Wang Yi begins India visit, Jaishankar says de-escalation process must move forward

Chinese foreign minister set to meet PM today

NEW DELHI, AUGUST 18

AS CHINESE Foreign Minister Wang Yi began his two-day visit to India on Monday — his first since India and China completed the disengagement process along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in November last year, and days ahead of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's likely first visit to China in seven years — External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar underlined that the "de-escalation process" must "move forward".

While he is in Delhi for the 24th round of talks between the India-China Special Representatives on the boundary issue on Tuesday, Wang will also call on Modi — he did not get a meeting with Modi during his last visit in April 2022. Wang and National Security Advisor Ajit Doval are the designated Special Representatives for the boundary talks. Doval travelled to China in December last year for talks after five years of the border standoff.

This is the first visit by a Chinese Minister since Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping met for the BRICS leaders' summit in Russia's Kazan in October 2024, when they set the stage for disengagement of troops at two friction points along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in eastern Ladakh and resumption of patrolling.

GST on health, term insurance may be scrapped or cut to 5%

THE GOODS and Services Tax (GST) reforms expected around Diwali this year could likely lead to scrapping of the tax on insurance policies — or at least a calibrated reduction to 5 per cent — making insurance more affordable, improving financial security for millions and accelerating insurance penetration in India.

The long-contingent reduction in GST on insurance is under active consideration by the government, although it is expected to result in annual revenue loss of approximately Rs 17,000 crore, said a source.

In Kerala village, 'living lab' provides local weather forecast, landslide alert

BEFORE HE ventures for rubber tapping each morning, Anil T R scrolls his WhatsApp for weather updates. The information that he gets isn't from far-off weather stations — it's specifically for his gram panchayat Kanichar, sourced from the neighbourhood and localised just for people like him.

Anil's village of Kanichar — 60 km from Kannur — is India's first village panchayat where a living lab approach has been adopted for enhancing climate sensitivity and people's resilience capacity. Implemented by the Kerala State Disaster Management Authority (KSDMA), the project has one aim — making the 4,600-odd household owners in the panchayat resilient to natural disasters.

The living lab approach is an ecosystem that integrates real-world settings with research and innovation to create and test solutions. First developed in the Netherlands, the approach is

marked by the involvement of several stakeholders — including government, experts, private agencies and civic society — to find real-world solutions.

For the village, which saw three people being killed and 36 hectares of farmland being destroyed in a series of landslides in 2022, this has come as a relief. "Every day, we get data on rains and wind from an automatic weather station installed at the village," 55-year-old Anil says. "When there's heavy rain, there are frequent alerts and updates about the situation."

The village currently has one automatic weather station to pro-

vide local weather data in the landslide-prone panchayat, with authorities now planning a dozen more in the panchayat's 13 wards. Another highlight is that the panchayat will have an early landslide warning system installed by IIT-Roorkee.

This is the only place in Kerala where KSDMA has opened a resilience centre and appointed a resilience officer, who is engaged in strengthening the disaster preparedness and social resilience of the people. The panchayat has made ready a 60-member emergency response team, with each person given a specific task. This is the first time in the

country that the concept is being implemented with landslide as the focal theme. "The Netherlands was first to use the living lab approach to find solutions for urban issues. The concept is new in India, and Kerala is the first to take land-slides as a theme for this approach," KSDMA member secretary Selkhar Kurukose says.

After the landslides of 2022, KSDMA conducted investigations in the region at the request of the panchayat. Subsequently, the government directed the KSDMA to set up a living lab.

"Developing a living lab in a hilly region has figured in the

Opp demand for discussion on SIR disrupts Houses

LS debate on space programme stalled

AS PARLIAMENT reconvened Monday after the Independence Day break, proceedings in both Houses were disrupted amid protests by opposition parties over electoral roll revision in Bihar, and a special discussion on Lok Sabha on the space programme, coinciding with astronaut Shubhanshu Shukla's return to India, ended abruptly.

