Pune man's fight for quieter festivals strikes a chord, and ruffles feathers

Vidyanand Bapat says festivals should bring happiness, not noise, congestion and blocked roads. His argument has earned him supporters, critics, viral fame — and, after an assault, police protection



Originally from Raigarh, 37-year-old Bapat grew up a voracious reader who questioned conventions from a young age

The irony is not lost on Vidyanand Bapat. He does not use Instagram, Facebook or X. WhatsApp is about as far as his social media presence goes. Yet, over the past few weeks, his image and words have travelled across online platforms, turning this little-known Nanyang Peth resident in Pune and a former BPO employee into one of the most talked-about voices on noise pollution during festivals.

It began with a question he has been asking long before the cameras arrived: Why should celebrating a festival mean so much noise for everyone?

On Aug 24, Bapat found the opportunity to ask his question in public. At a meeting attended by Pune Municipal Corporation officials and Ganesh festival organisers on preparations for Ganeshotsav, Pune's biggest festival, the 37-year-old rose to speak. He came straight to the point. DJs, loudspeakers and high-decibel celebrations should not spill over to public spaces at the cost of residents' peace and access to roads.

Bapat was shouted down and eventually escorted out under police protection. A video of the episode went viral online, inspiring many people to a man who, until then, had largely made his case through letters, representations and conversations with officials.

For some, he was questioning set traditions and religious beliefs. For others, he was articulating a frustration they had experienced, but rarely voiced. However, Bapat said the sudden attention has little to do with why he began speaking out.

"Noise pollution is not something I raised this year. I have been pursuing it for a long time and have written to local authorities, public representatives, the CMO and the PMO, seeking action," he said.

Shukrawar Peth, remembers their Nanyang Peth house and the festival processions. At times, she said, the sound was so intense that their walls and the utensils stacked up on the shelves would rattle.

But if the noise of Pune's festivals was something Bapat grew up with, books were what shaped the way he responded to the world around him. His father recalled his young son was often found in libraries. This reading habit, and his tendency to question, shaped his public arguments.

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Journey To Atheism
A native of Raigarh, he moved to Pune nine years ago for work after completing his commerce degree. He settled in the family house in Nanyang Peth — an old neighbourhood closely associated with Ganeshotsav (Devrat Wada, Lokmanya Tilak's residence, which hosts one of the five revered Ganapatis in Pune is close by) and one through which unbecomingly noisy religious processions pass every year.

His parents, Subhas and Kalpana Bapat, live in Raigarh. His father, who worked in a private firm, spent more than 25 years in Pune before returning to Raigarh in 2002 to look after his family's ancestral home. Vidyanand was in class 9 when the family moved back to Raigarh.

His mother, who grew up in

his videos went viral, with some users dubbing him the "Shashi Tharoor of Marathi". Chief Minister Devendra Fadnis also praised his mastery over the language.

One Smriti verse he quoted, "Ghatam bhindya, potam chhindya, kuryad garbhah ratham" (Break pots, tear clothes, or ride a chariot by any means necessary — a person should become famous) — a satirical line suggesting that a person should do whatever it takes to become famous — spawned a stream of reels and memes.

His fondness for less common Marathi words also became a talking point online. The phrase "sawang prasiddhi", which he used to describe cheap publicity, was picked up by social media users and soon became content.

For Festivals, Against Noise
At the heart of the controversy is an argument Bapat says is often misunderstood. "I do not oppose Ganeshotsav. My objection is to the additions that have become attached to public celebrations over time, particularly loudspeakers, DJs and the occupation of public roads," he said. He falls back on history to point to the origins of Ganeshotsav. That Tilak started in 1893 to foster social unity and nationalism during British rule.

"Back then, there were no loudspeakers or DJ systems at all because there was no electricity at least in Pune. They came into use only 50 to 60 years ago and were gradually incorporated into festivals," he said.

For Bapat, that history is important because it demonstrates that a festival can retain its identity even when the manner of celebrating it changes. "Society has already moved away from oppressive practices like child marriage and

with an argument often resorted to physical assault."

He cited Galileo, Giordano Bruno, Socrates and Dabholkar while talking about ideas that faced resistance.

On whether he feared another assault, Bapat's answer reflected the way he sees the issue. "I would be worried if the cause I am fighting for was under threat and not my own life," he said.

The Sound of Silence
Bapat's conviction that celebrations can be held differently was strengthened during an unexpected period of silence — Covid pandemic. With gatherings, and large-scale celebrations suspended, Pune's streets became quieter. For Bapat, it provided a glimpse of a city without the familiar din. It also changed his understanding of what was considered inevitable. "I realise now that quiet celebrations are possible and loudspeakers and DJ can be stopped but the will power is missing," he said. He drew on Solapur's Ganeshotsav celebrations in 2025 conducted without DJ systems, as another example.

