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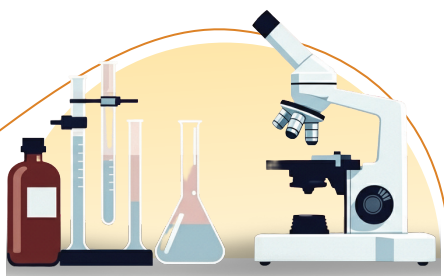

Shivalik Rasayan Limited ('SRL' or 'The Company') is an integrated chemical manufacturer spanning agrochemicals and high-value active pharmaceutical ingredients (APIs). The Company has evolved from a legacy producer of technical-grade

agrochemicals into a science-led chemical and life sciences enterprise, building a strong presence across the agrochemical and pharmaceutical value chains.

Building on this foundation, SRL is strategically strengthening its position as a Contract Development and Manufacturing Organization (CDMO). Research-led innovation

underpins this transition, supported by its DSIR-recognized R&D centre, which develops complex molecules, including NCE-1 products.

These capabilities are complemented by commercial manufacturing through its US FDA-approved facility. Together, they strengthen SRL's integrated R&D-to-manufacturing model, enabling advanced chemistry solutions for regulated markets while expanding across APIs, specialty chemicals, and global life sciences.

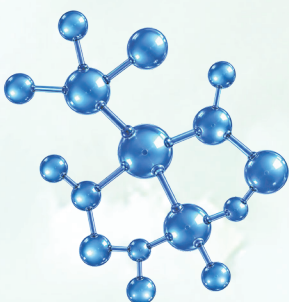

From the Chairman's Desk

Dear Shareholders,

As we present our 48th Annual Report, I am encouraged by the progress we have made in strengthening our position across agrochemicals and pharmaceuticals. Our journey reflects our focus on building differentiated capabilities, deepening our R&D-led approach and creating new opportunities in complex chemistry and CDMO.

Our journey has been guided by a clear intent: to invest in capabilities that create differentiated opportunities and strengthen execution. These investments enable us to participate in higher-value segments of the global chemistry landscape. Today, our R&D, complex chemistry and manufacturing capabilities are increasingly coming together. This is deepening our CDMO proposition and opening new avenues for sustainable growth.

Economic Overview

The global economy remained resilient during 2025-26 despite trade barriers, geopolitical tensions and policy uncertainty.

Amid these evolving dynamics, India continued to distinguish itself as one of the world's fastest-growing major economies.

Building an Integrated CDMO Platform

Our ability to develop, execute and manufacture differentiated molecules through non-infringing routes strengthens our proposition for customers operating in regulated markets.

Alongside pharmaceuticals, we continue to strengthen our agrochemical and specialty chemicals businesses. We are pursuing product development and manufacturing scale-up across these businesses. Together, these initiatives are creating a diversified chemistry platform, with R&D, CDMO and manufacturing capabilities working in concert.

Our CDMO strategy is anchored in a differentiated proposition: taking a molecule from development through manufacturing. Following the successful development of NCE-1 products through our R&D capabilities, the first product was delivered in April 2026, marking an important step in translating our development capabilities into manufacturing execution.

This demonstrates our ability to translate research outcomes into development, while addressing the requirements of regulated markets.



We are also undertaking two additional API programs with a US-based company, focused on NCE-1 and F2F products. By developing APIs through non-infringing routes differentiated from innovator products, we are building capabilities aligned with the evolving needs of global pharmaceutical companies. Interest from companies in Japan and South Korea further supports our potential to expand our API offering across international markets.

R&D remains central to our transformation into an research-driven CDMO. We continue to invest in our R&D capabilities and broaden the scope of projects undertaken for external customers and our own businesses.

During the year, our R&D centre worked across agrochemicals, APIs and formulations. This demonstrated the breadth of our chemistry and development capabilities.

Importantly, we are now working toward making R&D a profit centre. After achieving breakeven on R&D expenses last year, our focus is now on increasing projects and generating greater commercial value from our scientific capabilities. This transition marks an important step in making R&D a direct contributor to our growth and profitability. It moves R&D beyond its role as a supporting function.

Scaling the Agrochemical Platform

Our agrochemical business continues to provide a strong foundation for our diversified chemistry portfolio. Alongside our established products,

we are expanding into newer agrochemical and specialty chemical opportunities.

The agrochemical plant at Dahej-III, with a capacity of 2,500 MT, is now operational for manufacturing insecticides and fungicides. It is expected to have the potential to generate approximately Rs. 200 Crores over the next two years.

This expansion will enable us to support a broader product portfolio and strengthen our market presence.

Building Financial Momentum

In 2025-26, our revenue stood at Rs. 170.23 Crores, compared with Rs. 149.22 Crores in 2024-25, reflecting the continued scaling of our business operations. EBITDA stood at Rs. 27.14 Crores, compared with Rs. 28.40 Crores in the previous year. PAT stood at Rs. 8.17 Crores, compared with Rs. 13.87 Crores. EPS stood at Rs. 5.19, against Rs. 8.80 in 2024-25.

While profitability remained impacted during the year, our continued investments in R&D, manufacturing capabilities and business expansion are strengthening our foundation for future growth.

The Road Ahead

It is an important stage in our evolution. We are moving beyond conventional manufacturing toward an integrated model where R&D, CDMO and manufacturing capabilities come together to address

complex chemistry opportunities.

The successful development and manufacture of NCE-1 products provide an encouraging proof point. Our growing engagement with global pharmaceutical companies and expanding agrochemical platform further reinforce this direction.

Our priorities ahead are clear: deepen our R&D capabilities, expand our CDMO engagements and strengthen our presence in regulated markets. Our focus remains on converting scientific capabilities into commercial opportunities and building a more resilient and valuable business for all our stakeholders.

I take this opportunity to thank our employees, shareholders, customers and partners for their continued trust and support. With a stronger platform, focused strategy and growing pipeline of opportunities, I am confident that we are well positioned for our next phase of sustainable, value-led growth.

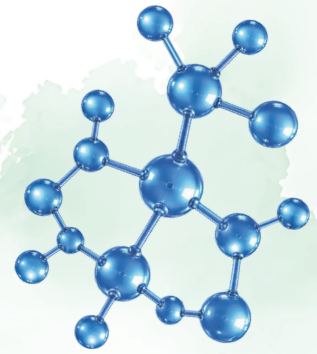

COMPANY'S PERFORMANCE & STATE OF COMPANY'S AFFAIR

On a consolidated basis, the revenue for Financial Year 2026 was Rs. 36,800.32 Lakhs, higher by 18.03% over the previous year revenue of Rs. 31,177.31 Lakhs. The profit after tax (PAT) attributable to shareholders was Rs. 1,796.88 Lakhs in Financial Year 2026 and Rs. 2,212.98 Lakhs in Financial Year 2025, thereby registering a decline of 18.80% over the last year PAT.

On Standalone basis, the revenue for Financial Year 2026 was Rs. 17,023.35 Lakhs, higher by 14.07% over the previous year revenue of Rs. 14,922.59 Lakhs. The profit after tax (PAT) attributable to shareholders for Financial Year 2026 was Rs. 817.25 Lakhs registering a decline of 41.06% over the PAT of Rs. 1,386.68 Lakhs for Financial Year 2025.

RETURN OF SURPLUS FUNDS TO SHAREHOLDERS

Based on the Company's performance, the Directors have recommended a final dividend for the Financial Year 2025-26 on Equity Share Capital @ 10% [Rs. 0.50 per equity share (nominal face value of Rs. 5/- each)]. The Dividend payout is subject to approval of shareholders in ensuing Annual General Meeting.

All related party transactions entered into during 2025-26 were on arm's length basis and in the ordinary course of business and were reviewed and approved by the Audit Committee. With a view to ensure continuity of day-to-day operations, an omnibus approval is obtained for related party transactions which are of repetitive nature and entered in the ordinary course of business and on an arm's length basis. A statement giving details of all related party transactions entered pursuant to the omnibus approval so granted is placed before the Audit Committee on a quarterly basis for its review.

During the year under review, the Company did not enter into any contracts or arrangements with related parties pursuant to Section 188(1) of the Act read with the relevant rules and no material related party transactions were entered into. Accordingly, the disclosure of related party transactions as required under Section 134(3)(h) of the Act read with Rule 8(2) of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 in Form AOC-2 is not applicable to the Company for 2025-26 and hence, does not form part of this Integrated Annual Report.

