BMC to create digital dashboard to provide data of trees across city

AT a time when Mumbai is reeling under heatwave conditions because of El-Niño, the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) has proposed an ambitious urban forestry exercise, under which the civic body is set to create a digital dashboard providing records of every tree in Mumbai.

The move comes at a time when the maximum city has lost as a substantial number of trees to make way for various infrastructure and civic amenity projects in the last 10 years.

Officials said the first step will be carrying out a tree census, which began earlier this month. This will be followed by consolidating the data into a digital dashboard. Under Centre's rules, a tree census should be carried out every five years by municipal corporations. In Mumbai, the last tree census was carried out in 2011 and the next one was due in 2016, however, the census got delayed and is being held now after a delay of 10 years and 15 years since the last census. According to the last census, there were 267.5 lakh trees in the financial capital.

Mumbai — which is one of the most densely populated globally — also has a low tree-to-human ratio. The city's estimated population in 2021 was 1.29 crores, or one tree for every four persons. An Indian Institute of Science (IISc) report, published in 2014, highlighted that the ideal human-to-tree ratio should be seven trees for every human being. A United Nations (UN) estimate puts it at 10 trees per person for sustaining a healthy lifestyle.

BMC data shows 21,098 trees were felled between 2017 and 2023 to make way for developmental projects such as Mumbai Metro, Bulevar, Coastal Road, sewage treatment plant (STPs) and Goregaon-Mulund Link Road (GMLR) along with many other road widening and bridge construction projects.

Meanwhile, civic officials said the census will go beyond a routine tree count, as officials plan to record 29-32 scientific at-

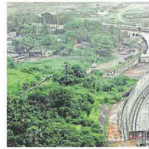

have taken over the past few years. Post Covid, to make up for the lost green cover, the civic body had taken up Miyawaki plantation, a Japanese technique of creating micro-forests in degraded urban lands.

Mapping trees and history

The key innovations proposed under this project include introduction of a QR code system for identifying and marking heritage trees. In Mumbai, several old localities like Parsi Colony (Dadar), Bandra and Grant Road have heritage trees like Baobab and Laburnum trees, which are century-old trees that have remained part of the city's ecosystem. These trees also have historical significance. For example, the Baobab trees are testament to Portuguese settlements in India, while the Laburnum trees known to have bright yellow flowers were introduced by the British. Today, five protected Laburnum trees stand near Mani Bhawan at Grant Road where Mahatma Gandhi lived for 17 years. Meanwhile, the Baobab has been given heritage status by UNESCO.

Civic body set to revive city's first waste-to-energy plant in Pali Hill

MUMBAI'S FIRST waste-to-energy (WTE) plant, which became operational in 2018 at Bandra's Pali Hill in Mumbai's western suburbs and became defunct last year, is set to get a new lease of life as the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) is set to revive the plant.

The plant became operational from May 3, 2018, at a time when the civic body's plan for the ambitious WTE plant at Deonar, which is set to become operational later this year, was only in discussion. The plant was also an entirely citizen-based drive that was spearheaded by the Pali Hill Residents Association (PHRA) in Bandra. The plant had a capacity to treat 100 tonnes of organic waste daily.

"The idea of constructing this plant was first mooted in 2016 and two years later, it became operational..." Madhu Popal, secretary of PHRA said. The plant had a capacity to treat 100 tonnes of organic waste daily.

workshop with residential towers. However, officials and locals maintaining the plant were well equipped that it had no emanating smells.

"The first operator who was maintaining the plant was doing it very well, however, the contract with him expired three years later... we appointed a new agency in 2021, following which the problem started. The new operator didn't carry out any operation or maintenance of this plant, which led to the facility developing problems. In July 2025, the operator handed us the keys and said that they won't be able to handle it..." Popal said.

"I have requested to explore if the capacity of the facility could also be increased," Swagna Mahatre, Bandra BJP councillor said. "We are exploring the possibility of reviving this plant by raising funds through Corporate Social Responsibility schemes," said Kiran Dighavar, deputy municipal commissioner.

