The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA"), vide its General Circular nos. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020, 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, and subsequent circulars issued in this regard, the latest being 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025, (collectively "MCA Circulars") has permitted companies to conduct AGM through VC or other audio-visual means, subject to compliance with various conditions mentioned therein. In compliance with the aforesaid MCA Circulars, applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013, rules made thereunder, SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("Listing Regulations"), and relevant SEBI circulars issued from time-to-time, the 14th Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Company is being convened and conducted through VC. 5. 10. Those Members who have registered themselves as a speaker will be allowed to express their views, ask questions during the AGM. The Company reserves the right to restrict the number of speakers as well as the speaking time depending upon the availability of time at the AGM.
11. Details as required in sub-regulation (3) of Regulation 36 of Listing Regulations and Secretarial Standard on General Meetings issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India, on directors recommended by the Board for appointment at this Meeting forms part of the Notice. The Director(s) has furnished consent/disclosure for the appointment as required under the Act and rules made thereunder.
12. In accordance with the MCA circulars and SEBI circulars the Notice of AGM is being sent only through the electronic mode to those Members whose e-mail addresses are registered with the Company/Registrar or the Depository Participant(s). The Company will not be dispatching physical copies of Notice of AGM and Annual Report 2025-26 to any Member. General instructions for accessing and participating in the AGM through VC/OAVM Facility and Voting through electronic means including remote e-Voting

1. The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and 15 minutes after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in this Notice.
2. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
3. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 and Regulation 44 of Listing Regulations, and the MCA Circulars and Secretarial Standard-2 issued by Institute of Company Secretaries of India, the Company is providing facility of remote e-Voting to its Members in respect of the business(es) to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with National Securities Depository Limited (NSDL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-Voting system as well as voting on the date of the AGM will be provided by National Securities Depository Limited (NSDL).
4. The remote E-voting period for all items of businesses contained in this notice of AGM shall commence from **Sunday, 27th September 2026 at 09:00 A.M. (IST) and will end on Tuesday, 29th September 2026 at 05:00 P.M. (IST)**. The E-Voting module shall be disabled by NSDL for voting thereafter. Once the vote on a resolution is cast by any Member, he/she shall not be allowed to change it subsequently.

5. The cut-off date for determining the eligibility of shareholders to exercise remote E-voting rights and **attendance at AGM is Wednesday, 23rd September 2026**. A person, whose name is recorded in the Register of Members or in the Register of Beneficial Owners maintained by the Depositories as on the above-mentioned cut-off date, shall be entitled to avail the facility of remote E-voting or voting at the meeting through electronic mode. The voting rights of shareholders shall be in proportion to their shares of the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date. 6. Those Members, who will be present in the AGM through VC/OAVM facility and have not cast their vote on the Resolutions through remote E-voting and are otherwise not barred from doing so, shall be eligible to vote through E-voting system during the AGM.

7. The Members who have cast their vote by remote E-voting prior to the AGM may also attend/participate in the AGM through VC/OAVM but shall not be entitled to cast their vote again. Members are requested to carefully read the instructions for E-voting before casting their vote.

8. At the AGM, the Chairman of the meeting shall after discussion on all the resolutions on which voting is to be held, allow voting by electronic means to all those members who are present at the meeting but have not casted their votes by availing the remote E-voting facility.

9. The Board of Directors of your Company have appointed Mr. J. P. Jagdev, Proprietor of M/s J.P. Jagdev & Co., Practicing Company Secretary (M. No. FCS 2469 and CP 2056), as the Scrutinizer to scrutinize the remote e-voting process and voting through E-voting system at the AGM in a fair and transparent manner.

10. The Scrutinizer shall, immediately after the conclusion of voting at the AGM, will first download the votes cast at the meeting and thereafter unblock the votes cast through remote E-voting in the presence of at least 2 (Two) witnesses not in the employment of the Company. Thereafter the Scrutinizer shall, submit a consolidated Scrutinizer's report of the total votes cast in favour or against, if any, to the Chairman, or a person authorised by him in writing who shall countersign the same and declare the result of voting forthwith. The result of e-voting along with consolidated Scrutinizer's report will be declared upon conclusion of the Meeting, within the permissible timelines.

Items No. III: Ratification of Remuneration payable to Cost Auditors for the Financial Year 2026-27

The Board of Directors of the Company on the recommendation of the Audit Committee approved the appointment and remuneration of **M/s K. K. Sinha & Associates, Cost Accountants, 3396, Sector - 46C, Chandigarh- 160047** (Firm Regn. No. 100279) to conduct the audit of cost records of the Company for the financial year 2026-27, at Rs. 50,000/- per annum (Rupees Fifty Thousand Only) subject to ratification by shareholders.

In terms of the provisions of Section 148(3) of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 14(a) (ii) of The Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014, the remuneration payable to the Cost Auditor is to be ratified by the Members of the Company. Accordingly, the Members are requested to ratify the remuneration payable to the Cost Auditors during the year 2026-27 as set out in the Resolution for the aforesaid services to be rendered by them.

Accordingly, in compliance with above and pursuant to the provisions of Section 161(1) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act"), Ms. Aritika Garg (DIN: 11895058), holds office as an Additional Director till the date of the ensuing 14th Annual General Meeting (AGM) to be held on 30th September 2026.

Ms. Aritika Garg (DIN: 11895058) is a qualified Chartered Accountant with over fifteen years of experience and a professional with expertise in the areas of accounting, finance, taxation, audit and related corporate matters. She possesses the requisite knowledge, skills and professional experience considered relevant for discharging the responsibilities of an Independent Director.

Ms. Garg's professional qualification as a Chartered Accountant, together with her understanding of financial and corporate matters, is expected to enable her to provide valuable guidance and an independent perspective to the Board. Her appointment would also contribute to strengthening the Board's overall composition and governance framework.

The Nomination and Remuneration Committee ("NRC") and the Board of Directors are of the opinion that Ms. Aritika Garg will provide valuable insights to the Company and her appointment as an Independent Director will be in the interest of the Company.

The NRC had identified skills, expertise and competencies required by the Board for the effective functioning of the Company. The selection of the new Independent Director was carried out and concluded by NRC members who were Independent Directors and not considered interested in such proposal. After considering qualifications, skillsets, experience, independence, knowledge, ability to devote sufficient time, the NRC selected and recommended to the Board, the appointment of Ms. Aritika Garg as an Independent Director of the Company. Further, based on the recommendation of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee, the Board of Directors of the Company at its meeting held on 22nd August 2026 also recommended the appointment of Ms. Aritika Garg as an Independent Director on the Board of the Company, not liable to retire by rotation, for a term of 5 (five) consecutive years commencing from 22nd August 2026.

Ms. Aritika Garg (DIN: 11895058) is not disqualified from being appointed as a Director in terms of Section 164 of the Act. The Company has received the consent and requisite declarations as per the provisions of the Act and SEBI Listing Regulations including the declaration that he meets the criteria of independence as provided under Section 149(6) of the Act and Regulation 16 of the SEBI Listing Regulations. Further, in terms of Regulation 25(8) of SEBI Listing Regulations, Ms. Aritika Garg (DIN: 11895058) has also confirmed that she is not aware of any circumstance or situation which exists or may be reasonably anticipated that could impair or impact her ability to discharge her duties.