Lok Sabha saw two adjournments, one till 12pm and another till 2pm, soon after business commenced. Between protests, the treasury benches introduced the Jan Vishwas (Amendment of Provisions) Bill and the Indian Institutes of Management (Amendment) Bill in Lok Sabha, before proceedings got adjourned again till 2pm.

In Rajya Sabha, proceedings were adjourned till 2pm amid Opposition protests, within minutes of commencing. Later, the Indian Ports Bill, 2025, was passed in the Upper House after Opposition members walked out.

Later, a special discussion on Shubhanshu Shukla's visit to the International Space Station ended abruptly after MoS (Independent Charge) for Department of Space, Jitendra Singh, spoke on the Axiom-4 mission and India's achievements in the space sector.

Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla appealed to all members to participate in the discussion on India's scientific achievements. Initiating the discussion, Jitendra Singh said: "India's space economy has already reached \$8 billion and was projected to touch \$45 billion in the next decade."

India will set up its own Bharat Antriksh Station in 2035, and in 2040, an Indian astronaut will

set foot on the moon," Singh said. He added that the government spent ₹548 crore on Shukla's travel to the ISS, which he said, was a small amount compared to other missions globally.

Singh spoke amid protests by opposition MPs and after his speech ended, Dilip Sankha of the BJP, who was in the chair, adjourned the House. The discussion will resume on Tuesday.

Earlier, Lok Sabha was first adjourned till noon following protests by the Opposition over the Bihar SIR. After the proceedings resumed, Opposition MPs gathered in the well of the House and raised 'Vote Chor, Gaddhi Chhod' slogans. Soon after the Jan Vishwas Bill was referred to a Select Committee, Sandhya Ray, who was in the chair, adjourned the House till 2pm.

In Rajya Sabha, Deputy Chairman Harivansh began proceedings by reading out an obituary reference for former Nagaland Governor and BJP leader La Ganesan. Harivansh said he had received 19 notices on four subjects under Rule 267 and he did not admit any of them.

They were then in adjourned to rules.BJP MP Dinesh Sharma rose to speak but his intervention was drowned out by Opposition MPs. The Deputy Chairman adjourned proceedings till 2pm.

Kharge and Nadda spar in Rajya Sabha

JUST BEFORE the Opposition walked out of Rajya Sabha ahead of the discussion on several Bills, the House business was held up for some time due to a heated exchange between Leader of Opposition Mallikarjun Kharge and Leader of the House J P Nadda over the former's demand for a discussion on the Bihar Special Intensive Revision (SIR).

When the House reconvened at 2pm, BJP's Sasmit Patra, who was in the chair, asked Union Minister Sarbananda Sonowal to introduce the Indian Ports Bill. Sonowal moved the Bill amid the din. Meanwhile, Kharge stood up and demanded a discussion on revision of electoral rolls in Bihar and other Opposition members joined him.

"Any matter which is subjective or is part of the judicial process right now cannot be taken on record and... anything that is not part of the listed business will not go on record," Patra said.

This led to protests by the

Opposition members. Nadda slammed the Opposition's "irresponsible behaviour" for regularly disrupting the House proceedings by resorting to "anarchism" and "obstructionism." He said the government is ready to discuss any subject, which is permitted in the rules.

"They have wasted 69 hours and one minute of this House," Nadda said. While he was speaking, Opposition members walked out.

Later in the day, Nadda, in a series of posts on X, called the Indus Water Treaty "one of the biggest blunders of country's first PM Jawaharlal Nehru."

Easing business: Jan Vishwas Bill 2.0 tabled, to decriminalise 288 offences

COMMERCE MINISTER Piyush Goyal on Monday tabled the Jan Vishwas (Amendment of Provisions) Bill, 2025 that proposes the decriminalisation of 288 provisions relating to minor offences in order to make doing business easier.

The Commerce Ministry said the 2025 Bill builds on the Jan Vishwas Act of 2023 which decriminalised 183 provisions. The 2025 Bill has been referred to a select committee which is expected to prepare a report on it by the first day of the next session.

