Annual Report.

Material Events during the year:

Listing on Main Board:

During the financial year 2025-26, the Company successfully migrated from the SME platform of the National Stock Exchange of India Limited (NSE Emerge) to the Main Board of the NSE.

Further, the Company also got listed on the Main Board of the BSE.

The equity shares of the Company were originally listed on the NSE Emerge platform on March 31, 2022. With consistent growth in operations, financial performance, and investor confidence, the Company met all the eligibility criteria prescribed by the Stock Exchanges and the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) for migration to the Main Board.

Pursuant to the necessary approvals received from the shareholders and the stock exchanges, the equity shares of the Company were admitted to trading on the Main Board of NSE and BSE with effect from Friday, June 20, 2025.

The migration to the Main Board marks a significant milestone in the Company's growth journey. This step is expected to enhance the visibility of the Company in the capital markets, improve liquidity for shareholders, and broaden the investor base.

The Board places on record its sincere appreciation to all stakeholders, including shareholders, regulatory authorities, and employees, for their continued support and trust in the Company.

Issue of Partly paid-up Right Issue:

During the year under review, your Company undertook a Rights Issue of equity shares to strengthen its capital base and support future growth plans.

The Board of Directors, at its meeting held on November 26, 2025, approved the issuance of equity shares on a rights basis in accordance with the provisions of Section 23(1)(c) read with Section 62(1)(a) and other applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the applicable provisions of the SEBI (Issue of Capital and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations.

Subsequently, the Board, at its meeting held on December 11, 2025, approved the detailed terms and conditions of the Rights Issue, including the Rights Entitlement, Issue Price, Record Date, timing of the Issue and other related matters.

The key terms of the Rights Issue are as follows:

- Total Issue Size: Up to 33,33,160 partly paid-up Rights Equity Shares
- Rights Entitlement Ratio: 45 Rights Equity Shares for every 301 fully paid-up equity shares held by eligible shareholders as on the Record Date
- Record Date: December 17, 2025
- Face Value: ₹10 per Equity Share
- Issue Price: ₹300 per Rights Equity Share (including a premium of ₹290 per share)

Pursuant to the above, the Company has allotted 33,33,160 partly paid-up Rights Equity Shares on January 8, 2026.

On application, an amount of ₹105 per Rights Equity Share (including face value of ₹3.50 and securities premium of ₹101.50 per share) was received from the applicants.

The Rights Issue was undertaken in compliance with applicable laws and regulations, and the proceeds are proposed to be utilized for the objects as stated in the Letter of Offer.

3. MATERIAL EVENTS WHICH HAVE OCCURRED BETWEEN THE END OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR OF THE COMPANY AND THE DATE OF THE REPORT:**Approval of the First and Final Call on Partly Paid-up Rights Equity Shares:**

Subsequent to the close of the financial year, the Rights Issue Committee approved the **First and Final Call of ₹195/- per partly paid-up Rights Equity Share**, aggregating to **₹64,99,66,200/-**, and fixed **July 13, 2026** as the Record Date, with the payment period from **July 21, 2026 to August 4, 2026**.

Subsequent to the close of the financial year, upon receipt of **₹54,05,65,935/-** towards the First and Final Call, the Rights Issue Committee, at its meeting held on **August 5, 2026**, approved the conversion of **27,72,120 partly paid-up equity shares into fully paid-up equity shares of ₹10/- each**. Consequent to the said conversion, the paid-up equity share capital of the Company

increased to ₹25,06,72,610/-, comprising 2,50,67,261 fully paid-up equity shares and 5,61,040 partly paid-up equity shares.

Subsequent to the close of the financial year, **27,72,095 partly paid-up equity shares of face value ₹10/- each were converted into fully paid-up equity shares** pursuant to receipt of the applicable call money. The said equity shares were admitted for trading on **BSE Limited and the National Stock Exchange of India Limited (NSE)** with effect from **August 18, 2026**. The shares rank **pari passu** with the existing fully paid-up equity shares of the Company in all respects.

The Board has approved the partial utilisation of funds received from the proceeds of the Rights Issue towards the ice cream division by way of providing an additional loan of Rs. 25 Crore to Melt 'N' Mellow Foods Private Limited, a subsidiary of the Company, subject to applicable approvals and necessary formalities. The funds would be utilised for strengthening cold chain by way of deployment of 10,000 additional deep freezers. Further board has approved an additional loan of Rs. 10 crores subject to approval of members for future working capital requirement.

Except as stated above, there were no other material events or changes affecting the financial position of the Company that occurred between the end of the financial year and the date of this Report.

The Board of Directors, at its meeting held on **May 04, 2026**, recommended a final dividend of **₹0.35 per fully paid-up Equity Share of face value ₹10/- each** for the financial year ended **March 31, 2026**. In respect of the partly paid-up Rights Equity Shares, the dividend shall be payable proportionately to the amount paid-up thereon, i.e., **₹0.1225 per partly paid-up Equity Share**. Accordingly, the total dividend amounts to **₹82,11,611.45/-**, subject to the approval of the Members at the ensuing Annual General Meeting.

The dividend, if approved, shall be payable to those Members whose names appear in the Register of Members by the Depositories as on the Record Date fixed for this purpose.

During the year under review, there has increase its Authorised Share Capital of the Company from existing Rs. 24,50,00,000/- (Rupees Twenty-Four Crores and Fifty Lakhs only) divided into 2,45,00,000 (Two Crore Forty-Five Lakhs) equity shares of Rs. 10/- (Rupees Ten) each to Rs. 30,00,00,000/- (Rupees Thirty Crores Only) divided into 3,00,00,000 (Three Crores) equity shares of Rs. 10/- (Rupees Ten) each ranking pari-passu in all respect with the existing Equity Shares of the Company.

Consequently, the paid-up equity share capital of the Company increased from ₹22,29,51,410/- (Rupees Twenty-Two Crore Twenty-Nine Lakh Fifty-One Thousand Four Hundred and Ten only), comprising 2,22,95,141 (Two Crore Twenty-Two Lakh Ninety-Five Thousand One Hundred and Forty-One) equity shares of ₹10/- each, to ₹25,06,72,610/- (Rupees Twenty-Five Crore Six Lakh Seventy-Two Thousand Six Hundred and Ten only).

According to the IMF's April 2026 World Economic Outlook, global growth is projected at 3.1% in 2026 and 3.2% in 2027. While the global economy continues to demonstrate resilience, geopolitical tensions in the Middle East, elevated commodity prices, trade fragmentation, and tighter financial conditions remain key risks. Global inflation is expected to moderate gradually from approximately 4.1% in 2025 to 3.8% in 2026, indicating easing cost pressures, although still above pre-pandemic levels. Energy price volatility and supply-chain disruptions may continue to create near-term uncertainties across markets.

