COLOMBO 21 killed in Sri Lanka bus accident

At least 21 people were killed and over 30 others injured after a passenger bus skidded off a cliff in Sri Lanka on Sunday, police said. The accident occurred in Kotmale in the Central Province when the bus driver tried to take a left turn on the hilly terrain. The state transport body-owned bus was taking 75 passengers from the southern pilgrim site of Kataragama to the northwest town of Kurunegala when it went down 100 meters off the cliff, police said. Deputy Minister of Transport and Highways Prasanna Gunasena said that 21 people died in the accident. Over 30 passengers were also injured in the tragedy. Deadly bus accidents are common in Sri Lanka and often occur due to reckless driving and poorly maintained roads.

KATHMANDU Mountain talks: India gifts 15 EVs

India gifted 15 electric vehicles to Nepal on Sunday to facilitate the organisation of 'Sagarmatha Sambah' (mountain dialogue). The Nepal government is hosting Sagarmatha Sambah in Kathmandu from May 16-18 on the theme 'Climate Change, Mountains and the Future of Humanity'. Indian Ambassador to Nepal Naveen Srivastava presented 15 electric vehicles to Nepal's Foreign Minister Arzu Rana Deuba at a function held at Foreign Affairs Ministry, according to a press release issued by the ministry. The vehicles will be used to facilitate the movement of guests and officials attending the event, which aims to highlight the impact of climate change on mountain regions.

TIRANA Albanian election sees old rivals

Prime Minister Edi Rama is seeking a fourth term as Albania's prime minister in a general election on Sunday, after taking on his political nemesis in a boisterous campaign dominated by the country's uphill effort to join the European Union. Rama's Socialist Party says it can deliver EU membership in five years, sticking to an ambitious pledge while battling conservative opponents with public recriminations and competing promises of pay hikes. Opening up the election to voters abroad for the first time has added to the volatility, along with the appearance of new parties, a shift in campaigning to social media and a recent TikTok ban. And Rama's opponents have hired a heavy hitter from the United States to steer their campaign.

Tariff talks with China making progress: Trump

Sensitive talks between US and Chinese delegations over tariffs that threaten to upend the global economy ended after a day of prolonged negotiations and will resume Sunday, an official told The Associated Press. Hours after the talks concluded, US President Donald Trump posted on social media that a reset on trade between both countries was being discussed.

"A very good meeting today with China, in Switzerland. Many things discussed, much agreed to. A total reset negotiated in a friendly, but constructive, manner," Trump wrote. "We want to see, for the good of both China and the U.S., an opening up of China to American business. GREAT PROGRESS MADE!!!" The meeting lasted over 10 hours and featured Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent, US Trade Representative Jamieson Greer and a delegation led by Chinese Vice Premier He Lifeng.

The official who spoke to the AP requested anonymity because of the sensitivity of the



talks, which could help stabilise world markets roiled by the US-China standoff. The talks have been shrouded in secrecy, and neither side made comments to reporters on the way out. Several convoys of black vehicles left the residence of the Swiss ambassador to the UN in Geneva, which hosted the talks aimed at de-escalating trade tensions between the world's two biggest economies. Diplomats from both sides also confirmed that the talks took place.

Saturday's talks were held in the sumptuous 18th-century 'Villa Saladin' overlooking Lake Geneva. The former estate was bequeathed to the Swiss state in 1973, according to the Geneva government. Prospects for a major breakthrough appear dim. But there is hope that the two countries will scale back the massive taxes - tariffs - they have slapped on each other's goods, a move that would relieve world financial markets and companies on both sides of the

Pacific Ocean that depend on US-China trade. Trump last month raised US tariffs on China to a combined 145 per cent, and China retaliated by hitting American imports with a 125 per cent levy. Tariffs that high essentially amount to the countries' boycotting each other's products, disrupting trade that last year topped USD 660 billion. Even before the talks began, Trump suggested Friday that the US could lower its tariffs on China.