In terms of Regulation 23 of the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Company submits details of related party transactions on a consolidated basis as per the specified format to the stock exchanges on a half-yearly basis.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Company has a comprehensive Risk Management framework that seeks to minimize the adverse impact on business objectives and capitalize on opportunities. The Company has implemented a mechanism for risk management and formulated a Risk Management Policy that is reviewed in line with the SEBI Listing Regulations framework. The Risk Management Policy was reviewed and amended during the year. The Policy provides for identification of risks and formulating mitigation plans. Major risks identified by business and other functions are systematically addressed through mitigation actions on a continuous basis.

The Risk Management Committee, chaired by an Independent Director, monitors the risks and their mitigation actions as well as formulating strategies towards identifying new and emergent risks.

Further, the Board is apprised of any actual/emergent risk that may threaten or impact the long-term plans of the Company. Such risks are linked to the audit universe and are also covered as a part of the annual risk-based audit plan.

The risk appetite of the organization is approved by the RMC and the Board and is aligned to the Vision of the organization. It is an important metric for governing all business actions and strategic decisions. The Risk appetite is driven by the following:

- Health and safety of our employees and the communities in which we operate are our prime concern and our operating strategy is focused on the above objective;
- Management actions are focused on continuous improvement;
- Environment and Climate Change impacts are assessed on a continuous basis and business decisions support systems including capital allocation, considers climate impact through the internal carbon pricing framework;
- The long-term strategy of the Company is focused on generating profitable growth and sustainable cash flows that creates long term stakeholder value

The Audit Committee has additional oversight in the area of financial risks and controls. The major risks identified by the businesses and functions are systematically addressed through mitigating actions on a continuing basis.

INTERNAL FINANCIAL CONTROL

Internal financial control systems of the Company are commensurate with its size and the nature of its operations.

These have been designed to provide reasonable assurance with regard to recording and providing reliable financial and operational information, complying with applicable accounting standards and relevant statutes, safeguarding assets from unauthorized use, executing transactions with proper authorization and ensuring compliance of corporate policies. The Company has a well-defined delegation of authority with specified limits for approval of expenditure, both capital and revenue.

The Audit Committee deliberated with the Management considered the systems as laid down and met the internal audit team and statutory auditors to ascertain their views on the internal financial control systems. The Audit Committee satisfied itself as to the adequacy and effectiveness of the internal financial control systems as laid down and kept the Board of Directors informed. However, the Company recognizes that no matter how the internal control framework is, it has inherent limitations and accordingly, periodic audits and reviews ensure that such systems are updated at regular intervals

Re-Appointment

In accordance with the provisions of Section 152 of the Act Mr. Suresh Kumar Singh and Dr. Vimal Kumar Shrawat retires by rotation and being eligible, offers themselves for re-appointment. A resolution seeking shareholders' approval for their re-appointment forms part of the Notice.

At the 47th AGM of the Company held on September 27, 2025, the shareholders of the Company approved the re-designation of Mr. Ashwani Kumar Sharma (DIN: 00325634) as a Non-Executive, Non-Independent Director of the Company with effect from August 12, 2025.

Independent Directors

In terms of provisions of Section 149 of the Act, the Independent Directors have submitted declarations that each of them meet the criteria of independence as provided in Section 149(6) of the Act along with Rules framed thereunder and Regulation 16(1)(b) of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI Listing Regulations"). There has been no change in the circumstances affecting their status as Independent Directors of the Company.

The Board is of the opinion that all Directors including the Independent Directors of the Company possess requisite qualifications, integrity, expertise and experience in the fields of science and technology, digitalization, strategy, finance, governance, human resources, safety, sustainability, etc.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 203 of the Act, the Key Managerial Personnel of the Company as on March 31, 2026 are: Mr. Suresh Kumar Singh, Vice- Chairman & Whole- Time Director, Dr. Vimal Kumar Shrawat, Managing Director, Mr. Vinod Kumar, Chief Financial Officer and Ms. Parul Choudhary, Company Secretary & Compliance Officer.

Procedure for Nomination and Appointment of Directors

The Nomination and Remuneration Committee (NRC) is responsible for developing competency requirements for the Board based on the industry and strategy of the Company. The Board composition analysis reflects in-depth understanding of the Company, including its strategies, environment, operations, financial condition and compliance requirements.

The Committee is also responsible for reviewing the profiles of potential candidates' vis-à-vis the required competencies and meeting the potential candidates prior to making recommendations of their nomination to the Board. At the time of appointment, specific requirements for the position including expert knowledge expected are communicated to the appointee.

The list of core skills, expertise and competencies of the Board of Directors as are required in the context of the businesses and sectors applicable to the Company are identified and are available with the Board. The Directors have also reviewed the list of core skills, expertise and competencies which were mapped against them. The same is disclosed in the Corporate Governance Report forming part of this Integrated Annual Report.

Criteria for determining Qualifications, Positive Attributes and Independence of a Director

The NRC has formulated the criteria for determining qualifications, positive attributes and independence of Directors in terms of provisions of Section 178(3) of the Act and Regulation 19 read with Part D of Schedule II to the SEBI Listing Regulations.

Independence: In accordance with the above criteria, a Director will be considered as an 'Independent Director' if he/she meets the criteria for independence as laid down in the Act and Rules framed thereunder, as amended and Regulation 16(1)(b) of the SEBI Listing Regulations

Qualifications: A transparent Board nomination process is in place that encourages diversity of thought, experience, knowledge, perspective, age and gender. It is also ensured that the Board has an appropriate blend of functional and industry expertise. While recommending the appointment of a Director, the NRC considers the manner in which the function and domain expertise of the individual will contribute to the overall skill-domain mix of the Board.

Positive Attributes: In addition to the duties as prescribed under the Act, the Directors on the Board of the Company are also expected to demonstrate high standards of ethical behavior, strong interpersonal and communication skills and soundness of judgement.

BOARD EVALUATION

Pursuant to the applicable provisions of the Act and the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Board has carried out an annual evaluation of its own performance, performance of the Directors as well as the evaluation of the working of its Committees. The NRC has defined the evaluation criteria, procedure and time schedule for the Performance Evaluation process for the Board, its Committees and Directors.

The performance of the Board and individual Directors was evaluated by the Board after seeking inputs from all the Directors. The performance of the Committees was evaluated by the Board after seeking inputs from the Committee Members.

The Company has created a framework for individuals to seek recourse and redressal for instances of sexual harassment. During the year, the Company conducted various training and sensitization sessions on prevention of sexual harassment at workplace for its employees, workmen, and others at various locations. The Company has a Prevention of Sexual Harassment at Workplace Policy in place to provide clarity around the process to raise such a grievance and how the grievance will be investigated and resolved.

WHISTLE BLOWER POLICY/ VIGIL MECHANISM

The Company maintains a robust Whistleblower Policy that ensures transparency and accountability. Whistleblowers are granted direct access to the Chairperson of the Audit Committee should they wish to report any concerns related to unethical behavior, improper practices, fraud, or violations of laws, rules, or regulations.

There have been no instances where individuals have been denied access to the Chairperson for reporting such concerns. All cases reported under the Whistleblower Policy are presented to and reviewed by the Audit Committee.

The Company has a Whistle Blower Policy and has established the necessary vigil mechanism for Directors and Employees in confirmation with Section 177(9) of the Act and Regulation 22 of Listing Regulations, to report concerns about unethical behavior. AUDITORS

a. Statutory Auditors- At the Forty Fifth (45th) Annual General Meeting held on September 29, 2023 appointed

M/s Rahul Chaudhary & Associates, Chartered Accountants (Registration Number 033971N) as Statutory Auditors of the Company till the conclusion of Fiftieth (50th) AGM.

The report of the Statutory Auditor forms part of the Integrated Report and Annual Accounts for 2025-26. The said report does not contain any qualification, reservation, adverse remark or disclaimer. During the year under review, the Statutory Auditors did not report any matter under Section 143(12) of the Act, therefore no detail is required to be disclosed under Section 134(3)(ca) of the Act.

b. Secretarial Auditor- In terms of Section 204 of the Act and the Companies (Appointment and Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014, M/s. AMJ & Associates, a firm of Company Secretaries in Practice, has been appointed as the Secretarial Auditors of the Company.

At the 47th AGM of the Company held on September 27, 2025, in accordance with the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Members of the Company appointed M/s. AMJ & Associates, a Peer reviewed firm, as the Secretarial Auditors of the Company for conducting Secretarial Audit and issue the Secretarial Audit Report for a term of consecutive five (5) years from Financial Year April 1, 2025 to March 31, 2030.