Further, Ms. Aritika Garg (DIN: 11895058) is not debarred from holding the office of Director pursuant to any Order issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) or any other authority. Further, she is also registered with the Independent Director's databank maintained by the Indian Institute of Corporate Affairs (IICA). In the opinion of the Board, Ms. Aritika Garg (DIN: 11895058) fulfils the conditions for her appointment as an Independent Director, as specified in the Act and SEBI Listing Regulations and is independent of the management.

Considering her expertise and knowledge, the Board considers that the appointment of Ms. Aritika Garg (DIN: 11895058) as an Independent Director of the Company will be in the interest of the Company, and hence, it recommends appointment of Ms. Aritika Garg (DIN: 11895058) as an Independent Director of the Company for period of 5 years, not liable to retire by rotation, for a term commencing from the date of Board's approval i.e. 22nd August 2026.

None of the Directors, Key Managerial Personnel or their relatives are interested in or concerned, financially or otherwise, in passing the proposed resolution.

Item No. V & VI: Approval for Material Transactions with Related Parties:

The provisions of Regulation 23 of SEBI (LODR) Regulations, 2015 ("the SEBI Listing Regulations"), as amended from time to time, mandates prior approval of Members of the Company by way of an Ordinary Resolution, for all material related party transactions and subsequent material modifications as defined by the Audit Committee even if such transactions are in the ordinary course of the business of the concerned Company and at an arm's length basis.

Pursuant to Regulation 23 of the amended SEBI Listing Regulations effective from December 19, 2025, a transaction with a related party is considered material if the transaction(s) to be entered into individually or taken together with previous transactions of the Company along with its subsidiaries during a financial year exceeds the materiality threshold prescribed under Schedule XII of the SEBI Listing Regulations.

The Company is a manufacturing and trading organization having its production/refining plant of Edible Oils. Our manufacturing and trading process involves dealing in Refined Rice Bran Oil, Canola Oil, Soya Bean Oil, Sunflower Oil and Rice Bran Bleached Oil. Our company is focused at production of highest quality of edible oil.

We firmly believe in benchmark product quality, customer centric approach, people focus, ethical business practices. By way of periodical expansion, MKPL has increased its production capacity from time & again to cater to changing business environment & varied customer needs. The company's turnover has increased manifold over time and is expected to grow substantially in subsequent years.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION ANALYSIS**CAUTIONARY STATEMENT**

The Management Discussion and Analysis sections contain the Company's objectives, projections, estimates and expectations may constitute certain statements, which are forward-looking within the meaning of applicable laws and regulations. The statements in this management discussion and analysis report could differ materially from those expressed or implied. Important factors that could make a difference to the Company's operations include economic conditions affecting demand/supply and price conditions in the Government policies, tax regimes, forex markets, economic developments within India and the countries with which the Company conducts business, political factors and such other factors beyond the control of the Company.

COMPANY OVERVIEW:

Our Company was incorporated on June 15, 2012 in Ambala, Haryana as a Private Limited Company. In 2017 the Company was converted into Public Company and subsequently overtime got listed in NSE and then in BSE. The Company is a manufacturing and trading organization having its production/refining plant of Edible Oils. Our manufacturing and trading process involves dealing in Refined Rice Bran Oil, Canola Oil, Soya Bean Oil, Sunflower Oil and Rice Bran Bleached Oil. During the refining process certain by-products are also manufactured such as Rice Bran Fatty Acid Oil, Rice Bran Wax, Gums and Spent Earth which are also saleable. Our company is focused at production of highest quality of edible oil. Our refinery is completely mechanized and today we produce rice bran oil, with controlled fiber free from oil residue, ash and sand & silica. This is possible only through sustained levels of cleaning, storage and monitoring arrangements. Our Company based on its extensive experience of its promoters and its standards, conforms to major specifications and customer requirements. We firmly believe in benchmark product quality, customer centric approach, people focus, ethical business practices. By way of periodical expansion, MKPL has increased its production capacity from time & again to cater to changing business environment & varied customer needs. The company's turnover has increased manifold over time and is expected to grow substantially in subsequent years.

INDUSTRY STRUCTURE, DEVELOPMENTS AND OUTLOOK

The edible oil manufacturing industry in India is highly fragmented, with numerous players catering to diverse consumer preferences and regional demands. The industry is characterized

by intense competition, price volatility of raw materials, and evolving regulatory norms. Our company operates in this dynamic environment and has adapted its strategies to capitalize on emerging opportunities.

At present, India is the world's largest importer of edible oil. Over the past six decades, the per capita consumption of edible oils in India has substantially increased. It now stands at approximately 19 kg per year. Factors such as rising disposable incomes, urbanisation, evolving dietary preferences and the expansion of the food processing sector have led to a heightened demand for edible oils in India. To meet this burgeoning domestic demand, India imports approximately 16 million metric tonnes of edible oils every year. In the first seven months of the 2024-25 (November-May), imported edible oil totalling 76.77 lakh tonnes. The agricultural sector's expansion, coupled with various initiatives aimed at augmenting oilseed production nationwide is further driving the market for edible oils in India.

We have witnessed significant progress in terms of market penetration and brand recognition in the past. Our commitment to quality and continuous improvement has helped us gain customer trust and loyalty. Looking ahead, we aim to expand our distribution network, explore new product categories, and invest in technology to enhance productivity and sustainability.

The Indian economy has displayed resilience amidst global uncertainties and internal challenges. The government's focus on infrastructure development, ease of doing business, and reforms in the agricultural sector has positively impacted our industry. However, macroeconomic factors such as inflation, exchange rate fluctuations, and policy changes need to be closely monitored.

INDIAN ECONOMIC OVERVIEW

India continues to be one of the fastest-growing major economies globally and is increasingly emerging as a leading consumption and investment destination. With nominal GDP projected to reach approximately US\$ 8.9 trillion and per capita GDP expected to cross US\$ 5,000 over the next decade, the country is witnessing a structural shift from need-based consumption towards aspirational and lifestyle-led spending.

Per capita spending on packaged foods has increased from approximately ₹4,800 in 2020 to ₹7,600 in 2025, and is expected to continue growing steadily over the coming years. Several structural factors, including rising household incomes, rapid urbanisation, increasing participation of women in the workforce, nuclearization of families and a young digital-native population, continue to reshape consumption patterns.

The growing preference for convenience, health and quality, coupled with increasing adoption of organised retail, e-commerce and quick commerce, is accelerating the shift towards branded and packaged staples. At the same time, the rapid expansion of upper-middleclass and affluent households is driving premiumisation across food categories, creating significant long-term opportunities for trusted brands and organised food companies.

GLOBAL OVERVIEW

The global economy remained resilient during FY26 despite continuing geopolitical uncertainties, supply chain disruptions and volatility across commodity and financial markets. While Inflationary pressures moderated across several major economies, growth remained uneven amid evolving trade dynamics, fluctuating energy prices and shifting monetary policy environments. Against this backdrop, global food consumption continued to demonstrate structural resilience, supported by population growth, urbanisation and increasing consumer preference for trusted and value-added food products. Companies with diversified sourcing networks, integrated operations and strong risk management capabilities remained better positioned to navigate market volatility and capitalise on emerging opportunities.

