INDIA, QATAR MAY FINALISE TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR TRADE DEAL



India and Qatar are likely to finalise terms of reference for a bilateral trade agreement next month, a senior official said on Monday.

Once the terms of reference of the proposed trade pact are finalised, Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal may visit Qatar in October, the official said.

The official also informed that there is good progress on the proposed trade pact with the EU.

The EU team is currently here for the 13th round of India-EU FTA talks. "It is possible that next month Qatar's terms of reference (for trade deal) may be finalised," the official said.

Minister Goyal last month had said that Qatar wants to negotiate a free trade agreement (FTA) with India.

In February, India and Qatar agreed to double bilateral trade to \$28 billion over the next five years.

12% SAFEGUARD DUTY ON STEEL PRODUCTS SUFFICIENT: JINDAL



The proposed safeguard duty of 12 per cent on the import of certain steel products is "sufficient" and the industry will approach the government again if it faces import-related challenges in future, industry leader Naveen Jindal said on Monday.

The Directorate General of Trade Remedies (DGTR) has recommended final imposition of a safeguard duty on imports of certain flat steel products for three years to protect domestic manufacturers from a sudden jump in inbound shipments. The duty was recommended by the DGTR in its final findings of a probe initiated on a complaint by the Indian Steel Association.

"We would have liked it to be 25 per cent (safeguard duty). But if in their wisdom, they (DGTR) have recommended 12 per cent. That is sufficient," Jindal told reporters on the sidelines of ISA Steel Conclave 2025.

Music was always my first love since I was a little child, but destiny had other wicked yet surprising plans in store for me. So, after completing my Master's in English from the erstwhile Cotton College (now Cotton University), yours truly, like many others, landed up in Delhi in search of jobs. And luck had it that, after working in various capacities at different organisations, my first job worth mentioning was with *Music Today* of The India Today Group.

I was rightfully delighted, as it kept me connected to music. After nine months of nurturing and care, like in a mother's womb, I was called for an interview at *Hindustan Times*, and fortunately, I got selected. I'm setting the tone with these slightly elaborate opening remarks to offer an insight into what nudged

me to write this piece. Upon my return to Assam for personal reasons, I never really had the luxury to get back to writing or publish anything substantial. But today came along as an opportune moment to return to the passion of writing once again, thanks to a few well-wishers who kept pestering me to start living the life and art I've always loved.

And Bhupen Da, as always, came to me as a knight in shining armour - in his spirit! Today, as Assam and the entire nation celebrate 100 years of Bharat Ratna Dr. Bhupen Hazarika, I had to pause and take a breather from the fast lanes of life to pen a heartfelt tribute to our very own Bhupen Da, a household name, deeply loved across generations, irrespective of caste, creed, community, and religion.

The Bard of the Brahmaputra stood for unity. Bhupen Da is the epitome of our identity, our culture, and an enduring love for humanity.

I grew up listening to his songs, played every morning on our humble yet proud possession, a radio that sat atop our wooden

dining table. My Ma would play it gleefully, loud enough to wake her three sleepy children in time for school. Every celebration at home was incomplete without his music.

Seeing my growing love for melody, Ma enrolled me in Dhemaji Music School when I was in the 4th standard at S.F.S. School. Thus began my six-year journey of formal training in Hindustani vocal under the Vishnu Digambar Gharana, guided by seasoned gurus.

Every Friday evening and Sunday morning, Ma, Dada, and I headed for our music classes. (Oh, and by the way, Dada, now an Associate Professor of Civil Engineering at AEC, is also a trained tabla player.) I eventually earned my B.Mus by the time I reached Class X.

Back at school, we had a Literary Activities class every Friday from 2-3 p.m., mandated for all students by the Father of our missionary school, a beautiful initiative. We performed songs by legends such as Bhupen Da, Kalaguru Bishnu Prasad Rabha, Jayanta Hazarika, Jyoti Prasad Agarwala, Rabindranath Tagore, Lata Di, and Asha Tai.

But Bhupen Da remained our

favourite, especially when Rudaali was the rage. I loved music so much that I even had it as my elective subject for the matriculation exam.

For the practical exam, which was held in Lakhimpur, if my memory serves me right, we had to learn at least two songs by Bhupen Da, one Rabindra Sangeet, one Nazrul Geeti, and one Bhajan as well. The best days of my life indeed.