The Bill proposes to amend 355 provisions in all. Besides the 288 provisions that are proposed to be decriminalised, the Bill proposes the amendment of 67 provisions under the New Delhi Municipal Council (NDMC) Act, 1994 and Motor Vehicles Act, 1988 to facilitate ease of living.

The Ministry said in a statement. The government said the proposals involve removal of imprisonment clauses for minor, technical or procedural defaults and have been replaced with monetary penalties or warnings.

To reduce the judicial burden, designated officers have been empowered to impose penalties through administrative processes. Four Acts — Tea Act, 1953,

Legal Metrology Act, 2009, Motor Vehicles Act, 1988, and Drugs and Cosmetics Act, 1940 — which were part of Jan Vishwas Act, 2023, are proposed for further decriminalisation under the current Bill, the government said.

As many as 47 provisions under the NDMC Act have been proposed for amendments. The proposal replaces the "retrospective" method of property tax with Unit Area Method (UAM), introducing a transparent and formula-based system linked to property size, usage and location. "This will simplify assessment, reduce discretion, and enhance compliance," a ministry official said.

The amendments proposed in the 20 provisions of Motor Vehicles Act, 1988 will provide relaxation and clarity in compliance,

including state-wide vehicle registration instead of jurisdiction-specific.

For instance, the reporting period for vehicle registration cancellation extended from 14 to 30 days. Insurer intimation period on transfer of insurance certificate has been proposed to be extended from 14 to 30 days. "These reforms aim to simplify procedures for citizens, improve transparency in property taxation, and provide relief in vehicle-related compliances," the official said.

The official said that 11 offences under the Apprentices Act, 1961 like employer requiring an apprentice to work overtime without approval of Apprenticeship Adviser, refusal to furnish information or return, employing apprentice on work

Bill in LS to set up new IIM in Guwahati

UNION EDUCATION MINISTER Dharmendra Pradhan on Monday introduced a Bill in Lok Sabha to set up a new Indian Institute of Management (IIM) at Guwahati.

The Indian Institutes of Management (Amendment) Bill, 2025 was tabled amid protests by Opposition MPs over the Special Intensive Revision exercise in Bihar.

The Bill provides for a corpus



fund of ₹555 crore from 2025-26 to 2029-30 for IIM Guwahati. After five years, no additional fund support will be extended as the institute is expected to generate revenue through internal accruals by then.

IIM Guwahati, once established, will be the country's 22nd

IIM. The Assam government had requested an IIM in the State, "keeping in view the geographical location of the state and its all-round development," going by the Bill's statement of objects and reasons.

It added that the Government of India, the Assam government and representatives of the United Liberation Front of Assam (ULFA) signed a Memorandum of Settlement for the all-round development of the State, and as per this settlement, a Special Development Package (SDP) comprising devel-

opmental projects was to be implemented by the Assam government. Setting up an IIM at Guwahati as an institution of national importance is one of these projects, it stated. The Bill amends the IIM Act of 2017 to provide for all provisions of the Act to apply to IIM Guwahati.

"Assam is one of the very few States with more than three crore population which does not have an IIM. Establishing an IIM at Assam shall boost the overall education and development of the region," the Bill's statement of objects and reasons read.

RS clears Bill to modernise 1908 ports law, ensure global compliance

THE RAJYA Sabha on Monday passed The Indian Ports Bill, 2025 through voice vote following a walkout by the Opposition and a two-hour-long discussion in the afternoon.

The Bill, which was passed by the Lok Sabha on August 12, seeks to modernise the outdated provisions of the Indian Ports Act, 1908, promote integrated port development, facilitate businesses and ensure utilisation of India's coastline. It was introduced in the Upper House amid noisy protests by the Opposition, demanding discussion on electoral rolls revision in Bihar, as soon as the session resumed post lunch, BJP's Sasmit Patra was in the Chair.

