Trump unveils vision for America's 'golden age'

Touts freedom, self-reliance on the eve of July 4

INA HISTORIC address marking the 250th anniversary of the United States, President Donald Trump framed the American legacy not merely as a history of political achievement, but as an unparalleled humanitarian mission that he claimed has fundamentally altered the trajectory of the world.

During his address from the granite slopes of Mount Rushmore, Trump declared that American generosity stands alone in human history. "No one has ever given more to charity, ended more hunger, cured more disease, or done more to uplift humanity than Americans, and no country ever will," he said.

He used the milestone of the nation's 250th year to pivot toward a vision of the future, framing this as the beginning of a "golden age of America."

India extends wishes to US

PRIME MINISTER Narendra Modi on Saturday greeted President Donald Trump on the 250th anniversary of America's independence and said the two countries' shared belief in democracy and the rule of law.

seated love of freedom and independence, which he described as a "precious legacy on which the sun has ever shined". The President also focused on the liberties he argued define the American way of life, including the freedom of speech, the right to worship, and the right to bear arms.

"For 6 years, I have saved, almost singlehandedly, your Second Amendment and I will continue to do so," he added. Trump called on Americans to protect the freedoms the nation's founders envisioned 250 years ago against what he has portrayed as the "communist" threat posed by progressive Democrats.

"We stand beneath the monument of these heroes, a true group of unbelievable people, and we rededicate ourselves to being a nation as big, bold, noble, and as great as these American giants, and that's not easy to do, but we're going to do it," Trump said. "There is now a resurgence of the communist menace in our land, including from newcomers to our country who embrace ideas totally opposed to our way of life and our great success," he said. "We're not going to let this happen."

Tankers take U-turn in Hormuz strait

AT LEAST EIGHT ships attempting to leave the Persian Gulf along the Omani coast turned back between Friday and Saturday, in the latest sign that reopening the Strait of Hormuz remains complicated by Iran seeking to assert its control over the key waterway.

ship-tracking data show. It is unknown why the ships have U-turned, though Iran has repeatedly said that vessels should only transit the strait through the authorised route. Over the past few months, vessels that

have attempted to leave the Gulf have reported hearing Iranian forces warning that they needed permission from Tehran.

Meanwhile, Iran's ambassador to Beijing said China and other friendly nations will be

granted "special considerations" when Tehran determines the level and nature of service fees charged to ships using the waterway. Abdolreza Rahmani Fazli said the waterway for energy supplies is now a matter of "national security".

Reacting to joint statement by UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer and French President Emmanuel Macron on Hormuz, Iranian Deputy Foreign Minister Kazem Gharibabadi has warned that the strait is not a theatre for the military display of extra-regional powers. He added that crisis-makers will be held accountable.



US DOJ seeks permanent dismissal of Adani case

THE US DEPARTMENT of Justice has forcefully defended its decision to abandon the criminal case against Indian billionaire Gautam Adani and seven others, telling a federal judge the prosecution was legally flawed, diplomatically counterproductive and inconsistent with the Trump administration's enforcement priorities.

In a sharply worded 10-page filing, the DOJ said the case "should have been dropped a year ago or never brought in the first place," arguing that the court had only a limited role in reviewing its decision to dismiss charges with prejudice. The filing came after US District Judge Nicholas Garaufis asked the department to explain why it was seeking to permanently dismiss the indictment, calling its earlier motion "terse, bland, and conclusory".

DOJ had in 2024 under the Biden administration indicted Adani and others for allegedly being involved in a scheme to bribe Indian government officials to the tune of \$250 million and to lie to investors to receive billions more in investments from other entities, during which alleged scheme Adani Green Energy Ltd raised at least \$175 million from US investors.

The DOJ said requiring prosecutors to publicly justify decisions to drop cases would discourage future dismissals, expose privileged internal deliberations and infringe on the executive branch's constitutional authority over charging decisions.

Cape Verde's fairy tale ends in a heartbreak

Argentina edge Cape Verde 3-2 in an epic clash

IN THE BEAUTIFULLY lit Hard Rock Stadium in Miami, a fairy tale met a tearful end. Cape Verde's journey from utter unknown to nearly pulling off the greatest shock in World Cup history ended at the hands, legs, and experience of the world champions, Argentina, in extra time, 3-2. But Cape Verde leave this World Cup as its most heart-warming narrative. They leave as heroes. Some leave as household names.

The toll was visible in its final seconds. Messi sank to his knees and prayed. Cape Verde's players staggered like ghosts. The world would spend days replaying this classic. Until the last second of the 120th minute, Cape Verde stretched the champions, and Messi himself, to the outer limits of physical and mental fortitude. They did not flinch when Messi broke their resistance in the 29th minute, controlling the ball on the rise with the outside of his boot to beat goalkeeper Vozinha. They weathered the storm, came out for the second half on the front foot, and equalised in the 59th minute through Deroy Duarte's sump-

tuously nutmeg of Emiliano Martinez. Argentina attacked in waves. Cape Verde stonewalled every one of them. Vozinha stood like the rock of Gibraltar, turning away a venomous Messi free kick from just two or three metres out while his defenders threw their bodies at anything that smelled of danger. Argentina's desperation curdled into uncharacteristic mistakes. When extra time began, it was a fight between equals. The smallest nation ever to reach a World Cup knockout round refused to yield. The dynasty of Messi, Maradona and Kempes stood on the precipice of its darkest hour. Three minutes in, Lisandro Martinez, a defender nicknamed "the Butcher" for the way he plays, came to his country's rescue with a goal built like a striker's. But their opponents

were not finished. Manager Bubiستا signalled for calm, and his players found it, even as the wilting Argentinians could not live with their energy. Messi was barely able to walk. Lautaro Martinez and Facundo Medina both went off with cramp. A shootout loomed until Argentina won a corner in the 111th minute. Messi's swerving delivery appeared to cannon in off Christian Romero's head. Argentina's third. It was the end of the fairy tale. But the memory won't. The day before America's 250th birthday will be remembered as the day the smallest nation ever to reach a World Cup knockout stage came within a heartbeat of dethroning the champions, burning an empire, and nearly writing the final chapter of Messi's career at the top of the game.