Fast forward to my college days at Cotton, our chorus performances during friendly intro sessions at SKL hostel and other events were often interspersed with Bhupen Da's melodies. He never really left us. His music stayed like a silent companion - in spirit and in soul.

Later, when I began my career in Delhi, I found solace in his songs once again. I met many like-minded souls in the journalism community, friends from Bengal and the Northeast, all chasing dreams in the world of mainstream media.

At least twice a month, we'd hold jam sessions, bringing along our musical instruments. I had my acoustic Gibson, though I never

quite mastered it. Others brought smaller percussion instruments; a tabla was too cumbersome to carry on buses (this was before the Delhi Metro came along).

At HT City, our chai addas were often set to music, with Bhupen Da, Rabindranath Tagore, and Abida Parveen always being favourites. Those moments felt like home away from home.

What I'm trying to say, through these fragments of memory, from childhood mornings to college corridors to newsroom evenings in Delhi, and now, being back in Assam, is that we have all lived and loved Bhupen Da in our own unique ways. And he will continue to inspire generations. My personal favourite from his legacy is Kohua Bon, Asanta Mon.

The Government of Assam has announced a year-long celebration as a tribute to Assam's son of the soil — our beloved Bhupen Da.

TRAI rejects Congress's charges of SMS censorship

TRAI on Monday said it did not receive any application that pertained to sending SMS to a political party's Maharashtra cadre on how the 2024 Assembly election was allegedly 'stolen', as the regulator asserted that it doesn't even approve individual SMS templates.

TRAI's rebuttal came after Congress on Sunday claimed that the TRAI rejected its application for sending out SMSes to its Maharashtra cadre with the link of a documentary on how Maharashtra assembly elections were allegedly "stolen" on the grounds that it is "content related to protest".

Without naming Congress, TRAI in a post on X said, "No application was received by #TRAI for sending SMS to a political party's Maharashtra cadre on how the 2024 Assembly election was 'stolen'".

TRAI pointed out that the said application was sub-

mitted to one of the service providers, who rejected it. "TRAI was at no stage involved in this process. In fact, TRAI does not deal with approval of individual message templates," the regulator clarified in a series of social media posts.

TRAI doesn't approve individual SMS templates, it said,

tagging a screenshot of the rejection by 'STPL', a service provider. "As per the photo, it is clear that it was rejected by the service provider, STPL," TRAI wrote in its post hashtagged '#FactCheck'.

Congress had also claimed that the rejection indicated "telltale signs of guilt of

Maharashtra election fraud" and there were coordinated moves by various arms of the government to suppress information.

Chairman of Congress's data analytics department Praveen Chakravarty had said the Congress wanted to send SMSes to its Maharashtra cadre of the link to the YouTube documentary "How the MH 2024 election was stolen", and as per government process, an application was filed with TRAI for approval.

He had claimed TRAI rejected permission to send SMSes, saying it is 'protest content'.

"How is there such perfect synchronisation between Home Ministry, Election Commission & Telecom regulator to suppress? Does one need more telltale signs of guilt of Maharashtra election fraud than such coordinated moves by various arms of the Government to suppress & hide information?" Chakravarty had said on X.

GM crops not one-size-fits-all solution, say experts

Genetically modified (GM) crops can offer targeted solutions for specific agricultural challenges, but their effectiveness varies significantly across different crops and traits, experts said at an event organized by the World Food Prize Foundation here on Monday.

"Any possible solution should be something that everyone should consider. It may not be the right solution for every individual farmer, but GM is something that we should look at," said Nicole Barreca Prenger, Senior Director (Strategic Communications) at the US-based World Food Prize Foundation, quoting Nobel laureate Norman Borlaug's philosophy.

Speaking at a media briefing about the foundation's 'Dialogue Next' conference, Prenger emphasised the urgency of exploring all avail-

able agricultural technologies. "It could help one and it could not help the other, but why wouldn't we try to do what we can do? We are running on borrowed time and we are doing everything that we can," she said.

The solutions discovered by Borlaug were effective for 25 years, but new approaches are now needed to address current agricultural challenges, Prenger added. "So is GM the answer? Yes for some, no for others, but we need to continue to look and continue to look for any solution that we can find."