Replying to the discussion on the Bill, Ports, Shipping and Waterways Minister Sarbananda Sonowal said the ministry was neglected by the Congress. Referring to the Opposition walkout just before the discussion on the Bill started, Sonowal said: "The role of Opposition is not only to oppose but they always possess two important qualities of responsibility and responsiveness."

Sonowal said the Indian Ports Bill, 2025 has been brought after wider consultations with all stakeholders, all coastal states and users of ports. Sonowal said the Bill decriminalises certain offences and removes outdated provisions, while ushering in more transparency in port tariff.

It also provides for the management of pollution, disaster, emergencies, security, safety, navigation and data at ports, ensures compliance with India's obligations under international instruments and provides for mechanisms for the redressal of port-related disputes. It replaces the outdated provisions of the Indian Ports Act, 1908.

Assam Gana Parishad's Birendra Prasad Baruah supported the Bill and said it aims to make Indian ports stronger. NCP leader Praful Patel also supported

In last 5 yrs, US, Bangla, UK top tourist arrivals

New Delhi: The US, Bangladesh, the UK, Australia and Canada were the top five source countries for foreign Tourist Arrivals (FTAs) in India in the last five years, according to data shared by the government on Monday. Union Culture Minister Gajendra Singh Shekhawat shared the data in a written response to queries related to FTAs in the Lok Sabha. The FTA figures stood at 99.52 lakh for 2024, as per the government data. The minister was asked details related to FTAs recorded in the country during the last five years, and whether India's tourism sector has seen a significant recovery after the COVID-19 pandemic, with international tourist arrivals exceeding pre-pandemic levels. PTI

Faster nod for critical minerals

New Delhi: The Environment Ministry has set up a category on its online clearance portal to speed up approvals for mining projects involving critical minerals, a move aimed at boosting domestic supply of resources considered essential for clean energy and advanced technologies, the government informed Lok Sabha on Monday. MoS Environment

Kirti Vardhan Singh said the Mines Ministry had in February requested faster clearances for such projects, following which the facility was added to the Parivesh 2.0 portal in March. PTI

Train collisions killed 79 jumbos in last 5 years

New Delhi: At least 79 elephants have died in train collisions across the country in the last five years, the Environment Ministry has informed Parliament. In a written reply in the Lok Sabha, Minister of State for Environment Kirti Vardhan Singh said the figure is based on reports from state governments and Union Territory administrations for the period 2020-21 to 2024-25. He said that the ministry does not maintain consolidated data on the deaths of other wild animals on railway tracks, including in elephant corridors. PTI

12,600 animals with military

Location, duration among reasons for non-acceptance of PMIS offers: Govt

THE GOVERNMENT on Monday said location considerations and duration of internships are among the reasons why applicants not accepting offers made under the pilot project of the PM Internship Scheme (PMIS).

The scheme, announced in the 2024-25 Budget, aims to provide internship opportunities to 1 crore youth in top 500 companies in 5 years and is being implemented by the Corporate

Affairs ministry. The State list of PMIS that commenced on October 3, 2024, targets to provide 1.25 lakh internship opportunities to the youth in 1 year and in the first round, 280 partner companies posted over 1.18 lakh internship opportunities and over 455 lakh applications were received from over 2.14 lakh applicants.

As on 12.08.2025, partner companies have made over 82,000 offers to youth and more than 28,000 candidates accepted offers to join the internship. Over 8,700 candidates

joined their internship in round 1. Minister of State for Corporate Affairs Harsh Mahindra told the Lok Sabha on Monday.

In the second round, which started on January 9, 2025, he said 327 partner companies posted over 1.18 lakh internship opportunities and over 455 lakh applications were received from over 2.14 lakh applicants.

As on 12.08.2025, partner companies have made over 82,000 offers to youth and more than 28,000 candidates accepted offers to join the internship, his written reply said.

AS MANY as 23 per cent of the total 56.04 crore Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana (PMJDY) accounts are inactive, Minister of State for Finance Pankaj Chaudhary said on Monday.