The Report of the Secretarial Auditors is enclosed as **Annexure "E"** which forms part of this Report. There have been two observations as given by the Secretarial Auditors in their Report as below:

1. Observation: During the Period under Review, it was observed that the Company's mandatory Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) budget allocation was calculated on the basis of Profit After Tax (PAT) instead of Profit Before Tax (PBT), deviating from the methodology prescribed under Section 135 read with Section 198 of the Companies Act, 2013. While this did not result in any financial deficit in the final CSR expenditure as explained to us by the management, we recommend updating the Company's internal compliance templates to ensure that future CSR calculations strictly adhere to the statutory methodology.

Management Response: The Company calculated the CSR amount with different approach although there is no deficit in CSR spending as per the calculation under section 198 during the years. The Company will take due care while calculating

the CSR amount in future. i.e. as per section 135 and 198 of Companies Act, 2013.

2. **Observation:** During the period under review, the Company failed to comply with the applicable provisions of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 ('POSH Act'). Specifically, relating to the Formation of the Internal Committee (IC) and non-submission of the Annual Report for the calendar year ended 31st December 2025, as mandated under section 21 of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013.

Management Response: The Company is deeply committed to maintaining a safe, secure, and supportive working environment for all employees. Due to sudden administrative and structural changes during the financial year, the formal setup of the internal compliance framework experienced an unintended delay. Management clarifies that the Company will ensure absolute and complete compliance with all statutory provisions of the POSH Act.

- c. **Cost Auditors-** The Company is required to maintain cost records as specified by the Central Government as per Section 148(1) of the Act and the rules framed thereunder, and accordingly, the Company has maintained such cost accounts and records. In terms of section 148(1) of the Act read with the Companies (Cost Records and Audit) Rules, 2014, based on the recommendations of the Audit Committee, the Board of Directors of the Company appointed M/s Cheena & Associates, Cost Accountants being eligible to conduct Cost Audit relating to the business of the Company for the year ending March 31, 2027.

M/s. Cheena & Associates, Cost Accountants have confirmed that they are free from disqualification specified under Section 141(3) and proviso to Section 148(3) read with Section 141(4) of the Act and that their appointment meets the requirements of Section 141(3) (g) of the Act. MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

A. Indian Agrochemical Industry

The Indian agrochemicals industry is expected to witness stable growth of approximately 6-8% in 2026-27, supported by steady domestic demand, improving crop intensity, and expanding distribution reach. While global uncertainties persist, the industry is transitioning to a volume-led growth phase, with a gradual improvement in overall operating conditions.

Geopolitical developments, particularly the ongoing US-Israel-Iran conflict, have introduced volatility in energy linked input costs and global logistics. While the temporary ceasefire has provided near-term stability by easing immediate pressure on crude oil prices and freight rates, the situation remains uncertain, with the risks of renewed disruptions.

The Indian agrochemicals sector continues to benefit from strong underlying agricultural fundamentals, with domestic demand providing a stable base for sustained growth. Despite global volatility, India remains a structurally growing market, supported by increasing agricultural activity and improving farm economics. Agrochemical demand in India continues to be supported by structural drivers. In addition, policy support and expansion in distribution networks remain key enablers.

Opportunities

The global agrochemical industry is evolving rapidly and in 2026, the demand for pesticides, insecticides is witnessing exponential growth. With the increasing global population, the demand for food production has surged. Farmers are adopting advanced agrochemical solutions to boost productivity, driving demand for high-quality agrochemical suppliers.

Sustainability is reshaping the industry. The demand for eco-friendly agrochemical intermediates and green chemistry practices is growing, encouraging manufacturers to produce safer and compliant chemical solutions. Emerging markets, particularly in Asia, are witnessing rapid industrial growth. This has increased the need for bulk agrochemical manufacturers to support large-scale production.

The demand for agrochemical intermediates in 2026 is driven by agricultural expansion, sustainability trends and innovation. Companies focusing on quality, scalability and compliance will lead the future of this evolving market.

Challenges

Heavy reliance on Chinese intermediates persists, exposing the sector to supply disruptions and price volatility. MSMEs face endless registrations, molecule bans and high compliance costs, while global oversupply keeps their margins pinned.

Moreover, the ongoing geopolitical conflict contributes to elevated macro and operating uncertainty for the agrochemical industry, primarily through energy prices, logistics costs, and currency volatility, rather than direct demand disruption. Agrochemical demand has remained largely resilient, given its linkage to food security and agricultural activity, although short-term ordering behaviour may remain cautious. Volatility in crude oil and freight markets poses margin sensitivity, especially for players with limited backward integration or greater reliance on imported intermediates. Supply chain disruptions, including longer transit times and higher insurance costs, will weigh on the profitability of Indian Companies.

Going forward, margin sensitivity persists, necessitating continued focus on product mix optimization and geographic diversification to mitigate concentration risk.

B. API (Active Pharmaceutical Ingredients) Industry

The global Active Pharmaceutical Ingredient Companies market is undergoing a massive transformation. Valued at over USD 159.3 billion in 2026, the sector is projected to surge toward USD 228.7 billion by 2033. This growth is driven by a surge in chronic diseases, the rise of personalized medicine, and a strategic shift in global supply chains. India API manufacturing growth 2026 sits at the center of that shift, steered by capacity expansion, policy support and years of regulatory experience.

India supplies nearly a fifth of the world's generic medicines by volume, with over 670 USFDA approved plants. The PLI scheme has pushed cumulative pharma investment past Rs. 40,000 Crores targeting around 41 critical bulk drugs. Buyers are diversifying away from single country sourcing and India is a direct beneficiary of that shift. USFDA and EU GMP certification remain the baseline checks for any Indian API supplier.

Pharma firms are shifting from basic APIs to complex APIs—aiming to counter price erosion, strengthen margins, and customer retention. Import reliance

on China for Key Starting Materials (KSMs) remains high, though government initiatives are beginning to show progress.

Indian API manufacturers are modernizing production by integrating sustainability, technology, and efficiency through Artificial Intelligence (AI), data analytics, and flow manufacturing.

Growth Opportunities for API Industry

Indian manufacturers typically operate at lower unit costs than counterparts in the US or Europe. India API manufacturing growth 2026 changes the maths in their favour, even after freight and import duties are added back in. This is due to decade of plant upgrades, dossier filings and inspection history that most Indian API manufacturers had already built well before this current wave of India API manufacturing growth 2026 demand arrived.

Challenges for API Industry

The Indian API industry is entering a phase of structural change driven by both domestic imperatives and global market dynamics. Rising regulatory scrutiny, evolving customer expectations, and the need for technological sophistication are reshaping how companies operate. At the same time, competitive pressures and supply chain vulnerabilities are compelling companies to rethink their strategies, moving beyond volume-driven growth towards specialization and value creation. These forces are not isolated; they interact to define the industry's trajectory and will determine how Indian manufacturers position themselves in the global pharmaceutical ecosystem.

C. Business Overview

Although Company has been able to grow its revenue but increase in operational cost has compressed the bottom line.

On a consolidated basis, the revenue for Financial Year 2026 was Rs. 36,800.32 Lakhs, higher by 18.03% over the previous year revenue of Rs. 31,177.31 Lakhs and on Standalone basis, the revenue for Financial Year 2026 was Rs. 17,023.35 Lakhs, higher by 14.07% over the previous year revenue of Rs. 14,922.59 Lakhs.

- i. **R & D**- We are trying to transit our R & D from cost center to profit center. Our main focus remains development of API and formulations for stringent markets.

R & D has developed two NCE-1 molecules for a US based Company. This demonstrates Shivalik's

capabilities and capacity to develop API as per most stringent norms of Pharmaceuticals markets. Our firm is capable of developing API through non infringing route having a novel polymorph.

- ii. **API**- The development and manufacturing of NCE-1 molecules, Shivalik has validated its capability to be dependable partner for Regulated Pharma Companies. This unlocks massive contract development (CDMO) opportunities, validating our infrastructure against top-tier regulatory standards.
- iii. **Agro-Chemical**- We are scaling our agro-chemical plant. This year, our R&D and manufacturing teams successfully commercialized 4 new high-demand agro-chemical products, expanding our presence in technical products. These new launches target high-growth domestic and export crop protection segments. They allow Shivalik to reduce dependence on commoditized generics and gain strong technical pricing leverage.

The new Agro-Chemical plant at Dahej which started its operation last year has one operational block. This block can produce 2500 MT of Insecticides or Fungicides per annum and can achieve revenue of Rs. 200 Crores. The Company is expecting this to be fully utilized in next two years. There is enough land to expand as the total plot size is 50,000 square meters.