Opportunities and Threats

The continued expansion of India's food and FMCG market presents significant opportunities for companies like ours to achieve steady growth in both revenue and profitability. With marketers increasingly tapping into rural India through modern retail formats such as haats, the potential for deeper market penetration is expanding rapidly. Rising income levels have fuelled greater spending on value-added and branded products, including edible oils. Affordable innovation will be key to helping more consumers access and adopt our offerings. Additionally, growing demand for edible oils—driven by a rising population and improved economic sentiment post-pandemic—remains a major growth driver.

The rise in lifestyle-related health issues, especially heart and cardiovascular diseases, has sparked a shift in consumer preference toward healthier oils. This creates a strong opportunity for companies offering heart-friendly options like rice bran, canola, and sunflower oils. At the same time, increasing competition from both domestic and global players continues to be a challenge, but we are well-prepared to respond through agility and innovation. India's young and growing urban population—projected to rise from 31% in FY2011 to 36% by FY2036—will further drive food consumption trends.

Meanwhile, the ongoing digitization of commerce presents both opportunities and risks. It allows us to target and serve customers more efficiently but also lowers the entry barrier for smaller players leveraging digital platforms. A consistent rise in edible oil imports to bridge the demand-supply gap has contributed to trade imbalances and foreign exchange outflows. Strengthening domestic oilseed production and productivity is essential to reduce dependency on imports and achieve long-term supply sustainability. The sector also faces direct risks from fluctuating raw material prices, which are influenced by environmental factors, crop conditions,

and geopolitical issues. Monsoon patterns, global production of soybean, mustard, and palm oil, and policy changes on interest rates and import duties continue to affect input costs and margins. Despite these challenges, the widening gap between domestic production and consumption is creating long-term demand. With thoughtful strategic planning, focus on innovation, and continued investment in brand and supply chain, the Indian edible oil industry is well-positioned to tap into its strong growth potential while managing emerging risks.

RISKS AND CONCERNS

In our edible oil business, majority of raw material comes from imports. Geo-political events can cause supply disruptions, exporting countries government can put restrictions on exports. Weather conditions can result in reduction of crop production.

Other operational factors include operating efficiency, product diversity, market position, and ability to secure raw material as well as the commodity price and forex-risk management systems. Risk financial position and returns metrics, capital structure, ability to generate positive cash flows from operations and the adequacy of the same in relation to its contractual debt service obligations.

There can be increase in taxes on import of crude edible oil. There can be restriction on the quantity that any Company can import. This can put a large Company like us at a disadvantage compared to our competitors.

Your Company is exposed to commodity price fluctuations in its business the edible oil prices in India are directly correlated to international oil price movements and currency movements that make profitability vulnerable to unexpected fluctuations.

Risks are an integral part of any business environment and it is essential that we create structures and processes that are capable of identifying and effectively mitigating them. For us, the risks are multi-dimensional and therefore we look at it in a holistic manner, straddling both, the external environment and the internal processes. These risks can be broadly classified into following categories: Strategic Risk, Compliance and Governance Risk, Financial Risk, Environmental Risk, Operational Risk and Social Risk.

Further, Key risks for the edible oils sector include risks from change in import-export regulations; change in the minimum support price (MSP) on oilseeds offered by the government; high dependence on monsoons and finally, the risk arising out of exchange rate fluctuations. Procurement of oilseeds at the right price and quantity, optimum utilization of

processing units, their strategic location, a strong brand name and diversification of product offerings are likely to be the key success determinants for players.

Increase in the number of competing brands in the marketplace, counter campaigning and aggressive pricing by competitors have the potential to create a disruption.

Changing consumer preference and Demand can be adversely affected due to shift in consumer preferences, especially those induced by the pandemic. Given the potential of social media, the speed of such a shift could be unparalleled.

The key determinants of business risk profile of the company are their ability to overcome the regulatory risk and agroclimatic conditions. Other operational factors include operating efficiency, product diversity, market position, and ability to secure raw material as well as the commodity price.

The profitability of edible oil companies is significantly influenced by regulatory changes and remains highly susceptible to the changes in the duty differential between import duties on crude and refined oil by the Government of India (GOI).

Also, the profitability of these companies depends on the changes in the export tax levied by exporting countries, mainly Indonesia and Malaysia (that account for most of palm oil imports).

DISCUSSION ON FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE WITH RESPECT TO OPERATIONAL PERFORMANCE

The financial statements have been prepared in compliance with the requirement of the Companies Act, 2013 and Indian Accounting Standards of India (Ind AS). During the year under review, the company reported profit of **Rs. 9,38,86,716.28/-** before tax adjustments as compared to profit of **Rs. 11,45,10,060.77/-** before tax adjustment in the previous year.

The company's revenue increased to **INR 3,82,87,51,812.54/-** during FY 2025-26 from **INR 2,67,70,59,633.37** for the same period ending FY 2024-25.

The Company achieved robust revenue growth of **43.02%** during FY 2025-26, with revenue increasing from **₹2.68 billion** to **₹3.83 billion**. Despite this strong top-line performance, **Profit Before Tax (PBT)** and **Profit After Tax (PAT)** declined by **18.01%** and **18.50%**, respectively. The reduction in profitability was because of increased operating costs, finance costs, depreciation, or other expenses. Going forward, the Company will focus on improving operational efficiency, optimizing costs, and enhancing margins to translate strong revenue growth into sustainable profitability.

Report on the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying standalone financial statements of **M. K. PROTEINS LIMITED** ('the Company'), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2026 and the Statement of Profit and Loss (Including Other Comprehensive Income), Statement of Changes in Equity and the Statement of Cash Flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid standalone financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Indian Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March 31, 2026, and its profit including Other Comprehensive Income, its cash flows and the changes in equity for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit of the standalone financial statements in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under Section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements section of our report. Key Audit Matters

Key Audit Matters ("KAM") are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the standalone financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the standalone financial statements as a whole and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. We have determined the matters described below to be the Key Audit Matters to be communicated in our audit report.