Out of 56.03 crore PMJDY accounts at the end of July 31, 2025, 13.04 crore such accounts are inactive, he said in a written reply in the Lok Sabha.

Uttar Pradesh has the highest number of inactive Jan Dhan

accounts of 2.75 crore, followed by Bihar at 1.89 crore and Madhya Pradesh at 1.07 crore, he said.

As per Reserve Bank of India (RBI) guidelines dated February 18, 2009, a savings account should be treated as inactive if there are no financial transactions in the account for over a period of two years.

The government has taken various steps to ensure smooth functioning of PMJDY accounts, including Direct Benefit Transfer. These benefits are transferred even to inactive accounts. Banks inform account holders in writ-

ing through letters or email or SMS about the accounts which are to become inactive and also contact the holder(s) of the inactive accounts through letters, email or SMS, he said.

The government launches campaigns from time to time for promotion of enrolment under various schemes, as well as for issues such as activation of inactive accounts, he said.

A Gnan Prachay level campaign was launched from July 1, 2025 to September 30, 2025 to carry out re-KYC of inactive PMJDY accounts, he said.

7 dead in Maharashtra; 550 mm rain pours in Mumbai since I-Day

INTENSE RAIN on the third consecutive day brought Mumbai to a grinding halt on Monday, amid severe waterlogging, tree fall and wall collapse incidents that led to one death, and train services getting affected due to inundated railway tracks. Schools and colleges in the city were closed during the second shift in the afternoon, and the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) said they will remain closed on Tuesday as well.

Across Maharashtra, at least seven persons lost their lives and around 2 lakh hectares of land in Vidarbha affected in the heavy rain, the Chief Minister's office stated on Monday.

Even as the city received over 550 millimetres (mm) of rain between Friday (August 15) morning and Monday evening, the weather bureau said the downpour is likely to continue. Mumbai and its neighbouring districts of Thane, Palghar and Raigad have been placed under "red" alert on Tuesday, while an orange alert has been sounded for Wednesday.

The intensity of rain will only recede after Thursday, when a "yellow" alert will remain in place, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said.

After experiencing about 100 mm rain on Sunday, a downpour pounded the city on Monday with the Santacruz observatory recording 124 mm rain between 8.30 am and 5.30 pm. In view of the showers starting early in the day, the IMD first issued a "red" nowcast warning for the city at 8.20 am and later, revised its forecast bulletin to sound a "red" alert — forecasting "extremely heavy" rainfall in isolated pockets — for Mumbai and its neighbouring districts until Wednesday morning.

The Monday rain comes after the city recorded nearly 43% of its monthly average quota of rain in a single day on Saturday when the city received over 200 mm rain in six hours.

DELETED FROM BIHAR ELECTORAL ROLLS 'Look for anomalies': Opp alert after EC publishes voters list

AFTER the Election Commission (EC) released details of the 65 lakh voters deleted in the first phase of the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) exercise in Bihar on Sunday, Opposition parties in the state have asked their cadre to check lists in each booth for anomalies and bring them to their attention.

"We have been exposing the anomalies since even before the list was published. How do you think we have produced people declared dead by the EC? This work has been going on at the booth level and MLAs and MPs are monitoring the same on the ground. A searchable list put out by the EC on the orders of the Supreme Court has made the verification job easier," said RJD's Bihar MP Sudhakar Singh.

RJD spokesperson Mintyujay Tiwari reiterated the party's position was clear: the SIR "is an exercise in vote theft." The entire exercise is legitimised when you see that it has not added a single vote but only deleted. After the publication of the deletion list, the district-in-charges of the party have been sensitised about the task at hand. The work is already

on. Booth-level workers who are in touch with people in their area are verifying the correctness of the deletion exercise," he said.

A Booth Level Agent (BLA) of the Congress from Sultanpur Assembly seat, Shyam Sundar Thakur, told *The Indian Express* there were several problems with the list of voters deleted from the rolls in his constituency.