D. Human Resources

We recognized that a strong sense of purpose at work drives higher engagement and productivity. Accordingly, we embed our core values across the organization to ensure they meaningfully connect with our people. By nurturing a positive and inclusive workplace that encourages collaboration, peer learning, and respect for diverse perspectives, we create an environment where individuals feel valued and empowered. This, in turn, supports personal development while aligning individual efforts with our broader organizational goals.

Throughout the year, employees were provided with numerous opportunities to participate in various training programmes, either virtually or in person. The online integrated training platform enabled employees to choose functional or behavioral programmes according to their individual preferences, with unlimited access.

As of March 31, 2026, the Company's total number of payroll employees was 340.

E. Internal Control System

The Company's internal financial controls framework is based on the “three (3) lines of defence model”. The Company has laid down Standard Operating Procedures, policies and authorities to guide the operations of the business. Robust and continuous internal monitoring mechanisms ensure timely identification of risks and issues. The statutory and internal auditors undertake rigorous testing of the control environment of the Company.

Independence of the Internal Auditor is ensured by way of direct reporting to the Audit Committee. The Audit Committee reviews the adequacy and effectiveness of the Company's internal controls environment and monitors the implementation of the

audit recommendations including those relating to strengthening of the Company's risk management policies and systems. The ultimate objective being a zero-surprise risk controlled organization. These internal financial controls help to put in place checks on the implementation of the internal financial controls, policies and procedures that are adopted by the Company for ensuring an orderly and efficient conduct of its business. These internal financial controls help in safeguarding assets, prevention and detection of frauds and/or errors, maintaining the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records.

2. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

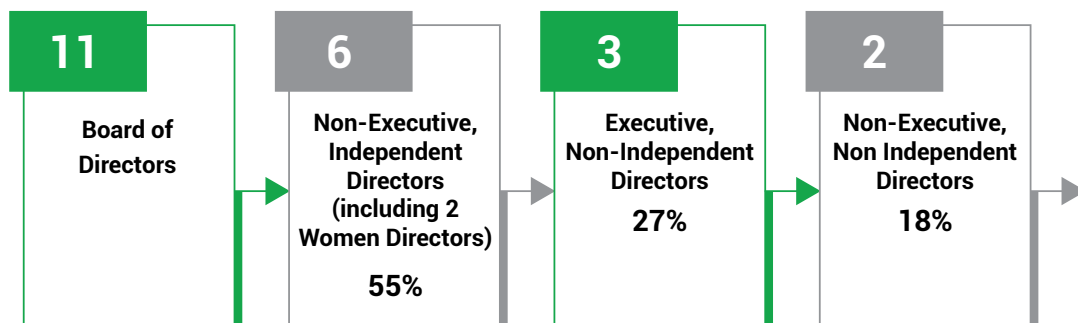

i) Board Procedure

The Board of Directors is the apex body constituted by members for overseeing the Company's overall functioning. The Board provides and evaluates the Company's strategic direction, management policies and their effectiveness, and ensures that the stakeholders' long-term interests are being served.

The Board meets at regular intervals to discuss and decide on Company/business policy and strategy in addition to the statutory and other matters. The Board has constituted five committees, namely Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee, Corporate Social Responsibility Committee, Stakeholders' Relationship Committee and Risk Management Committee. The Board is authorized to constitute additional functional committees, from time to time, depending on business needs.

The Board meets at regular intervals to discuss the business strategy of the Company apart from other matters. A tentative annual calendar of the meetings of Board and Committees is circulated to the Directors well in advance to facilitate them to plan their schedule and to ensure meaningful participation in the meetings. However, in case of urgent matters, the Board's/Committee's approval is taken by passing resolutions by circulation, as permitted by law, which are noted and confirmed at the subsequent Board/Committee meeting. For matters not permitted to be passed by circular resolution, a meeting is convened at shorter notice as per the applicable provisions. Video conferencing facilities are used to enable the Directors to participate in the meeting should they need to attend the meetings virtually. The notice, agenda and supplementary documents are circulated well in advance before each meeting, to

all Directors, to facilitate effective discussion and decision making.

The agenda and related information are shared through a secured electronic platform, minimizing paper usage and reinforcing the Company's commitment to sustainability. This digital approach not only reduces the environmental footprint but also enhances the security and confidentiality of sensitive information.

At the Board Meetings, the Chairman apprises the Board on the overall performance of the Company to enable the Board to discharge its responsibilities effectively and take informed decisions. The Board also, inter alia, reviews the strategy, annual business plan, capital expenditure budgets and adoption of quarterly/half-yearly/annual financial results, compliance reports on all laws applicable to the Company, people process matters and minutes of the Meetings of the Committees of the Board.

The Chairperson of all the Committees briefs the Board at its Meetings about the significant discussions at each of the Committee Meetings. Additionally, the Board is kept informed of all major events, including information listed under Regulation 17(7) read with Part A of Schedule II to the SEBI Listing Regulations.

j) Independent Directors

Independent Directors play a pivotal role by overseeing the Company's internal controls, financial reporting and risk management. They provide valuable insights and recommendations that help the Company achieve its goals for ensuring effective corporate governance for the success and sustainability of the organization. Their increased presence in the boardroom has been hailed as a harbinger for striking a right balance between individual, economic and social interests.

The Company currently has Six (6) Non-Executive, Independent Directors which comprises 55% of the total strength of the Board of Directors. The maximum tenure of the Independent Directors is in accordance with the Act and the SEBI Listing Regulations.

The appointment/re-appointment of Independent Directors is carried out in a structured manner in accordance with the provisions of the Act and the SEBI Listing Regulations. The Charter of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee ('NRC') provides for identification of candidates based on certain laid down criteria and takes into consideration the need for diversity of the Board and accordingly makes its recommendations to the Board.

Further, the Company has received a declaration from the Independent Directors confirming that they meet the criteria of independence as prescribed under Section 149(6) of the Act and with Regulation 16(1)(b) of the SEBI Listing Regulations. In terms of Regulation 25(8) of the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Independent Directors have confirmed that they are not aware of any circumstances or situations which exist or may be reasonably anticipated that could impair or impact their ability to discharge their duties.

In the opinion of the Board, the Independent Directors fulfill the conditions of independence specified in the Act and the SEBI Listing Regulations and are independent of the Management.

k) Meeting of Independent Directors

During the year under review, a separate Meeting of the Independent Directors of the Company was held on February 13, 2026, as required under Schedule IV to the Act (Code for Independent Directors) and Regulation 25(3) of the SEBI Listing Regulations. At the Meeting, the Independent Directors:

- Reviewed the performance of Non-Independent Directors and the Board as a whole;
- Reviewed the performance of the Chairman of the Company, taking into account the views of the Managing Director and Non-Executive Directors; and
- Assessed the quality, quantity and timeliness of flow of information between the Company's Management and the Board that is necessary for the Board to effectively and reasonably perform its duties.

The Meeting was attended by all the Independent Directors as on that date and Mr. Sham Goel chaired the said Meeting.

l) Induction and Familiarization Programme for Directors

The Company has a familiarization programmer for its Independent Directors with an objective to enable them to understand the Company, its operations, strategies, business, functions, policies, industry and environment in which it functions and the regulatory environment applicable to it and operations of its group companies. These include orientation programmes upon induction of new Directors as well as other initiatives to update the Directors on a continuous basis. An induction kit is provided to new Directors which includes the Annual Report, overview of the Company and its operating group companies, charters of the Committees, Code of Conduct for Board members including Independent Directors, Company's Code of Conduct for Prevention of Insider Trading and Code of Corporate Disclosure Practices, etc. Meetings with Business/Functional Heads are organized to provide a brief on the businesses/functions.

Pursuant to Regulation 25(7) of the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Company also has an ongoing familiarization programme for its Independent Directors with the objective of familiarizing them with the Company, its operations, strategies and business model, nature of the industry and environment in which it operates, functions, policies and procedures of the Company, the regulatory environment applicable to it, etc. The Board is provided with all the documents required and/or sought by them to have a good understanding of the Company, its business model, and various operations, and the industry of which it is a part.

The Board is also regularly informed about significant developments in the industry, geopolitical issues, regulatory changes and other developments that impact the Company.

m) Code of Conduct

The Company has in place a Code of Conduct (the "Code") for its Directors and Employees. The Code lays down standards of business conduct, ethics and governance. The Code reflects the values of the Company viz. Customer Value, Ownership Mindset, Respect, Integrity, One Team and Excellence.