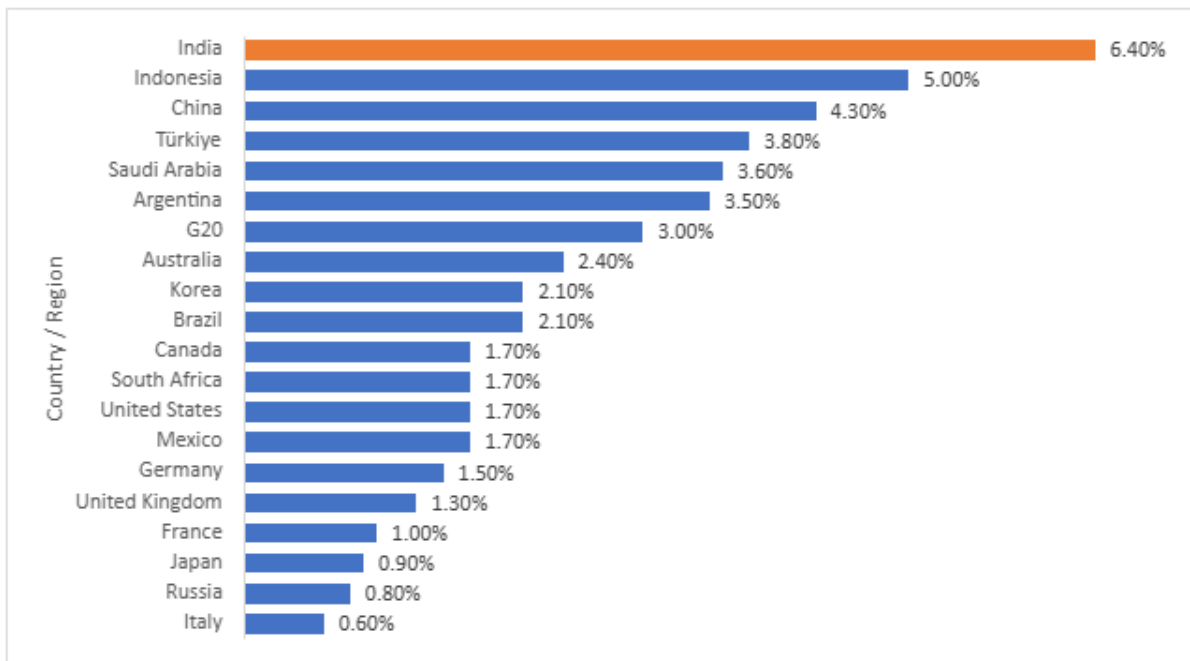
At the same time, ongoing investments in technology, artificial intelligence, and digital infrastructure, coupled with improving financial conditions in several economies, are expected to support economic activity. However, geopolitical developments continue to pose downside risks through their impact on energy markets, global trade routes, and supply chains, influencing input costs and inflation across industries, including food and FMCG.

2. Indian Economic Overview

India continued to be the fastest-growing major economy in FY26, with real GDP growth estimated at approximately 7.7%, supported by resilient domestic demand, robust government capital expenditure, strong services exports, and improving private investment activity. Growth in Q4 FY26 stood at 7.8%, reflecting the strength of the country's macroeconomic fundamentals despite global uncertainties. India remains well-positioned to sustain long-term growth driven by favourable demographics, rising incomes, urbanisation, digital adoption, and ongoing economic formalisation.

Inflation moderated during FY26, supporting household purchasing power and improving consumption demand across categories. Continued investments in infrastructure, logistics, digital payments, and connectivity are enhancing supply-chain efficiency and improving market access across urban and rural India. These structural developments are expected to support long-term economic growth and create a favourable operating environment for organised consumer-focused businesses.

The Indian consumption story remains a key growth driver. Rising disposable incomes, rapid urbanisation, and expanding middle-class households are fuelling demand across discretionary consumption categories. Importantly, consumption growth is no longer limited to metropolitan areas; Tier II, III, and IV cities are emerging as significant demand centres, supported by increasing digital penetration, improved connectivity, and rising discretionary spending. The continued growth of e-commerce and quick commerce platforms is accelerating the shift towards organised and branded consumption across categories.

The continued formalisation of the economy, aided by GST implementation and digitisation, is strengthening organised businesses and enhancing market transparency. Additionally, evolving consumer preferences, greater product accessibility, and faster delivery cycles are reshaping consumption patterns across urban and rural markets.

While risks such as crude oil price volatility and global economic uncertainties persist, India's strong domestic demand, favourable demographics, policy support, and expanding digital ecosystem position it well for sustained long-term growth.

3. Indian Sector Overview and Growth Outlook

(i) FMCG Sector

India's FMCG sector continues to expand steadily, supported by rising consumption, increasing penetration of branded products, and evolving consumer preferences. The sector is undergoing a structural transformation, characterized by a shift from unorganized to organized players and from loose to packaged consumption.

Urban markets continue to drive premiumisation, while rural markets are witnessing stronger demand growth and increasing penetration of branded products. According to NielsenIQ, premiumisation, modern trade, e-commerce, and quick commerce channels are reshaping consumer purchasing behaviour and accelerating the growth of organized FMCG players. Companies with strong brands, wider distribution networks, and continuous product innovation are well-positioned to capitalize on these emerging consumption trends.

(ii) Dry Fruits & Nuts Industry

The Indian dry fruits and nuts market continues to benefit from increasing health consciousness, rising disposable incomes, premiumisation, and evolving dietary preferences. Consumers are increasingly incorporating nuts and dry fruits into their daily nutrition regimes due to their high protein, fibre, and micronutrient content.

The industry is witnessing a significant shift towards branded and hygienically packaged products, particularly in Tier II, III, and IV markets. Value-added offerings such as flavoured nuts, roasted variants, trail mixes, and ready-to-consume packs are gaining traction, creating opportunities for organised players with strong sourcing and processing capabilities.

Industry estimates suggest that the Indian dry fruits and nuts market is projected to grow at approximately 8.5%-9.0% CAGR, expanding from approximately USD 2.2 billion in 2025 to nearly USD 4.7 billion by 2034, supported by increasing consumption beyond festive occasions and growing penetration of branded products.

(iii) Ice Cream Industry

India's ice cream market remains one of the fastest-growing categories within the FMCG sector. Rising disposable incomes, urbanisation, increasing youth consumption, premiumisation, product innovation, and expansion of cold-chain infrastructure continue to drive category growth.

The industry is gradually transitioning from a seasonal consumption category to a year-round indulgence segment, aided by modern retail, quick commerce platforms, and improving cold-chain penetration. Premium and innovative offerings are witnessing particularly strong demand among younger consumers.

Industry estimates suggest that the Indian ice cream market is projected to grow at approximately 16% CAGR, expanding from approximately USD 3.8 billion in 2025 to nearly USD 14.5 billion by 2034,

creating significant opportunities for organised brands with strong distribution and product innovation capabilities.

4. Company Overview

Krishival Foods Limited is a fast-growing FMCG company specializing in premium nuts, dry fruits, and ice cream, operating under two distinct brands—Krishival Nuts and Melt N Mellow.

Since its inception, the Company has built a diversified and scalable business model, catering to both health-focused and indulgence-driven consumption segments. The dual-brand strategy enables the Company to address a wide consumer base while ensuring operational synergies and risk diversification.

The Company has established a strong presence across multiple distribution channels, including general trade, modern trade, e-commerce, and quick commerce platforms, while also initiating its export journey.

As of FY26, the Company operates through two high-growth consumer brands, offering more than 67 SKUs in nuts and dry fruits and over 189 SKUs in ice cream. The Company serves more than 45,000 retail touchpoints across its businesses and has established a presence across 300+ towns and places in India, supported by an extensive cold-chain network and expanding distribution infrastructure.

5. Business and Operational Performance

Krishival Foods delivered strong operational performance during FY26, driven by capacity expansion, distribution growth, enhanced manufacturing capabilities, and sustained focus on product innovation across both business segments.

During FY26, the Company significantly strengthened its market presence:

- Krishival Nuts expanded its retail footprint to over 11,000 touchpoints.
- Melt N Mellow expanded to over 34,200 retail touchpoints across Maharashtra, Karnataka, Telangana, Andhra Pradesh and Goa.
- The Company's cold-chain infrastructure grew to 15,490 deep freezers, substantially enhancing product availability and last-mile delivery capabilities.
- The overall network now spans more than 300 towns and places across India, along with an expanding international presence in Singapore.