"Those who are dead have managed to make it to the voter list. And those alive have been deleted. There are so many problems. I met the BLA (Booth Level Agent) today and conveyed the issues to him. I have already submitted documents of some people whose names have been deleted," said Thakur.

Another Congress BLA, Ram Manohar Jha, said: "The majority of deletions are of our voters who hail from disadvantaged backgrounds. We will take the issues to the BLAs and get the names added back. If it doesn't happen, then our party's leadership will decide what to do," said Jha.

Sources said the analysis of the lists was a "massive exercise" that would test the grassroots network and strength of the Opposition parties. "All will depend upon how strongly and aggressively local leaders, MLAs and MPs of INDIA bloc parties follow up with the workers. By September 1, we need to produce strong evidence of large-scale disenfranchisement in the process," an RJD leader said.

EC, CECs will face action when INDIA bloc comes to power: Rahul

LOK SABHA Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi on Monday said action will be taken against the Chief Election Commissioner and the two Election Commissioners for "vote chori" when INDIA bloc forms government.

Addressing a gathering during his Voter Adhikar Yatra in Bihar, Gandhi said the EC was asking him to file an affidavit even after its "vote theft" had been caught.

"I want to tell the EC that the whole country will ask you to give an affidavit. Give us some time, we will catch your theft: in every Assembly and Lok Sabha seat, and put it before the people," he said.

The people of Bihar will tell the ECs and BJP leaders in one voice that "vote chori" cannot be done," Gandhi said. "Understand one thing, a day will come when there will be an INDIA bloc government in Bihar and in Delhi; then we will take action against the three of you... You've stolen (vote) from the whole country."

'Is it a joke?': Gauhati HC on cement firm getting 3,000 bighas in tribal area

THE GAUHATI High Court, in a hearing last week, made sharp observations about the allotment of 3,000 bighas of land (around 4 square kilometres) in Assam's tribal Dima Haso district to a private company to set up a cement factory, directing the state to furnish the policy under which "such a huge chunk of land" has been allotted for the purpose in a region under the Sixth Schedule of the Constitution.

Dima Haso is a tribal majority district in Assam, administered through provisions under 6th Schedule of the Constitution with an autonomous council, the North Cachar Hills Autonomous Council (NCHAC). In October 2024, a plot of land measuring 2,000 bighas was allotted to Mahabul Cement Private Limited, a private company with its registered address in Kolkata, and in November that year, it was allotted another adjacent plot of 1,000 bighas of land.

The allotment order, issued by the Additional Secretary, Revenue, NCHAC, states the purpose of the allotment is the installation of a cement plant. Incidentally, Mahabul Cement had signed an MoU for investment worth ₹10,000 crore with the state during the Assam government's mega investment summit, Advantage Assam 2.0, in February

this year, in which a company spokesperson had said that they would set up a cement plant in Dima Haso.

During a hearing on two petitions concerning this allotment last week, including one by a set of locals alleging they are being evicted from their land for the purpose, a Bench of Justice Sanjay Kumar Medhi made the remarks when the counsel for the company, G Goswami, mentioned the size of the allotment is 3,000 bighas, "3,000 bighas!... What is going on? 3,000 bighas allotted to a private company?... What kind of decision is this? Is this some kind of joke or what," he remarked during the hearing.

While the initial petition had been filed earlier this year by the company, seeking protection from "disturbances created by local villagers" in construction work, Justice Medhi said last week the court would file to examine the policy and the process through which the land was allotted to the company. In its order, the court referred to the size of the allotted land as "extraordinary".

Directing the state to provide information on the allotment process, the court noted the rights of tribal residents, and its environmental sensitivity. "This court directs Shri C. Sarna, learned standing counsel, NCHAC, to obtain records containing the policy to allot such a huge chunk of land to a factory," states the order.

PM Modi chairs high-level meet on next-gen reforms

Nirmala Sitharaman, Shivraj Singh Chaudhan, Pooja Goyal and Lalan Singh attended the meeting.