Iran, US hold 3-hr talks on nuke deal

Iran and the United States held a fourth round of negotiations Sunday over Tehran's rapidly advancing nuclear programme, just ahead of a visit by President Donald Trump to the Middle East this week.

The talks ran for some three hours in Muscat, the capital of Oman, which has been mediating the negotiations, said a US official. Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesperson Esmail Baghaei also said the talks took place that long and that a decision on the next round of talks is under discussion.

Baghaei called the talks "difficult but useful." The US official, speaking on condition of anonymity to discuss the closed-door negotiations, offered a little bit more, describing them as being both indirect and direct.

"Agreement was reached to move forward with the talks to continue working through technical elements," the US official said. "We are encouraged by today's outcome and look forward to our next meeting, which will happen in the near future."

Iran insisted they only took place indirectly - possibly over internal political pressures within the Islamic Republic.

Tufts doctoral student released after six weeks

Rümeyza Öztürk, a doctoral student at Tufts University, returned to her home state of Massachusetts on Saturday after being held in ICE detention for six weeks, an arrest her attorneys link to the Trump administration's efforts to deport noncitizens who have spoken out against the war in Gaza. Her release followed a federal judge's order on Friday.

Öztürk landed at Boston Logan International Airport Saturday evening, just a day after US District Judge William K. Sessions III ordered her immediate release.

Addressing reporters at the airport, Öztürk expressed

gratitude for the support she received. "America is the greatest democracy in the world, and I believe in those values that we share. I have faith in the American system of justice," Öztürk stated. "This has been a very difficult time for me, for my community, for my community at Tufts, at Turkey, but I'm so grateful for all the support, kindness, and care."

She affirmed her intention to continue pursuing her case in court while resuming her studies and research.

Öztürk's March 25 arrest, captured in a widely circulated video showing masked federal agents apprehending her near her Somerville home, sparked national outrage.

Putin proposes direct talks, Kyiv says truce first

Ukrainian president Volodymyr Zelenskyy responded guardedly on Sunday to a proposal from Russian president Vladimir Putin of rapid direct talks aimed at ending the war, saying Kyiv was willing to talk but only after Moscow agreed to a ceasefire.

Zelenskyy, writing on X, said it was a "positive sign that the Russians have finally begun to consider ending the war" and said that "the entire world has been waiting for this for a very long time." He added, however, that "the very first step in truly ending any war is a ceasefire," in a reference to his proposal to start a 30-day unconditional truce on Monday. "There is no point in continuing the killing even for a single day. We expect Russia to confirm a ceasefire - full, lasting, and reliable - starting tomorrow, May 12th, and Ukraine is ready to meet,"

Zelenskyy said. Russian President Vladimir Putin in remarks to the media overnight effectively rejected that ceasefire offer and proposed restarting direct talks with Ukraine in Istanbul on Thursday instead "without preconditions." He said a ceasefire might be agreed on during the negotiations. Putin's counter-offer came after leaders from four major

European countries threatened to ratchet up pressure on Moscow if it does not accept an unconditional 30-day ceasefire in Ukraine. In a social media post several hours after Putin's overnight remarks about peace talks, Trump said it was "a potentially great day for Russia and Ukraine!" "I will continue to work with both sides to make sure that it

happens. The USA wants to focus, instead, on rebuilding and Trade. A BIG week upcoming!" he added. Macron said Sunday that Putin's offer of direct negotiations with Ukraine is "a first step, but not enough," signalling continued Western skepticism toward Moscow's intentions. "An unconditional ceasefire is not preceded by negotiations," Macron told

reporters at the Polish-Ukrainian border, according to French media.

Macron also warned that Putin is "looking for a way out, but he still wants to buy time."

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov, in comments aired by Russian state TV on Sunday, called Putin's proposal "very serious," aimed at eliminating "the root causes of the conflict," and said it "confirms a real intention for find a peaceful solution."

Turkish president Recep Tayyip Erdogan spoke to Macron and Putin and told them in separate phone calls that Turkey was ready to host the peace talks. He also said that a "historic turning point" had been reached in efforts to end the war, according to a statement from the Turkish presidential communications office.