Western Railway clears 1,500 sqm of encroached land in Malad after HC nod

WESTERN RAILWAY on Monday cleared nearly 1,500 square metres of encroached railway land between Goregaon and Malad stations after the Bombay High Court permitted authorities to proceed with the demolition of various structures built on railway property.

The demolition drive was carried out along the eastern side of the Goregaon-Malad section between kilometre markers 28S and 28E, covering areas near Chincholi Phatak, Haji Bapu Road, Dhoobi Ghat and Govind Nagar in Malad East. The action

followed a February 26, 2026 order passed by the Bombay High Court in Writ Petition and a batch of connected petitions filed by residents occupying the land. Petitioners had sought protection against the proposed demolition, challenging the eviction process. The court declined, observing that the occupants failed to establish legal ownership, tenancy or any enforceable rights over the land.

Court records show the matter involved 25 connected petitions about settlements and chavlis located along the railway corridor in Malad East. "In accordance with the directions of Hon'ble Bombay

High Court, a demolition drive was conducted successfully today between GMN-MDD Km No. 28/S to 28/E (East side). Approximately 1,500 SqM area has been cleared. A total of 36 hard encroachments and 24 soft encroachments have been demolished," Western Railway Chief Public Relations Officer Vinet Abhishek said. According to officials, 168 police, 25 Railway Protection Force, 65 Government Railway Police and 80 departmental staff personnel were stationed at the site. The demolition was carried out in phases, with 26 permanent structures removed initially before clearing the remaining encroachments.

Public Notice
Regarding Solid Waste Management

The Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change has published the Solid Waste Management Rules-2026 vide Notification No. S.O. 388(E) dated 27th January, 2026. These rules have been enforced with effect from 01.04.2026. Under these new rules; every individual and institution generating waste is Obligated to Fulfil the following key duties and responsibilities:

1. Four-Stream Segregation of Solid Waste at the source of generation:
 - Wet Waste: Kitchen waste, food waste, vegetable/fruit/flower waste, meat Waste and any other similar biodegradable waste.
 - Dry Waste: All waste, except wet waste, sanitary waste, special cares waste, including recyclable waste (plastic, paper, metal, glass, etc.) and non recyclable waste.
 - Sanitary Waste: Used, diapers, sanitary napkins, tampons, condoms incontinence sheets, (securely packed) and any Other waste.
 - Special Care Waste: Use of paint cans/ drums, pesticide cans/ containers/ bottles broken mercury their meters, discarded, CFL bulbs/ lamps/ tube light, batteries, medicines used needles and syringes etc.
2. Responsibilities of New Bulk Waste Generators (BWGs): New BWGs must set up and operate wet waste processing facility of adequate capacity including for horticulture waste to ensure processing of complete wet waste generated by them.

Existing BWGs who are unable to set up a wet waste processing facility will be exempted from doing so by the Talasari Nagar Panchayat, and such BWGs must register and obtain Extended Bulk-Waste Generator Responsibility (EBWGR) Certificates.

3. Use of RDF (Refuse Derived Fuel) by Industries: The target is to increase the use of RDF up to 15% over the next six years.
4. Strict Penalties and Environmental Compensation: In case of violation of the rules, penalties and legal action will be initiated.
5. Online Monitoring : Monitoring will be carried out through a Centralized Online Portal.
6. Stakeholders Covered Under the Solid Waste Management Rules-2026: All citizens generating household solid waste Bulk Waste Generators (BWGs) fulfilling at least one of the following criteria: (i) Buildings with a floor area of 20,000 sq.m or more; or (ii) Daily waste Consumption of 40,000 liter & more; or (iii) Generation of 100 kg/day or more of solid waste.

Institutions involved in managing/ pre-processing solid waste. Local bodies collecting or transporting solid waste. Material Recovery Facilities (MRF) engaged in segregating recyclable and non-recyclable solid waste.

All citizens are hereby informed to ensure compliance with the provisions of the Solid Waste Management Rules-2026. All stakeholders shall be held responsible for compliance, and violations shall face legal consequences under the Environment Protection Act, 1986.