Modi said on X, "Chaired a meeting to discuss the roadmap for Next-Generation Reforms. We are committed to speedily reform across all sectors, which will boost Ease of Living, Ease of Doing Business and prosperity."

Bengal aid for returning migrants: ₹5,000/month for 1 yr

WEST BENGAL Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee on Monday announced a new financial scheme for migrants returning to the state in the wake of detention and deportation of Bengali-speaking people from different parts of the country, especially BJP-ruled states like Delhi, Haryana, and Maharashtra, on

and are returning to West Bengal without anything. We have decided to launch this scheme, Sramosree, for their rehabilitation. According to their rehabilitation, the state Labour Department will be the nodal body for implementing the scheme.

"We will start a portal on Sramosree, where migrant workers can apply for the benefits. They will also be given jobs under Karmasree project," the chief minister said.

Justice Dhulia to head panel to select V-Cs for 2 Kerala varsities

New Delhi: The Supreme Court on Monday appointed its former judge Justice Sudhanshu Kumar as the head of a committee which will shortlist names for appointment as vice-chancellor of two Kerala universities — APJ Abdul Kalam Technological University and University of Digital Sciences Innovation and Technology.

A bench of Justices J B Pardiwala and K V Viswanathan

said, authorised Justice Dhulia to constitute a separate or senate committee for the two universities. The committee will have five members, including two members each from the list provided by the Chancellor and the state.

"Ultimately, we leave it to the discretion of the chairman," the SC said. It was hearing an appeal filed by the Kerala Governor.

'Two-state solution is dead. If Trump wants true peace, he has to get real about Palestine issue'

NAVTEJ SARNA, former Indian Ambassador to Israel, the US and UK, on the Israeli assaults and humanitarian crisis in Gaza, the fallout of the Israeli-American attack on Iran and the position taken by India. The session was moderated by Diplomatic Editor Shubhrajit Roy

On Israel achieving its objectives in Gaza

It depends upon what you think were the objectives: whether it was to avenge [the massacre of Israeli citizens by Hamas] October 7 [2023]; the killing of the Hamas leadership and destruction of its military infrastructure; release of hostages; or to get Gaza vacated of Palestinians. The Israeli military brass is saying that the military objectives are over, essentially because all major Hamas leaders have been killed, whether in Gaza or outside, and the ability of Hamas to attack Israel has been significantly depleted for a very, very long time.

But it has not been eradicated. Now, how does Hamas get eradicated? A very senior Israeli army officer has said in an interview that Hamas can only be eradicated once 100 per cent of the territory of Gaza is taken over and there's nobody there. That means what Gaza has been ethnically cleansed, to put it bluntly. I think that quite deliberately the goalposts have been kept movable. I don't think [Prime Minister Benjamin] Netanyahu is going to say that it's all done and dusted and we're walking off.

On the disproportionate Israeli response to the October 7 terrorist attack

It was expected that Israel would respond disproportionately to the October 7 terrorist attack because that is the Israeli doctrine. But I don't think it was imagined that this response would continue for 21 months in the face of increasing international pressure. It has continued because of the real objective that Netanyahu probably has — which is not just revenge. The objective is to use this opportunity to make sure that Gaza is taken over, that Palestinians are put into a situation in which the entire paradigm of the two-state solution becomes unachievable. If Gaza becomes uninhabitable, where are the Palestinians going to return to? And Israeli ministers have said as much. If the US, both under [Joe] Biden and [Donald] Trump, had wanted, this would have ended a very long time ago.

On Israel's strike on Iran

Israel has planned and practised this for years.

With the first circle of Hamas and Hezbollah degraded, and [Bashar al-Assad's] regime in Syria, which was another proxy of Iran, ousted, there would never be a better window of opportunity for Netanyahu. All he needed was the green signal from the White House and he got it from Trump. Now Trump had campaigned for America to stay away from forever wars but this was an opportunity to take a huge amount of credit, which he could not resist. He obviously thought that if somebody has already done the heavy lifting, I can go in when they really need me, make it short and sweet, claim victory and [get] out, and that's exactly what happened.