A declaration to this effect duly signed by the Managing Director & CFO forms part of this Report. n) Board and Director Evaluation and Criteria for Evaluation

The Nomination and Remuneration Committee has devised criteria for evaluation of performance of the Directors (including Independent Directors). The said criteria specifies certain parameters like attendance, effective participation in the meetings, domain knowledge, vision and strategy, awareness of business and regulatory environment in which company operates, etc. which is in compliance with applicable laws, regulations and guidelines.

The overall functioning of the evaluation process reflected a high degree of engagement amongst the Board members and their freedom to express views on matters transacted at the Meetings.

3. COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD

The Company's guidelines relating to the Board meetings are applicable to Committee meetings. The composition and terms of reference of all the Committees are in compliance with the Act and the Listing Regulations, as applicable. Each Committee has the authority to engage external experts, advisors and counsels to the extent it considers appropriate to assist in discharging its function. Minutes of proceedings of

Committee meetings are circulated to the respective committee members and also placed before the Board for its noting.

A. Audit Committee

The Audit Committee is constituted and functions in accordance with Section 177 of the Act, Regulation 18 of the SEBI Listing Regulations and its Charter adopted by the Board.

Terms of Reference

The terms of reference of the Audit Committee, inter alia, include:

- Oversight of the Company's financial reporting process and disclosure of its financial information to ensure that the financial statements are correct, sufficient and credible.
- Discuss and review with the Management, the annual/half-yearly/quarterly financial statements and the limited review report/ auditor's report thereon, before submission to the Board for approval.
- Review of the Company's accounting policies, internal accounting and financial controls, risk management policies and such other matters.
- Discuss with the statutory auditors, before the audit commences, about the nature and scope of the audit as well as post-audit discussion to ascertain any areas of concern.
- Hold timely discussions with the statutory auditors regarding critical accounting policies and practices and significant financial reporting issues and judgements made.
- Recommend to the Board the appointment, re-appointment and if required, the

replacement or removal of statutory auditors, remuneration and terms of appointment of auditors, fixation of audit fees and to approve payment for any other services rendered by the statutory auditors.

- Review and monitor the auditor's independence, qualification and performance and effectiveness of audit process and all relationships between statutory auditors and the Company.
- Review with the management, performance of the statutory and internal auditors.
- Review the adequacy of the internal audit function and the adequacy and efficacy of the internal control systems.
- Evaluate internal financial controls and risk management systems.
- Review the related party transactions including any subsequent modification to the related party transactions and review the functioning of the Whistleblower Mechanism.
- Approve the appointment of the Chief Financial Officer after assessing the qualifications, experience and background of the candidate.

Further, pursuant to Regulation 18(2)(c) of the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Audit Committee is empowered to investigate any activity within its terms of reference, seek information it requires from any employee, obtain outside legal or other independent professional advice and secure attendance of outsiders with relevant expertise, if considered necessary. Apart from the above, the Audit Committee also exercises the role and powers entrusted upon by the Board of Directors from time to time and as mandated under the applicable rules/regulations/laws.

- To identify and recommend to the Board, including their remuneration, the appointment or removal of KMP and Senior Management members.
- Carry out the evaluation of every Director's performance and support the Board and Independent Directors in the evaluation of the performance of the Board, its Committees and individual Directors.
- Oversee the performance review process for the KMP and executive team with the view that there is an appropriate cascading of goals and targets across the Company.
- On an annual basis, recommend to the Board the remuneration payable to Directors, KMPs and executive team of the Company.

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

Shivalik Rasayan Limited was registered with the ROC Gwalior, Madhya Pradesh under the Registration number 1498/79 dated 16/03/1979. In the year 1980 the Company shifted its registered office from Madhya Pradesh to Uttar Pradesh under the registration number 6992/5041 dated 23/02/1980. Old Registration number has been converted into new Corporate Identification Number (CIN) L24237UR1979PLC005041. The registered office of the Company is situated in the state of Uttarakhand at Village Kolhupani, P.O. Chandanwari, Dehradun – 248007. The Company is a manufacturer of Agrochemicals & Active Pharma Ingredients (API). Manufacturing facilities are situated at:-

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards ('Ind AS'), under the historical cost basis except for certain financial instruments which are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period as explained in the accounting policies below, the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') (to the extent notified) and guidelines issued by Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI). The Ind AS are prescribed under Section 133 of the Act read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and relevant amendment rules issued thereafter.

2.2 Current versus non-current classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/non-current

classification. An asset is treated as current when it is:

- Expected to be realized or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading
- Expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents. The Company has identified twelve months as its operating cycle.

2.3 Foreign currencies

The financial statements are presented in Indian rupees, which is the functional currency of the Company and the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates.

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recorded by the Company at its functional currency spot rates at the date the transaction first qualifies for recognition. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the functional currency spot rates of exchange at the reporting date.

Notes to Standalone Financial Statements For the Year Ended March 31, 2026 (Contd.)

Exchange differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

2.4 Fair value measurement

The Company measures financial instruments, such as derivatives at fair value at each balance sheet date. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their best economic interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data is available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- **Level 1:** Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

- **Level 2:** Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable
- **Level 3:** Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorization (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

The Company determines the appropriate valuation techniques and inputs for fair value measurements. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses market-observable data to the extent it is available. Where level 1 inputs are not available, the Company engages third party qualified valuers to perform the valuation. Any change in the fair value of each asset and liability is also compared with relevant external sources to determine whether the change is reasonable.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

2.5 Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured, regardless of when the payment is being made. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of returns and allowances, trade discounts and volume rebates after taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government.

The Company derives revenues primarily from manufacture and export of Pharmaceuticals products.

Notes to Standalone Financial Statements For the Year Ended March 31, 2026 (Contd.)

2.6 Dividends

Revenue is recognized when the Company's right to receive the payment is established, which is generally when shareholders approve the dividend.

Final Dividend on shares is recorded as a liability on the date of approval by the shareholders and interim dividends are recorded as a liability on the date of declaration by the Company's Board of Directors. The entity recognized the income tax consequences of dividends in profit or loss, other comprehensive income or equity according to where the entity originally recognized those past transactions or events. The Finance Act, 2020 has repealed the Dividend Distribution Tax (DDT). The Company is now required to pay/distribute dividends after deducting applicable taxes. The remittance of dividends outside India is governed by Indian law on foreign exchange and is also subject to withholding tax at applicable rates.

2.7 Current income tax

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted, at the reporting date in the countries where the Company operates and generates taxable income. Current income tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income ("OCI") or in equity). Current tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provision where appropriate.

2.8 Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all taxable temporary differences.

Deferred tax assets are recognized for all deductible temporary differences, the carry forward of unused tax credits and any unused tax losses. Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilized.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax assets to be utilized. Unrecognized deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognized to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax assets to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Deferred tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

2.9 Property, plant and equipment

Capital work-in-progress, property, plant and equipment are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Such cost includes the cost of replacing part of the plant and equipment and borrowing costs for long-term construction projects if the recognition criteria are met. When significant parts of plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Company depreciates them separately based on their specific useful lives.

Notes to Standalone Financial Statements For the Year Ended March 31, 2026 (Contd.)

Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied.

All other expenses on existing property, plant and equipment, including day-to-day repair and maintenance expenditure and cost of replacing parts, are charged to the statement of profit and loss for the period during which such expenses are incurred.

Subsequent expenditure related to an item of property, plant and equipment is added to its book value only if it increases the future benefits from the existing asset beyond its previously assessed standard of performance or extends its estimated useful life.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows:

An item of property, plant and equipment and any significant part initially recognized is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the statement of profit and loss when the asset is derecognized.

The residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

2.10 Intangible assets

Costs relating to software, which is acquired, are capitalized and amortized on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives of 5 to 10 Years.

Gains or losses arising from derecognition of an intangible asset are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognized in the statement of profit or loss when the asset is derecognized.

Amortization method, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at the end of each financial year and adjusted if appropriate.

2.11 Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of an asset that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use or sale are capitalized as part of the cost of the asset. All other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they occur. Borrowing costs consist of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds. Borrowing cost also includes exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

2.12 Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Costs incurred in bringing each product to its present location and conditions are accounted for as follows:

Raw materials: Materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost. Cost includes cost of purchase and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

Finished goods and work-in-progress: cost includes cost of direct materials and labor and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on the normal operating capacity.