The Key Audit Matters	Auditor's Response
Revenue Recognition and Year-end Cut-off Revenue from operations is a significant performance indicator for the Company and increased substantially during the year. Revenue is recognised upon transfer of control of goods to customers, generally upon dispatch/delivery, in accordance with the requirements of Ind AS 115, <i>Revenue from Contracts with Customers</i>. The recognition of revenue involves significant judgment with respect to determination of transfer of control, timing of recognition, year-end cut-off, rebates, discounts, sales returns, and other variable consideration arrangements. Further, considering the high volume of transactions, pricing volatility in the edible oil industry, and inherent risk of management override, there exists a risk that revenue may be recognised in an incorrect accounting period or before transfer of control to customers. Considering the materiality of revenue transactions and the extent of audit effort involved, revenue recognition and year-end cut-off were considered to be a Key Audit Matter.	Principal Audit Procedure Our audit procedures in relation to revenue recognition included, among others, the following: • Obtained an understanding of the Company's revenue recognition process and evaluated the design, implementation, and operating effectiveness of key internal controls relating to revenue recognition and year-end cut-off. • Tested application controls, system interfaces, and relevant manual controls over recording of revenue transactions in the accounting system. • Performed substantive testing on selected sales transactions by examining supporting documents such as customer contracts, sales orders, invoices, delivery challans, e-way bills, transport documents, customer acknowledgements, and rebate / discount arrangements. • Performed year-end cut-off testing by verifying dispatches and sales transactions recorded before and after the reporting date to assess whether revenue was recognised in the appropriate accounting period. • Reviewed credit notes, sales returns, rebates, and discounts issued subsequent to the year-end to evaluate completeness and accuracy of revenue recognised during the year. • Performed analytical procedures comparing revenue trends, dispatch quantities, pricing patterns, and gross margins to assess the reasonableness of revenue recognised. • Evaluated the appropriateness of the accounting policy and adequacy of disclosures relating to revenue recognition in accordance with Ind AS 115.
Inventory Valuation and Process Loss Estimation Inventory constituted a significant portion of the Company's total assets as at the reporting date. During the year, gross profit margins declined significantly, indicating increased estimation uncertainty relating to inventory valuation, process efficiency and assessment of net realizable value ("NRV"). The valuation of inventory involves significant management judgment with respect to determination of cost, allocation of production overheads, estimation of process loss and yield in the manufacturing process, and assessment of NRV, particularly considering volatility in edible oil prices and market conditions. Considering the quantitative materiality of inventory balances, the judgment involved in valuation and process loss estimation, and the extent of audit procedures performed, inventory valuation and process loss estimation were considered to be a Key Audit Matter.	Our audit procedures in relation to inventory valuation and process loss estimation included, among others, the following: • Reconciled physical inventory quantities with inventory records and books of account. • Evaluated the appropriateness and consistency of the inventory valuation methodology adopted by the Company. • Verified raw material purchase costs, production records, and cost build-up for selected inventory items. • Reviewed process loss and yield reports and compared them with historical trends, technical benchmarks and production norms. • Performed net realizable value ("NRV") testing using post year-end selling prices and prevailing market trends. • Reviewed ageing analysis and assessed the adequacy of provisions for slow-moving and obsolete inventory. • Evaluated the adequacy and appropriateness of disclosures relating to inventory in the standalone financial statements.

Contingent liabilities relating to taxation, litigations and claims	Principal Audit Procedure
The Company is exposed to various direct and indirect tax matters arising in the ordinary course of business. As at the reporting date, contingent liabilities primarily comprise pending income tax appeals relating to disallowance of expenses for Assessment Years 2016–17 to 2018–19 and Goods and Services Tax (“GST”) demand proceedings pertaining to FY 2019–20, against which appeals have been filed before the appropriate authorities. The assessment of such matters involves significant management judgment in evaluating the likelihood of future outflows, interpretation of applicable tax laws and regulations, and determination of whether a provision is required or disclosure as a contingent liability is appropriate under the applicable accounting framework. Considering the degree of judgment involved, uncertainty relating to the ultimate outcome of the matters, and the potential financial impact on the standalone financial statements, contingent liabilities relating to taxation matters and claims were considered to be a Key Audit Matter.	Our audit procedures in relation to contingent liabilities and claims included, among others, the following: • Obtained an understanding of the Company’s process for identification, assessment, and monitoring of litigations, tax matters, and contingent liabilities. • Evaluated the design and implementation of controls relating to assessment and recording of provisions and contingent liabilities. • Reviewed management’s assessment and assumptions relating to pending income tax and GST matters. • Examined relevant demand notices, appeal documents, orders, legal correspondence, and communications received from statutory and regulatory authorities. • Discussed the status of significant matters with management and reviewed opinions obtained from legal and tax consultants, where available. • Assessed whether the recognition, measurement, and disclosure of contingent liabilities were in accordance with the requirements of the applicable accounting standards. • Evaluated the adequacy and appropriateness of disclosures relating to contingent liabilities in the standalone financial statements.

Note forming part of the standalone financial statements for the year ended March 31st, 2026

[1] CORPORATE INFORMATION

M. K. Proteins Limited ('the Company') is a public limited company incorporated in India in the year 2012. The Corporate Identification Number (CIN) of the Company is L15500HR2012PLC046239. The registered office of the Company is situated at Village Garmala, Naraingarh Road, Tehsil and Distt. Ambala (Haryana) – 134003. The Company is engaged in the business of manufacturing Vegetable Refined Oil and its by-products, including rice bran fatty acid, wax, gums and spent earth. The manufacturing facility of the Company is located at the same address. The equity shares of the Company are listed on the Main Board of the National Stock Exchange of India Limited ("NSE") and BSE Limited ("BSE").

[2] BASIS OF PREPARATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Statement of Compliance

The Standalone Financial Statements ("Financial Statements") have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act"), read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended. The Financial Statements also comply with the presentation and disclosure requirements of Division II of Schedule III to the Act, other applicable provisions of the Act, and the guidelines issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI). The Company has consistently applied its accounting policies across all reporting periods.

Accordingly, the Company has prepared these standalone financial statements which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), the Statement of Cash Flows and the Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended as on that date, and accounting policies and other explanatory information.

The financial statements were approved for issue by the Company's Board of Directors at their meeting held on May 29, 2026

b) Basis of Preparation of Financial Statement

i) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS), using the historical cost convention on an accrual basis, except for certain financial assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value (refer to the accounting policy on financial instruments), and the employee defined benefit obligations, which are valued actuarially at the end of each reporting period.

Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services at the time of their acquisition. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or liability, the Company uses observable market data as far as possible. Fair values are categorized into different levels in a Fair Value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date.

Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).

Level 3: Inputs for the assets or liabilities that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

If the inputs used to measure the Fair Value of an asset or a liability fall into different levels of the Fair Value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety in the same level of the Fair Value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

ii) **Functional and Presentation currency**

These financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (INR), which is the functional currency of the Company and the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates.

iii) **Current and Non-current classification**

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/non-current classification. An asset is treated as current when it is:

- Expected to be realized or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle.
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading.
- Expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

Based on the nature of products and the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as twelve months for the purpose of current/non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

c) **New and amended standards adopted by the Company**

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA"), vide notifications dated May 7, 2025 and August 13, 2025, notified the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2025 and the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Second Amendment Rules, 2025, respectively, which amended certain accounting standards and are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after April 1, 2025. The Company has adopted the following amendments during the current year:

i) **Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-current and Non-current Liabilities with Covenants – Amendments to Ind AS 1**

The amendments to Ind AS 1 clarify the requirements relating to classification of liabilities as current or non-current, including the assessment of covenants attached to borrowings.

The Company has certain short-term borrowings containing customary financial and operational covenants. The adoption of the aforesaid amendments did not result in any change in the classification of such borrowings as at the reporting date. Accordingly, the amendments did not have any material impact on the standalone financial statements of the Company and no retrospective adjustments were required.

ii) **Supplier Finance Arrangements – Amendments to Ind AS 7 and Ind AS 107**

The Company does not have any supplier finance arrangements during the year. Accordingly, the amendments to Ind AS 7 and Ind AS 107 did not have any impact on the standalone financial statements of the Company.

- iii) **International Tax Reform – Pillar Two Model Rules – Amendments to Ind AS 12**
The Company is not within the scope of the OECD Pillar Two Model Rules. Accordingly, the amendments to Ind AS 12 did not have any impact on the standalone financial statements of the Company.
- iv) **Lack of Exchangeability – Amendments to Ind AS 21**
The Company does not have any foreign currency transactions during the year. Accordingly, the amendments to Ind AS 21 relating to lack of exchangeability did not have any impact on the standalone financial statements of the Company.
- d) **Use of Estimates and Judgement**
The preparation of financial statements in accordance with the recognition and measurement principles of Ind AS requires management of the Company to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amount of assets, liabilities, disclosures relating to contingent liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of income and expenses during the period. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to the accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are known or materialised.