BM Prasanna, Managing Director of the Borlaug Institute for South Asia (BISA), explained that genetic modification works best in crops with simpler genomes.

"In rice, just by altering one gene either through genetic modification or genome editing, you can have a drastic change in phenotype. It's not the case in all crops," he said.

Speeding shaped by social pressure, poor road design, weak enforcement systems: Research

Speeding is not just about ignoring rules but is also shaped by social pressure, poor road design and weak enforcement systems, a research study based on evidence from nine countries by the George Institute of Global

Health has found.

Global evidence shows that every 10 km/h reduction in average vehicle speed reduces the risk of a fatal crash by up to 40 per cent, making speed management one of the most powerful tools for saving lives.

The research, published in BMJ Injury Prevention, a peer-reviewed journal, is

the first global qualitative evidence synthesis on why people speed.

With rapid growth in car and motorcycle ownership, combined with limited public transportation, speeding and its deadly consequences are worsening. These insights are highly relevant for India, which continues to record the highest

number of road crash deaths worldwide.

In 2023 alone, there were over 480,000 crashes and 172,000 deaths — roughly 55 crashes and 20 deaths every hour.

Aligning with the UN's Second Decade of Action for Road Safety (2021–2030), the study notes the urgent need for smarter, stronger speed

management strategies to halve deaths and injuries by 2030.

"Speeding is not just an individual choice — it is shaped by culture, road design and the credibility of enforcement. If we want to save lives, we need to create systems where safe driving is the easier choice, not the harder one," said Pratishta

Singh from The George Institute for Global Health, India.

Researchers found that simply informing people that speeding is dangerous is not sufficient. Effective interventions must address peer pressure, challenge dangerous cultural norms linking speeding to masculinity and design roads that naturally

slow down traffic.

The study also noted that these findings reflect perceptions from diverse global contexts and may not apply equally everywhere. Importantly, there are still major gaps in high-quality research and evidence from low and middle-income countries, including India.

Addressing Indian drivers,

Jagnoor Jagnoor, Co-director of the WHO Injury Collaborating Centre, The George Institute for Global Health, said, "Reducing average speeds by just 10 km/h can cut the risk of a fatal crash by up to 40 pc. Speeding is not a marker of a nation's development — the true measure is how much we value human life."

CM Khandu launches kiwi mission

Arunachal Pradesh Chief Minister Pema Khandu launched Kiwi Mission 2025-2035, an ambitious 10-year programme aimed at making the frontier state synonymous with Kiwi cultivation in the way Assam is associated with tea, officials said.
He formally launched the programme at Ziro in Lower Subansiri district on Sunday in the presence of Agriculture Minister Gabriel D Wangsu, and other cabinet colleagues and MLAs.
Speaking at the programme, Khandu described the initiative as a bold step to empower farmers and position the state as a hub of high-quality organic produce. The CM called the Kiwi Mission a "farming revolution that will redefine Arunachal Pradesh's role in India's agricultural map".
"Arunachal Pradesh is underway with a bold vision to make our land

synonymous with Kiwi, just as Tea is to Assam," Khandu said in a post on X.
"The mission is about empowering our farmers, embracing sustainable practices, and putting Arunachal on the global map for high-quality organic produce," he added.
"Under the programme, model Kiwi orchards will be established in 13 districts, with the fertile Ziro Valley identified as the heart of this "farming revolution," he said.

Airbnb supported 1.11 lakh jobs in India in 2024: Report

Global home-sharing platform Airbnb on Monday said it supported around 1.11 lakh jobs across India in 2024, contributing approximately ₹2,400 crore in wages, underscoring its growing role in the country's tourism and hospitality economy.

According to the Economic Impact of Airbnb in India (May 2025) report, in 2024, Airbnb guest spending in India reached ₹11,200 crore, which includes both accommodation and non-accommodation expenses.

The report, by Oxford Economics and commissioned by Airbnb, was based on data on the global home-sharing platform for the calendar year of 2024.

Further, the report revealed that in 2024, domestic travellers comprised around 91 per cent of Airbnb guests in India, a rise from about 79 per cent in 2019, fuelled by a surge in domestic travel, corresponding to stronger demand from younger Indian Airbnb guests, and positioned India as one of Airbnb's fastest growing markets.