Stores, spares and packing materials: are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value, net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

2.13 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. When the Company expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, for example, under an insurance contract, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset, but only when the reimbursement is virtually certain. The expense relating to a provision is presented in the Statement of Profit and Loss net of any reimbursement.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, when appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as a finance cost.

2.14 Retirement and other employee benefits

Short-term obligations

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service are recognized in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled. The liabilities are presented as current employee benefit obligations in the balance sheet.

Other long-term employee benefit obligations

The liabilities for earned leave and sick leave are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. They are therefore measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the end of the reporting period using the projected unit credit method. The benefits are discounted using the market yields at the end of the reporting period that have terms approximating to the terms of the related obligation.

The obligations are presented as current liabilities in the balance sheet if the entity does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting period, regardless of when the actual settlement is expected to occur.

Post-employment obligations

The Company operates the following post-employment scheme:

- (a) defined benefit plans such as gratuity; and
- (b) defined contribution plans such as provident funds.

Bonus plans

The Company recognizes liability and an expense for bonuses. The Company recognizes a provision where contractually obliged or where there is a past practice that has created a constructive obligation.

2.15 Investments in subsidiaries

In respect of equity investments, the entity prepares separate financial statements and account for its investments in subsidiary at cost, net of impairment if any.

2.16 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks and on hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of the statement of cash flow, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term deposits, as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts as they are considered an integral part of the Group's cash management.

2.17 Trade receivables

Trade receivables are recognized initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment.

2.18 Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Company prior to the

end of the financial year which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months after the reporting period. They are recognized initially at their fair value and subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

2.19 Contributed equity

Equity shares are classified as equity.

2.20 Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share

Basic earnings per share are calculated by dividing:

- the profit attributable to owners of the Company
- by the weighted average number of equity share outstanding during the financial year, adjusted for bonus elements in equity shares issued during the year and excluding treasury shares.

2.21 Contingent Liabilities

In the opinion of the Board of Directors, adequate provisions have been made in the accounts for all known liabilities. The value of current assets, loans and advances have a value on realization in the ordinary course of business at least equal to the amount at which they are stated in the balance sheet, unless otherwise stated.

The Company does have any pending litigation which would impact on its financial position.

While the Company generally does not have any pending litigation that would materially impact its financial position, there is one specific matter currently under litigation:

A pending litigation with The Superintendent (Range-V), Central Goods and Services Tax Division – Dehradun, is currently before the Nainital High Court. This litigation pertains to an alleged excess input tax credit (ITC) amounting to Rs.1,18,34,538/- availed in GSTR-3B compared to GSTR-9 and GSTR-2A during the Financial Year 2017-18. The Company asserts that this

discrepancy arose due to a clerical error where Input credit of Rs.1,18,34,538/- (comprising IGST Rs.1,15,77,552/-, CGST Rs.1,28,493/-, and SGST Rs.1,28,493/-) was inadvertently filed under Table No.4A(4) instead of Table No.4A(5) of Eligible ITC in GSTR-3B for the month of March 2018.

The Board of Directors believes that this pending litigation is unlikely to have a material adverse impact on the Company's financial position.

2.22 New standards and interpretations not yet adopted

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standard or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. On March 23, 2022, MCA amended the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2022, applicable from April 1, 2022, as below:

Ind AS 103 – Reference to Conceptual Framework

The amendments specify that to qualify for recognition as part of applying the acquisition method, the identifiable assets acquired, and liabilities assumed must meet the definitions of assets and liabilities in the Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting under Indian Accounting Standards (Conceptual Framework) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India at the acquisition date. These changes do not significantly change the requirements of Ind AS 103. The Company does not expect the amendment to have any significant impact in its financial statements.

Ind AS 16 – Proceeds before intended use

The amendments mainly prohibit an entity from deducting from the cost of property, plant and equipment amounts received from selling items produced while the Company is preparing the asset for its intended use. Instead, an entity will recognize such sales proceeds and related cost in profit or loss. The Company does not expect the amendments to have any impact in its recognition of its property, plant and equipment in its financial statements.

Notes to Standalone Financial Statements For the Year Ended March 31, 2026 (Contd.)

Ind AS 37 – Onerous Contracts - Costs of Fulfilling a Contract

The amendments specify that the “cost of fulfilling” a contract comprises the “costs that relate directly to the contract”. Costs that relate directly to a contract can either be incremental costs of fulfilling that contract (examples would be direct labor, materials) or an allocation of other costs that relate directly to fulfilling contracts. The amendment is essentially a clarification, and the Company does not expect the amendment to have any significant impact in its financial statements.

Ind AS 109 – Annual Improvements to Ind AS (2021)

The amendment clarifies which fees an entity includes when it applies the “10 percent” test of Ind AS 109 in assessing whether to derecognize a financial liability. The Company does not expect the amendment to have any significant impact on its financial statements.

Ind AS 116 – Annual Improvements to Ind AS (2021)

The amendments remove the illustration of the reimbursement of leasehold improvements by the lessor in order to resolve any potential confusion regarding the treatment of lease incentives that might arise because of how lease incentives were described in that illustration. The Company does not expect the amendment to have any significant impact on its financial statements.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

For the Year Ended March 31, 2026

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

Shivalik Rasayan Limited was registered with the ROC Gwalior, Madhya Pradesh under the Registration number 1498/79 dated 16/03/1979. In the year 1980 the Company shifted its registered office from Madhya Pradesh to Uttar Pradesh under Registration number 6992/5041 dated 23/02/1980. Old Registration number has been converted into new Corporate Identification Number (CIN) L24237UR1979PLC005041. Registered office of the Company is situated in the state of Uttarakhand at Village Kolhupani, P.O. Chandanwari, Dehradun – 248007. The Company is a manufacturer of Agrochemicals & Active Pharma Ingredients (API).

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 (A) BASIS OF PREPARATION

- (a) The financial statements of the Group have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards ('Ind AS'), under the historical cost except for certain financial instruments which are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period as explained in the accounting policies below, the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') (to the extent notified) and guidelines issued by Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI). The Ind AS are prescribed under Section 133 of the Act read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and relevant amendment rules issued thereafter.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost except for certain financial instruments that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period, as explained in accounting policies below.

The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees and all values are in Rupees, except otherwise indicated.

(b) BASIS OF CONSOLIDATION

The Consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of the Group as at March 31, 2026 and March 31, 2025.

Control is achieved when the Group is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the investee. Specifically, the Group controls an investee if and only if the Group has:

- Power over the investee (i.e. existing rights that give it the current ability to direct the relevant activities of the investee)
- Exposure, or rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee, and
- The ability to use its power over the investee to affect its returns.

Generally, there is a presumption that a majority of voting rights result in control. To support this presumption and when the Group has less than a majority of the voting or similar rights of an investee, the Group considers all relevant facts and circumstances in assessing whether it has power over an investee, including:

- The contractual arrangement with the other vote holders of the investee
- Rights arising from other contractual arrangements
- The Group's voting rights and potential voting rights.

The Group re-assesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control. Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the Group obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Group loses control of the subsidiary. Assets, liabilities, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated financial

statements from the date the Group gains control until the date the Group ceases to control the subsidiary.

Consolidated financial statements are prepared using uniform accounting policies for like transactions and other events in similar circumstances. If a member of the group uses accounting policies other than those adopted in the consolidated financial statements for like transactions and events in similar circumstances, appropriate adjustments are made to that group member's financial statements in preparing the consolidated financial statements to ensure conformity with the group's accounting policies.

(B) CONSOLIDATION PROCEDURE:

- Combine like items of assets, liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows of the parent with those of its subsidiaries.
- Eliminate the carrying amount of the parent's investment in subsidiary and the parent's portion of equity of subsidiary. Business combinations policy explains how to account for any related goodwill.
- Eliminate in full intragroup assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between entities of the group (profits or losses resulting from intragroup transactions that are recognized in assets, such as inventory and fixed assets, are eliminated in full). Intragroup losses may indicate an impairment that requires recognition in the consolidated financial statements. Ind AS 12 Income Taxes applies to temporary differences that arise from the elimination of profits and losses resulting from intragroup transactions.

- Profit or loss and each component of other comprehensive income (OCI) are attributed to the equity holders of the parent of the Group and to the non-controlling interests.
- When necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies into line with the Group's accounting policies.

2.2 Summary of significant accounting policies

In accordance with Ind-AS 101 provisions related to first time adoption, the Group has elected to apply Ind AS accounting for business combinations prospectively from April 01, 2015. As such, Indian GAAP balances relating to business combinations entered into before that date, including goodwill, have been carried forward with minimal adjustment. Similarly, such first time adoption exemption is also adopted for associate.