"Solapur has shown that festivals can be celebrated without DJs and loudspeakers. The absence of DJ systems also discourages large processions, elevating the importance of traffic. It proves that people can celebrate without causing inconvenience to others," he said. His alternative is to take control of public life altogether, but to redesign the way they occupy it — those who want loud music could use auditoriums, he suggested, while those without noise could be moved to designated routes outside cities.

Accustomed To Inconvenience
In Pune's Peth areas, residents have long accepted that during the 10 days of Ganeshotsav to escape the disruption, while a vast number simply tolerate it.

"For years, people adjusted to whatever inconvenience they had to bear. Instead, the current debate has encouraged many to question that acceptance and speak about what they believe is right," he said.

For Bapat, that conversation is less about changing existing tolerance and more about asking who gets a say in how public spaces are used.

"Festivals should be occasions of happiness, not a punishment for people living under the celebration. Celebration should not feel that they are paying the price for someone else's celebration. If that feeling continues, the divide between organisers and other citizens will grow wider," he said.

Maharashtra govt will not replace Chavan on CC panel

Mumbai: Maharashtra govt has said it will not replace Justice (retd) R C Chavan who has resigned from the seven-member committee appointed to draft rules and recommendations for implementing the Uniform Civil Code in the state. Chavan resigned following differences over the functioning of the committee in certain aspects.

A cabinet minister said, Govt will not appoint any new member to replace him. It will go ahead and prepare draft rules and make recommendations to implement UCC based on submissions from the existing 6 members. Govt has

decided to not respond to Chavan's allegations, too, the minister said.

In July, the state set up a 7-member committee led by retired SC judge Ranjana Desai to formulate a draft legislation for its implementation within 6 months. She had earlier headed a committee which drafted the UCC for Uttarakhand. Chief minister Devendra Fadnis had then said he intends to present a bill in the winter session of the legislature in December.

The Constitution, the directive principles of state policy say each state should form a UCC. The other committee members of the panel included retired Bombay HC judges R C Chavan and S G Mehrotra, former Maharashtra chief secretary D K Joshi, former advocate general Virendra Saraf, constitutional expert Ramesh Patange and educationist and social worker Suvrat Kulkarni.

Chavan submitted his resignation to the committee via email on Sept 19. The committee forwarded the mail to the law and justice dept, which in turn forwarded it to CM Fadnis who approved it. Govt accepted the resignation and

Expert panel to conduct a comprehensive inquiry: Min

Guwahati/ New Delhi: Two Congress functionaries were injured in a road accident during Assam Monday evening after an alleged attack on their convoy in Samsar where they were en route to attend the 6th Nagaland assembly bypoll. ACC secretary Manoj Choudhary and Assam Mahila Congress president Mira Borahkar were injured in the incident in Nagaon district. ACC in charge of Assam, Bhupesh Borge, was also part of the roadshow.

Congress later filed an FIR at Nagaon and sought arrest of the alleged assailants. Assam Congress media department chairperson Debabrata Bora alleged that "hired BJP goons" attacked the convoy with bottles, stones and bricks. He said Choudhary suffered chest and abdominal injuries, while Borahkar sustained head injuries.

Health department officials said the window AC in which the fire is suspected to have originated had been repaired about a week ago.

Dr Sodhana said 23 inmates were in the unit and four others in an adjacent ward. "Being previous inmates, they were already weak. A few of them lost consciousness immediately due to smoke inhalation."

The fire was detected at 11:40 pm while 27 newborns and their attendants were inside the unit, according to a preliminary report. Smoke filled the ward quickly, made it difficult for the newborns to breathe and caused the flames by 3 am," said Dr Jayashree, station fire officer of Adilabad.

4 dead as car falls into gorge

Shimla: Four people were killed and another was seriously injured after their car plunged into a 200m gorge in Haridwar-Nagana area of Himachal Pradesh's Kullu district early Tuesday.

Sources said the victims were returning to their native village, Jabbo, from a wedding when the accident occurred on NH-105 around 10 am. The deceased were identified as Rahul, Bal Krishna, Gunjan and Vivek Rana. The lone survivor, Suresh Kumar, is battling critical injuries in Rampur hospital.

Kullu ADGM Surjeet Singh Rathore said depth of the gorge made the rescue operation difficult.

Rathore added administrative released immediate assistance of Rs 25,000 to the bereaved families and Rs 5,000 to the injured person's family. Police are investigating the cause of the accident.

Woman poisons 3 kids in Punjab

Sangrur: A woman in Punjab's Sangrur district was arrested for allegedly poisoning her three minor children at the behest of her lover, police said on Tuesday.

On Aug 28, Love-protest Kar of Bhawanigarh allegedly laced some sweets with poison and gave it to her children.

SHO Yashpal Singh said the three children died within a span of 10 days.