The significant areas of estimation, uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amount recognised in the financial statements is included in the following notes:
 - i) **Useful lives of property, plant and equipment:**
The Company calculates depreciation on property, plant and equipment on a straight –line basis. The management believes that depreciation rates currently used fairly reflect its estimate of the useful lives and residual values of property, plant and equipment as prescribed under Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013. The useful lives are based on historical experience with similar assets as well as anticipation of future events, which may impact their lives, such as change in technology. This reassessment may result in a change in depreciation expenses in future periods.
 - ii) **Estimation of residual values of property, plant and equipment:**
The estimation of residual values of Property, Plant and Equipment involves significant management judgment. Residual values are determined based on expected recoverable value at the end of the asset's useful life, considering technical assessment, historical experience and market conditions. Where the residual value equals the carrying amount, depreciation is not charged.
 - iii) **Recognition of deferred tax assets and liabilities:**
Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for deductible temporary differences. The Company uses judgement to determine the amount of deferred tax that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and the level of future taxable profits and business development.
 - iv) **Defined Benefit plans obligation:**
The liabilities and costs for defined benefit gratuity plans and other post-employment benefits are determined using actuarial valuations. The actuarial valuation involves making assumptions relating to discount rates, future salary increases, mortality rates and future pension increases. Due to the long-term nature of these plans, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainty.
 - v) **Provision for expected credit loss of trade receivables and contract assets:**
The measurements of expected credit losses on financial assets are based on an assessment of collectability and involve significant management judgment, taking into account both internal and external sources of information. A substantial degree of judgment is required in evaluating the ultimate recoverability of loans and receivables, considering the past collection history of each counterparty, ongoing business relationships, and an assessment of their ability to meet repayment obligations on the designated due dates.

vi) **Inventories:**

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In estimating the net realizable value of inventories, the Company makes an estimate of future selling prices and costs necessary to make the sale.

vii) **Provisions and contingent liabilities:**

A provision is recognised when the Company has a present obligation as a result of past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions (excluding retirement benefits and compensated absences) are not discounted to its present value and are determined based on best estimate of expenditure required to settle the obligation at the Balance Sheet date. These are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Contingent liabilities are not recognised in the financial statements. A contingent asset is neither recognised nor disclosed in the financial statements.

viii) **Leases:**

Ind AS 116 *Leases* requires a lessee to determine the lease term as the non-cancellable period of the lease, adjusted for any extension or termination options, if the use of such options is reasonably certain. The Company assesses the expected lease term on a lease-by-lease basis and evaluates whether it is reasonably certain that any extension or termination options will be exercised. In making this assessment, the Company considers various factors, including significant leasehold improvements made during the lease term, costs associated with lease termination, and the strategic importance of the underlying asset—particularly in terms of its location and the availability of suitable alternatives. To ensure that the lease term remains reflective of current economic conditions, the Company reassesses lease terms periodically.

As the interest rate implicit in the lease cannot be readily determined, the Company uses its incremental borrowing rate (IBR) to measure lease liabilities. The IBR represents the rate of interest the Company would have to pay to borrow funds over a similar term, with similar security, to obtain an asset of comparable value to the right-of-use asset in a similar economic environment. This rate is estimated using observable inputs, such as prevailing market interest rates, when available.

II SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) **Property, Plant and Equipment:**

Property, Plant and Equipment (other than freehold land) are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss, if any. The cost of an item of Property, Plant and Equipment comprises:

- a) its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable taxes (i.e. Excise Duty/Value added taxes/Goods and Services Tax, if any), after deducting trade discounts and rebates
- b) any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the management.
- c) the initial estimate of the costs of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site on which it is located.
- d) any subsequent expenditure for replacement/repair and maintenance is capitalised only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company. Otherwise the same are recognised as expenditure in the statement of profit and loss when they are incurred.

Expenses directly related to the construction or acquisition of the fixed assets have been capitalised and added to the particular assets. Pre-operative expenses incurred till the date of capitalization have been apportioned on pro-rata basis. Items of fixed assets that are not yet ready for their intended use as at the balance sheet date and other pre-operative expenses to the extent not apportioned are shown under the head “Capital work in progress”.

If significant parts of an item of Property, Plant and Equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of Property, Plant and Equipment and depreciated accordingly.

Any gains or losses arising from de-recognition of fixed assets are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset on the date of disposal and are recognised in the statement of profit and loss when the asset is derecognised.

Depreciation/Amortisation:

In respect of fixed assets (other than freehold land and capital work-in-progress) the Company calculates depreciation on straight-line basis ('SLM') based on useful lives and residual values estimated by the management in accordance with Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013. Depreciation in respect of addition/deduction to fixed assets during the year has been charged on pro-rata basis.

Depreciation is not recorded on capital work-in-progress until construction and installation is complete and the asset is ready for its intended use.

The management has estimated the useful lives of the assets based on technical assessment, historical experience and the nature of the assets. The estimated useful lives of various classes of assets are as follows:

The estimated residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period on a prospective basis.

Where the carrying amount of an asset is equal to its estimated residual value, no depreciation is charged. Residual values and useful lives are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted prospectively, where appropriate.

b) Leases

The Company assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

i) Company as lessee

The Company applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term leases. The Company recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and Right-of-use assets representing the right to use the underlying assets.

Right-of-use assets

The Company recognises Right-of-use assets at the commencement date of the lease (i.e., the date the underlying asset is available for use). Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. The cost of Right-of-use assets includes the amount of lease liabilities recognised, initial direct costs incurred, and lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease term. The Right-of-use assets are also subject to impairment.

If ownership of the leased asset transfers to the Company at the end of the lease term or the cost reflects the exercise of a purchase option, depreciation is calculated using the estimated useful life of the asset.

Lease Liabilities

At the commencement date of the lease, the Company recognises lease liabilities measured at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments include fixed payments (including in substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable. The lease payments also include the exercise price of a purchase option reasonably certain to be exercised by the Company and payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the Company exercising the option to terminate.

In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Company uses its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. After the commencement date, the amount of lease liabilities is increased to reflect the accretion of interest and reduced for the lease payments made. In addition, the carrying amount of lease liabilities is remeasured if there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in the lease payments (e.g., changes to future payments resulting from a change in an index or rate used to determine such lease payments) or a change in the assessment of an option to purchase the underlying asset. The Company's lease liabilities are presented in the Balance Sheet under Financial Liabilities (Refer Note 35).

Short-term leases

The Company applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term leases (i.e. those leases that have a lease term of twelve months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option). Lease payments on short-term leases are recognized as expenses.

ii) Company as a lessor

Leases in which the Company does not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of an asset are classified as operating leases. Rental income arising is accounted for over the lease terms. Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating and arranging an operating lease are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognised over the lease term on the same basis as rental income.

c) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value after providing for obsolescence and other losses, where considered necessary. Cost includes all charges in bringing the goods to the point of sale, including freight and other levies, transit insurance and receiving charges. The cost of inventories is determined using the First-in-First out basis. Work-in-progress and finished goods include appropriate proportion of overheads based on the normal operating capacity, wherever applicable. Cost of finished goods further includes other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Cost of stock-in-trade includes cost of purchases and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price for inventories in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale. However, materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be used are expected to be sold at or above cost.

d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the Balance Sheet comprise cash at banks and on hand and short-term deposits with a maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of presentation in the Statement of Cash Flows, Cash and Cash Equivalents includes balance with banks and demand deposits with banks with original maturities of three months or less and other short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

e) **Financial Instruments**

Financial assets and liabilities are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than Financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

i) **Financial assets**

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial assets are recognised initially at fair value plus, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Financial assets are classified, at initial recognition, as financial assets measured at fair value or as 'Financial assets measured at amortised cost'. The classification depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

Subsequent measurement

After initial recognition, financial assets are measured at fair value (either through other comprehensive income or through profit and loss), or amortised cost.