Business combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method. The cost of an acquisition is measured as the aggregate of the consideration transferred measured at acquisition date fair value and the amount of any non-controlling interests in the acquiree. For each business combination, the Group elects whether to measure the non-controlling interests in the acquiree at fair value or at the proportionate share of the acquiree's identifiable net assets. Acquisition-related costs are expensed as incurred.

At the acquisition date, the identifiable assets acquired and the liabilities assumed are recognized at their acquisition date fair values. For this purpose, the liabilities assumed include contingent liabilities representing present obligation and they are measured at their acquisition fair values irrespective of the fact that outflow of resources embodying economic benefits is not probable. However, the following assets and liabilities acquired in a business combination are measured at the basis indicated below:

- Deferred tax assets or liabilities, and the assets or liabilities related to employee benefit arrangements are recognized and measured in accordance with Ind AS 12 Income Tax and Ind AS 19 Employee Benefits respectively.

- Liabilities or equity instruments related to share based payment arrangements of the acquiree or share based payments arrangements of the Group entered into to replace share-based payment arrangements of the acquiree are measured in accordance with Ind AS 102 Share-based Payments at the acquisition date.
- When the Group acquires a business, it assesses the financial assets and liabilities assumed for appropriate classification and designation in accordance with the contractual terms, economic circumstances and pertinent conditions as at the acquisition date. This includes the separation of embedded derivatives in host contracts by the acquiree.
- If the business combination is achieved in stages, any previously held equity interest is re-measured at its acquisition date fair value and any resulting gain or loss is recognized in profit or loss or OCI.
- Goodwill is initially measured at cost, being the excess of the aggregate of the consideration transferred and the amount recognized for non-controlling interests, and any previous interest held, over the net identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed. If the fair value of the net assets acquired is in excess of the aggregate consideration transferred, the Group re-assesses whether it has correctly identified all of the assets acquired and all of the liabilities assumed and reviews the procedures used to measure the amounts to be recognized at the acquisition date. If the reassessment still results in an excess of the fair value of net assets acquired over the aggregate consideration transferred, then the gain is recognized in OCI and accumulated in equity as capital reserve. However, if there is no clear evidence of bargain purchase, the entity recognizes the gain directly in equity as capital reserve, without routing the same through OCI.
- After initial recognition, goodwill is measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. For the purpose of impairment

testing, goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the Group's cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the acquiree are assigned to those units.

- A cash generating unit to which goodwill has been allocated is tested for impairment annually, or more frequently when there is an indication that the unit may be impaired. If the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit is less than its carrying amount, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the unit and then to the other assets of the unit pro rata based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit. Any impairment loss for goodwill is recognized in Statement of Profit and Loss. An impairment loss recognized for goodwill is not reversed in subsequent periods.
- Where goodwill has been allocated to a cash-generating unit and part of the operation within that unit is disposed of, the goodwill associated with the disposed operation is included in the carrying amount of the operation when determining the gain or loss on disposal. Goodwill disposed in these circumstances is measured based on the relative values of the disposed operation and the portion of the cash-generating unit retained.

2.3 Investment in associates:

An associate is an entity over which the Group has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee but is not control or joint control over those policies. The results and assets and liabilities of associate are incorporated in these Consolidated Financial Statements using the equity method of accounting, except when the investment, or a portion thereof, is classified as held for sale, in which case it is accounted for in accordance with Ind AS 105 – Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations.

2.4 Current versus non-current classification

The Group presents assets and liabilities in the Balance Sheet based on current/non-current classification. An asset is treated as current when it is:

- Expected to be realized or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading
- Expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

The Group classifies all other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents. The Group has identified twelve months as its operating cycle.

2.5 Foreign currencies

The Group's consolidated financial statements are presented in Indian rupees, which is also the parent company's functional currency. For each entity the Group determines the functional currency and items included in the financial statements of each entity are measured using that functional currency. The Group uses the direct method of consolidation and on disposal of a foreign operation the gain or loss that is reclassified to profit or loss reflects the amount that arises from using this method.

2.6 Transactions and balances

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recorded by the Group at its functional currency spot rates at the date the transaction first qualifies for recognition. However, for practical reasons, the group uses an average rate if the average approximates the actual rate at the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the functional currency spot rates of exchange at the reporting date.

Exchange differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognized in profit or loss except with the exception of exchange differences arising on monetary items that forms part of a reporting entity's net investment in a foreign operation are recognized in profit or loss in the separate financial statements of the reporting entity or the individual financial statements of the foreign operation, as appropriate. In the financial statements that include the foreign operation and the reporting entity, such exchange differences are recognized initially in OCI. These exchange differences are reclassified from equity to profit or loss on disposal of the net investment.

Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the dates of the initial transactions. Non-monetary items measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value is determined. The gain or loss arising on translation of non-monetary items measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of the gain or loss on the change in fair value of the item (i.e., translation differences on items whose fair value gain or loss is recognized in OCI or profit or loss are also recognized in OCI or profit or loss, respectively).

2.7 Group companies

On consolidation, the assets and liabilities of foreign operations are translated into functional currency at the rate of exchange prevailing at the reporting date and their Statements of Profit or Loss are translated at exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. For practical reasons, the Group uses an average rate to translate income and expense items, if the average rate approximates the exchange rates at the date

of transactions. The exchange differences arising on translation for consolidation are recognized in OCI. On disposal of a foreign operation, the component of OCI relating to that particular foreign operation is recognized in Statement of Profit and Loss.

2.8 Fair value measurement

The Group measures financial instruments, such as, derivatives at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Group. The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Group uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the consolidated financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1: Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

- Level 2: Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable
- Level 3: Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the consolidated financial statements on a recurring basis, the Group determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorization (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

The Company's chief financial officer determines the appropriate valuation techniques and inputs for fair value measurements. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Group uses market-observable data to the extent it is available. Where level 1 inputs are not available, the Group engages third party qualified valuers to perform the valuation. Any change in the fair value of each asset and liability is also compared with relevant external sources to determine whether the change is reasonable.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Group has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

2.9 Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Group and the revenue can be reliably measured, regardless of when the payment is being made. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of returns and allowances, trade discounts and volume rebates after taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government. The Group derives revenues primarily from manufacture and sale of Generic Finished dosage forms (FDF) and Contract Research services (together called as "Pharmaceuticals")

2.10 Dividends

Revenue is recognized when the Group's right to receive the payment is established, which is generally when shareholders approve the dividend.

Final Dividend on shares are recorded as a liability on the date of approval by the shareholders and interim dividends are recorded as a liability on the date of declaration by the Company's Board of Directors. The entity recognized the income tax consequences of dividends in profit or loss, other comprehensive income or equity according to where the entity originally recognized those past transactions or events. The Finance Act, 2020 has repealed the Dividend Distribution Tax (DDT). The Company is now required to pay/distribute dividend after deducting applicable taxes. The remittance of dividends outside India is governed by Indian law on foreign exchange and is also subject to withholding tax at applicable rates.

2.11 Current income tax

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted, at the reporting date in the countries where the Group operates and generates taxable income. Current income tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Current tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

2.12 Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all taxable temporary differences.

Deferred tax assets are recognized for all deductible temporary differences, the carry forward of unused tax credits (MAT Credit) and any unused tax losses. Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilized.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilized. Unrecognized deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognized to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period/ year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Deferred tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

2.13 Property, plant and equipment

Capital work-in-progress, Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Such cost includes the cost of replacing part of the plant and equipment and borrowing costs for long-term construction projects if the recognition criteria are met. When significant parts of plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Group depreciates them separately based on their specific useful lives. Likewise,

when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied. All other expenses on existing property, plant and equipment, including day-to-day repair and maintenance expenditure and cost of replacing parts, are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss for the period during which such expenses are incurred.

Subsequent expenditure related to an item of property, plant and equipment is added to its book value only if it increases the future benefits from the existing asset beyond its previously assessed standard of performance or extends its estimated useful life.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows:

1. Factory Buildings	:	30 Years
2. Lease Hold Land	:	99 Years
3. Plant Equipment	:	5 to 20 Years
4. Furniture and Fixtures:		10 Years
5. Vehicles	:	3 to 10 Years
6. Computers	:	3 to 6 Years

The Group, based on technical assessment and management estimate, depreciates certain items of plant and equipment and vehicles over estimated useful lives which are different from the useful life prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013. The management believes that these estimated useful lives are realistic and reflect fair approximation of the period over which the assets are likely to be used.