The Company continued to strengthen its product portfolio through innovation and new product development, catering to evolving consumer preferences across both business segments. Melt N Mellow now ranks among the brands with the highest SKU counts in the Indian ice cream industry, reflecting the Company's strong innovation capabilities.

Operationally, FY26 marked a significant milestone with the commissioning of a new 35,000 sq. ft. processing facility at Halkarni, Kolhapur, which became operational in April 2026. This expansion increased the nuts processing capacity from 10 MT per day to 20 MT per day. The Company has laid

out a phased roadmap to further expand capacity to 40 MT per day over the next two years, supporting future growth requirements.

In the ice cream business, the Company operates a state-of-the-art manufacturing facility in Chatrapati Sambhaji Nagar with a production capacity of 1 lakh litres per day, supported by integrated dairy and bakery operations and a dedicated R&D centre focused on flavour innovation and product development.

6. Financial Performance

The Company delivered its strongest-ever financial performance during FY26, driven by robust growth across both business segments, expanding distribution reach, improving operating leverage, and disciplined execution.

Total Revenue for FY26 stood at ₹304.41 crore, registering a growth of 48% over ₹206.31 crore in FY25. Revenue growth was supported by strong traction in the ice cream business, continued expansion in nuts and dry fruits, increasing retail penetration, and growing brand acceptance across markets.

Adjusted EBITDA (excluding one-time ESOP expense) increased by 66% to ₹41.95 crore from ₹25.25 crore in FY25. EBITDA margin improved by 130 basis points to 13.78%, reflecting better product mix, operating leverage, supply-chain efficiencies, and improving scale across operations.

Profit After Tax (PAT) increased by 64% to ₹22.20 crore compared to ₹13.55 crore in FY25. PAT margin improved to 7.59% from 6.70% in FY25, demonstrating the Company's ability to translate revenue growth into enhanced profitability.

6.1 Segment Performance

Nuts & Dry Fruits – Krishival Nuts

The Nuts & Dry Fruits segment continued to be the primary contributor to revenue and profitability during FY26. Segment revenue increased to ₹211 crore, supported by expanding retail reach, strong festive demand, and growing acceptance of premium branded products.

The business achieved EBITDA of approximately ₹33 crore and PAT of approximately ₹21 crore during FY26. A key milestone during the year was the achievement of a 10% PAT margin, reflecting the strength of the Company's sourcing capabilities, operating efficiencies, and disciplined execution.

Ice Cream – Melt N Mellow

Melt N Mellow emerged as the Company's fastest-growing business segment during FY26. Revenue increased by 95% year-on-year to ₹95.42 crore, while EBITDA improved to ₹7.1 crore, resulting in an EBITDA margin of 7%.

The most significant achievement during the year was the attainment of profitability ahead of management's original target timeline. Melt N Mellow achieved PAT-level profitability in FY26, one year ahead of expectations, demonstrating the scalability and operating efficiency of the business model.

The segment's growth was driven by expanded distribution, deeper freezer deployment, enhanced product offerings, and improving brand visibility across key markets.

Overall, FY26 marked a transition from an investment phase to a scale-up phase for Krishival Foods, supported by strong revenue growth, improving profitability, and enhanced operating leverage across both business verticals.

7. Key Business Drivers

The Company's growth is driven by a combination of structural and execution-led factors. Increasing penetration in Tier II, III, and IV markets, along with a strong focus on premium yet affordable products, continues to drive demand.

The Company's omnichannel distribution strategy, including modern trade, e-commerce, and quick commerce platforms, enhances accessibility and consumer reach. Additionally, product innovation and expansion into new categories and geographies further support growth.

The export business, currently focused on Singapore, is expected to scale further with planned expansion into markets such as the United States and Japan.

During FY26, the Company successfully completed a ₹100 crore Rights Issue. The proceeds are being deployed towards capacity expansion, supply chain strengthening, manufacturing infrastructure, and expansion of the deep freezer network. These investments are expected to support the next phase of growth and improve operational efficiencies across both business segments.

8. Risks

The Company operates in a dynamic environment and is exposed to various risks, including volatility in raw material prices, seasonality in certain product categories, and competitive pressures.

To mitigate these risks, the Company has adopted a diversified sourcing strategy across multiple geographies, integrated supply chain management practices, and disciplined cost-control measures. The dual-brand business model spanning nuts and ice cream categories provides additional resilience by reducing dependence on any single product segment and helping offset seasonality-related fluctuations.

9. Opportunities

- **Growth in Branded Dry Fruits & Nuts**

Increasing health awareness, premiumisation, and the shift towards branded and hygienically packaged food products continue to create significant opportunities in the dry fruits and nuts category. Rising consumption beyond festive occasions and growing penetration across Tier II, III, and IV markets are expected to support long-term growth.

- **Expansion of Organised Ice Cream Consumption**

India's ice cream market continues to witness strong growth driven by urbanisation, rising disposable incomes, premiumisation, and expanding cold-chain infrastructure. The Company's growing distribution network and product portfolio position it well to capitalize on these opportunities.

- **Distribution and Omnichannel Expansion**

Increasing adoption of e-commerce, quick commerce, and modern retail channels continues to improve product accessibility and consumer reach, creating opportunities for faster market penetration and brand building.

10. Internal Control Systems

The Company maintains adequate internal control systems and procedures designed to ensure operational efficiency, safeguarding of assets, accuracy of financial reporting, and compliance with applicable laws and regulations. These controls are regularly reviewed and strengthened to align with the evolving scale and complexity of operations.

The Company follows established policies and processes covering financial controls, procurement, inventory management, quality assurance, and risk management. Management periodically reviews the effectiveness of internal controls to ensure their adequacy and operating effectiveness.

11. Human Resources

The Company's workforce plays a critical role in driving growth, innovation, and operational excellence. With a team of over 200 employees, Krishival Foods focuses on capability building through structured training, continuous learning, leadership development, and performance-driven initiatives.

The Company remains committed to fostering a collaborative, inclusive, and merit-based work environment while strengthening future-ready capabilities across functions. Employee engagement, skill enhancement, and talent retention remain key priorities as the Company continues to scale its operations.

12. Future Outlook

Krishival Foods enters FY27 with strong growth momentum, enhanced manufacturing capabilities, and improving profitability across both business segments.

The Company remains focused on expanding distribution, increasing capacity utilisation, strengthening supply-chain integration, and driving product innovation. In the nuts business, the Company plans to continue capacity expansion towards its long-term target of 40 MT per day while deepening market penetration across Tier II, III and IV cities.

In the ice cream segment, Melt N Mellow is expected to remain a key growth driver. The Company plans to further expand its deep freezer network, strengthen its presence across core markets, and launch approximately 25 Franchise-Owned Company-Operated (FOCO) ice cream parlours under the "Mellow & Co." brand across Mumbai and Pune during FY27.

Company remains confident in the long-term growth prospects of both businesses and expects to benefit from increasing operating leverage, stronger brand visibility, expanding distribution reach, and improving capacity utilisation.

Supported by these strategic initiatives, the Company remains focused on delivering sustainable and profitable growth while creating long-term value for shareholders, customers, employees, and other stakeholders.

13. ESG and Sustainability

Krishival Foods remains committed to sustainable and responsible business practices.

1 General Information and Material Accounting Policies

1 General Information

Krishival Foods Limited (Formerly Known as Empyrean Cashews limited) was incorporated on March 21, 2014 and Company's Equity Share are listed on Main Board of National Stock Exchange (NSE) with effect from 20th June 2025. It is primarily engaged in the business of processing nuts and other dry fruits. The Registered office of the company is located at 1309, Lodha Supremus, Saki Vihar Road, Opp MTNL office, Mumbai 400072.