Debt Instruments

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income ('FVTOCI') or fair value through profit and loss ('FVTPL') till de-recognition on the basis of (i) the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and (ii) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

There are three measurement categories into which the Company classifies its debt instruments.

a) Debt instruments at amortised cost

Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest [SPPI] are measured at amortised cost. A gain or loss on a debt investment that is subsequently measured at amortised cost is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is de-recognised or impaired. Interest income from these financial assets is included in other income using the effective interest rate method.

b) Debt instruments at Fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI):

Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows and for selling the financial assets, where the assets' cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, are measured at FVTOCI. Movements in the carrying amount are taken through OCI, except for the recognition of impairment gains or losses, interest revenue and foreign exchange gains and losses which are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. When the financial asset is de-recognised, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from equity to the Statement of Profit and Loss and recognised in other gains/ (losses). Interest income from these financial assets is included in other income using the effective interest rate method.

c) Debt instruments at Fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL):

Assets that do not meet the criteria for amortised cost or FVTOCI are measured at FVTPL. A gain or loss on a debt investment that is subsequently measured at FVTPL is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which it arises. Interest income from these financial assets is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Equity instruments

All equity investments in scope of Ind AS 109 are measured at fair value. Equity instruments which are held for trading are classified as at FVTPL.

For all other equity instruments, the Company decides to classify the same either as at FVTOCI or FVTPL.

The Company makes such election on an instrument-by-instrument basis. The classification is made on initial recognition and is irrevocable.

If the Company decides to classify an equity instrument as at FVTOCI, then all fair value changes on the instrument, excluding dividends, are recognized in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). There is no recycling of the amounts from OCI to Statement of Profit and Loss, even on sale of such investments.

Equity instruments included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Investment in equity shares, compulsorily convertible debentures and compulsory convertible preference shares of subsidiaries, associates and jointly controlled entities have been measured at cost less impairment allowance, if any.

De-recognition of financial assets

A financial asset is derecognized only when:

- the Company has transferred the rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset or
- retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows from the financial asset but assumes a contractual obligation to pay the cash flows to one or more recipients.

Where the entity has transferred an asset, the Company evaluates whether it has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset. In such cases, the financial asset is derecognized. Where the entity has not transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is not derecognized.

Where the entity has neither transferred a financial asset nor retains substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is derecognized if the Company has not retained control of the financial asset. Where the Company retains control of the financial asset, the asset is continued to be recognized to the extent of continuing involvement in the financial asset.

Impairment of financial assets

The Company applies Expected Credit Loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on the following financial assets and credit risk exposure:

- Financial assets that are debt instruments, and are measured at amortised cost e.g., loans, deposits, and bank balance.
- Trade receivables.

The Company follows 'simplified approach' for recognition of impairment loss allowance on trade receivables which do not contain a significant financing component.

The application of simplified approach does not require the Company to track changes in credit risk. Rather, it recognises impairment loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date, right from its initial recognition.

Income recognition (Interest income)

Interest income from debt instruments is recognized using the effective interest rate method. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset.

ii) Financial liabilities**Initial recognition and measurement**

Financial liabilities are initially measured at their fair value plus or minus, in the case of a financial liability not at FVTPL, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the issue/origination of the financial liability.

Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are classified as measured at amortised cost or FVTPL. A financial liability is classified as FVTPL if it is classified as held- for trading, or it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition. Financial liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value and net gains and losses, including any interest expense, are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognized in Statement of Profit and Loss. Any gain or loss on de-recognition is also recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

De-recognition

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Offsetting financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the Balance Sheet where there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. The legally enforceable right must not be contingent on future events and must be enforceable in the normal course of business and in the event of default, insolvency or bankruptcy of the Company or the counterparty.

Derivative financial instruments

The Company uses derivative financial instruments, such as forward currency contracts, interest rate swaps and forward commodity contracts to hedge its foreign currency risks, interest rate risks and commodity price risks respectively. Such derivative financial instruments are initially recognised at Fair Value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at Fair Value. Derivatives are carried as financial assets when the Fair Value is positive and as financial liabilities when the Fair Value is negative.

f) Equity Instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments issued are recognised at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Repurchase of the Company's own equity instruments is recognised and deducted directly in equity. No gain or loss is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss on the purchase, sale, issue or cancellation of the Company's own equity instruments.

g) Borrowings Cost

Borrowing costs, general or specific, that are directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of qualifying assets are capitalised as part of such assets. A qualifying asset is one that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for intended use. All other borrowing costs are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

The Company determines the amount of borrowing costs eligible for capitalization as the actual borrowing costs incurred on that borrowing during the year less any interest income earned on temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets, to the extent that a company borrows funds specifically for the purpose of obtaining a qualifying asset. In cases where the Company borrows generally and uses the funds for obtaining a qualifying asset, borrowing costs eligible for capitalization are determined by applying a capitalization rate to the expenditures on that asset.

Borrowing cost includes exchange differences arising from foreign currency borrowings to the extent they are regarded as an adjustment to the finance cost.

h) **Revenue Recognition**

i) **Revenue from contracts with customers**

Revenue from contracts with customers is recognised when control of the goods or services is transferred to the customer at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Company expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. The Company has concluded that it is the principal in all of its revenue arrangements since it is the primary obligor in all the revenue arrangements as it has pricing latitude and is also exposed to inventory risks.

Goods and Services Tax (GST) is not received by the Company on its own account. Rather, it is tax collected on the value added to the commodity by the seller on behalf of the government. Accordingly, it is excluded from revenue.

ii) **Sale of Goods**

Revenue from sale of products is recognised at the point in time when control of the asset is transferred to the customer, generally on delivery of the products. Invoices are payable within contractually agreed credit period.

The Company considers whether there are other promises in the contract that are separate performance obligations to which a portion of the transaction price needs to be allocated. In determining the transaction price for the sale of products, the Company considers the effects of variable consideration (if any).

Revenue from sale of products is stated exclusive of Goods and Services Tax (GST). Revenues are net of sales returns, discounts, provision for anticipated returns on expiry, made on the basis of management expectations.

iii) **Refund Liabilities**

A refund liability is recognised for the obligation to refund some or all of the consideration received (or receivable) from the customer. The Company's refund liabilities arise from customers' right of return and volume rebates. The Company updates its estimates of refund liabilities at the end of each reporting period.

iv) **Rendering of Services**

Service income is recognised as per the terms of the contracts/arrangements when related services are performed and is stated net of GST.

v) **Dividend and Interest Income**

Dividend income from investments is recognised when the shareholder's right to receive payment has been established (provided that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of income can be measured reliably). Interest income from a financial asset is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of income can be measured reliably. Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount on initial recognition.

vi) **Contract Balances**

Trade Receivables

Trade receivables are amounts due from customers for goods sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business and reflect the Company's unconditional right to consideration (that is, payment is due only on the passage of time). Trade receivables are recognised initially at transaction price. The Company holds the trade receivables with the objective of collecting the contractual cash flows and therefore measures them subsequently at amortised cost net of any expected credit losses. Loss allowance on trade receivables is measured at an amount equal to life time expected losses.