An item of property, plant and equipment and any significant part initially recognized is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognized.

The residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

2.14 Intangible assets

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a business combination is their fair value at the date of acquisition. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses.

Cost relating to software, which is acquired are capitalized and amortized on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives of five to ten years.

Gains or losses arising from derecognition of an intangible asset are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognized.

Amortization method, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at the end of each financial year and adjusted if appropriate.

2.15 Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of an asset that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use or sale are capitalized as part of the cost of the asset. All other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they occur. Borrowing costs consist of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds. Borrowing cost also includes exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

2.16 Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Costs incurred in bringing each product to its present location and conditions are accounted for as follows:

Raw materials: Materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost. Cost includes cost of purchase and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

Finished goods and work-in-progress: cost includes cost of direct materials and labor and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on the normal operating capacity.

Stores, spares and packing materials: are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value, net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

2.17 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Group has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. When the Group expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, for example, under an insurance contract, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset, but only when the reimbursement is virtually certain. The expense relating to a provision is presented in the Statement of Profit and Loss net of any reimbursement.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, when appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as a finance cost.

2.18 Retirement and other employee benefits

Short-term obligations

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service are recognized in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled. The liabilities are presented as current employee benefit obligations in the balance sheet.

Other long-term employee benefit obligations

The liabilities for earned leave and sick leave are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. They are therefore measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the end of the reporting period using the projected unit credit method. The benefits are discounted using the market yields at the end of the reporting period that have terms approximating to the terms of the related obligation.

The obligations are presented as current liabilities in the balance sheet if the entity does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting period, regardless of when the actual settlement is expected to occur.

Post-employment obligations

The Company operates the following post-employment scheme:

- (a) defined benefit plans such as gratuity; and
- (b) defined contribution plans such as provident fund.

Bonus plans

The Company recognizes a liability and an expense for bonuses. The Company recognizes a provision where contractually obliged or where there is a past practice that has created a constructive obligation.

2.19 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks and on hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term deposits, as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts as they are considered an integral part of the Group's cash management.

2.20 Trade receivables

Trade receivables are recognized initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment.

2.21 Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the group prior to the end of financial year which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months after the reporting period. They are recognized initially at their fair value and subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

2.22 Contributed equity

Equity shares are classified as equity.

2.23 Earnings per share

(i) Basic earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing:

- the profit attributable to owners of the group
- by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the financial year, adjusted for bonus elements in equity shares issued during the year and excluding treasury shares.

2.24 Contingent Liabilities

In the opinion of the Board of Directors, adequate provisions have been made in the accounts for all known liabilities. The value of current assets, loans and advances have a value on realization in the ordinary course of business at least equal to the amount at which they are stated in the balance sheet, unless otherwise stated.

2.26 New standards and interpretations not yet adopted

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standard or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. On March 23, 2022, MCA amended the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2022, applicable from April 01, 2022, as below:

Ind AS 103 – Reference to Conceptual Framework

The amendments specify that to qualify for recognition as part of applying the acquisition method, the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed must meet the definitions of assets and liabilities in the Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting under Indian Accounting Standards (Conceptual Framework) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India at the acquisition date. These changes do not significantly change the requirements of Ind AS 103. The Company does not expect the amendment to have any significant impact in its financial statements.

Ind AS 16 – Proceeds before intended use

The amendments mainly prohibit an entity from deducting from the cost of property, plant and equipment amounts received from selling items produced while the Company is preparing the asset for its intended use. Instead, an entity will recognize such sales proceeds and related cost in profit or loss. The Company does not expect the amendments to have any impact in its recognition of its property, plant and equipment in its financial statements.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements For the Year Ended March 31, 2026 (Contd.)

Ind AS 37 – Onerous Contracts - Costs of Fulfilling a Contract

The amendments specify that the "cost of fulfilling" a contract comprises the "costs that relate directly to the contract". Costs that relate directly to a contract can either be incremental costs of fulfilling that contract (examples would be direct labor, materials) or an allocation of other costs that relate directly to fulfilling contracts. The amendment is essentially a clarification and the Company does not expect the amendment to have any significant impact in its financial statements.

Ind AS 109 – Annual Improvements to Ind AS (2021)

The amendment clarifies which fees an entity includes when it applies the "10 percent" test of

Ind AS 109 in assessing whether to derecognize a financial liability. The Company does not expect the amendment to have any significant impact in its financial statements.

Ind AS 116 – Annual Improvements to Ind AS (2021)

The amendments remove the illustration of the reimbursement of leasehold improvements by the lessor in order to resolve any potential confusion regarding the treatment of lease incentives that might arise because of how lease incentives were described in that illustration. The Company does not expect the amendment to have any significant impact in its financial statements.

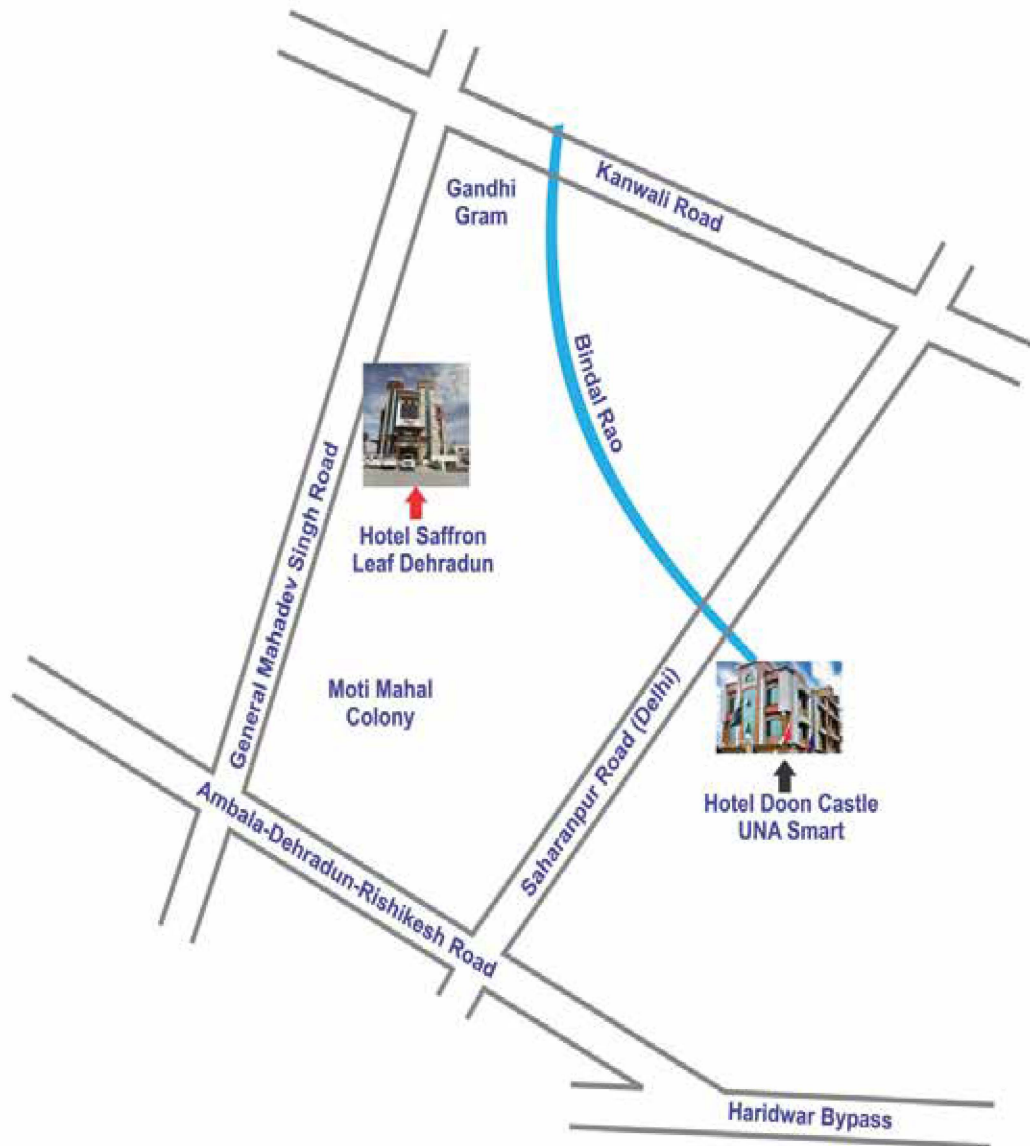