2 Material accounting policies

Material accounting policies adopted by the Company are as under:

2.1 Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

(a) Statement of Compliance with Ind AS

The Standalone Financial Statements of the company is prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended) ('Ind AS') as amended from time to time, other relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and presentation requirements of Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013, (Ind AS compliant Schedule III). Accordingly, the Company has prepared these Financial Statements which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31 March 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss, the Statement of Cash Flows and the Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended 31 March 2026, and a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information (together hereinafter referred to as 'financial statements').

The financial statements have been prepared using the material accounting policies and measurement bases summarised below. These accounting policies have been used throughout all periods presented in these financial statements, except where the Company has applied certain accounting policies and exemptions upon transition to Ind AS.

(b) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for certain financial instruments that are measured at fair values.

Classification into current and non-current:

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle (not exceeding twelve months) and other criteria set out in the Schedule III to the Act.

(c) Use of estimates

The preparation of the standalone financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires the use of estimates, judgements and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and the reported income and expenses during the year. Management believes that the estimates made in the preparation of the standalone financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognised prospectively in current, future periods and all periods presented in the standalone financial statements.. Refer Note 3 for detailed discussion on estimates and judgments.

2.2 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment, are stated at cost of acquisition or construction less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Freehold land is carried at cost and is not depreciated. Cost of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price net of any discounts and rebates, any import duties and other taxes (other than those subsequently recovered from the tax authorities), any directly attributable expenditure on making the asset ready for its intended use, other incidental expenses, decommissioning costs, if any, and interest on borrowings attributable to acquisition of qualifying asset up to the date the asset is ready for its intended use.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognized when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss during the year in which they are incurred.

Property, plant and equipment's residual values and useful lives are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and changes, if any, are treated as changes in accounting estimate.

Depreciation methods, estimated useful lives

Based on management's evaluation, useful life prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 represent actual useful life of property, plant and equipment. The Company uses straight-line method for building, plant and machinery and electrical installations and uses written down method for the remaining assets and has used following useful lives to provide depreciation of different class of its property, plant and equipment:

In respect of additions or extensions forming an integral part of existing assets and insurance spares, including incremental cost arising on account of translation of foreign currency liabilities for acquisition of Property, Plant and Equipment's, depreciation is provided as aforesaid over the residual life of the respective assets.

Depreciation on addition to property plant and equipment is provided on pro-rata basis from the date of acquisition. Depreciation on sale/deduction from property plant and equipment is provided up to the date preceding the date of sale, deduction as the case may be. Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in Statement of Profit and Loss under 'Other Income'.

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed periodically at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, as appropriate.

2.3 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are recorded at the consideration paid for the acquisition of such assets and are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment. Advances paid towards the acquisition of intangible assets outstanding at each balance sheet date are disclosed as other non-current assets.

Intangible assets in the Company comprises of computer software which has a useful life of 3 years.

Gains or losses arising from derecognition of an intangible asset are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognised.

The residual values, useful lives and methods of amortization of intangible assets are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Intangible assets with finite lives are assessed for impairment whenever there is an indication that the intangible asset may be impaired. The amortization period and the amortization method for an intangible asset with a finite useful life are reviewed at least at each financial year end.

2.4 Capital work in progress

Projects under which property, plant and equipment are not yet ready for their intended use are carried at cost, comprising direct cost and related incidental expenses.

2.5 Foreign Currency Transactions

(a) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates ('the functional currency'). The Company's Financial Statements are presented in Indian Rupees, which is also its functional currency and all values are rounded to the nearest lakhs ('00,000), except when otherwise indicated.

(b) Transactions and balances

On initial recognition, all foreign currency transactions are recorded by applying to the foreign currency amount the exchange rate between the functional currency and the foreign currency at the date of the transaction. Gains/Losses arising out of fluctuation in foreign exchange rate between the transaction date and settlement date are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

All monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are restated at the year end at the exchange rate prevailing at the year end and the exchange differences are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the dates of the initial transactions.

2.6 Fair value measurement

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability accessible to the Company.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is material to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1 — Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 — Inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the assets or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).
- Level 3 — Inputs for the assets or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

2.7 Revenue Recognition

Revenue from Contracts with Customers

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received/ receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government and is net of rebates and discounts. The Company assesses its revenue arrangements against specific criteria to determine if it is acting as principal or agent. The Company has concluded that it is acting as a principal in all of its revenue arrangements.

Revenue is recognised in the income statement to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue and costs, if applicable, can be measured reliably.

The Company has applied five step model as per Ind AS 115 'Revenue from contracts with customers' to recognise revenue in the standalone financial statements. The Company satisfies a performance obligation and recognises revenue over time, if one of the following criteria is met:

- a) The customer simultaneously receives and consumes the benefits provided by the Company's performance as the Company performs; or
- b) The Company's performance creates or enhances an asset that the customer controls as the asset is created or enhanced; or
- c) The Company's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Company and the entity has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date.

For performance obligations where one of the above conditions are not met, revenue is recognised at the point in time at which the performance obligation is satisfied.

Revenue is recognised either at point of time and over a period of time based on various conditions as included in the contracts with customers.

(i) Revenue from Operation

Expenses and income, not specifically referred to otherwise, are accounted for on accrual basis.

(ii) Finance Income

Interest Income is recognised on a basis of effective interest method as set out in Ind AS 109, Financial Instruments, and where no material uncertainty as to measurability or collectability exists. Dividend income is accounted for when the right to receive it is established.

(iii) Revenue from transportation

Revenue from transportation is recognised when the transportation service is completed.

2.8 Taxes

Tax expense for the year, comprising current tax and deferred tax, are included in the determination of the net profit or loss for the year.

(a) Current income tax

Current tax is the amount of tax payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961. Current tax assets and tax liabilities are offset where the entity has a legally enforceable right to offset and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

(b) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences, being differences between the carrying amount of assets and liabilities and corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax is measured using the tax rates and the tax laws enacted or substantively enacted as at the reporting date. Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if such items relate to taxes on income levied by the same governing tax laws and the Company has a legally enforceable right for such set off.

Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date for their realisability.

Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in Other Comprehensive Income or directly in equity respectively.

2.9 Leases

Company as a lessee

The Company recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the Company's incremental borrowing rate. It is remeasured when there is a change in future lease payments arising from a change in an index or rate, if there is a change in the Company's estimate of the amount expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee, or if the Company changes its assessment of whether it will exercise a purchase, extension or termination option. When the lease liability is remeasured in this way, a corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset, or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

The Company has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. The Company recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense over the lease term.

The Company's lease asset classes primarily consist of leases for building. The Company assesses whether a contract contains a lease, at inception of a contract. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. To assess whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, the Company assesses whether

- (i) the contract involves the use of an identified asset,
- (ii) the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset through the period of the lease and
- (iii) the Company has the right to direct the use of the asset.

At the date of commencement of the lease, the Company recognizes a right-of-use asset ("ROU") and a corresponding lease liability for all lease arrangements in which it is a lessee, except for leases with a term of twelve months or less (short-term leases) and low value leases.

Certain lease arrangements include the options to extend or terminate the lease before the end of the lease term. ROU assets and lease liabilities include these options when it is reasonably certain that they will be exercised.

2.10 Inventories

Stock in trade, work in progress, finished goods, packing materials, stores and spares are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost of raw materials, packing materials, and stores and spares is determined on a weighted average basis and includes all applicable costs.