Contract Liabilities

A contract liability is recognised if a payment is received or a payment is due (whichever is earlier) from a customer before the Company transfers the related goods or services. Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the Company performs under the contract (i.e., transfers control of the related goods or services to the customer).

i) **Employee Benefits**

Employee benefits include salaries, wages, contribution to provident fund, employee state insurance fund & Labour welfare fund, leave encashment for un-availed leave, gratuity, compensated absences and other terminal benefits.

i) **Defined Contribution Scheme**

Retirement benefits such as provident fund, employee state insurance, and labour welfare fund are classified as defined contribution schemes. The Company's obligation under these schemes is limited to the amount of contributions payable, which is recognized as an expense when the employee renders the related service.

If the contribution payable for services rendered before the balance sheet date exceeds the amount already paid, the shortfall is recognized as a liability after deducting the contributions already paid. Conversely, if the contributions already paid exceed the amount due for services received before the balance sheet date, the excess is recognized as an asset, to the extent that the prepayment will result in a reduction of future payments or a refund of cash

ii) **Defined benefit plans**

Defined benefit plans comprising of gratuity and other terminal benefits, are recognized based on the present value of defined benefit obligations which is computed using the projected unit credit method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each annual reporting period. These are accounted for either as current employee cost or included in cost of assets as permitted.

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of the defined benefit obligation and the fair value of plan assets. This cost is included in employee benefit expense in the statement of profit and loss.

Re-measurement gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are recognised in the period in which they occur, directly in other comprehensive income. They are included in retained earnings in the statement of changes in equity and in the balance sheet.

Changes in the present value of the defined benefit obligation resulting from plan amendments or curtailments are recognised immediately in profit or loss as past service cost.

iii) **Short term employee benefits**

The undiscounted amount of short-term employee benefits expected to be paid in exchange for the services rendered by employees is recognised during the year when the employees render the service. These benefits include performance incentive and compensated absences which are expected to occur within twelve months after the end of the period in which the employee renders the related service.

iv) **Terminal benefits**

Termination benefits are payable when employment is terminated by the Company before the normal retirement date, or when an employee accepts voluntary retirement scheme in exchange for these benefits. Expenditure on Voluntary Retirement Scheme (VRS) is charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss when incurred.

j) **Income Tax**

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in statement of profit and loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in the other comprehensive income or in equity. In such cases, the tax is also recognised in the other comprehensive income or in equity. The provision for current tax is made at the rate of tax as applicable for the income of the previous year as defined under the Income Tax Act, 1961.

i) **Current Tax**

The current income tax charge is calculated based on the Indian Tax Laws enacted or substantively enacted at the end of the reporting period. The provision for current tax is made at the rate of tax as applicable for the income of the previous year as defined under the Income Tax Act, 1961. Current tax assets and current tax liabilities are offset where the entity has a legally enforceable right to offset and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

ii) **Deferred Tax**

Deferred tax is recognised using the liability method, on temporary differences at the reporting date arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for the financial reporting purpose at the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that future taxable income will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses, depreciation carry-forward and unused tax credits could be utilized. The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilized.

Unrecognized deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profit will allow the deferred tax assets to be recovered. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured based on the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets and liabilities and when the deferred tax balances relate to the same taxation authority.

Current and deferred tax is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. In this case, the tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

k) **Government Grants and Subsidies**

Government grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the Company will comply with the conditions attached to them and that the grants will be received.

Government grants are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss on a systematic basis over the years in which the Company recognises as expenses the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate or when performance obligations are met.

Government grants, whose primary condition is that the Company should purchase, construct or otherwise acquire non-current assets and non-monetary grants are recognised and disclosed as 'deferred income' under non-current liability in the Balance Sheet and transferred to the Statement of Profit and Loss on a systematic and rational basis over the useful lives of the related assets.

l) **Trade and Other Payables**

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Company prior to the end of the financial year which are unpaid at the period end. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months after the reporting period. They are recognised initially at their Fair Value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

m) **Provisions and contingent liabilities**

i) **Provisions**

Provisions are recognized when there is a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and there is a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation. If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. Where discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as a finance cost.

ii) **Contingent liabilities**

Contingent liabilities are disclosed in the Notes to the standalone financial statements. They are disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company, or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made.

iii) **Contingent assets**

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the entity. The Company does not recognize the contingent asset in its standalone financial statements since this may result in the recognition of income that may never be realized. Where an inflow of economic benefits is probable, the Company discloses a brief description of the nature of contingent assets at the end of the reporting period. However, when the realization of income is virtually certain, then the related asset is not a contingent asset and the Company recognizes such assets.

Provision, contingent liabilities and contingent assets are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date.

n) **Earning per share**

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit after tax for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period and for all periods presented is adjusted for events, such as bonus shares and sub-division of share, other than the conversion of potential equity shares that have changed the number of equity shares outstanding, without a corresponding change in resources.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit for the period attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period is adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

o) **Foreign currency translation**

i) **Functional and presentation currency**

Items included in the standalone financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates ('the functional currency'). The standalone financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (INR), which is the Company's functional and presentation currency.

ii) **Transaction and balances**

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions, as well as from the translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at year-end exchange rates, are generally recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Non-monetary items that are measured at historical cost in foreign currency are not retranslated. All non-monetary items denominated in foreign currency are carried at historical cost or a similar valuation and are reported using the exchange rate that existed when the values were determined.

p) **Segment Reporting**

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the Chief Operating decision-maker. The Chief Operating decision-maker is responsible for allocating resources and assessing performance of the operating segments and makes strategic decisions. Refer Note 34 for segment information presented.

q) **Exceptional items**

When items of income or expense are of such nature, size and incidence that their disclosure is necessary to explain the performance of the Company for the year, the Company makes a disclosure of the nature and amount of such items separately under the head “exceptional items.”

r) **Statement of Cash Flows**

Cash flows are reported using the Indirect Method, as set out in Ind AS 7 ‘Statement of Cash Flows’, whereby profit for the year is adjusted for the effects of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accruals of past or future operating cash receipts or payments and item of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated.

The current discount rates used are not considered to differ materially from those applied at the time of initial recognition. Accordingly, the carrying amounts of these financial assets and liabilities are considered to be a reasonable approximation of their respective fair values.

IV) The following is the basis of categorizing the financial instruments measured at fair value into Level 1 to Level 3:

The Company classifies financial instruments measured at fair value into a three-level hierarchy based on the significance of inputs used in the valuation techniques, as prescribed under Ind AS 113 – Fair Value Measurement. Fair value is determined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date under current market conditions, irrespective of whether the price is directly observable or estimated using other valuation techniques. The Company has established the following fair value hierarchy for disclosure of fair value measurements:

Level 1: Quoted (unadjusted) prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date.

Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices). Fair values are determined using valuation techniques that maximise the use of observable market data and rely as little as possible on entity-specific estimates.