It has now emerged that he gave the green signal for the Israeli attack in June and said that you'll have my support if it goes well. And it did go well, there were exceptionally effective air strikes which completely took over the Iranian airspace and the Israelis could hit everything at will.

Role played by other West Asian countries

It's very difficult to assess exactly who did how much. Jordan and possibly Saudi Arabia gave air-space clearance but the other countries were a bit ambivalent because for the last few years the UAE, Saudi Arabia and Qatar have been trying to build bridges with Iran. But at the same time, they don't want a nuclear Iran, they don't want an overpowering Shia presence cutting across Sunni heartlands. This ambivalence came out more post the conflict because Iran attacked the US base in Qatar, and this was all signalled in advance, there was nobody at the base. Iran had to do it to save face and Qatar was warned but Qatar made a very

strong statement and then immediately the Iranians expressed regret. They also called up everybody else in the region and expressed regret. So it was all a kind of well-calibrated little cameo... But the fact remains that this conflict really does not help the other countries.

On the situation inside Iran

One, there is economic turmoil within Iran. The 12 days of [war] resulted in a substantial loss of oil revenue, and a very large number of people could not get any income. This builds on the unrest which is already there among the poor, who are probably the strongest base of the clerical regime. Two, politically, the leadership has pivoted away from its pan-Islamic revolutionary rhetoric. The average Iranian has a positive view of the US. But now there is also a growing sense that you can't trust America. It is that Iran was negotiating in good faith and [the US] walked away and attacked us.

This is another shift, more towards nationalism. The average Iranian may want regime change but they don't want [it done] by foreign powers. If there is a regime change, it will be done on their own terms, and by themselves. This [war]

would have also given rise to a very strong lobby for a nuclear weapon. Because nobody says anything to countries who have nuclear weapons... So this may actually go the other way.

However, this is easier said than done because they are completely penetrated in intelligence terms, and it would be very difficult to pick up the fissile material if they still have it, and to actually do what they need to weaponise. If Iran were to walk out of the NPT (nuclear non-proliferation treaty), it would be a good signal that they've figured out that they can't be a threshold state. At the moment the focus will be on the regime's survival.

On the future of the two-state solution

A lot of the hand-wringing [about Gaza] in Europe is [the] easing of their guilt for the uncompromising support to Israel for decades, and also domestic considerations.

I think the two-state solution is pretty much dead at the moment. The second state needs land. It needs people to govern that land and Gaza is clearly not something on which a Palestinian state will ever be allowed by the Israelis. In fact, they are saying that a Palestinian state is an existential threat to Israel. A majority in [Israel's] Parliament is in favour of annexation of the West Bank. Unless there is a massive move by the US by Donald Trump to completely reject the Middle East, [the two-state solution] is [only] a statement of intent.

On the position taken by India

We have been fairly consistent that we are not in favour of a humanitarian crisis and the killing of civilians, we would like a two-state solution. We are very conscious of our very strong bilateral relationship with Israel, and therefore, we have been trading gently on this. But when even [Israeli] allies or the Europeans protest, when you are faced with a man-made famine situation in the 21st century, then India, as the putative leader of the Global South, will begin to speak up. As things get more drastic, the Indian situation will be constantly under review. When it comes to starvation, when it comes to forced displacement of Palestinians which Israeli ministers are talking about and which is a war crime, the situation will have to be met with the appropriateness it deserves.

On the 'ideal' solution in Gaza

The ideal solution would be a two-state solution. Sending the Palestinians away to another country is not a solution; it is an admission that there is no solution. You need a rethink within the Israeli leadership, the Palestinian leadership and the American leadership, and only then can you have a true two-state solution. The 2020 plan of Donald Trump was not a true solution, Israel will never leave the West Bank, settlers will continue, Jerusalem will be the capital of Israel. There is no solution. There has to be a deep rethink.