Stock-in-trade and finished goods are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost includes direct materials and direct cost incurred to bring the stock in ready to dispatch stage as aforesaid.

Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

The cost of inventories may not be recoverable if those inventories are damaged, if they have become wholly or partially obsolete, or if their selling prices have declined. The cost of inventories may also not be recoverable if the estimated costs of completion or the estimated costs necessary to make the sale have increased.

Estimates of net realisable value are based on the most reliable evidence available at the time the estimates are made as to the amount the inventories are expected to realise. These estimates take into consideration fluctuations of price or cost directly relating to events occurring after the balance sheet date to the extent that such events confirm the conditions existing at the balance sheet date.

2.11 Impairment of non-financial assets

The carrying values of assets / cash generating units at each balance sheet date are reviewed for impairment. If any indication of impairment exists, the recoverable amount of such assets is estimated and impairment is recognised, if the carrying amount of these assets exceeds their recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the greater of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and their value in use. Value in use is arrived at by discounting the future cash flows to their present value based on an appropriate pre-tax discount rate to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered any impairment loss. When there is an indication that an impairment loss recognised for an asset in earlier accounting periods no longer exists or may have decreased, such reversal of impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except in case of revalued assets.

2.12 Provisions and contingent liabilities

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Company will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. In the event the time value of money is material, provision is carried at the present value of the cash flows required to settle the obligation.

Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or a present obligation that arises from past events, where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

Contingent assets are possible assets that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the entity. A contingent asset is disclosed, where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

2.13 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks, cash on hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.14 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

(a) Financial assets

(i) Initial recognition and measurement

At initial recognition, financial asset is measured at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are expensed in profit or loss.

(ii) Subsequent measurement

For purposes of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified in following categories:

- a) at amortized cost; or
- b) at fair value through other comprehensive income; or
- c) at fair value through profit or loss.

The classification depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

Amortized cost: Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortized cost. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method (EIR).

Fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI): Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows and for selling the financial assets, where the assets' cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, are measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI). Movements in the carrying amount are taken through OCI, except for the recognition of impairment gains or losses, interest revenue and foreign exchange gains and losses which are recognized in Statement of Profit and Loss. When the financial asset is derecognized, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in OCI is reclassified from equity to Statement of Profit and Loss and recognized in other gains/ (losses). Interest income from these financial assets is included in other income using the effective interest rate method.

Fair value through profit or loss: Assets that do not meet the criteria for amortized cost or FVOCI are measured at fair value through profit or loss. Interest income from these financial assets is included in other income.

Equity instruments: All equity investments in scope of Ind AS 109 are measured at fair value. Equity instruments which are held for trading are classified as at FVTPL. For all other equity instruments, the Company may make an irrevocable election to present in other comprehensive income subsequent changes in the fair value. The Company makes such election on an instrument- by-instrument basis. The classification is made on initial recognition and is irrevocable.

If the Company decides to classify an equity instrument as at FVTOCI, then all fair value changes on the instrument, excluding dividends, are recognized in the OCI. There is no recycling of the amounts from OCI to P&L, even on sale of investment. However, the Company may transfer the cumulative gain or loss within equity.

Equity instruments included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognized in the profit and loss.

(iii) Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind AS 109, Financial Instruments, the Company applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on financial assets.

In case of trade receivables, the Company follows a simplified approach wherein an amount equal to lifetime ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance.

In case of other assets, the Company determines if there has been a significant increase in credit risk of the financial asset since initial recognition. If the credit risk of such assets has not increased significantly, an amount equal to 12-month ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance. However, if credit risk has increased significantly, an amount equal to lifetime ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance.

Subsequently, if the credit quality of the financial asset improves such that there is no longer a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the Company reverts to recognizing impairment loss allowance based on 12-month ECL.

ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Company in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Company expects to receive (i.e., all cash shortfalls), discounted at the original effective interest rate. Lifetime ECL are the expected credit losses resulting from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial asset. 12-month ECL are a portion of the lifetime ECL which result from default events that are possible within 12 months from the reporting date.

ECL are measured in a manner that they reflect unbiased and probability weighted amounts determined by a range of outcomes, taking into account the time value of money and other reasonable information available as a result of past events, current conditions and forecasts of future economic conditions.

As a practical expedient, Expected credit Loss is to be provided for on the basis of Simplified Approach as allowed under IND AS based on historically observed default rates over the expected life of trade receivables and is adjusted for forward-looking estimates. At each reporting date, the historically observed default rates and changes in the forward-looking estimates are updated.

(iv) Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset is derecognized only when

- a) the rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset is transferred or
- b) retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of the financial asset, but assumes a contractual obligation to pay the cash flows to one or more recipients.

Where the financial asset is transferred then in that case financial asset is derecognized only if substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset is transferred. Where the entity has not transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is not derecognized.

(b) Financial liabilities

(i) Initial recognition and measurement

All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value and, in the case of borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

(ii) Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are classified as measured at amortised cost or FVTPL. A financial liability is classified as at FVTPL if it is classified as held-for-trading, or it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition. Financial liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value and net gains and losses, including any interest expense, are recognised in profit or loss.

Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is also recognised in profit or loss.

(iii) Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss as finance costs.

(c) Financial Guarantee Contracts

Financial guarantee contracts are those contracts that require a payment to be made to reimburse the holder for a loss it incurs because the specified party fails to make a payment when due in accordance with the terms of a debt instrument. Financial guarantee contracts are recognized as a financial liability at the time the guarantee is issued at fair value, adjusted for transaction costs that are directly attributable to the issuance of the guarantee.

(d) Embedded derivatives

An embedded derivative is a component of a hybrid (combined) instrument that also includes a non-derivative host contract – with the effect that some of the cash flows of the combined instrument vary in a way similar to a standalone derivative. Derivatives embedded in all other host contract are separated if the economic characteristics and risks of the embedded derivative are not closely related to the economic characteristics and risks of the host and are measured at fair value through profit or loss. Embedded derivatives closely related to the host contracts are not separated.

Reassessment only occurs if there is either a change in the terms of the contract that significantly modifies the cash flows that would otherwise be required or a reclassification of a financial asset out of the fair value through profit or loss.

(e) Derivative contracts

The Company uses derivative financial instruments such as foreign exchange forward contracts to hedge its foreign currency risks which are not designated as hedges. All derivative contracts are marked-to-market and losses/gains are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Derivatives are carried as financial assets when the fair value is positive and as financial liabilities when the fair value is negative.