Level 3: Inputs for the assets or liabilities that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs). Fair values are determined in whole or in part, using a valuation model based on assumptions that are neither supported by prices from observable current market transactions in the same instrument nor are they based on available market data.

The Company did not have any financial instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss or fair value through other comprehensive income requiring Level 1, Level 2 or Level 3 disclosures as at March 31, 2026 and March 31, 2025, except for investments measured at fair value, if any.

[39] FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The company's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks, including market risk, credit risk, liquidity risk and interest rate risk. The Company's principal financial liabilities comprise borrowings, lease liabilities, trade payables and other financial liabilities. The primary purpose of these financial liabilities is to finance the Company's operations. The Company's principal financial assets include trade receivables, cash and cash equivalents and other financial assets that arise directly from its operations. The Company's senior management oversees the management of these risks and ensures that the Company's financial risk management activities are governed by appropriate policies and procedures. The Board of Directors reviews and approves policies for managing each of these risks, which are summarised below.

a) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: interest rate risk, currency risk and other price risk, such as commodity risk. The Company's exposure to market risk is primarily on account of interest risk, foreign currency risk and Commodity price risk.

i) Interest rate risk management:

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Company is exposed to such risk primarily through its interest-bearing liabilities. Interest rate risk is actively monitored and managed by tracking market interest rate movements and evaluating the impact on the Company's existing exposures. The Company manages its exposure to interest rate risk through an appropriate mix of fixed and variable rate borrowings.

As of the reporting date, substantially all of the Company's borrowings carry fixed interest rates, except for working capital facility which is subject to floating interest rate. The Company does not hold any interest-bearing financial assets carrying floating interest rates.

Interest rate sensitivity analysis

The sensitivity analysis below has been determined based on the exposure to interest rate risk for floating rate borrowings outstanding at the reporting date. The analysis assumes that the amount of floating rate borrowings outstanding at the reporting date remained outstanding throughout the year. A change of 50 basis points in interest rates has been considered, representing management's assessment of a reasonably possible change in market interest rates.

If interest rates had increased or decreased by 50 basis points, with all other variables remaining constant, the Company's profit before tax for the year ended March 31, 2026 would have decreased or (increased) by Rs.1725433.00 (March 31, 2025: Rs.1826920.00), primarily on account of changes in interest expenses relating to floating rate borrowings.

ii) Foreign currency exchange rate risk

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument may fluctuate due to changes in foreign exchange rates. The Company's exposure to such risk arises primarily from transactions denominated in foreign currencies.

During the current and previous year, the Company has not undertaken any foreign currency transactions, including imports, and there are no outstanding foreign currency monetary items as at the reporting date. Accordingly, the Company is not exposed to any significant foreign currency risk.

Given the absence of such exposure, the Company does not enter into derivative contracts or hedging arrangements for foreign currency risk management.

iii) Commodity Price Risk

The Company is exposed to commodity price risk arising primarily from the fluctuations in prices of crude edible oil and related raw materials. The Company manages this risk through appropriate procurement strategies, effective inventory management, continuous monitoring of market trends and suitable corrective actions, including revisions in selling price and implementation of cost optimization measures, to mitigate the impact of changes in commodity prices.

The sensitivity analysis below has been determined based on reasonably possible changes in commodity prices, assuming all other variables remain constant. A 1% increase in commodity prices would have resulted in an additional loss of approximately Rs.34585699.00 in the Statement of Profit and Loss for the year ended March 31, 2026 (March 31, 2025: Rs.27197162.00). Conversely, a 1% decrease in commodity prices would have had an equal and opposite impact on the profit before tax.

b) Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty fails to meet its contractual obligations. The Company is exposed to credit risk primarily from its operating activities, particularly in relation to trade receivables. To manage this risk, the Company continuously monitors the creditworthiness and financial position of its customers and ensures that sales proceeds are realized in accordance with agreed credit terms. The Company also follows prudent liquidity management practices to mitigate the risk of default in meeting obligations towards creditors, statutory authorities and other stakeholders. The Carrying amounts of financial assets recognised in the financial statements represent the maximum exposure to credit risk. The Company does not have any significant concentration of credit risk as its customer base is diversified across different counterparties.

i) Trade Receivables

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company in the event that a customer or counterparty fails to meet its contractual obligations. The Company is primarily exposed to credit risk arising from its trade receivables. This risk is managed through established policies, procedures, and controls relating to the assessment and monitoring of the creditworthiness of customers and other counterparties.

To measure impairment losses, the Company applies the simplified approach permitted by Ind AS 109 – Financial Instruments, which requires recognition of lifetime expected credit losses ("ECL") on trade receivables. The Company uses a provision matrix for determining impairment allowances, which is based on historically observed default rates over the expected life of trade receivables and is adjusted to reflect current and forward-looking estimates, including macroeconomic factors. The Company consistently measures the loss allowance for trade receivables at an amount equal to lifetime expected credit losses. This methodology incorporates the ageing profile of receivables and is based on practical expedients permitted under simplified impairment model prescribed by Ind AS 109. Based on management's assessment, considering historical experience and currently available information relating to defaults and delays in collections, the credit risk associated with trade receivables is considered to be low.

Trade receivables are generally unsecured and the Company does not hold any collateral against such receivables.

c) **Liquidity Risk**

Liquidity risk refers to the risk that the Company may not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due, whether under normal conditions or during periods of stress, without incurring unacceptable losses or adversely affecting its financial position and reputation.

The Company's liquidity management approach is focused on ensuring that it has adequate liquidity to meet its liabilities as they become due. This includes maintaining access to sufficient funding sources and aligning the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities.

The ultimate responsibility for managing liquidity risk lies with the Board of Directors, which has established a robust framework to oversee the Company's short-term, medium-term, and long-term funding and liquidity needs. The Company actively manages its liquidity risk by maintaining adequate internal accruals, equity infusion when necessary, and by strategically matching the maturities of its financial assets and liabilities.

[44] IMPACT OF NEW LABOUR CODES ON EMPLOYEE BENEFIT OBLIGATIONS

The Government of India has enacted the Code on Wages, 2019, the Industrial Relations Code, 2020, the Code on Social Security, 2020, and the Occupational Safety, Health and Working Conditions Code, 2020 (collectively referred to as the "Labour Codes") to subsume and rationalize existing labour laws. The Code introduces certain changes, such as extension of gratuity benefits to fixed-term employees on a pro-rata basis; however, these will become applicable only upon notification in the relevant jurisdiction. The Company does not have any fixed-term employees as at the reporting date.

The Company is in the process of evaluating the potential impact of the Labour Codes. In accordance with the guidance issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI), the impact, if any, will be recognised in the financial statements in the period in which the Labour Codes become effective.

[45] COMPLIANCE WITH AUDIT TRAIL REQUIREMENTS FOR ACCOUNTING SOFTWARE

The Company uses Tally Prime accounting software for maintaining its books of account. The software has a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) for each transaction, including details of changes made to accounting records. The audit trail feature was enabled and operated throughout the financial year for all relevant transactions recorded in the software, and the audit trail records have been preserved by the Company in accordance with the statutory requirements for record retention.

The audit trail functionality available in Tally Prime captures changes made to transactions only from the date on which such feature was enabled and does not record any changes made prior thereto. Further, the audit trail functionality is limited to transactions recorded within the accounting software and does not extend to any changes made outside the accounting software environment.