Meanwhile, Russia resumed mass drone attacks in Ukraine early on Sunday, after its self-declared three-day pause expired.

Sheikh Hasina's Awami League rejects ban by interim government

Bangladesh's deposed prime minister Sheikh Hasina-led Awami League on Sunday rejected "with disgust" the interim government's decision to ban the party and vowed to continue its operations despite the restriction.

The Muhammad Yunus-led interim government's Council of Advisers or the Cabinet on Saturday night slapped a ban on "all activities of Awami League", including in cyberspace, under an anti-terrorism law.

Israeli strikes on Gaza kill 11, mostly women and children

Israeli strikes overnight and into Sunday killed 11 people in the Gaza Strip, mostly women and children, according to local health officials.

Two of the strikes hit tents in the southern city of Khan Younis, each killing two children and their parents. Other strikes killed a child and a man riding a bicycle, according to Nasser Hospital, which received the bodies. In northern Gaza, an Israeli strike killed a 16-year-old boy, according to the Indonesian Hospital.



The Israeli military says it only targets militants and tries to avoid harming civilians. It blames Hamas for civilian deaths in the 19-month-old war because the militants are embedded in densely populated areas. There was no immediate

Israeli comment on the latest strikes. Israel has sealed Gaza off from all imports, including food, medicine and emergency shelter, for over 10 weeks in what it says is a pressure tactic aimed at forcing Hamas to release hostages.

Soo reinstated as prez candidate

South Korea's embattled conservative party cancelled and then reinstated the presidential candidacy of Kim Moon Soo within hours as internal turmoil escalated ahead of the June 3 election.

Saturday's chaotic U-turn, after a failed attempt to replace Kim with former prime minister Han Duck-soo, underscored the People Power Party's leadership crisis following the ouster of former President Yoon Suk Yeol over his martial law imposition in December, which possibly

doomed the conservatives' chances of winning another term in government.

Kim, a staunch conservative and former labour minister under Yoon, was named the PPP's presidential candidate on May 3 after winning 56.3 per cent of the primary vote, defeating a reformist rival who had criticised Yoon's martial law. But the PPP's leadership, dominated by Yoon loyalists, had spent the past week desperately pressuring Kim to step aside and back Han, whom they believed stood a stronger chance against liberal Democratic Party.

crypto case | Celsius founder sentenced to 12 yrs in prison

The founder and former CEO of the cryptocurrency lending platform Celsius Network was sentenced Thursday to 12 years in prison after a prosecutor labeled him a predator who "preyed on hope" by enticing vulnerable customers to risk their life savings for a supposedly safe investment.

Alexander Mashinsky, 59, was sentenced by U.S. District Judge John G. Koeltl, who said a substantial term in prison was necessary for

someone who engaged in "extremely serious" crimes that enabled him to pocket over \$45 million while some of his customers lost everything and suffered severe psychological harm.

Celsius declared bankruptcy in 2022, exposing risky financial bets Mashinsky had made with some of the \$20 billion that thousands of customers poured into the company. He had promised that their money would be safe and secure at Celsius, which pitched itself as a modern-day bank where crypto assets

could earn interest.

The defense blamed the collapse of Celsius on a "cataclysmic downturn" of cryptocurrency markets in May and June of 2022 and said in court papers that Mashinsky's "actions were never predatory, exploitative or venal. He never acted with the intent to hurt anyone."

"He preyed on hope," she said. "Mashinsky knew exactly what he was doing - selling these people hope."

She said the customers were not going to be made financially whole regardless

of money that can be recovered through bankruptcy proceedings.

Before he was sentenced, Mashinsky sobbed several times as he apologized to customers and referenced his difficult past as his family was able to leave a small Ukrainian town in the former Soviet Union with help from the United States when he was 7. The family moved to Israel, where Mashinsky served three years in the Israeli Defense Forces as a fighter pilot before coming to America.