- (f) **Offsetting financial instruments**
Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet where there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. The legally enforceable right must not be contingent on future events and must be enforceable in the normal course of business and in the event of default, insolvency or bankruptcy of the Company or the counterparty.
- 2.15 Employee Benefits**
- (a) **Short-term obligations**
All employee benefits payable wholly within twelve months of rendering the services are classified as short-term employee benefits. These benefits include salaries and wages, bonus and ex-gratia. The undiscounted amount of short-term employee benefits expected to be paid in exchange for the services rendered by employees is charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which such services are rendered.
- (b) **Other long-term employee benefit obligations**
- (i) **Defined contribution plan**
Provident Fund: The Company's contributions to statutory provident fund in accordance with the Employees Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 which is a defined contribution plan, are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period of accrual. The Company has no obligation, other than the contribution payable to the provident fund.
- Superannuation Fund: Employees of the Company above a prescribed grade are entitled to receive retirement benefits under the Company's superannuation fund scheme. The contributions made by the Company to the approved Employees' Superannuation Fund Scheme under the scheme administered and managed by a trust, towards defined contribution plan for eligible employees are charged to Profit and Loss in the period of accrual.
- (ii) **Defined benefit plans**
The Company provides for retirement benefits in the form of Gratuity. Benefits payable to eligible employees of the Company with respect to gratuity is accounted for on the basis of an actuarial valuation as at the Balance Sheet date. The present value of such obligation is determined by the projected unit credit method and adjusted for past service cost and fair value of plan assets as at the balance sheet date through which the obligations are to be settled.
- Remeasurements, comprising of actuarial gains and losses and the return on plan assets (excluding net interest) is reflected immediately in the balance sheet with a charge/credit recognised in Other Comprehensive Income ("OCI") in the period in which they occur.
- Remeasurements recognised in OCI is reflected immediately in retained earnings and is not reclassified to profit or loss in subsequent periods.
- (iii) **Other employee benefits**
Other employee benefits are reassessed at the end of each year and provided on an accrual basis.
- 2.16 Earnings Per Share**
Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year. Earnings considered in ascertaining the Company's earnings per share is the net profit or loss for the year after deducting preference dividends and any attributable tax thereto for the year. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year and for all the years presented is adjusted for events, such as bonus shares, other than the conversion of potential equity shares, that have changed the number of equity shares outstanding, without a corresponding change in resources.
- For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year is adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.
- 2.17 Borrowing Costs**
Borrowing costs consist of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds. Borrowing costs also include exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.
- All borrowing costs are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss except:
Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of assets that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use are capitalised as part of the cost of such assets.
- Investment Income earned on the temporary investment of funds of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation.
- 2.18 Investment properties**
Property that is held for long-term rental yields or for capital appreciation or both, and that is not occupied by the group, is classified as investment property. Investment property is measured initially at its cost, including related transaction costs and where applicable borrowing costs. Subsequent expenditure is capitalised to the asset's carrying amount only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance costs are expensed when incurred. When part of an investment property is replaced, the carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised.
- 2.19 Segment reporting**
Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the chief operating decision maker. The Company is principally engaged in a single business segment - processing of nuts and other dry fruits, which is governed by similar risk and return.
- 2.20 Rounding off amounts**
All amounts disclosed in financial statements and notes have been rounded off to the nearest lakhs as per requirement of Schedule III of the Act, unless otherwise stated.

3 Significant accounting judgments, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future years.

3.1 Estimates and assumptions

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the year end date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The Company based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market changes or circumstances arising that are beyond the control of the Company. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

(a) Useful lives of property, plant and equipment and intangible assets

As described in the material accounting policies, the Company reviews the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment and intangible assets at the end of each reporting period. Useful lives of intangible assets is determined on the basis of estimated benefits to be derived from use of such intangible assets. These reassessments may result in change in the depreciation /amortisation expense in future periods.

(b) Fair value measurements and valuation processes

Some of the Company's assets and liabilities are measured at fair value at each balance sheet date or at the time they are assessed for impairment. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses market-observable data to the extent it is available. Where Level 1 inputs are not available, the Company engages third party valuers, where required, to perform the valuation. Information about the valuation techniques and inputs used in determining the fair value of various assets and liabilities require estimates to be made by the management and are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

(c) Actuarial Valuation

The determination of Company's liability towards defined benefit obligation to employees is made through independent actuarial valuation including determination of amounts to be recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss and in Other Comprehensive Income. Such valuation depend upon assumptions determined after taking into account discount rate, salary growth rate, expected rate of return, mortality and attrition rate. Information about such valuation is provided in notes to the financial statements.

(d) Impairment of non-financial assets

In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cash-generating units based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.

(e) Revenue from Contracts with Customers

The Company has applied judgments that significantly affect the determination of the amount and timing of revenue from contracts with customers.

Opinion

1 General Information and Material Accounting Policies

1 General Information

Krishival Foods Limited (Formerly Known as Empyrean Cashews limited), Holding Company was incorporated on March 21, 2014 and Company's Equity Share are listed on Main Board of National Stock Exchange (NSE) with effect from 20th June 2025. It is primarily engaged in the business of processing nuts and other dry fruits. The Registered office of the company is located at 1309, Lodha Supremus, Saki Vihar Road, Opp MTNL office, Mumbai 400072.

2 Material accounting policies

Material accounting policies adopted by the Group are as under:

2.1 Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

(a) Statement of Compliance with Ind AS

The Group has voluntarily adopted to prepare its Financial Statements as per the Indian Accounting Standards prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended) ('Ind AS') as amended from time to time, other relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and presentation requirements of Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013, (Ind AS compliant Schedule III). Accordingly, the Group has prepared these Financial Statements which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31 March 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss, the Statement of Cash Flows and the Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended 31 March 2026, and a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information (together hereinafter referred to as 'financial statements').

The financial statements have been prepared using the material accounting policies and measurement bases summarised below. These accounting policies have been used throughout all periods presented in these financial statements, except where the Group has applied certain accounting policies and exemptions upon transition to Ind AS.

(b) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for certain financial instruments that are measured at fair values.

Classification into current and non-current:

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Group's normal operating cycle (not exceeding twelve months) and other criteria set out in the Schedule III to the Act.

(c) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires the Management to make estimate and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities as at the Balance Sheet date, reported amount of revenue and expenses for the year and disclosures of contingent liabilities as at the Balance Sheet date. The estimates and assumptions used in the accompanying financial statements are based upon the Management's evaluation of the relevant facts and circumstances as at the date of the financial statements. Actual results could differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on a periodic basis. Revisions to accounting estimates, if any, are recognized in the year in which the estimates are revised and in any future years affected. Refer Note 3 for detailed discussion on estimates and judgments.

2.2 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment, are stated at cost of acquisition or construction less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Freehold land is carried at cost and is not depreciated. Cost of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price net of any discounts and rebates, any import duties and other taxes (other than those subsequently recovered from the tax authorities), any directly attributable expenditure on making the asset ready for its intended use, other incidental expenses, decommissioning costs, if any, and interest on borrowings attributable to acquisition of qualifying asset up to the date the asset is ready for its intended use.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognized when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss during the year in which they are incurred.

Property, plant and equipment's residual values and useful lives are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and changes, if any, are treated as changes in accounting estimate.

Depreciation methods, estimated useful lives

Based on management's evaluation, useful life prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 represent actual useful life of property, plant and equipment. The Group uses straight-line method for building, plant and machinery and electrical installations and uses written down method for the remaining assets and has used following useful lives to provide depreciation of different class of its property, plant and equipment:

In respect of additions or extensions forming an integral part of existing assets and insurance spares, including incremental cost arising on account of translation of foreign currency liabilities for acquisition of Property, Plant and Equipment's, depreciation is provided as aforesaid over the residual life of the respective assets.

Depreciation on addition to property plant and equipment is provided on pro-rata basis from the date of acquisition. Depreciation on sale/deduction from property plant and equipment is provided up to the date preceding the date of sale, deduction as the case may be. Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in Statement of Profit and Loss under 'Other Income'.

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed periodically at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, as appropriate.

2.3 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are recorded at the consideration paid for the acquisition of such assets and are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment. Advances paid towards the acquisition of intangible assets outstanding at each balance sheet date are disclosed as other non-current assets.

Gains or losses arising from derecognition of an intangible asset are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognised.

The residual values, useful lives and methods of amortization of intangible assets are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

The Group amortized intangible assets over their estimated useful lives using the straight line method. The estimated useful lives of intangible assets are as follows:

Intangible assets with finite lives are assessed for impairment whenever there is an indication that the intangible asset may be impaired. The amortization period and the amortization method for an intangible asset with a finite useful life are reviewed at least at each financial year end.

2.4 Capital work in progress

Projects under which property, plant and equipment are not yet ready for their intended use are carried at cost, comprising direct cost and related incidental expenses.

2.5 Foreign Currency Transactions

(a) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates ('the functional currency'). The Group's Financial Statements are presented in Indian Rupees, which is also its functional currency and all values are rounded to the nearest lakhs ('00,000), except when otherwise indicated.

(b) Transactions and balances

On initial recognition, all foreign currency transactions are recorded by applying to the foreign currency amount the exchange rate between the functional currency and the foreign currency at the date of the transaction. Gains/Losses arising out of fluctuation in foreign exchange rate between the transaction date and settlement date are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

All monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are restated at the year end at the exchange rate prevailing at the year end and the exchange differences are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the dates of the initial transactions.

2.6 Fair value measurement

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability accessible to the Group.

The Group uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is material to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1 — Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 — Inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the assets or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).
- Level 3 — Inputs for the assets or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

2.7 Revenue Recognition

Revenue from Contracts with Customers

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received/ receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government and is net of rebates and discounts. The Group assesses its revenue arrangements against specific criteria to determine if it is acting as principal or agent. The Group has concluded that it is acting as a principal in all of its revenue arrangements.

Revenue is recognised in the income statement to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Group and the revenue and costs, if applicable, can be measured reliably.

The Group has applied five step model as per Ind AS 115 'Revenue from contracts with customers' to recognise revenue in the standalone financial statements. The Group satisfies a performance obligation and recognises revenue over time, if one of the following criteria is met:

- a) The customer simultaneously receives and consumes the benefits provided by the Group's performance as the Group performs; or
- b) The Group's performance creates or enhances an asset that the customer controls as the asset is created or enhanced; or
- c) The Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the entity has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date.

For performance obligations where one of the above conditions are not met, revenue is recognised at the point in time at which the performance obligation is satisfied.

Revenue is recognised either at point of time and over a period of time based on various conditions as included in the contracts with customers.

(i) Revenue from Operation

Expenses and income, not specifically referred to otherwise, are accounted for on accrual basis.

(ii) Finance Income

Interest Income is recognised on a basis of effective interest method as set out in Ind AS 109, Financial Instruments, and where no material uncertainty as to measurability or collectability exists. Dividend income is accounted for when the right to receive it is established.

(iii) Revenue from transportation

Revenue from transportation is recognised when the transportation service is completed.

2.8 Taxes

Tax expense for the year, comprising current tax and deferred tax, are included in the determination of the net profit or loss for the year.

(a) Current income tax

Current tax is the amount of tax payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961. Current tax assets and tax liabilities are offset where the entity has a legally enforceable right to offset and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

(b) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences, being differences between the carrying amount of assets and liabilities and corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax is measured using the tax rates and the tax laws enacted or substantively enacted as at the reporting date. Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if such items relate to taxes on income levied by the same governing tax laws and the Group has a legally enforceable right for such set off.

Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date for their realisability.

Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in Other Comprehensive Income or directly in equity respectively.

2.9 Leases

Group as a lessee

The Group recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the Group's incremental borrowing rate. It is remeasured when there is a change in future lease payments arising from a change in an index or rate, if there is a change in the Group's estimate of the amount expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee, or if the Group changes its assessment of whether it will exercise a purchase, extension or termination option. When the lease liability is remeasured in this way, a corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset, or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

The Group has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. The Group recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense over the lease term.

The Group's lease asset classes primarily consist of leases for building. The Group assesses whether a contract contains a lease, at inception of a contract. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. To assess whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, the Group assesses whether

- (i) the contract involves the use of an identified asset,
- (ii) the Group has substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset through the period of the lease and
- (iii) the Group has the right to direct the use of the asset.

At the date of commencement of the lease, the Group recognizes a right-of-use asset ("ROU") and a corresponding lease liability for all lease arrangements in which it is a lessee, except for leases with a term of twelve months or less (short-term leases) and low value leases.

Certain lease arrangements include the options to extend or terminate the lease before the end of the lease term. ROU assets and lease liabilities include these options when it is reasonably certain that they will be exercised.

2.10 Inventories

Stock in trade, work in progress, finished goods, packing materials, stores and spares are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost of raw materials, packing materials, and stores and spares is determined on a First In-First out (FIFO) basis and includes all applicable costs.

Stock-in-trade and finished goods are valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost includes direct materials and direct cost incurred to bring the stock in ready to dispatch stage as aforesaid.

Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

The cost of inventories may not be recoverable if those inventories are damaged, if they have become wholly or partially obsolete, or if their selling prices have declined. The cost of inventories may also not be recoverable if the estimated costs of completion or the estimated costs necessary to make the sale have increased.

Estimates of net realisable value are based on the most reliable evidence available at the time the estimates are made as to the amount the inventories are expected to realise. These estimates take into consideration fluctuations of price or cost directly relating to events occurring after the balance sheet date to the extent that such events confirm the conditions existing at the balance sheet date.

2.11 Impairment of non-financial assets

The carrying values of assets / cash generating units at each balance sheet date are reviewed for impairment. If any indication of impairment exists, the recoverable amount of such assets is estimated and impairment is recognised, if the carrying amount of these assets exceeds their recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the greater of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and their value in use. Value in use is arrived at by discounting the future cash flows to their present value based on an appropriate pre-tax discount rate to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered any impairment loss. When there is an indication that an impairment loss recognised for an asset in earlier accounting periods no longer exists or may have decreased, such reversal of impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except in case of revalued assets.

2.12 Provisions and contingent liabilities

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Group will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. In the event the time value of money is material, provision is carried at the present value of the cash flows required to settle the obligation.

Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Group or a present obligation that arises from past events, where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

Contingent assets are possible assets that arise from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the entity. A contingent asset is disclosed, where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

2.13 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks, cash on hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.14 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

(a) Financial assets

(i) Initial recognition and measurement

At initial recognition, financial asset is measured at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are expensed in profit or loss.

(ii) Subsequent measurement

For purposes of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified in following categories:

- a) at amortized cost; or
- b) at fair value through other comprehensive income; or
- c) at fair value through profit or loss.

The classification depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

Amortized cost: Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortized cost. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method (EIR).

Fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI): Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows and for selling the financial assets, where the assets' cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, are measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI). Movements in the carrying amount are taken through OCI, except for the recognition of impairment gains or losses, interest revenue and foreign exchange gains and losses which are recognized in Statement of Profit and Loss. When the financial asset is derecognized, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in OCI is reclassified from equity to Statement of Profit and Loss and recognized in other gains/ (losses). Interest income from these financial assets is included in other income using the effective interest rate method.

Fair value through profit or loss: Assets that do not meet the criteria for amortized cost or FVOCI are measured at fair value through profit or loss. Interest income from these financial assets is included in other income.

Equity instruments: All equity investments in scope of Ind AS 109 are measured at fair value. Equity instruments which are held for trading are classified as at FVTPL. For all other equity instruments, the Group may make an irrevocable election to present in other comprehensive income subsequent changes in the fair value. The Group makes such election on an instrument- by-instrument basis. The classification is made on initial recognition and is irrevocable.

If the Group decides to classify an equity instrument as at FVTOCI, then all fair value changes on the instrument, excluding dividends, are recognized in the OCI. There is no recycling of the amounts from OCI to P&L, even on sale of investment. However, the Group may transfer the cumulative gain or loss within equity.

Equity instruments included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognized in the profit and loss.

(iii) Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind AS 109, Financial Instruments, the Group applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on financial assets.

In case of trade receivables, the Group follows a simplified approach wherein an amount equal to lifetime ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance.

In case of other assets, the Group determines if there has been a significant increase in credit risk of the financial asset since initial recognition. If the credit risk of such assets has not increased significantly, an amount equal to 12-month ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance. However, if credit risk has increased significantly, an amount equal to lifetime ECL is measured and recognized as loss allowance.

Subsequently, if the credit quality of the financial asset improves such that there is no longer a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the Group reverts to recognizing impairment loss allowance based on 12-month ECL.

ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Group in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Group expects to receive (i.e., all cash shortfalls), discounted at the original effective interest rate. Lifetime ECL are the expected credit losses resulting from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial asset. 12-month ECL are a portion of the lifetime ECL which result from default events that are possible within 12 months from the reporting date.

ECL are measured in a manner that they reflect unbiased and probability weighted amounts determined by a range of outcomes, taking into account the time value of money and other reasonable information available as a result of past events, current conditions and forecasts of future economic conditions.

As a practical expedient, Expected credit Loss is to be provided for on the basis of Simplified Approach as allowed under IND AS based on historically observed default rates over the expected life of trade receivables and is adjusted for forward-looking estimates. At each reporting date, the historically observed default rates and changes in the forward-looking estimates are updated.

(iv) Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset is derecognized only when

- a) the rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset is transferred or
- b) retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of the financial asset, but assumes a contractual obligation to pay the cash flows to one or more recipients.

Where the financial asset is transferred then in that case financial asset is derecognized only if substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset is transferred. Where the entity has not transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is not derecognized.

(b) Financial liabilities

(i) Initial recognition and measurement

All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value and, in the case of borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

(ii) Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are classified as measured at amortised cost or FVTPL. A financial liability is classified as at FVTPL if it is classified as held-for-trading, or it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition. Financial liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value and net gains and losses, including any interest expense, are recognised in profit or loss.

Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is also recognised in profit or loss.

(iii) Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss as finance costs.

(c) Financial Guarantee Contracts

Financial guarantee contracts are those contracts that require a payment to be made to reimburse the holder for a loss it incurs because the specified party fails to make a payment when due in accordance with the terms of a debt instrument. Financial guarantee contracts are recognized as a financial liability at the time the guarantee is issued at fair value, adjusted for transaction costs that are directly attributable to the issuance of the guarantee.

(d) Embedded derivatives

An embedded derivative is a component of a hybrid (combined) instrument that also includes a non-derivative host contract – with the effect that some of the cash flows of the combined instrument vary in a way similar to a standalone derivative. Derivatives embedded in all other host contract are separated if the economic characteristics and risks of the embedded derivative are not closely related to the economic characteristics and risks of the host and are measured at fair value through profit or loss. Embedded derivatives closely related to the host contracts are not separated.

Reassessment only occurs if there is either a change in the terms of the contract that significantly modifies the cash flows that would otherwise be required or a reclassification of a financial asset out of the fair value through profit or loss.

(e) Derivative contracts

The Group uses derivative financial instruments such as foreign exchange forward contracts to hedge its foreign currency risks which are not designated as hedges. All derivative contracts are marked-to-market and losses/gains are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Derivatives are carried as financial assets when the fair value is positive and as financial liabilities when the fair value is negative.

(f) Offsetting financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet where there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. The legally enforceable right must not be contingent on future events and must be enforceable in the normal course of business and in the event of default, insolvency or bankruptcy of the Group or the counterparty.

2.15 Employee Benefits

(a) Short-term obligations

All employee benefits payable wholly within twelve months of rendering the services are classified as short-term employee benefits. These benefits include salaries and wages, bonus and ex-gratia. The undiscounted amount of short-term employee benefits expected to be paid in exchange for the services rendered by employees is charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which such services are rendered.

(b) Other long-term employee benefit obligations

(i) Defined contribution plan

Provident Fund: The Group's contributions to statutory provident fund in accordance with the Employees Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 which is a defined contribution plan, are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period of accrual. The Group has no obligation, other than the contribution payable to the provident fund.

(ii) Defined benefit plans

The Group provides for retirement benefits in the form of Gratuity. Benefits payable to eligible employees of the Group with respect to gratuity is accounted for on the basis of an actuarial valuation as at the Balance Sheet date. The present value of such obligation is determined by the projected unit credit method and adjusted for past service cost and fair value of plan assets as at the balance sheet date through which the obligations are to be settled.

Remeasurements, comprising of actuarial gains and losses and the return on plan assets (excluding net interest) is reflected immediately in the balance sheet with a charge/credit recognised in Other Comprehensive Income ("OCI") in the period in which they occur.

Remeasurements recognised in OCI is reflected immediately in retained earnings and is not reclassified to profit or loss in subsequent periods.

(iii) Other employee benefits

Other employee benefits are reassessed at the end of each year and provided on an accrual basis.

2.16 Earnings Per Share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year. Earnings considered in ascertaining the Group's earnings per share is the net profit or loss for the year after deducting preference dividends and any attributable tax thereto for the year. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year and for all the years presented is adjusted for events, such as bonus shares, other than the conversion of potential equity shares, that have changed the number of equity shares outstanding, without a corresponding change in resources.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year is adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

2.17 Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs consist of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds. Borrowing costs also include exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

All borrowing costs are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss except:

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of assets that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use are capitalised as part of the cost of such assets.

Investment Income earned on the temporary investment of funds of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation.

2.18 Investment properties

Property that is held for long-term rental yields or for capital appreciation or both, and that is not occupied by the group, is classified as investment property. Investment property is measured initially at its cost, including related transaction costs and where applicable borrowing costs. Subsequent expenditure is capitalised to the asset's carrying amount only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance costs are expensed when incurred. When part of an investment property is replaced, the carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised.

2.19 Segment reporting

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the chief operating decision maker. The Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) evaluates the Group's performance and allocates resources based on an analysis of various performance indicators of business segment/s in which the Group operates, processing of Nuts and dry fruits and manufacturing of Ice Cream which the management and CODM recognise as the two business segments.

2.20 Rounding off amounts

All amounts disclosed in financial statements and notes have been rounded off to the nearest lakhs as per requirement of Schedule III of the Act, unless otherwise stated.

3 Significant accounting judgments, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future years.

3.1 Estimates and assumptions

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the year end date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The Group based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market changes or circumstances arising that are beyond the control of the Group. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

- (a) Useful lives of property, plant and equipment and intangible assets**
As described in the material accounting policies, the Group reviews the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment and intangible assets at the end of each reporting period. Useful lives of intangible assets is determined on the basis of estimated benefits to be derived from use of such intangible assets. These reassessments may result in change in the depreciation /amortisation expense in future periods.
- (b) Fair value measurements and valuation processes**
Some of the Group's assets and liabilities are measured at fair value at each balance sheet date or at the time they are assessed for impairment. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Group uses market-observable data to the extent it is available. Where Level 1 inputs are not available, the Group engages third party valuers, where required, to perform the valuation. Information about the valuation techniques and inputs used in determining the fair value of various assets and liabilities require estimates to be made by the management and are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.
- (c) Actuarial Valuation**
The determination of Group's liability towards defined benefit obligation to employees is made through independent actuarial valuation including determination of amounts to be recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss and in Other Comprehensive Income. Such valuation depend upon assumptions determined after taking into account discount rate, salary growth rate, expected rate of return, mortality and attrition rate. Information about such valuation is provided in notes to the financial statements.
- (d) Impairment of non-financial assets**
In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cash-generating units based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.
- (e) Revenue from Contracts with Customers**
The Group has applied judgments that significantly affect the determination of the amount and timing of revenue from contracts with customers.
